## GOLFERS TO MEET IN UTICA.

### Representatives of Clubs of Central New York League to Get Together.

The annual meeting of the Central New York Golf League is to be held in Utica today. The clubs in the league are the Onondaga Golf Club, Syracuse; Owasco Golf Club, of Auburn; Otsego Golf Club, of Coopers-town; Sadaquada Golf Club, of Utica; Wau-oka Golf Club, of Trenton Falls; the Country Club, of Rochester; the Country Club of Albany, and the Elmira Country Club.

W. B. Lee, who was elected captain of the local club last week, will attend the meeting. One of the matters of importance to come up is that of arrangements for the annual tournament of the league, which is to be held in Albany in June or July.



## GOLFERS MEET IN UTICA.

### Annual Meeting of Central New York League Held Saturday.

All of the clubs holding membership in the Central New York Golf League were represented at the annual meeting of the league held Saturday in Utica. The clubs are the Onondaga Golf Club, Syracuse; Owasco Golf Club, of Auburn; Otsego Golf Club, of Cooperstown; Sadaguada Golf Club, of Utica; Wanoka Golf Club, of Trenton Falls; the Country Club, of Rochester; the Country Club, of Albany, and the Elmira Country Club.

Albany was unanimously selected as the place for the annual tournament, which will be held Thursday, Friday and Saturday, June 28th, 29th and 30th. As in former years, the tournament will be largely given up to match team play. Each club is entitled to enter one team of six players. The matter of adding a putting and approaching contest in the tournament was left to the discretion of the greens committee of the Albany club.

It was voted that in case the committee report favorably the contests shall be under the supervision of the president and secretary of the club, together with the greens committee of the league, which consists of the captains of the eight league clubs. It was also decided not to expend over \$25 for two prizes to be given for the new events, if added.

Applications for admission were received from several clubs. It was deemed unwise to take in more clubs, and as the present members of the league are all desirous of staying in, it was voted that the Central New York Golf League remain an eight-club league. The treasurer's report showed the association to be in an excellent condition financially. Every club has paid its dues, the league owes no money and has over \$100 in the treasury.

Judge Teller, of Auburn, was re-elected president of the league, and Mr. Rochester, of the Country Club of Albany, secretary and treasurer. Walter C. Kernan, of the Utica club, entertained the visiting representatives on the Utica links in the morning and at luncheon at the Fort Schuyler club.

At the meeting matches were arranged to be played by Syracuse and Rochester and by Syracuse and Utica teams.

## WORK OF COUNTRY CLUB.

### Trying to Preserve the New Road to Brighton and Pittsford by Signs.

The Country Club of Rochester so highly appreciates the good road now being completed from Brighton to Pittsford, that it is making an effort to preserve its excellent condition. To this end the club has had several signs painted, and these will be put up at intervals of a half mile along the highway, hoping that the intent will be readily perceived, and that it may gain the co-operation of those who frequent this road. The simplest way to preserve it is not to wear it out, and the easiest prevention of wear is to protect it from ruts which come from following one path and always driving in the middle of the road.

The signs are as follows:

"You want a good road? Driving in one track makes a rut. Don't do it."

"Don't drive in the middle of the road and make a rut. Pull over to one side."

"Ruts spoil roads. Don't spoil this road by driving in one track."

"Make a new track where you drive. Don't wear a rut by following the other fellow."

"Keep off the middle of the road and you will have a good smooth road and no rut."

"Its continued wear in one place destroys a road bed. Wear a new place."

"Help keep this road in good condition by not driving in a beaten track."

This ingenious method of attracting attention to a well-known fact, and getting of repair expenses ought to be very successful.
