GEORGE HERMAN ELLWANGER

Death of Rochester Author of Note and Authority on Horticulture.

George Herman Ellwanger died last night shortly before 10 o'clock at his home, No. 593 Mount Hope avenue. Paralysis of the heart was the immediate cause of death. Mr. Ellwanger was born in Rochester, July 10, 1848. He was a man of extensive and varied literary accomplishments and was secretary of Ellwanger & Barry, nurserymen, of which his father, George Ellwanger, is president.

In the opinion of George Ellwanger, the father, "breadth of culture, variety of knowledge and experience, and contact with the world, especially with persons of culture, and correct moral principles, have always been the surest foundation for usefulness and success in life."

These teachings Mr. Ellwanger inculcated in the minds of his children, in whose interest his fortune was freely used. George Herman was sent to Europe to complete an education begun in Myron G. Peck's school in East avenue. Mr. Ellwanger went abroad at the same time Hiram W. Sibley was in Europe for study. He was a student in Vervey, Switzerland, and Angers, France, remaining abroad about four years.

After returning to Rochester, Mr. Ellwanger became editor-in-chief of the Evening Express. In 1873 he married Harriet Stillson, and his wife survives him with three children, Mrs. Boyd Watson, of Parkersburg, W. Va., and Mrs. Alexander Otis and Miss Julia Ellwanger, of Rochester.

Mr. Ellwanger was an authority on horticulture, on which he wrote in nearly all of a dozen volumes of which he was author. One of his latest works was the revision of "The Rose," written by his brother, which Mr. Ellwanger brought down to date in 1893. His first publication of more than ordinary value was "The Garden Story, or Pleasures and Trials of an Amateur Gardener," which was placed on sale in 1889. Two years later came "The Story of My House," and a year afterward, "In Gold and Silver."

It was four years before Mr. Ellwanger wrote another book. There came from his pen in 1896 a volume entitled "Idyllists of the Country-Side, Being Six Commentaries Concerning Some of Those Who Have Apostrophized the Joys of the Open-Air." "Meditations on Gout, With a Consideration of Its Cure Through the Use of Wine," was published in 1898.

Other works and the date of the publication of each follow: "The Pleasures of the Table," 1902; "Introduction to White's Natural History of Selborne, in 'The World's Great Books,'" 1898; "Love's Demesne, a Garland of Contemporary Love Poems," with critical introduction, 1896.

Mr. Ellwanger's literary accomplishments won from the University of Rochester the master of arts degree. He was a member of the Pundit Club, the Genesee Valley Club and the Country Club of Rochester. Mr. Ellwanger was interested in numerous business ventures and was one of three commissioners of Mount Hope cemetery.

Country Club of Rochester Golf Team Won First Intercity Match

Defeated Rivals From Buffalo Country Club by Thirteen Up in Play Made Difficult by a High Wind.

Teams of eight men each, representing the Country Club of Rochester and Buffalo Country Club, met yesterday afternoon in an intercity match on the links in Brighton. Rochester won by 13 up. There were nine men in the party from the Buffalo Country Club: C. M. Ransom, Park Wright, W. H. Faust, W. A. Gardner, H. D. Kirkover, Mr. Lloyd, Mr. Joyce, W. T. Atwater and J. K. Freeman. All played but Mr. Freeman.

The visitors were entertained at luncheon by the members of the Country Club of Rochester. Play was begun at about 2 o'clock, the last pair coming in at about 5:15 o'clock. Rochester was represented by J. C. Powers, W. W. Powers, Beekman C. Little, W. B. Lee, Gurney T. Curtis, J. A. Du Puy, W. W. Dake and J. P. Bowman.

The pairings were J. C. Powers vs. Faust, Bowman vs. Gardner, Little vs. Atwater, W. W. Powers vs. Kirkover, Dake vs. Wright, Curtis vs. Ransom, Du Puy vs. Lloyd, Lee, vs. Joyce.

Conditions were not conducive to good golf and medal play scores were not kept. A high wind figured in the work of all, pulling down what would have been excellent drives and approaches under more favorable conditions. The play, however,

was excellent, all things being taken into consideration.

While there were several members of the Buffalo team who had not played before this season, the team as a whole gave Rochester a much closer rub than the score indicates. Only three of the Rochester men were down, and one of these by I. W. W. Powers won by the largest margin, having Harry D. Kirkover 6 down. The match play scores follow:

COUNTRY CLUB HANDICAP ONE OF THREE FEATURES OF AN INTERESTING DAY

Golf Fixture Brings Out Twenty-One Contestants, the Honors Going to J. Craig Powers With a Gross Score of 84 and a Net of Exactly Bogey.

GYMKHANA SPORTS AND POLO TEAM MATCH

Gymkhana sports, polo and golf made Memorial Day at the Country Club of Rochester of three-fold interest to members. Nearly 1,000 persons, the first large gathering of the season of 1906, were present. Women members and friends made up a large part of the crowd, participating in several events and manifesting much interest in the others. In all the gymkhana sports there were twelve contestants. Two three-man teams met in polo and twenty-one men played eighteen holes in the golf handicap.

An accident in the polo pony race might have resulted seriously for Walter Howard. A new pony, said to have been ridden by Mr. Howard for the third time, stumbled while in its full stride and Mr. Howard went over its head. He was up in a moment, but the advantage of several lengths he held at the time of the accident was lost. Before the fall he appeared to be a certain winner. Mr. Howard was bruised and got about with difficulty after his accident, but will probably not suffer more than temporary inconvenience.

There was more than usual interest in the gymkhana sports, six of eight scheduled events being run off. The other two were abandoned because of the weather and the fact that the ponies were tired. In the first event W. J. Howard was returned winner with H. Occumpaugh a close second. Stick and ball, polo ball to be driven the length of the field and through goal, was the event. J. S. Wadsworth, D. Macomber, H. S. Gragg, J. Cooney, John Weiss, Arthur Barry, R. J. Macy, J. W. Lindsay, C. H. Stearns and E. F. Servis were other contestants. The same field took part in all the events.

The polo pony race, run second on the card, furnished a few exciting moments. Enjoyment of it was marred by Mr. Howard's accident, but as soon as it was seen that he was not badly injured attention was directed to the finish. H. S. Gragg was first to cross the line. The condition called for ponies 14.2 and under. The race was the length of the field, around a post and back.

With lances ten feet long and three-inch rings more than eight feet from the ground, the contestants in the event "riding for rings" had delicate work. C. S. Stearns won. He was also winner of the event "hurting javelins," in which contestants rode full gallop on a target. Spears were thrown before the rider passed a distance post, and to count must remain in the target.

The fifth event, "thread the needle race," was for members of both sex. As many women as there were contestants stood about fifty yards from their partners on the ground. The men lined up, mounted, rode to their partners and dismounted. The woman threaded a needle, handed it to the man and the man mounted and returned to the starting point. H. Occumpaugh, John Weiss and D. Macomber finished in the order named. The partners of several of the contestants exhibited nervousness in a few instances, and in one instance the needle was not threaded when all the others had completed the course.

Riding for scarfs and the cigar and umbrella race were omitted. The egg and spoon race furnished as much excitement as the thread and needle event. Each rider had to dismount, pick up an egg in a spoon and race to a mark and return. In the event of the egg being dropped, conditions demanded that the rider get another egg from the eggman. Every rider stopped for a second egg. The eggs could not be picked up and carried on because they were real eggs and one drop was enough. H. Occumpaugh won the race, walking his horse all the way. Others walked one way and at-

tempted to run the other, dropping their eggs along the course. E. F. Servis, who also took it easy, was second. R. Harris was third.

The polo match, followed the gymkhana events. The teams were made up as follows: Reds, J. W. Lindsay, J. Cooney, H. S. Gragg; Greens, J. S. Wadsworth, H. Occumpaugh, John Weiss. The Reds won, 6 to 0.

A feature of the match was the riding and play of Mr. Cooney, who drove four of the Reds' six goals. J. W. Lindsay and H. S. Gragg each had a goal. Three ten-minute periods were played. The Summary:

First Period—Goal by Red (J. Cooney) in 2:22.
Second Period—Goals by Red (J. W. Lindsay) in 3:22; (J. Cooney) in 2:14. (J. Cooney) in 2:16.
Third Period—Goals by Red (H. S. Gragg) in 2:18. (J. Cooney) in 3:24.

The golf play occupied a large part of the day. Several cards were turned in before noon and the last cards were not in until almost 6 o'clock. J. C. Powers was one of the first in and his card was the best gross and net score of the day. Twelve of the eighteen holes were played in bogey. The course is of nine holes with a bogey 20. The second roundly as a bogey of 78. The skill with which the handicapper did his work is shown in the work of Mr. Powers. Mr. Powers had a gross score of 84. His handicap was 9, giving him a net score of 75, exactly bogey.

Russell Armstrong gave Mr. Powers the closest rub of the day. He had a net 75. He was home in 97, with a handicap of 18. The work of the players in detail follows:

KINGSTON CLUB DEFEATED BY ROCHESTER POLO TEAM

In the second period Harty had a bad tumble from his pony. He escaped serious injury, however, and played until the finish. In the last three periods of play Rochester notched up three goals to the locals' two, making the final score 5 to 3. For the visitors, the playing of Scatcherd and Ocumpaugh was of a high order, the other two members of the team also showing up well in their positions. Harty and Williams starred for the locals, while Straubenzie also did good work. The members of the visiting club are being dined to-night at the British-American Hotel by the local team. Toronto is Easy Winner of International Polo Match

Scores Nine Straight Goals Against Rochester, the Locals Failing to Tally--Occumpaugh's Play.

In the first of a series of international polo matches to decide permanent possession of the J. G. Averell cup, Rochester was defeated yesterday afternoon by Toronto, 9 to 0. Few events of its kind on the grounds of the Country Club of Rochester have been as well attended, and it was regretted by Rochester followers of the sport that the local team should be so badly outclassed on such an occasion.

In every department of the sport, Toronto had the better team. Lack of team work was a glaring fault in the play of the Rochester four, while the Canadians worked together at all times and even individually were the better men. In only one of six periods of ten minutes each did the men from across the lake fail to score. Then Rochester, four goals behind the visitors, played a whirlwind game, fighting every inch of ground, giving when necessary and exacting as much in return.

The locals had few good chances for goals. It seemed as though a Toronto man was continually on the ball, and, when, by some brilliant stroke, a Rochester player pulled the Green out of a tight corner, the Canadian drove the wooden sphere back again, there being no one to follow it up. There were exciting situations in number and pretty work by members of the Rochester team individually. As a team Toronto was every minute the better four.

The Canadians scored three goals in the first period, Captain Straubenzie driving the first point home within two minutes after the whistle had sounded. During this ten minutes the ball was continually in Rochester territory, and it was only through the good work of Wilder and Occumpaugh that one or more additional points were kept from the visitors. Wilder, out of condition, soon tired. Occumpaugh, throughout the match, played Rochester's best game and he was frequently cheered by the spectators.

After Straubenzie's goal, Scatterd, imported from Buffalo for the international match, caught the ball on the far side of the field and drove it nearly 150 yards out of bounds near the Toronto goal. It was the longest ball of the afternoon. Toronto then forced the play and the ball was driven out of bounds twice near the local goal before Bickford put it through the posts in about four minutes. Straubenzie added another in three minutes and the period closed with Toronto three goals to the good.

The second period began in Rochester territory, where time had been called. The locals got the ball and carried it the entire length of the field, only to lose it. A black pony broke from the boy leading it back of the grand stand and added to the excitement by following the players down the field, full tilt. It was thought a rider had been unseated, but when they were counted there were eight up. Then it was discovered that the pony had taken a hand in the game.

In this period the locals played a strong defensive game and it was not until more than six minutes of actual play had elapsed that Young scored for Toronto. The following period was a draw, neither team scoring. Straubenzie scored for Toronto in the fourth after seven minutes of play. Bickford scored in 7:53 in the fifth period, and in the sixth Toronto added three more. The summary:
