This match was characterized by the play of Hedstrom, who, with Crowell, turned in a card of 88, the lowest scores of the morning round. It is of interest in connection with these cards to know that Crowell had an 89 in the afternoon, making the lowest gross score of the day and winning the cup offered in this department of the game.

The second round was begun immediately after lunch. The few who followed W. W. Dake and Mr. Hedstrom, of Buffalo, with the exception of witnessing a brilliant match, found Mr. Dake decidedly off form. At the end of five holes he was five down. They halved the sixth, Mr. Dake won the seventh when Hedstrom missed a putt, the Buffalo man won the eighth and before the gallery at nine they each took a six. Mr. Dake was five down at the conclusion of this round. He succeeded in cutting the lead of Hedstrom down to three, by winning the tenth, sixteenth and seventeenth holes. Hedstrom won the fourteenth and the others were halved. W. W. Powers turned the eighteen with 19 less strokes than were required by Kirkover, giving Rochester ten of its twelve up. BUFFALO GOLFERS WIN CHALLENGE CUP

ARE NOW THE CHAMPIONS OF THE LOWER LAKES — DEFEATED ROCHESTER IN AN INTERESTING IF LIVELY PLAYED SERIES.

ROCHESTER, Oct. 6.—The seventh annual golf tournament of the League of the Lower Lakes opened at 9 o'clock yesterday morning on the links of the Country Club of Rochester in Brighton. Four teams, representing the country clubs of Detroit, Cleveland, Buffalo and Rochester, met to contest the club championship. Buffalo was returned winner.

Rochester went through the first round with flying colors, defeating Detroit by a score of 17 up. In the second round, with two exceptions, the Rochester team to a man played a poorer game than in the morning. The Buffalo play was also below the morning standard, but it was of a good enough quality to insure the championship for 1905-'06. In practice Wednesday the Buffalo men showed to advantage over their opponents, and critics predicted that the team from the neighboring city would be heard from.

Things looked pretty dark for Rochester in the second round of the team championship, when Buffalo player followed Buffalo player to the official scorers with an up card. Hedstrom, Ransom, and others came in winners over Rochester men, their scores totaling fifteen up. When W. W. Powers returned a card of 10 up on Kirkover, the Rochester contingent saw a chance for victory. The play of Curtis and Faust through the ninth green was watched with especial interest, for it was known that Curtis was up, and on the margin by which he defeated Faust depended Rochester's success. Curtis was two up when he halved the eighteenth hole with Faust, both taking a five.

CURTIS REACHES THE SEMI-FINALS

ONLY ROCHESTER MAN WHO
HAS CHANCE FOR CUP.

SURE OF THE CONSOLATION

Four Local Men Are Left in Semi-Final Round for the Consolation Trophy - Low Scores General in Play of First and Second Rounds

Cool weather, a bright sky and low wind marked the second day's play in the seventh annual tournament of the League of the Lower Lakes yesterday on the links of the Country Club of Rochester, Brighton. The rules of match play governed and practically no cards were turned in. Had the official scorers been able to show the figures for the day, it is probable that there would have been some surprises, for none of the thirty-two men who competed in the first round of the championship and consolation could plead lack of time as an excuse for a poor card. Excellent play marked practically every match.

With the team championship out of the way, attention was turned to the individual championship and consolation event, each of which brought together eight pairs. Play in the first round began shortly after 9 o'clock, and the round was not without surprises. One of the best matches was between Faust, of Buffalo, and Crowell, of Cleveland, both of whom had many backers. Faust was 6 up at the fifteenth tee and Crowell contented himself for the remainder of the day with love matches. Crowell and Stanley were the only Cleveland men left in the tournament, two of the team of four having returned home. Stanley beat Annis, of Detroit, in the first round and was paired with J. C. Powers in the afternoon round.

The morning play left the contestants paired as follows for the second round: G. T. Curtis, Rochester, vs. Bowman, Rochester; Stanley, Cleveland, vs. J. C. Powers, Rochester; Faust, Buffalo, vs. Cole, Detroit; Ransom, Buffalo, vs. Little, Rochester.

Speculators speculated on the merits of the respective pairs in an effort to decide which would produce the best golf, with a result that there were four galleries, about one in four persons holding the same opinion. T. Faust, of Buffalo, must be given the credit of putting Detroit out of the running. By defeating Cole, Faust put himself in line to meet Ransom, also of Buffalo, in the semi-finals to-day. Stanley won his match with Powers by a wonderful approach from a bunker and Curtis beat Bowman at the twentieth hole.

The Buffalo men might be better satisfied were they paired either with Curtis or Stanley. Both, however, are good players and capable of putting up an argument that will be interesting, since it means at least the runner-up's cup to one of them, if not the championship trophy. Followers of the game who are acquainted with the play of Curtis will no doubt prefer to watch his match with Stanley, who is champion of Ohio.

Stanley-Powers Match.

Stanley won his match with Powers in the second round on the last putting green. On one, both got into trouble, Stanley's ball striking the sunken bunker, while Powers drove into the round bunker. Stanley was the hole by one stroke with a five. From the second tee Powers drove to the apple tree. Stanley's three took him into the bunker and far enough under to cause him to play two strokes in getting over on the left side. He was on the green in six. Powers was on the green in four and both missed the putt, Powers having a six for the hole.

They were both over the bunker with their drives on three. Stanley's approach took him barely to the edge of the green. Powers missed a three-foot putt that would have halved the hole and Stanley won. On four they both got away good drives. Powers's approach was over the trees to the right of the putting green. They were both on the green in three and Powers made a pretty ten-foot putt for a four. Stanley missed and took a five. This left them all even.

On five Powers got away a bad drive, toppling badly. Stanley was well away and his second took him past the dog pile. His third was a little short of the bunker. He took the hit badly in playing four and the ball rolled only a few yards. Powers made a beautiful approach, part of thirty feet, falling to hole and by no more than two inches. This, coming on top of the bunker he had in the long bunker, was one of the best shots of the day. This played along with some steady game, leading to the eleventh hole all even.

Stanley played into the bunker on a hole that had to be. His approach was exactly on the line and without a doubt won the match. Powers hardly had time to shake hands with his opponent, when the gallery offered its congratulations. The match was the best of the day, though the Smith-Brown match was a very close one. A series of very interesting putts that allowed Powers to make the hole.

East, of Hills, and Cape, of Detroit, played a match that for nine holes resembled the contest between Powers and Stanley. Then East got an advantage and increased it on the second round until he was three up on the end of the sixteenth. When they both missed the putt, it was all even and there it was again at the conclusion of the round.

This afternoon the 1905 Fourth Regiment Band will play for the high school. The team and all the afternoon, weather permitting, will be served. A large crowd is expected, as the band will be played by the individual championship. The tournament will wind up tonight with a dinner to all the players and guests at the Kenwood Athletic Club. TO STOP POLO HURTS.

Association Adopts Rule to Prevent Accidents.

At the annual meeting and dinner of the Polo Association, held at the Metropolitan Club last evening, a schedule of tournaments for the coming season was announced. The White Marsh Polo Club was admitted to membership.

Chairman H. L. Herbert presided at the dinner and meeting, the discussion of business and of the menu being held at the same time. P. F. Collier was a guest of the association.

The following officers were chosen, all re-elected from last year: Chairman, H. L. Herbert; secretary-treasurer, W. A. Hazard; executive committee, the chairman, ex-officio, R. L. Agassiz, George J. Gould, John C. Groome, W. A. Hazard, O. W. Bird, Joshua Crane, jr., Charles Wheeler and Sidney C. Love. Aside from the adoption of the schedule, the planning of which required much care to please all the clubs which wanted dates, the most important action taken was the amendment to Rule 31, Section B. This rule read: "A player shall not interpose his mallet to interfere with an opponent's strike." It was stricken out and the following was substituted: "A player shall not crook his adversary's mallet, unless he is on the same side of the adversary's pony as the ball, or in a direct line behind, and his mallet is neither over nor under the adversary's pony. The mallet may not be crooked unless his adversary is in the act of striking the ball."

While officers of the association were reluctant to admit that there was any connection, it is understood that this amendment is the result of agitation growing out of the fatal accident in a polo game between teams representing Princeton and the New-Haven Polo Club at Van Cortlandt Park last fall, when Babcock, of the Yale polo team, was struck on the head by an adversary's mallet and died from his injuries a few days afterward.

The following schedule of tournaments for the coming season, prepared by the executive committee at a meeting in the afternoon, was approved:
