C. C. OFR. SETS DATES FOR ANNUAL INVITATION TOURNAMENT

GRANTLAND RICE AND OTHER CRACK GOLFERS ENTER PLAY

Oak Hill and Country Club to Open Seasons Memorial Day---Announce Tournament Dates.

The number of golf announcements made this early in the season have been limited to a degree, but the one made known yesterday by Buell P. Mills, tournament chairman of the Country Club of Rochester, that the second annual invitation tournament to be staged by that club on June 30th and July 1st and 2d, is, perhaps, the choicest morsel of news that will be made all season. Being the only invitation tournament to be played off in Rochester, naturally it creates more than passing interest locally. However, the fact that some of the best of nationally known golfers have already signified their intentions of entering, lends more color to the event. Mr. Mills further made known the dates of all of the important programs to be played over the East avenue course, among them being the annual home-and-home series between the Country Club of Rochester and the Oak Hill Country Club.

Grantland Rice, editor of "The American Golfer," Special Correspondent of the Democrat and Chronicle, and one of the foremost writer-players in the world, has notified Thomas C. Parsons, chairman of the invitation tournament that he would come here to play along with Don Parker of Garden City, runner-up in last year's classic at the Country Club. The name Grantland Rice is known from coast to coast among the fraternities of golfers, baseball players and athletes in general, and the fact that he is to enter the tournament speaks volumes for the prestige which the Country Club of Rochester holds in golfdom. The tournament last season was the first ever staged by Rochester's oldest club and it was considered one of the best sanctioned by the United States Golf Association during the season.

Other Stars Entered.

Other celebrities who will play in the tournament are Reggie Worthington and Hamilton Kerr, well known metropolitan players; D. C. Corkran, of Huntington Valley; Joe Bydolek, of Transit Valley, winner of the Spring tournament at Pinchurst; Bob Chase, of Buffalo, who reached the semi-finals here last summer, and Sherrill Sherman, of Utica.

Arthur Yates, winner of the Country Club invitation tournament last summer, by virtue of his victory over Don Parker, will naturally defend the championship. Golf is the most uncertain of games and to-day's champion is to-morrow's "also ran," and to repeat this season Yates will have to be every bit as good, if not a trifle better than in 1923. John E. Dailey, Jr., one of Rochester's best golfers, is expected to return from Washington where he is attending Georgetown University, in time to enter. Vincent B. Murphy, champion of the Oak Hill Country Club, is another certainty.

From among its own membership the Country Club of Rochester expects enough entries to be strongly considered for the championship. Fillmore K. Robeson; William B. Macomber; Dewitt B. Macomber, runner-up in last Fall's championship event and many other expert players will be Country Club of Rochester hopes.

First Tourney May 30th.

Real tournament activities will not start until Decoration Day, when the Tombstone tournament and regular Golf Ball tournament will be staged. The following day a Blind Par tourney will be held.

On June 7th, the qualifying rounds for the Spring championship will be played, with the finals by June 21st. The first sixteen will play for the Spring title. John Day will defend the championship which he won last May.

On June 14th at the Country Club of Rochester, and on August 23d, at the Oak Hill Country Club, the team matches for the Country Club championship of Rochester will be played. Last season the Country Club of Rochester won handily, taking the first half of the match over its own links, and then going to Oak Hill where it scalped the enemy in its own back yard.

The Tournament Committee this season is composed of Chairman Buell P. Mills, Whiting B. Morse and William B. Macomber.

The committee in charge of the invitation tournament is: Thomas C. Parsons, chairman; Irving S. Robeson, Alfred M. Moss crop, Whiting B. Morse, and Fillmore K. Robeson.

B. C. C. INVITATION ENTRY LIST LARGE

At Closing Time 185 Individuals Had Filed For Play.

CLARKE CORKRAN MISSING

Committee Hoping His And Marston's Acceptances Are In The Mail.

When the entries for the twelfth annual invitation golf tournament of the Baltimore Country Club closed last night there were 185 individuals listed to compete in the qualifying round on Thursday. Of this number 78 were members of the host organization, while 107 were from out-of-town clubs and other local organizations other than the Baltimore Country Club.

It was explained last night that additional entries placed in the mail yesterday and reaching the club today or tomorrow will be accepted.

Clarke Corkran Missing.

Prominent among anticipated entries that had not reached the committee at closing time was that of D. Clarke Corkran, of the Huntingdon Valley Country Club, Philadelphia.

Clarke Corkran, formerly a member of the Baltimore Country Club, has been twice a winner of the event and needs only one more victory to become permanent owner of the main prize, the Maryland cup. Clarke's most recent victory was achieved last spring.

It also had been hoped that Max Marston, a clubmate of Clarke Corkran, would enter. Marston, now national amateur champion, participated in the 1922 tournament, but was defeated in the semi-finals by H. Lennox Bond 3d, of the Rolling Road Golf Club, this city, who went on to win the tournament that year.

Committee Still Hoping.

The committee had not given up hope last night that Corkran's and Marston's entries were mailed some time yesterday.

While there isn't the class among the entries this time that there was a year ago, when such men as Clarke Corkran and the several members of the Walker cup team competed, there is sufficient material for a good first sixteen.

Such capable linksmen as Albert and Rowland MacKenzie, Chris Dunphy, Guy Standifer, Donald Woodward, F. K. Robeson and the best of the local golfers are formidable enough to make the man who wins the event value his victory highly.

Good Men Here.

The MacKenzies, Dunphy, Standifer and Woodward are Washington men who are well known throughout the Middle Atlantic section. Standifer is a former member of the United States Walker cup team. Albert MacKenzie is the present Middle Atlantic champion and his son, Rowland, was runner-up to him in the event of a year ago.

Robeson is a member of the Country Club of Rochester and, like Clarke Corkran, has a handicap rating of two.

Among the better known of the local entries are B. Warren Corkran, who is the brother of D. Clarke; Frank Sweeney, State amateur champion; H. Lennox Bond 3d, winner of the 1922 invitation at the Baltimore Country Club, and Allan W. Mason.

Thirty-two Washingtonians.

Washington is well represented, there being 32 from the District of Columbia. Twenty of the 32 are members of the Columbia Country Club.

Pairings for the qualifying round will be made late tomorrow afternoon. Trophies will be awarded winners of four sixteens, together with the runners-up and winners of the defeated eights in each sixteen.

An all-day handicap tournament will be staged Saturday. Entries for the handicap event will close Friday afternoon.

TOME SCHOOL didn't bring back the Eastern Interscholastic title from Greenwich, Conn., but the Port Deposit youngsters are transporting their share of the silverware. W. K. Lanman, after eliminating his teammate, Donald Bomann, the 1923 champion, let his golden opportunity slip by losing to C. R. Brodbeck, of Mount Vernon-High, in the semi-finals.

In winning the team competition, Tome earned the right to keep the famous St. Luke's cup for a year. The Presbrey cup went to the winner of the tournament.

Each of the four members of Tome's team were given individual medals. Tome's final trophy was accounted for by W. P. Andrews through his good work in the second 16.

Among the out-of-town linksmen who got in a pre-tourney practice round over the Baltimore Country Club course yesterday were D. Clarke Corkran, of Huntingdon Valley Country Club; C. J. Dunphy, Chevy Chase, and F. K. Robeson, Country Club of Rochester. All three were in fine form, despite the soggy condition of the links.

Corkran and Dunphy took 74 apiece to make the round, while Robeson, who went around with Corkran, had a 76. Dan S. Neill and Lester W. McCrea, two local entries in the invitation, made the trip with Dunphy.

Dunphy went out in par figures, despite a 7 on the seventh, where he got into difficulties that carried him two over par for the hole. He came right back with birdies on the eighth and ninth.

It is not likely, in view of the slow greens and water-soaked condition of the links in general, that Clarke Corkran's record for the course will be lowered. The mark stands at 71, and Clarke set it in the medal round of the same event last year. Par is 72.

Last year 83 was the ultimate qualifying figure for the invitation. This may be raised to 83 or possibly 84

today, although it would appear that any linksman shooting above 83 is headed for a lower flight.

Six men shot 82 in the qualifying round a year ago. Only one was needed to round out the first 16, and in the one-hole playoff among the six, A. F. Kammer won with a birdie 3. Dr. Willing and Guy Standifer were two of Kammer's rivals in the abbreviated competition.

A noteworthy feature of the 1923 qualifying round was constituted in the fact that, while Clarke Corkran was the only man to shoot below 78, 10 of the 16 scores were in the seventies.

Baltimore golf fans are wondering how the Washington MacKenzies, father and son, will compare this time. Roland, the son, has come to the front with a rush this spring, having already won two invitations in Washington this season. In one of them he met Albert, his father, in the finals.

Roland's game was good last year, but not quite the equal of his father's. The father won over his son in the finals of the 1923 Middle Atlantic tournament, in a 19-hole match.

For the last two years Albert has been a finalist in the Baltimore Country Club invitation. Two years ago he was a sort of giant killer in the early rounds, doing great execution in clearing the way for H. Lennox Bond 3d, to whom he lost in the finals.

B. Warren Corkran and Albert MacKenzie together served in that capacity last spring. Warren eliminated Jack Neville, the Walker cup star, in the second round and then was in turn eliminated by Albert.

ROCHESTER GOLFERS PREPARE FOR OPENING TOURNEYS

Decoration Day marks the beginning of activities at practically all of the Rochester golf clubs, country and municipal, and each organization, save the Monroe Country Club and the Irondequoit Country Club, has already announced a list of events for the season. The former is the new club on Monroe avenue, now under construction. Work on the clubhouse is progressing fast and by Independence Day play will be in full swing there. The Irondequoit Country Club is expected to announce its program next week.

At the Genundewah Country Club on Friday a regular golf ball handicap tournament will be staged. Nearly 100 members have already entered this event. Elaborate improvements have been made over the course, the grounds and the clubhouse this spring, and members are jubilant over the prospects of the most successful season in the history of the club. William Glenn is president of the Genundewah Club this season, succeeding Dr. James H. Finnessey, who was killed in an automobile accident several weeks ago.

Play for the club championship for last season is now in the third round and it is expected that the titleholder will have eliminated all competition by Thursday. The Genundewah Club did not complete its championship tourney last fall. The President's Cup, donated by the late Dr. Finnessey, goes to the winner in addition to the club title.

At the Country Club of Rochester on Friday a tombstone tournament and a regular golf ball tournament will be held, while eagle scores for summer will start. A tombstone event is medal play in which

A perfect oval. The par of the course is added to the handicap of each player who has this total number of strokes in which to complete the course. And, if possible, go farther. Each player places a small flag in the ground where his ball comes to rest after playing his allotment of strokes, the prize going to the golfer who has gone the farthest.

Players at the County Club of Rochester are graded into three classes for the tombstone event, classes A and B, C and D, and E and F. On Saturday a blind par tournament will be held.

Play for the annual vice-president's trophy will be staged at the Oak Hill Country Club course on Memorial Day. This free-for-all event has always been popular, and a big field is expected to start. Within the next month it is expected that Arthur Yates and John F. Dailey, Jr., will have returned to Rochester to join the Oak Hills, whose main this season is to wipe out the defeat handed them last year by the Country Club of Rochester team in the Country Club championship match of Rochester.

At the Genesee Valley Park links, the season will bloom forth with a Memorial Day handicap for members of the Genesee Golf Club. COUNTRY CLUB OF ROCHESTER ANNOUNCES TOURNEY EVENTS

Three days, June 30th, July 1st and 2d, will be devoted to the annual Invitation Golf Tournament of the Country Club of Rochester during which the East Avenue Club will try to surpass all other tourneys, both in number of entries and in caliber of play. Invitations to golfers of this section were mailed yesterday by the invitation tournament committee for this play.

The eighteen-hole course of the club, situated within fifteen minutes' drive of the center of the city, is in excellent condition for play and low scores are expected from many of the entrants. This course is laid out in a terrain that is naturally excellent for beauty and difficulty at one and the same time.

Last season the C. C. of R. conducted one of the most successful invitation events sanctioned by the United States Golf Association. Handicapping for that event will be based on the player's home course handicap with all above twenty reduced to that figure. This committee in charge of the tournament comprises Thomas C. Parsons, chairman; I. S. Robeson, A. M. Moss crop, F. K. Robeson and Whiting B. Morse.

Last year's winner, Arthur Yates, of the Oak Hill Club, and the runner-up, Don Parker, of Garden City, are again entered and head a field which promises to bring out some stiff competition for first honors. Art Yates, after his performance in winning individual honors at the Wanakah Country Club in Buffalo in the League of Iroquois play last week, is again favored to cop off the trophy. He is decidedly on his game, shooting three par rounds on the difficult Buffalo links. He played good golf in other spring tournaments, making a particularly good showing at the Philadelphia tournament early this month.

WATTLES AND HATFIELD LEAD FIELD IN GOLF TOURNEY

QUALIFYING ROUND FINDS TWO OUT-OF-TOWN PLAYERS ON TOP

Shoot Country Club of Rochester Course in 76 for Victory; Match Play Starts To-day.

Sixteen star amateur golfers qualified yesterday for the championship flight at the Country Club of Rochester in the eighteen-hole round of play which placed F. E. Wattles, Jr., of Wanakah Country Club and A. R. Hatfield, of Utica, in a tie position for first honors in the medal play with scores of seventy-six. It took a score of eighty-two to qualify for the first bracket in the tourney which will be continued to-day and to-morrow with match play over the East avenue links.

Seven of the stars to tee off to-day in hand-to-hand battle on the links are from Rochester clubs, three from the home club, and four from Oak Hill. The other nine on the list are spread over much of Western New York, from Buffalo to Oswego, and down East to Shawnee-on-Delaware. These nine invaders comprise strong out-of-town attempts to win this annual invitational tourney which Arthur Yates of Oak Hill, and last year's winner, is expected by many to come through again as he is at the top of his game, his seventy-nine of yesterday being in the center of the scores of the first eight qualifiers.

Scores of the tourney were not as low as expected yesterday, the cool air and a slight wind keeping several of the shooters accustomed to low figures into big numbers while many of the second bracket barely missed landing in the first division. The second division is made up entirely of golfers who missed the first grouping by less than five strokes which shows the general quality of the shooting throughout the long list of more than 100 entries.

G. B. Hatfield held the position of medal winner until the last twenty players reported their scores when P. E. Wattles, Jr., tramped in with a needed four on the last hole and sank a short putt to tie him with a seventy-six. F. K. Robeson, of the home club landed third place in the play with a seventy-seven, coming in in thirty-seven with a birdie three on the last hole. Both Hatfield and Wattles came in with scores of 76 as a result of the first nine holes in forty and the last nine in brilliant thirty-six totals. Wattles shot superb golf the majority of the way, being forced to offset a seven which he scored on the sixth hole. He followed it with two threes and then on the home journey he put the ball to rest in four strokes on seven of the nine holes.

Second Sixteen Fast.

Drawings for the first sixteen practically assures the most intensive play ever seen in Rochester. In the upper half one local man is looked to match skill with seven out-of-town players. F. K. Robeson is in the upper half against Wattles, Tiekner, Syracuse champion, N. L. Bates, Union College player, and other stars. In the lower half, Yates, John P. Dalley, Jr., Weldon, Macomber, and other Rochester players will try to go through to the finals against Hatfield and Stan Brunick, of Oswego, who meet in the first round.

The second sixteen is figured on by the tournament followers as likely to produce almost as good golf as the first group as many of the former stars of other Western New York tournaments were a bit high on their game yesterday. Particularly is this true of Sherrill Sherman, of Utica, who is known as a high-class golfer but who only scored an eighty-five in his round. Don Parker is also in this group.

B. C. Little, was one of seven tied for last position in the second division and in the draw for places he was thrust down to leadership of the third sixteen where he will do battle with Harper Sibley in the opening match.

Lee Chase, of Buffalo, winner of last year's medal play with a brilliant seventy-three for the course, was forced to withdraw from the tourney due to illness. The absence of the popular Bison star was a blow to many of his friends who thought Chase might get his name on the cup here this year by virtue of a victory.

Play-off of the tie for medal in the qualifying round will be decided tomorrow, the two players agreeing to let the matter go until the final day. It is likely that a special eighteen-hole match will be decided on as an extra attraction for the last day. Wattles and Hatfield may, of course, meet in the finals which might automatically be chosen as the play-off.

DAILEY JOINS HOLE-IN-ONE-CLUB IN INVITATION PLAY

OAK HILL GOLFER FEATURES ON SECOND DAY OF TOURNEY

Robeson Eliminated for Biggest Upset of Day--- Yates Wins to Enter Semi-Finals.

A round of upsets and surprises featured the second day's play in the Country Club of Rochester's second annual invitation tournament over the East avenue course yesterday. Arthur Yates, Oak Hill ace, and defending champion was the only favorite to come through his first and second round matches to enter the semi-finals which will be played this morning. The biggest upset of the day was the defeat of F. K. Robeson, last hope of the home club for titular honors, by R. L. Tickner, of the Onondaga Country Club, of Syracuse.

Robeson lost a bitterly contested match to the Salt City champion in the second round, 2 and 1, after winning by the same score from M. W. Comstock, of the Waukegan Club of Buffalo in the first of the match pairings. R. L. Tickner showed marked improvement with added familiarity with the local links and played superb golf in his contest with Robeson to cop the semi-final right.

Dalley's Hole in One.

The second surprise of the day was J. F. Dalley, of the Oak Hill Club. The youthful local crack qualified for full standing in the hole-in-one club when he took exactly that single swing on the thirteenth hole to land his little pellet of gutta percha inside the metal container which signifies completion. The hole is a short one, less than 200 yards, but the feat was a remarkable one for match play and for the circumstances before and after the hole.

Dalley was paired with W. B. Macomber, Country Club of Rochester, in the second round and was two down when he drove off the thirteenth tee. Cutting off one here, he duplicated the performance by taking a three on the fourteenth to make the match even and then to show he possessed "golfer's nerve" and was not playing above his head, came through with a two on the fourteenth hole to put him one up. Macomber took one of the holes before the eighteenth and the match went into extra holes. Dalley was again on his game after crossing the road and took a three to terminate the match on the twentieth hole when Macomber sliced a few feet into the rough and required a four to finish.

Art Yates, Robeson and Dalley were the favorites with the gallery yesterday, the Macomber-Dalley match taking every one in sight "across the road" when they went over for the extra holes after finishing even-up.

R. S. Worthington, of Shawnee-on-Delaware, one of those most feared to take the trophy out of Rochester, continued his threat by playing unbeatable golf in both his rounds easily disposing of P. B. Wattles, of Waukegan Country Club, Buffalo, who tied for the medalist on Monday 6 and 5, and W. L. Bates, Jr., Oswego Country Club, 4 and 3.

A. R. Hatfield, Jr., Yahnundasis Club, of Utica, tied for medal in the qualifying round with Wattles, won his first match with Stan Emerick, of Oswego, but fell before Yates, 2 and 1, in a good game in the afternoon.

Seven extra-hole matches indicates the brand of golf played on a day and course admirably suited to the grand old Scottish game. Nearly all the matches in all five divisions and in the consolation events brought out excellent shooting. D. M. Parker, of the Genesee Club, furnished the thrill in the second sixteen, the public link ace taking J. M. Word, of the Country Club into camp on the twentieth hole. A. G. Devins, Rochester Country Club, covered himself with enough golf glory for a season when he trounced J. M. Rhett, of New York city, 4 and 3.

The semi-finals and finals to-day bear promise of contests that will be well worthy of the gallery which is expected to follow the players. Worthington and Tickner will tee-off at 9 o'clock in what will be the feature match but no more of a favorite with the crowds than the Dalley-Yates match which will leave the first tee five minutes later.

The two local players will not have the competition aspect attached to their match as in the other semi-final, as Dalley is hardly expected to defeat the more experienced Yates. Personal followers will have a difficult problem picking the Oak Hill man to "squeeze for."

TICKNER DEFEATS YATES IN FINAL ROUND OF TOURNEY

SYRACUSE STAR GOLFER'S PLAY TOO FAST FOR OAK HILL ENTRY

Long Driving Wins Final Round in First Sixteen for Visitor; One Home Club Victor.

Long driving by R. L. Tickner, of the Onondaga Country Club of Syracuse, and city champion there enabled the visiting golfer to take first position in the Country Club of Rochester second annual amateur invitational tournament by means of a sensational 1-up victory over Arthur Yates, Oak Hill, winner of last year's tourney. Tickner had previously eliminated R. S. Worthington, of Shawnee-on-Delaware, in the semi-final round by 3 and 2 while Yates had crimped the hopes of a fellow club member, John F. Dailey, Jr., 2 and 1.

Weighing about half as much as the rotund Yates, Tickner's feat of out-driving one of the hardest hitters in Rochester golfing circles brought him victory. Tickner is of the same type of golfer as is April Walker, weighing about 130 pounds but packing a wallop in every ounce of it. Yates was trying more for accuracy in his drives than distance but even with some of the power turned off was finding it hard to keep down the center of the fairways.

Sibley Wins for Home Club.

Sherrill Sherman, of Yahnundasis Country Club, won the final match of the second sixteen when he defeated R. G. Wey, of the home club, 6 and 5. Golfing fans who were backing players of the East avenue club found solace in the showing of their men only in the third sixteen in which Harper Sibley won the final match from R. D. Price, New York, 1 up after the latter had finished the 18 holes even with the local player. Price had three matches in succession go into extra holes, winning from Curtis in twenty-one holes, and from Krenepin in twenty holes, but dropping his match to Sibley on the nineteenth. Two Oak Hill players won the fourth and fifth sixteen championships, J. Raines defeating J. T. Brennan, of Baltimore, 3 and 1, and C. W. McKay, defeating J. E. Scrantom, of the home club, 6 and 5.

Hatfield Wins Medal.

S. Cutler and E. C. Moore won the best-ball, four-ball, 18-hole handicap tourney with a net of 62 strokes, resulting from a gross of 83 and a handicap of 21. In the individual handicap 18-hole medal play, H. K. Kerr, Genesee, defeated a good field of contestants by notching a 77 over the course for a net of 70. F. K. Robeson was awarded low gross with 78 in this event.

F. E. Wattles, of Wanakah and A. R. Hatfield, Jr., Yahnundasis who tied for first honors in the medal play round of Monday played off the tie yesterday with Hatfield leading Wattles by three strokes to take the award.

Yates took the lead on Tickner in the final round of the first sixteen by winning the fourth hole but the Salt City champion won the fifth to even matters and then copped the seventh to take the lead. The eighth was halved but on the ninth Yates scored a four and again evened the count. Both players went out in 43. While Tickner's short game was off form, his long straight drives more than made up for his shortcomings on the iron shots and kept him close to Yates.

Long Putt Wins Title.

On the tenth hole Tickner notched an advantage of 1-up and after halving the eleventh, he added another hole to his credit on the long twelfth. Yates then rallied and halved the thirteenth and with a four and a three to Tickner's five and four, respectively, won the fourteenth and fifteenth to square the match. The seventeenth decided the championship. Tickner was on the green nicely in two and holed for four while Yates overshoot the green on his second shot and when he got back on it took him two more to hole out.

Tickner needed a long putt on the eighteenth to square the hole and assure victory and with a brilliant display of nerve, he leaned over the ball and sunk it into the cup after a roll on the green of ten feet over a terrain that might have thrown many a more-experienced golfer off his game and caused the match to an extra hole or even more. It was Tickner's best single shot of the day.

AMERICAN GOLFER PRESENTS COUNTRY CLUB WITH TROPHY

**Don M. Parker, Business Manager of Periodical
and Noted Amateur Player, Announces Gift.**

Appreciation of the manner in which the Country Club of Rochester has conducted the first two of its annual Invitation Tournaments has been expressed in a concrete way by Don M. Parker, business manager of the American Golfer, the leading periodical devoted exclusively to the ancient Scottish game in America, in the presentation to the club of a trophy on behalf of the publication. The trophy will be known as the American Golfer Trophy and will be played for at future tournaments of the Country Club of Rochester by pairs representing the various clubs participating.

Parker, who is a nationally-known amateur and who represented the Garden City Country Club of Long Island in the tournament, made the announcement of the gift at the dinner which closed the second annual tournament last Wednesday evening. He spoke of the great enjoyment he had had in participating at both the 1923 and 1924 tourneys and complimented the local club on the manner in which the tourneys have been run. The gift was accepted for the club by President William C. Barry.

Tournament a Success.

Details for the award of the cup in competition have not yet been definitely settled but will be announced prior to the tournament next summer. Parker, who qualified for the second sixteen in this year's tourney, is also secretary and treasurer of the New York State Golf Association. Grantland Rice, whose golfing articles, *Tales of a Wayside Tee*, appear regularly in the Democrat and Chronicle, is contributing editor of the *American Golfer* on whose behalf Parker made the presentation.

Visiting players expressed themselves very freely as to the good time they had had at the tournament. President Barry when asked as to how the club felt regarding the tournament just closed, said he and the other club members were greatly pleased, especially with the response to invitations sent other clubs. A number of players participated who have United States Golf Association handicaps as low as five, and there appeared to be as much golfing ability in the group which qualified for the second sixteen as competed in the first division.

The calibre of the match play in the tournament is represented by the fact that eleven matches were carried to extra holes. Mr. Barry expressed his gratitude to the out-of-town amateurs who participated, crediting their entries as making the meeting successful. Seventeen clubs from some twelve cities were represented in the 112 entries who teed-off in the qualifying round last Monday.

HAGEN AND SMITH HUMBLIED IN MATCH WITH BRITISH PROS

**Duncan and Mitchell Win International Foursome
Honors 4 Up and 2 to Play.**

Oxhey, England, July 11.—(By the Associated Press)—George Duncan and Abe Mitchell, leading British professional golfers, to-day avenged their defeat of last year at the hands of Walter Hagen and Jim Barnes, of America, by defeating Hagen and McDonald Smith 4 up and 2 to play, in their seventy-two-hole match for a purse of £300 and international foursome honors.

Last year the American team won by 4 up and 3 to play. On the first thirty-six holes of this year's contest, played yesterday at the St. George's Club, the British pair finished 4 up. At the conclusion of the last half of the match this afternoon over the Oxhey course the Americans had succumbed and Duncan and Mitchell prepared to split the £300 purse. Hagen and Smith will receive £50 each as the losers' end.

Lose Match on Greens

The American contenders started today's rounds confronted with the big task of overcoming the lead of four holes which their opponents had stowed away. During the first part of the morning round it looked as though they would do this easily. They were both driving long and straight and putting well. But at the tenth Hagen started missing his five and six-foot putts and from then on his green work was not in the championship class. In fact it was only average.

To-day's battles, like those of yesterday, took place on the greens. Here Duncan and Mitchell kept the upper

hand even in the face of some brilliant work by Smith. The steady Californian saved the situation several times in both rounds with long, hard putts. But his approaches were sometimes short and the best he could do was to hold the second day's tourney on an even-~~stephen~~ basis.

Duncan pleased the gallery of more than 5,000 spectators that followed today's play by giving a masterly exhibition of his professional game. Never once did he fail to drive straight down the fairway. His short shots always hit the green and, the few times his approaches found bunkers, he made the spectators gasp by his well-played recoveries.

There was very little fault to be found to-day with the drives and seconds of the foursome. On several holes their drives lay huddled within a few feet of each other. This course, which is a paradise for long hitters, is 6,478 yards in length and has eleven holes over 400 yards long. Three times in the first seven holes, which were eventually halved in par figures, it was up to Hagen to sink a five or six-footer to win, but each time the ball grazed the edge of the cup and passed on.

Walter Hagen, British open golf champion, will not compete in the Canadian open golf championship, which is to be held at Mount Bruno on Friday and Saturday. A telegram received from Boston last night stated that he had announced he will be unable to come to Canada over the coming week-end owing to a previous engagement to play at the Green Hill Farms Country Club, Philadelphia. His appointment to meet Marston, national amateur champion, on Saturday, could not be changed, he said.

Gene Sarazen, however, has headed the advance guard of American players who have sent in their entries, he having arrived in Montreal yesterday morning after motoring from New York, with his wife. Having refreshed himself at the Mount Royal Hotel, where he is staying, Sarazen drove out to the Mount Bruno links yesterday to look over the course. Interviewed in the Mount Royal Hotel last night Gene stated that he thought the course at Mount Bruno was everything he had heard it to be.

it to be.
"Say, I think it is quite the most beautiful course I have seen anywhere," he said.
"This is the first time I have ever been to Canada, and, gee, you just don't know how beautiful the drive is from New York to Montreal. I would just like to stay here a long while, but we will have to leave here on Saturday night."
Asked what "we" meant, Sarazen said, "Well, Mrs. Sarazen is with me, we are still honeymooning, you know."
Thus, with the entry list closing at noon today, the stage is all set for what promises to be one of the most successful of any previous open championships in the Dominion. It was stated last night that no name will be included in the draw which is received after noon today. Any entries that are received after that time will be paired off as they come in. It is further announced that entries may be sent in by telephone to Main 7031 (the Mount Bruno Club) up to twelve o'clock, providing that such entries are received in writing by the Royal Canadian Golf Association at the Mount Royal Hotel by five o'clock.

NEW LOCAL ENTRIES.

An unusual feature of the entries received to date is the comparatively few local entries. It will be noted from the list which is appended below that only one or two players have entered from each of the larger local clubs, some clubs as yet having no representative in the tourney.

Although he visited Mount Bruno yesterday Gene Sarazen did not play. Leo Diegel and his fellow-countryman, W. Bourne, did, however, the former turning in a card of 69 and the latter one for 72. It was the first time that Diegel had been over the course. These golfers declared the course to be in perfect condition and it was the prediction of these players that the one who could turn in consistent 60's in the tournament would clinch the laurels. Mike Brady, from Detroit, was also out on the course.

HAGEN AND KIRKWOOD IN EXHIBITION HERE ON FRIDAY

TWO FAMOUS GOLF PROS TO PLAY OVER OAK HILL COURSE

Will Meet Robeson and
Yates in 18-Hole
Foursome.

The greatest pair of exhibition golfers that ever teamed for a swing around the golfing centers of the world will return to Rochester on Friday afternoon of this week when Walter Hagen, Rochester's famous homebred, will pair with Joe Kirkwood, trick-shot wizard from Australia, tee off in a foursome against Arthur Yates, of Oak Hill, and Fillmore Robeson, Jr., of the Country Club of Rochester, over the Oak Hill Country Club course. The match between the world's greatest professionals and Rochester's best amateurs will be of eighteen holes and will start at 2:15 o'clock.

Hagen, known as the greatest tournament winner of present-day golf, will be playing here for the second time with the British open championship dangling from his string of victories, by virtue of his recent victory over the world's best at Hoylake. Hagen has won the competition twice and has also won the American open championship the same number of times, being the only golfer to win both more than once. He is also the only American golfer to win the British championship more than once. Added to that, in 1923, he finished but one stroke behind the winner, a short missed putt costing him a tie and perhaps, victory in the play-off.

"World's Best Golfer.

British newspaper critics were lavish in their praise of the Rochester boy when he won his recent triumph.

R. E. Howard of the London Mail said:

"Hagen has become the world's best golfer."

Bernard Darwin of the London Times said:

"I never in my life saw such a series of courageous recoveries as Hagen made in the last nine holes to win the British Open Championship at Hoylake."

Hagen has met with tremendous success since he was the professional at the Country Club of Rochester and has already created the greatest record ever made by an American golfer. He has won the American open championship twice and the British open championship twice. This gives him four major championships and, as he is but 31-years-old and has a great many years of competitive golf ahead, he will undoubtedly surpass the record of seven major championships made by Harry Vardon. Vardon won the British title six times and the American title once. Hagen's victories in tournaments of lesser importance are too numerous to mention.

Played Here Last Year.

For more than two years now Hagen and Kirkwood have been engaged in playing exhibition golf and they have appeared in all but six states in the United States, in Canada, in Mexico, in Great Britain and on the continent and have been urged to make a tour of South Africa and South America.

Last year when Hagen and Kirkwood played over the Country Club of Rochester course, Walter furnished the golfing exhibition from a scoring stand point and the player from the other side of the world showed his marvelous control over the pellet with his trick shots. He can top them to the nth degree of control, can slice them, hook them, cut under them and backspin them with uncanny control. He may make one of them talk during his Friday's exhibition. Some golfers say that that would be easier than trying to perform his tricks.

Final arrangements were made yesterday to bring the pair here by Clarence Wheeler, president of the Oak Hill Club. The matches will be played on the Elmwood course and a tour of inspection will be made, showing Hagen and Kirkwood the new courses between East avenue and Monroe avenue that have recently been graded and which will be seeded by end of this week according to contractors in charge. These new courses will be two of the best eighteen-hole lay-outs in this part of the country and will not be played until the spring of 1920 when they will have settled and hardened, making them right for perfect play.

HAGEN AND KIRKWOOD TO PLAY ROCHESTER AMATEURS TO-DAY

Famous Professionals Will Oppose Robeson and Either Yates or Dailey at Oak Hill.

Walter Hagen, Rochester's great homebred golfer, and the world's best by virtue of his victories in tournament play, and Joe Kirkwood, the greatest of trickshot golfers, will pair off this afternoon in a foursome over the links of the Oak Hill Country Club against two of Rochester's best players. Their opponents depend on the showing of Art Yates and John F. Dailey, of Oak Hill, in the New York state amateur tournament at Buffalo this morning. The loser in this battle of stars will pair with Fillmore Robeson, of the Country Club of Rochester, against the professionals.

Country Club of Rochester, against the

Robeson lost yesterday afternoon to Yates by only 3 to 2 in the Buffalo tourney. All three of the players are able to give the professionals a battle, due to their familiarity with the Oak Hill course, now in its best playing condition. It has been carefully treated all summer with this match in view.

All three play the course in even fours with monotonous regularity and Yates has the course record of 63, set last year, while Dailey and Robeson have several times broken 70 over the eighteen-hole route.

Local Amateurs May Win.

The fine showing of the Rochester players in the state tourney at Buffalo has led many fans to believe that Hagen, carrying the British open championship, and Kirkwood will run into the stiffest kind of opposition and that the star professionals will be defeated. Hagen hates to lose any kind of a match and hates to lose in his home town worse than on any other lines especially with a crowd of friends following him. This feeling is bound to bring out the best golf of "our home champion."

With golf growing faster than any other sport in recent years and adding thousands of devotees every season, it is expected that a big following will be out to watch the favorites. Hagen and Kirkwood always draw well in Rochester and with Oak Hill coming to the front in national golfing circles by virtue of its new plans, even a larger crowd than saw the match last year at the Country Club of Rochester is expected to follow the quartet.

The players will tee off at 2:30 o'clock and Kirkwood's exhibition will follow immediately upon the finish of the eighteenth hole. All of the quartet will hole out all putts, so that medal score as well as bestball score will be obtained by those interested in individual players.

Last year Kirkwood in warming up, put on a few of his back-spin shots and trick ways of avoiding stymies which were a most interesting part of the program, so that early arrivals at the course will not find their interest waning before the actual start of the exhibition.

He will arrive in Rochester from Syracuse with his daughter about noon and will be conducted to the Country Club of Rochester for luncheon. During the afternoon the visiting engineer will be taken on a sightseeing trip around the city.

The dinner-meeting, which is expected to attract the entire membership of the organization here, is scheduled for the Genesee Valley Club at 7 o'clock. Mr. Grunsky will deliver an informal talk on affairs of the society. T. J. Morrison, division engineer in charge of Barge canal operations and president of the Rochester section, will be toastmaster for the dinner. There will be no other speakers.

Although the American Society of Civil Engineers is the oldest of any of the national technical societies, having been founded in 1852, next week's visit of President Grunsky will mark the first time a national head of the order has been entertained in Rochester while in office. NAMING JAMES G. CUTLER FOR ELECTION TO BOARD OF REGENTS WIDELY APPROVED

**Notable Business and Public
Career Basis of Choice
for Education Post.**

Widespread satisfaction was expressed yesterday with announcement that the name of former Mayor James G. Cutler will be presented to the Legislature for election to the Board of Regents of the University of the State of New York to take the place of the late Pliny T. Sexton, of Palmyra. Republican Leader James L. Hotchkiss made this public after a conference with Simon L. Adler, majority leader of the Assembly.

Mr. Cutler, if he is elected by the Legislature in joint session, will represent the Seventh Judicial District which embraces Cayuga, Livingston, Monroe, Ontario, Seneca, Steuben, Wayne and Yates counties. His term will expire in 1926, when he undoubtedly will be re-elected for a full term of twelve years. The regents serve without compensation.

When the Legislature convenes on January 1st, the two houses will be called for a joint session to elect two members of the Board of Regents, one to succeed Charles B. Alexander, of Tuxedo, whose term will expire on January 1st, and one to succeed Mr. Sexton. Mr. Cutler's name will be presented by the Monroe delegation, and it is believed that he will be elected.

Born in Albany.

James G. Cutler was born in Albany, April 24, 1848, and received his early education in the Albany Boys' Academy. He came from English-Holland ancestry, many members of which received distinguished recognition for notable services in public life. His parents were John N. and Mary E. (Goold) Cutler.

In 1869 Mr. Cutler began the study of architecture in the office of Nichols & Brown in Albany. In 1872 Mr. Cutler removed to this city, and becoming a draughtsman in the office of the late A. J. Warner and after two years his partner, he then opened an office as practicing architect, which he maintained until 1884, making an enviable reputation in the architecture of many outstanding public and private buildings.

It was during this period that Mr. Cutler saw the utility of mail chutes for large buildings and obtained a patent on an invention for the reception of mail on any and every floor of a building, and this has carried the name of Cutler to all parts of the world. In 1884 Mr. Cutler retired from architecture to give all his time to the manufacture of the mail chute. As president of the Cutler Manufacturing Company and the Cutler Realty Company Mr. Cutler has won wide recognition as a business man of conspicuous ability.

For years Mr. Cutler has been active in banking circles, having been for thirty years a director in what is now the Lincoln-Alliance Bank, its first vice-president, then for twelve years its president and since January of this year chairman of the Board and of the Executive Committee. For more than twenty

years he has been a trustee of the Rochester Savings Bank. He is affiliated with Rochester's leading clubs, the Genesee Valley Club, the Country Club of Rochester and the Rochester Athletic Club. He also is an honorary member of the American Institute of Architects.

Governor Levi P. Morton recognized Mr. Cutler's ability in municipal matters by appointing him, in 1895, a member of the White Charter Commission which produced the uniform charter for second-class cities of the state. In 1896 he was elected a presidential elector and carried the state's electoral vote to Washington. In 1916 for the second time he was a presidential elector. In 1897 he was appointed a consulting architect for the state capitol buildings.

University Trustee.

In 1896 Mr. Cutler was president of the Rochester Chamber of Commerce, an organization of which he has recently been elected an honorary member. For some time he was a director of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, and he was chairman of its Executive Committee some years since.

For seven or eight years, Mr. Cutler has been a trustee of the University of Rochester, and he is a trustee of the Bureau of Municipal Research and a director of the Community Chest. He was chairman of the County Defense Committee during the World war. He has been deeply interested in art and city planning, serving as president of the Art Commission and of the City Planning Bureau from the organization of these boards until December 31, 1923, when he declined reappointment.

Mr. Cutler's advent into active administrative affairs was in January, 1900, when Mayor Carnahan appointed him commissioner of public safety, in which position he inaugurated a series of improvements that he later, as mayor, was able to complete.

In the campaign of 1903 Mr. Cutler was elected mayor of Rochester over former mayor George E. Warner, the Democratic nominee, and James Johnston, Citizens' party candidate. He was re-elected for a second term in 1905.
