ROCHESTER ATHLETES BRING FAME TO CITY DURING 1924

NATIONAL AND INTERNATIONAL SPORT ACTIVITIES FEATURED BY YACHTING, GOLF AND TRACK

If the ending of 1924 found the eagle hoarse from screaming, there was good reason for that condition. International sport during the last year gave plenty of occasion for patriotic outbursts, so much occasion in fact, that even so tough a creature as our national bird must have felt the terrific strain on its vocal cords. And when patriotism did not evoke a screech surprise did.

In the main international titles of the year, pitted usually against England or one of her possessions, Canada, our athletes were supreme. They were equal to virtually every test on fields, native or foreign, and the sum of their victories against other nations is greater than the combined triumph of our rivals.

The outstanding achievement of the year was, of course, our victory in the Olympic games. Next came Walter Hagen's conquest of the British open golf champion. This Rochester home-bred first won that title in 1922 and finished one stroke behind in 1923. Rochester's other bid for international honors came in competition with Canada for supremacy on the lake. Rochester for the first time in a great many years was host to the annual regatta of the Lake Yacht Racing Association, held at Sodus Bay during July. In the international dinghy competition, the Rochester sailors retained possession of the Douglas trophy but lost the Emerson cup to the Canadian invaders in races off Charlotte. Bill Cox, a local boy, was a member of the American Olympic team.

GOLF

Golf in Western New York and in Rochester in particular, rose to new heights during the 1924 season and promises for 1925 are particularly bright in this, one of the newest for sport fields. The formation of new clubs, the improvement of old players and the thousands added to the game as participants makes golf assured of greater followings this coming year than ever before.

During the 1924 season, Walter Hagen and Joe Kirkwood featured with an exhibition at the Oak Hill Country Club. The Country Club of Rochester's annual tournament was the biggest success ever with Frank Tichnor, of the Onandaga Club of Syracuse, defeating Rochester's greatest star, Art Yates, of Oak Hill, in the finals of a match that went to the last green.

Inter-club activity as well as inter-city play brought added interest to the sport and the two city courses were crowded whenever weather was at all good for the game. Local golfers went far in national and state championships, Art Yates going into the national amateur in the last sixteen and Johnny Dailey winning his way to the finals in state play, while George Christ, of the Country Club of Rochester, won the Western New York Professional Association tournament. This association has done much to further the sport and has enjoyed its most successful season while the Women's Golf Association of Western New York also completed a great year with the crowning of Mrs. De Witt Macomber, of the Country Club, Rochester, as champion in the final tournament over the Irondequoit Club links.

The Oak Hill Country Club will open its now completed (two-eighths hole) courses in the spring of 1925 and the Monroe County Club will prepare for its first full season of activity during 1925. Brook-Len club will probably begin construction on its course this year and the St. Andrew's Day and Night Club, an indoor outlay, is the latest development offered for the golfing "bug." Genesee-wah, Stafford, Blue Burn and Newark and Canandaigua courses reported much activity among its golfing contingents and held championship tournaments which drew large fields of entries.



MEMBERS OF INDOOR CLUB TO START GOLF ACTION TO-MORROW

**Saint Andrews Day and Night Course Now Ready;
Non-member Able to Use Links.**

The members of the St. Andrews Day and Night Golf Club are all prepared for a round of golf to-morrow afternoon on the new indoor course in the Million Dollar Warehouse which has just been completed. According to backers of the greatest indoor golfing project in this part of the country, the foursome which will tee off at 2 o'clock to start the club on its official way will be making golf history as this is the only completed course in the world, indoors, of its size.

The selected four will be composed of two golfers from each of the older golf clubs of the city, the Oak Hill Country Club and the Country Club of Rochester. Johnny Dailey, and Jim Weldon, young stars of the Oak Hill club, will represent that organization and Fairfax H. Gouverneur and William M. Macomber will drive off for the Country Club of Rochester.

All Players Welcome

The entire eighteen-hole course is finished with the turf, made from cotton seed hulls, layed and rolled and in excellent condition. The screening is all in position and the heating system has been used and will keep the entire course near a 60 degree temperature. Office and reception room facilities will be completed as soon as workmen can do the job and everything will be as handy as at a regular outdoor club with locker rooms right at the first tee and eighteenth green.

The committee in charge of arrangements for play on the course has decided to allow players who are non-members the use of the links for a nominal grounds fee until the membership limit of 400 is reached.

Christ and Gordon Will Enter Southern Tourneys

Two more Western New York golf pros, in the persons of George Christ and Jack Gordon, of the Country Club, of Rochester, and Buffalo Country Club, respectively, have followed the birds to the Southland and will begin a tour of courses of that region. They will play for two weeks getting in shape for tourney play and then will enter all of the big events.

Starting with the \$8,000 tourney at Hot Springs, February 2d to 5th, they will compete in the following events: Texas open at Corpus Christi, February 19th to 21st; Houston, February 26th to 28th, and at Augusta, G., March 7th and 8th.

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WORLD'S FIRST INDOOR TOURNEY TO START WEDNESDAY

ST. ANDREWS CLUB LINKS IS BUSY SCENE OF PREPARATION

More Than 100 Play Course Getting Ready for Qualifying Round; Trophies on Display.

Rochester's first golf tournament of 1925 and the first indoor tournament staged in the world will hold the center of interest in the amateur sport world this week when a qualifying round will be played on Wednesday afternoon and evening and match play will continue on Thursday and thereafter until completed. The Saint Andrew's Day and Night Golf Club is sponsoring the tournament and the links of the club in University avenue, opposite Granger place, is a busy place with more than 100 golfers shooting the eighteen holes daily. More than 150 entries are expected.

Two handsome trophies were placed on display in the locker room at the course yesterday afternoon and players immediately began to wish for a "fine" touch on the day of the qualifying round with extra control on shots to guarantee a score placing them in the first sixteen. The men's trophy is of solid silver, ten inches high and is a basket on a pedestal while the women's trophy is a delicately formed container for candy or other refreshments. Both were chosen in place of cups by the tournament committee in order to give greater lure to the entrants.

While entries continued to pour in to members of the committee, those in charge are still feeling that the average rank and file of Rochester golfing circles is holding back feeling that the play is for members only. The public is invited to enter the tourney and all will be allowed to play the course on Monday and Tuesday free of charge. The fee for entrance is but one dollar, which will not cover costs of the tournament.

Sets Mark of 52.

In addition to the first prize winners, all winners of the first four sixteens in both the men's and women's division will receive prizes while qualifying round and other special performances will receive rewards. Play in the men's division will start at 3 o'clock on Wednesday and the women will tee off in the morning at 10 o'clock.

The course record of 54 held by Walter Bemish was given another jolt yesterday by Charlie Bemish, of Oak Hill, who turned the eighteen holes in the low total of 52. Charlie had the "touch" that golfers in the tourney play are desiring for the later days of the week on his round, while other players were getting rid of a bunch of poor shots which they hope will evade them when the competition starts.

Club rivalry has flared up in the competition and already Oak Hill men are figuring on winning the indoor title while Country Club of Rochester, Genundewah, Monroe, Genesee and other outdoor club supporters have primed certain of their numbers to win the awards. Fillmore K. Robeson of the Country Club of Rochester, John F. Dailey, Jr., of Oak Hill, Jim Hogan, of Oak Hill, Ray Brown, of Genundewah and others have posted 62 for an eighteen-hole round and look in the thick of the fight.

FIRST CHAMPIONSHIP INDOOR GOLF TOURNAMENT TO START

BIG FIELD WILL OPEN TO-DAY IN QUALIFYING PLAY

Tourney Committee An-
nounces All in Readiness
for Players.

LOCAL CHAMPS ENTERED

All Local Outdoor Clubs
Represented in List
of Entries.

In spite of all Jack Frost can do to-day, Rochester golfers will be occupied in the qualifying round of the city's and world's first indoor championship tournament at the St. Andrew's Day and Night Indoor Club on University. The tournament committee announced yesterday that all was in readiness for the first day's play in this novel tournament, which will extend through Sunday. The entry list is one of the largest to ever compete in a tournament here and numbers some of the best known of the amateur golfing fraternity, with representatives from each of the outdoor clubs.

Because of the large number of entrants in the men's divisions, the committee in charge announces another slight change in the program. The men will be able to qualify at any time during the day thus permitting those who find it more convenient to tee off at any time after ten this morning. This will also be true in the women's division thus giving those who wish the opportunity of playing later in the day. Entries in both divisions will be accepted during this forenoon and up to three o'clock this afternoon.

Practically all who have entered so far practiced on the course either Monday or yesterday and a number of low scores were turned in.

Course Attracts Interest

Out-of-town golfers who have read or heard about St. Andrew's began to come into town yesterday. The details of this course have travelled far and wide since its opening and many enthusiasts from other cities will be in town at some time during the tournament to study the course under the ideal conditions that will then prevail.

Among the first arrivals was R. W. Foley, business manager of the Western New York Golfer, who will cover the tournament. He is also representing some Buffalo club members and while here is getting together data to be used in constructing a course in the Windy City. He says that Buffalo is greatly interested in the proposition and he believes that another year will see a course completed in Buffalo.

Chapin, 3 and 2. These matches were in the first sixteen of the men's division. In the other semi-final match of this division Joe F. Dailey, Jr., who eliminated Richard J. Trabold by 4 and 2, will play Elmer Rowntree, a second round winner over Leo Fleming by 3 and 2.

Dr. P. J. Quinn was forced to the twentieth hole to win over W. H. Kiefer by 1 up in the second sixteen. Quinn will play Elmer Thanev to-day in the semi-final round. Thanev advanced by winning his match from E. A. Smith by default. J. W. Weldon and Murray Dailey were other winners in the second sixteen, the former defeating F. J. DAILEY TAKES FIRST HONORS IN INDOOR GOLF TOURNEY

OAK HILL STAR TRIMS LAWSON 3 AND 2 IN THE 36-HOLE FINALS

Robeson Loses Qualifying Medal Play-off to Trabold; Earle Defeats Connelly.

John F. Dailey, Jr., of Oak Hill Country Club, successfully came through the Lincoln's Birthday indoor tourney of the St. Andrews Day and Night golf club when he defeated Bill Lawson, of the Genesee club, yesterday, in a thirty-six hole match, the final of the first sixteen, three and two. Dailey is one of the star outdoor players of the vicinity and his victory yesterday over Lawson was accomplished by steadiness brought on through the result of many matches on the outdoor links.

accomplished by steadiness through matches on the outdoor links.

The first nine holes were hard fought with neither player having an advantage at this stage of the game, each winning three and halving three of the holes. Three successive holes in two strokes by Dailey enabled the Oak Hill player to hold his own in this quarter of the match as strong shooting at this stage of the game brought both to the turning point in 26 strokes.

At the end of the first eighteen, Dailey had Lawson 1 down, scoring wins on the tenth, fifteenth and seventeenth holes to offset wins by Bill on the twelfth, thirteenth and fourteenth. Neither player kept his pace on this nine, Dailey getting a 32 and Bill a 33 to make totals of 58 and 59, respectively for the first half of the match.

Trabold Wins Play-off.

Both played the out-going nine on the second half of the match in thirty strokes, the margin remaining at one-up for Dailey, Bill taking the twenty-sixth and twenty-seventh holes to close a gap of three-up which Dailey had established. On the last nine, the first two holes were halved, Dailey took the third, Lawson the fourth and Dailey came back and obtained the fifth and sixth. The seventh was halved giving Johnny his first indoor award.

In the play-off of the qualifying round tie, between Fillmore K. Robeson, of the Country Club of Rochester, and Richard J. Trabold, Trabold won the medal with a total of 56 to Robeson's 60. Robeson was twice penalized two strokes, notching one six and one seven and Trabold walked in on this margin.

In the third sixteen, B. V. Benedict will play Seldon May to-day and Elmer Thane is scheduled to meet the winner between Murray Dailey and M. C. McMann in the finals of the second sixteen. In the fourth sixteen, H. C. Earle, the oldest golfer in the journey, trimmed Connelly, a youth in his teens, 1-up after 37 holes of spirited play. Results::

**OAK HILL COURSE AWARDED
WOMEN'S GOLF TITLE PLAY**

**Western New York Association Plans Five
One-day Tourneys; Active Year Seen.**

Members of the Women's Golf Association of Western New York, to the number of sixty, met yesterday at the Country Club of Rochester, and after voting several changes in the constitution and by-laws, decided on the tourney dates for the 1925 season, proclaimed at the meeting as carrying prospects of being the greatest year ever for the links game for women in this section.

Five one-day tourneys were listed with a championship tournament awarded to the Oak Hill Country Club, of this city, which will last one week beginning on July 13th. Qualifying rounds and match play in as many sixteens as qualify, will be completed at that tourney, the season's high light.

Aside from the association championship tourney in July, the one-day tourneys will be played at the Buffalo Country Club, on May 12th; Orchard Park Country Club, Orchard Park, on June 9th; East Aurora Club, East Aurora, August 12th; Wanakah Country Club, Wanakah, October 12th, with the September location yet to be decided. All of the one-day tourneys will be medal handicap play, open to all members and contested in three divisions. Class A. comprises those players who can break 100, Class B. from 100 to 120, and Class C. is the 120 plus division.

The meeting was called yesterday by President M. L. D. Spaulding, of Buffalo, who presided. Mrs. Spaulding was accompanied her by Mrs. Seymour White, secretary, and Mrs. Franklin Wells, of Niagara Falls, treasurer, and some thirty women links followers from Buffalo, Niagara Falls, and Le Roy.

Mrs. DeWitt A. Macomber, of the Country Club of Rochester, is first vice-president of the association and Mrs. Arthur L. Stern, of Irondequoit Club, is chairman of the handicap tourney. Mrs. William S. Morse, of the Country Club of Rochester, is chairman of the tourney committee, which promises an active year for members of the organization. 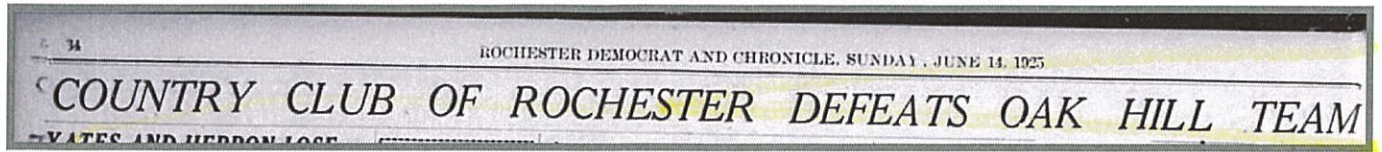

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MACOMBER AND GARDNER TIE FOR MEDAL IN TOURNEY PLAY

BUFFALO AND ROCHESTER STARS GET TOTAL OF 73 FOR QUALIFYING COUNTS

*Only Four of 100 Entries Break 80 Mark;
Match Play Starts This Morning.*

Medal scores in the qualifying round of eighteen holes in the third annual invitation amateur tournament of the Country Club of Rochester held yesterday on the East avenue links ran, in general, much higher than experts and club members expected but the lofty average did not prevent W. H. Gardner, of the Buffalo Club, and W. B. Macomber, of the home club, from turning in scores of 73 for the lay-out. With the rain of Sunday and Sunday night and a dull morning with heavy dew resulting in slow turf, the scores of the players performing before noon ran highest but both Macomber and Gardner were in the bracketing of the afternoon and they took advantage of the weather man's assistance to set their playing at its fastest stride.

Macomber went out in a 37 and returned in a 30. Par for the 6,141 yard layout is 71 with a thirty-five out and a thirty-six in, so that Macomber turned the perfect figures on his route back to the clubhouse. Gardner was not so consistent as Macomber, taking a 38 out and then coming to the front with a second nine of 35, one under par.

The Buffalo player notched a birdie four on the fourteenth which is 474 yards long and also obtained one on the sixteenth. He was even par except on the twelfth where he took a six one over. Going out Gardner had eight fours in succession to end up with a 6 on the ninth.

Chase in Second Section.

But two other players of the more than one hundred who trudged over the links turned in counts of better than 80. H. T. Park, of Fort Wayne registering in the leading list with a 76 while F. H. Gouverneur, of the Country Club of Rochester, had a 77 for his score. Eighty-two counts brought four players into the championship fight, drawn from a list of seven.

Don M. Parker, Garden City; T. C. Parsons, C. C. of R.; J. W. McCoolley, Jr., Oak Hill, and J. M. Weldon, Oak Hill, drew the numbers for the higher classification. In match play while E. C. Rowntree, William Rosenberg and T. E. Kremplin went into the second sixteen, where the going may be easier, although the list includes Lee Chase, New York state amateur champion, who scored an 84. He was one of the morning players.

In the American Golfer contest for two-man best-ball combinations of fellow-club members, Buffalo and Rochester teams split honors with scores of 70, when W. H. Gardner and B. B. Black, Buffalo Country Club, compiled that total to balance the same mark of the best that W. B. Macomber and F. K. Roberson, of the Country Club of Rochester, could offer. This match will be played off today and at the same time the playoff for qualifying medal will be held as Macomber and Gardner are in both contests.

Club Qualifiers.

From a club standpoint of entries qualified for the first sixteen, the Country Club of Rochester has a fine chance to bring the trophy back from Syracuse to its own trophy case with five in the sixteen. Oak Hill, the big rival of the home club, qualified four with the Buffalo Country Club getting two and the remainder of the field split one to a club.

A co-incidence in the pairings eliminates one Oak Hill and one C. C. of R. man in the first round as Jim Weldon plays C. C. Culver for the elimination of an Elmwood avenue course star and R. G. Weis will meet a clubmate in the medalist, Macomber. H. T. Park, with his 76, must be feared while Comstock of Wanakah and Joe Bydoleck, of Transit Valley, are experienced match players and may take the trophy to the Bison City for 1925.

As soon as the fifth sixteen pairs are away from the first tee, to-day play will be started in the beaten eights and second round of the other divisions, and will reach a point where the semi-finals and finals can be played to-morrow.

The absence of the title-holder, Ronald Tiehenor, of Syracuse, from the tourney as well as that of the two Oak Hill stars, Art Yates, finalist last year, and John F. Dailey, Jr., semi-finalist, was a blow to the tournament committee but the scores in general pleased all interested in the affair. Closely-contested matches are seen for to-day and to-morrow in all divisions as a result of the average shooting done yesterday.

MACOMBER ONLY. ROCHESTER MAN STILL IN TITLE CHASE

BUFFALO PLACES THREE IN SEMI-FINALS OF C. C. OF R. INVITATION GOLF TOURNEY

*Bydolek, Gardner and Comstock Win First
and Second Round Title Matches*

One Country Club of Rochester player, W. B. Macomber, who tied for medal in the qualifying round on Monday and who eliminated R. G. Weis, 5 and 4, in the first round, and J. W. McCauley, 7 and 5, in the second round of the Country Club of Rochester third annual invitation tourney now in progress carries the entire burden of winning for the Flower City over three other semi-finalists, all of Buffalo. W. H. Gardner, other medalist with Macomber with his 73, eliminated John Raines, of Oak Hill, and Jim Weldon, of the same club by substantial margins; Joe Bydolek, of Transit Valley, took care of H. T. Park, and Don M. Parker; and H. W. Comstock, of Wanakah, ruined any championship hopes of D. T. C. Parsons and Richardson to enter the trio of Buffalo men into the semi-finals to be played this morning.

Macomber will meet Comstock in the

Macomber will meet Comstock this morning while Gardner and Bydolek do battle with each other for the right of carrying the Bison colors into the finals. With one Buffalo entry already assured, Rochester also must depend on Macomber to prevent the finals from being all Buffalo, with the winner's and runner-up's trophies to go to the West. Macomber was in good form yesterday and put out Weis and McCauley with ease. Comstock promises a hard battle, however, as he had one 8-and-7 triumph in the second round and a 5-and-4 count in the first match.

Bydolek Beats Parker.

Joe Bydolek's easy manner in eliminating Park, who had a 76 on the first day, was a surprise, his 4-and-3 victory giving him favor with the enthusiasts. Bydolek is figured to give "Ham" Gardner a hard fight before letting the championship chance slip from his clutches. Bydolek had a tough match in the second round, eliminating Don Parker, of the Garden City Club, 3 and 1. Parker was a finalist in the first sixteen in the first tourney of the club.

The second sixteen saw many of the favorites win in the first round and Mark Trivison, of Genundewah; Lee Chase, of Buffalo, Filmore K. Robeson, of C. C. of R., and Jack Wallace, came through to the semi-final bracket. To-day the New York state amateur champion, Chase, will play with Trivison and Robeson will clash with Wallace. The matches in this section were much closer than in the first sixteen.

Extra-hole Matches.

The third division had two matches go into extra holes. R. J. Trabold winning over M. J. Miller, 1 up in 20 holes and Chris Carr going to the nineteenth green to win over J. M. Ward. In the second round Carr defeated Robeson, 1 up, and Little defeated Curtis, 1 up. In the second round of the fifth sixteen, Curtis defeated Clarke, 1 up, on the twentieth, to tie Trabold for long-distance honors.

May and Price reached the finals in the fourth sixteen by playing their semi-final matches a day ahead of schedule and will battle for the awards in that division at 1:50 this afternoon.

The play-off of the American Golfer award tie between Gardner and Black, of the Buffalo Country Club, and Macomber and Robeson, of the Country Club of Rochester, was won by the Rochester pair when they turned in a best ball aggregate of 73 to the Bison players' 78. The two teams had tied at 72 on the day previous.

The finals of the first sixteen will be played this afternoon at 2:20 with the consolation finalists to start at 2:25. The second sixteen will start at 2:30 and the consolation pair of finalists at 2:35.

'HAM' GARDNER, OF BUFFALO, TAKES C. C. OF R. TOURNEY

ELIMINATES COMSTOCK IN FINALS, 4 AND 3, TO WIN THIRD ANNUAL TOURNEY

*Lee Chase Cops Second Sixteen; New Champ
Triumphs in Play-off for Medal.*

Buffalo golfers monopolized honors in the final rounds of the Country Club of Rochester tournament yesterday afternoon over the well-polished links of that club, when W. H. (Ham) Gardner, of the Buffalo Country Club, defeated H. W. Comstock, of the Wanakah Club, of Buffalo, 4 and 3, in final eighteen-hole match of the championship flight. Following close on the heels of the match between the Buffalo pair came Lee Chase, of Buffalo, battling Jack Wallace, of the Garden City, Long Island club, in the finals of the second sixteen and once more a Bison City golfer won out, Chase, the holder of the New York state amateur crown, winning on the last green, 1 up.

The victories in the third, fourth and fifth sixteens went to B. C. Little, of the C. C. of R.; R. D. Price, of Garden City, and L. L. Dunn, of Oak Hill, respectively, the trio in turn eliminating M. M. Bonney, Oak Hill; S. E. May, Oak Hill, and H. M. Weed, Park Club, of Buffalo.

Another Buffalo triumph was registered when Gardner, newly-crowned champion, who tied with 73 for qualifying honors with W. B. Macomber, won the play-off for the medal. By mutual consent, the contestants limited their efforts to a five-hole course and Macomber lost by taking a 21 while Gardner was getting a 20. Thus "Ham" took the medal and championship trophy back to Buffalo with him.

Comstock Very Wild.

The semi-finals of the first sixteen were played yesterday morning and Comstock won the right to meet Gardner by putting W. B. Macomber, lone Rochester survivor, into the discard. Gardner had previously disposed of Joe Bydolek, Transit Valley star, by 4 and 3. Comstock's victory over Macomber was by a 6-and-5 margin and the enthusiasts who had been following the play anticipated a keen match in the finals.

In this they were disappointed. The sturdy, red-haired youth, Comstock, was wild as a hawk in his final match and Gardner was as straight as any played could desire. His tee shots were particularly well-placed for good approach shots and on many of the holes his second shot was dead to the pin for easy fours, while playing safe, as Comstock had already shot his fourth shot.

Loses Short Holes.

The match started with the Wana-kah player winning the first hole with a four to Gardner's five. They halved the second in fives and then Gardner scored a birdie four to Comstock's six on the par 5 550-yard hole. The next two were halved in 3's on the fourth and 5's on the fifth, one over par. The sixth and seventh, two par 3 holes, went to Gardner in par figures, while the youth was taking a six and a five.

Right here Comstock lost his chance for a real fighting finish, as the two holes were too many to give the veteran at this stage and in the manner in which he was playing. The eighth was halved and the ninth went to Gardner, with a birdie four to Comstock's five. This made Comstock three down at the turn, his medal

total being 43 to Gardner's 36, one over par.

The pair played fine shots on the par 4 tenth hole and they halved with birdie 3's while a par four won the eleventh for Gardner. The twelfth and thirteenth holes were halved and Comstock gained one hole when he won the fourteenth with a birdie four to Gardner's par five. The match ended on the fifteenth when Comstock took a four and Gardner another par three. The cards:

Don Hyland, Yahnundasis, won the low gross in the special handicap medal tourney play with a 78, and Don Parker was the low net prize winner with a 67.

The best-ball match for pairs was won by R. G. Hoffman and E. R. Swanton, with a gross 75 for a net 53 after their handicap of 22. L. D. Newman and W. W. Brown were second with 85-29-56.

The tourney was a well-managed affair and members of the committee that had the arrangements in charge were on the job at all hours during the three day's play seeing that every event was carried through in smooth and rhythmic order.

As soon as each winner reached the eighteenth green he was presented with the trophies while a movie camera took negatives of the beaming countenance.

From a club viewpoint, the awards were well divided in the various divisions. Genundawah having two winners in the consolation sixteens, the home club having two and the Park Club of Buffalo winning one of the consolidations. Oak Hill's only win was in the fifth sixteen, taken by L. L. Dunn, while Garden city took one in the fourth sixteenth. Oak Hill had finalists in the third and fourth sixteens, but neither could come through to victory.

RENE LaCOSTE WINNER OF ALL-ENGLAND NET CHAMPIONSHIP

YOUNG FRENCHMAN BEATS BOROTRA, FORMER CHAMP, THREE OUT OF FOUR SETS

*King Included among Crowd of 14,000 Fans
Witnessing Match—Lenglen Wins.*

Wimbledon, July 4.—(A. P.)—The 20-year-old French player, Rene Lacoste, to-night holds the All-England lawn tennis singles championship. He wrested the title from his countryman, Jean Borotra, in clean cut fashion to-day in a match witnessed by the king and a crowd of 14,000 persons who jammed the center court unmindful of the cold wind and threatening rain. Lacoste won, 6-3, 6-3, 4-6, 8-6.

His victory was gained through careful, steady and strategic playing, in a game devoid of sensationalism, against an opponent who time and again performed the almost impossible in brilliant strokes at the net but whose lack of precision in long rallies and faulty service finally spelled his own defeat.

France claimed a share in another title to-day when Mlle. Lenglen, who yesterday won the women's singles in brilliant style, took the women's doubles, playing with Miss Elizabeth Ryan, formerly of California, in straight sets from Mrs. A. V. Bridge and Mrs. C. G. McQuaham, of England.

Borotra played poorly in the beginning of the match, double faulting eleven times in the first two sets and consistently driving outside or back of the baseline. Even his work at the net lacked its usual fire and his volleying was less well placed than heretofore in the tournament.

La Coste, upon the other hand, was cool and playing in his best form. He outgeneralled Borotra, keeping him at the baseline with long lobs that frequently dusted the chalk from the lane and then waited his chance for a well placed kill in the rally.

Borotra was not back in form until the third set when he took the offensive and won the first three games without a break.

The score was 5-2 in Borotra's fav-

or in this set before the younger player could get well started. Lacoste took two more games, but Borotra took the final deuce game with a beautiful placement from the net.

He continued on the offensive in the final set, running the score to 4-1, but his stroking again became erratic under the steady fire of his opponent, and Lacoste, with a superhuman effort, evened the score, at 4-4.

They were again even at 6-6, but Lacoste took the next two games, winning the set.

In the last three games both men rose to their greatest heights, Lacoste was more steady and confident however, and had the winning stroke when a crisis demanded it.

Baron Von Kehrling of Hungary, won the "all-England plate," a consolation prize competed for by those defeated in the first two rounds of the tournament. He defeated R. George, of France, 6-3, 6-4.

The doubles and mixed doubles titles will be decided on Monday, when Raycasey and John Hennessey, the American pair, will meet Borotra and Lacoste, and Baron De Morpurgo, of Italy, and Miss Elizabeth Ryan, formerly of California, will meet Borotra and Mlle. Lenglen.

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MRS. DEWITT B. MACOMBER GAINS WOMEN'S CHAMPIONSHIP

C. C. OF R. STAR DEFEATS MRS. JOSEPH BYDOLEK FOR WESTERN NEW YORK TITLE

*Margin of Victory is 2 and 1; Mrs. Weis and

Mrs. DeWitt B. Macomber carried the colors of the Country Club of Rochester to victory yesterday morning over the Oak Hill Country Club links, defeating Mrs. Joseph Bydolek, of the Transit Valley Club, of Buffalo, 2 to 1, to win the final match and the individual championship of the Women's Golf Association of Western New York. Mrs. MacComber's victory was witnessed by a colorful gallery of more than 250 golf enthusiasts, many of them women who had fallen before their prowess earlier in the week, either in the qualifying round or at match play.

Mrs. Macomber in Lead.

The match started with the Country Club of Rochester player winning the first hole with a five to Mrs. Bydolek's six. She retained the 1-up advantage by halving the second with sevens while the Transit Valley player won the long fifth with a fine five to Mrs. Macomber's sixth to square the match. The fourth was divided in even fours and Mrs. Bydolek took an advantage on the fifth with a par three while Mrs. Macomber was out of bounds with her first and short with her second ball for a five. The long sixth was halved with another pair of sevens while Mrs. Macomber won the seventh with a five as compared to Mrs. Bydolek's six, squaring the match. The new champion repeated her win on the eighth, becoming 1-up and holding it by halving the ninth though she took three putts. Mrs. Macomber laid herself a dead stymie on this hole.

The tenth was halved but on the eleventh Mrs. Bydolek played the best single shot of the afternoon, her second shot reaching the green on two, but a yard from the pin. She sunk the putt for a birdie three to even matters. Despite a dubbed drive, Mrs. Bydolek took the lead on twelve with a four to Mrs. Macomber's five. The match was again dead-locked on the Apple Green hole, when Mrs. Macomber took a five to her opponent's six. The fourteenth and fifteenth were halved, Mrs. Macomber failing to take advantage on the fifteenth of a slip by Mrs. Bydolek.

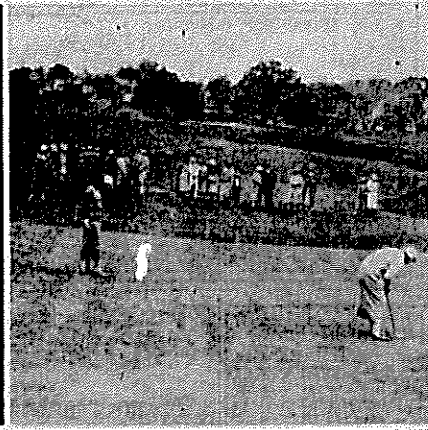
Wins 16th and 17th.

Buffalo, Aug. 10.—Golf bordering on the sensational marked the second annual clash between a team representing the Western New York Amateur Golf Association, which included John F. Dailey, the Rochester star, and a team chosen from the cream of the talent in the Western New York Professional Golfers' Association, which includes a big area around Rochester not embraced in the scope of the amateur body.

After a hotly contested battle in which the

After a hectic battle in which the simon-purse led the morning play, the foursomes, by one point, the Ray G. Danahy cup and the title for up-state supremacy between the two divisions passed to the amateurs by the substantial margin of twelve points. The amateurs notched 33 points on the grand aggregate against 21 by the professionals. The professionals won the inaugural event last year.

Never before has such a stellar team of up-state amateur linksmen played in any team contest. In the line-up was included Ray J. McAuliffe, recently crowned national public links champion; Paul H. Hyde, district champion; W. H. Gardner and H. W. Comstock, former district champions; C. A. Rebadow, of Niagara Falls, who recently battered the score of Walter Hagen over the Falls course; John F. Dailey, Jr., the Rochester star who was a semi-finalist in the state championship last year, and a galaxy of other stars with big performances on links near and far.

Mac Marches Along.

The professionals also had an aggregation of brilliant performers in the field, but the unexplained absence of George Christ, of Country Club of Rochester, who had been picked to play but did not show up was probably felt a little for Christ is one of the crack professional performers in these parts. Charley McKenna, the Rochester star who won Buffalo Country Club invitation when he was an amateur, fell a victim to the winning streak of national public links champ, Ray McAnuliffe, for Ray smote the ball so well in his singles game that he scooped all the points against one of the cleverest golfers in the state.

Paul H. Hyde, district champion and Jack Gordon, of Buffalo Country Club, had a warm tussle. Gordon went out in the startling figures of 32, to become 5 up on Paul. But the district titlist saved a point out of the match by winning the second nine, the match going to Gordon, who needed 30 strokes to come in. Hyde had rounds of 72 and 75, very fine shooting.

Walter Bemish stellar Flower City player also lost all three points to his amateur opponent Henry W. Comstock, former district champion. Henry shot the great medal of 70, the best round of the day to trim Bemish, who had a card of 73. Hank was one up on the first nine.

Dalley Wins Match

Alf Campbell, Niagara Falls pro split with Frank E. Wattles, medalist in the state amateur, and star of many conflicts. John F. Dalley coraled 2 1-2 points from W. Davidson in his singles battle, Dalley having a nifty 74 card.

W. Nagle, of Stafford Country Club found the long-hitting Rehadow a tough proposition, and managed to save only a half-point in their match.

There was a flock of scores in the seventies, with eight cards under seventy-five, showing betokening that amateur golf of this section is rapidly approximating the peerless stage. The up-state should be able to draft the most formidable squad ever selected to go to the national amateur battle at Oakmont.

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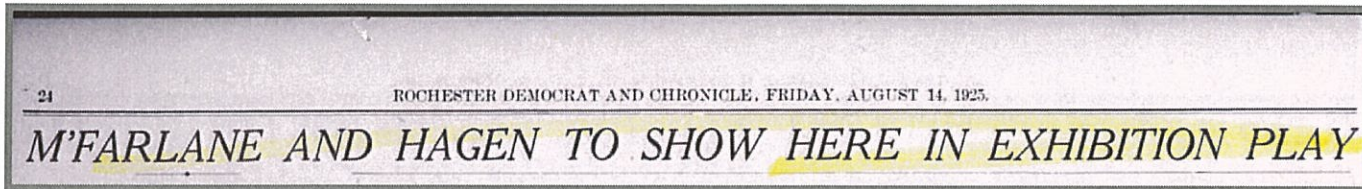
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Walter Hagen Enters Western Open Tourney

FAMOUS PROS. TO OPPOSE CHRIST AND ROBESON OVER C. C. OF R. LINKS TUESDAY

*Will Be First Local Appearance of Present
Open and Shawnee Champion.*

Rochester golf fans and players will have another chance to see Walter Hagen, Rochester's greatest golf player, and at the same time and for the same admission charge will have a first look at Willie MacFarlane, present United States open champion, on Tuesday when this nationally-known pair of mashie wielders will oppose George Christ and Fillmore K. Robeson, professional and amateur star, respectively, of the Country Club of Rochester, in an eighteen-hole best-ball four-some match. One of the largest galleries ever to follow a match is expected to turn out to see this quartet in competition.

Hagen, once a caddy at the Country Club of Rochester, and born within a stone's throw of the course, is well known to Rochester golfers. He has twice won the British open golf title and on another attempt finished second, one stroke behind the winner.

He has also triumphed in the United States open title quest, the North and South professional championship, the Professional Golfers's Association championship and has scored record-breaking performances on numerous courses in the country including a competitive mark of 62. He is claimed as the greatest exhibition player in the country because of his ability to turn strange lay-outs in record scores.

MacFarlane Open Champ

MacFarlane, claimed by Grantland Rice as having gone eight years without topping a tee shot, has won the United States open championship this year as well as annexing the Shawnee open and finishing in the Canadian open championship. His memorable battle with Bobby Jones, whom he defeated after a thirty-six hole play-off for the 1925 open championship is one of the greatest feats by any golfer in recent years, especially when it is considered that MacFarlane had handled his clubs but for twelve rounds of golf during the preceding winter and spring months.

Christ, professional at the local course, was once assistant pro to Hagen here and is rapidly advancing to the front ranks of the professional game. He finished tenth in 1924 in the Canadian open and this season bettered that mark with a much better and stronger field in the competition. He holds the course record with a 67. Robeson has long been one of the crack amateurs of the section, a state title-holder and one of the most consistent of Rochester linksmen.

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WILLIE M'FARLANE IN FIRST APPEARANCE HERE TUESDAY

OPEN CHAMPION WILL PLAY WITH HAGEN AGAINST PAIR OF ROCHESTER GOLF STARS

*Nationally Known Links Artists to Exhibit
on Country Club of Rochester Course.*

Willie MacFarlane, national open golf champion, will make his first appearance in Rochester Tuesday afternoon at the Country Club of Rochester, when he will pair with Walter Hagen, American professional champion, in an eighteen-hole match against Fillmore K. Robeson and George Christ, the Country Club's amateur professional team. The match will start at 2:15 P. M.

MacFarlane won the American open championship at Worcester, Massachusetts, in June, after a bitter struggle with Bobby Jones, the Atlanta amateur. They were tied at the end of the four regular rounds at 294 strokes and tied again after an eighteen-hole play-off the following morning. A second eighteen-hole play-off was held in the afternoon.

With nine holes to play Jones was leading MacFarlane by four strokes and the Atlanta amateur looked like a sure winner. Then MacFarlane holed a two at the tenth, another two at the short thirteenth and at the long fifteenth picked up the last of the four-stroke lead. He finally won on the home green when Jones put his second shot into a trap and took a five. MacFarlane had a four.

On Way to Western Open.

In the Shawnee open this year, MacFarlane won after a play-off with Willie Kline. He played three great rounds in one day, a 70-71-70, in this tournament.

MacFarlane is able to stop off in Rochester as he is on his way to the Western open championship to be played at Youngstown, Ohio, this week Thursday, Friday and Saturday. Hagen will also play at Youngstown, as will many of the best professionals and amateurs. This event will probably be MacFarlane's last tournament start this year, as he does not plan to enter the Professional Golfers' Association championship at Chicago in September.

Tuesday's game will mark Hagen's fourth appearance in his home city. He is always a favorite in Rochester, for he was professional at the Country Club of Rochester, when he first won the American open championship, some eleven years ago at Chicago. Hagen has done a lot of travelling since then and has won everything that a professional golfer can win, including the American open twice, the British open twice, the Professional Golfers' Association championship twice, but he never enjoys a round of golf more than over the Country

Club of Rochester, his "real home course."

Busy in Exhibitions.

Hagen has been touring single-handed this summer. He started his tour at the close of the season in Pasadena, Florida in a match at Macon, G., and from there played through the South until the open championship at Worcester. He then started West and has been as far out as Calgary, Alberta. He played ten exhibitions in Western Canada and averaged 70 3-10 strokes per round. He also played fine golf in North and South Dakota, Minnesota, Iowa and Ohio.

Hagen has played sixty-two exhibitions since May first and will keep busy until the first of November. He expects to play in Missouri, Oklahoma and other Southwestern states following the P. G. A. championship in Chicago in September.

First Time Together.

MacFarlane and Hagen have never played together. They certainly should be a great combination, one holding the American open championship title and the other a former holder of that title and the present professional champion. Titles do not bother Robeson and Christ when they get the opposition out on their home grounds. They are prepared to make the big stars play their best game if they wish to win.

Robeson is one of the two Rochester amateurs who will play in the national championship to be conducted at the Oakmont Country Club, Pittsburgh, during the first week in September. He played recently in the Canadian open championship at Toronto and for a time was leading the amateurs entered in that event. Christ has won his district championship and played well in a number of open competitions this year.

Whiting Morse is in charge of the exhibition and expects a large gallery will be on hand to see MacFarlane, the new champion, along with Hagen, an old favorite, as well as the popular local men.

HAGEN'S EXHIBITION HERE IS 62D OF PRESENT TOUR

Rochester's Golf Star Will Pair with MacFarlane against Robeson and Christ.

Walter Hagen, Rochester's native son, who will play his home city course, the Country Club of Rochester, to-morrow afternoon, with Willie MacFarlane, American open champion, as his partner, has established a record as an exhibition golf player which will be very difficult for any player to beat.

When he plays with MacFarlane, against Willmore K. Robeson and George Christ, it will be his sixty-second match game since May 1st. Twenty-four of these games were played during the month of July. He expects to play 100 games before the first of November, a record number never approached by any other golfer in one summer season.

For three seasons Hagen and Joe

Kirkwood toured together. They played winter and summer during their first year as partners and a trip to California and Europe was included in their journeys about the golf courses of the world. These two have played more exhibitions than any other pair. They have been seen in every large city in America and in the British Isles.

This year Hagen and Kirkwood divided their "big tent" show and each has been touring alone in order that they could play in many small cities and in towns which have always wanted to have a real star visit their course but could not afford to engage two players. Both have been successful and will return to their home club in Padadena, Fla., in December after very strenuous seasons.

Starting May 1st in Macon, Georgia, Hagen played the next day in Atlanta in a four-ball match in which Bobby Jones was one of the contestants. This game drew a huge crowd to the East Lake Club. Jones and Watts Gunn, most promising of Southern youngsters, defeated Hagen and Harold Callaway, but when the same match was repeated at La Grange, Ga., Hagen and Callaway won.

Gets Repeat Calls.

Hagen remained in the Southern states until the open championship at Worcester and following that event he played matches in New England and Pennsylvania, working his way to the "Twin Cities," Minneapolis and St. Paul, where he engaged in six exhibitions.

On July 2st he opened a tour of Western Canada at Winnipeg and he played ten exhibition rounds in that country and averaged 70 and 3-10 strokes per round. He holed every putt and made by far the biggest hit an exhibition golfer ever made in Canada. He was invited by every club at which he appeared to return next year.

He will visit Missouri, Oklahoma and some other states before returning to Florida for the winter season.

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HAGEN AND M'FARLANE IN EXHIBITION MATCH HERE TO-DAY

ROCHESTER HOMEBRED AND OPEN CHAMPION WILL PAIR AGAINST CHRIST, ROBESON

*Eighteen-hole Best-Ball Competition Listed
for East Avenue Country Club Links.*

Golf comes into its own in Rochester to-day. Fans, who follow the gutta-percha pellet and who aspire to greatness on the links, as well as those fans who like to watch form in its perfection, will have a chance to help their game by watching Willie MacFarlane, present United States open golf champion, and Walter Hagen, in a match against George Christ and Fillmore K. Robeson, professional and amateur stars of the Country Club of Rochester. The quartet will tee off at 2:15 o'clock at the Country Club of Rochester, East avenue, in an eighteen-hole best ball match which many close students of the game believe will result in a victory for the local pair over their noted professional rivals.

The well planned assault on the golf course brought together teams of Hagen and MacFarlane against Robeson and Christ, two stellar figures in the local game, and when the smoke of the four-ball best-ball match had lifted the match was all even. The four-ball was billed and backed as an exhibition but it resulted in a battle-bitter struggle carried to the eighteenth green where the duo of Rochester players exerted the match on their final effort. Each team won four holes, and ten were halved.

Visitors Start Early.

While no records were shattered either for the course or for attendance a gallery of about 400 witnessed past masters of the ancient game on their very best behavior. Willie MacFarlane, recent winner of the world's gender golf crown, the United States open, was playing on unfamiliar ground yet his score of 69 was two under par and included an eagle two on a par four hole. Walter Hagen, Rochester homebred and generally regarded as the world's greatest golfer, was shooting over hills and on greens of which he has vivid recollections from the days when he first learned the game as a caddy boy. The former Rochesterian had the best card of the day, four under par, for a 67. On only four holes did any one of the quartet shoot a stroke above par and on eight less than par was turned up, seven birdies, and one eagle.

Fillmore K. Robeson, the home club's best amateur bet, equalled the green champion's card with a 69 and George Christ, C. C. of R. pro, turned in a 71 par, but even he with the highest figure played sterling golf. The first two holes won by the local pair were copped by Christ with two successive birdies, a two and a three on the seventh and eighth holes.

A brooding hot sun continued unabated during the course of the match but failed to melt the enthusiasm of the gallery which loyally trundled about the eighteen holes, thrilled successively by brilliant shots and by the closeness of the match which seemed back and forth after the local pair had once pulled within striking distance of the visiting celebrities. Interest, of course, centered on Hagen, the Rochesterian, and MacFarlane, most recent entitle to ascend the golfing heavens.

Hagen, as hothead as a berry, was the same sniffling, peppery player Rochester followers remember always at his best in a tight place and always sure to give the gallery something to applaud. MacFarlane, tall, lank and angular is as much a New England pedagogue in appearance as his pictures would indicate. He is cool and confident in his performance, playing every shot mindful of the crowd or conditions.

The visiting pros, with Hagen in the spotlight, provided occasion for comment on the very first hole. Walter opened it with a birdie three to put the locals one down and immediately followed with a second birdie to make his team two up. It made things look dubio for the local pair, which had been even-money favorites as friendly wagers before the start of the match. Christ and Robeson, not so accustomed to the gallery as the pair of tourists, played a bit nervously. Robeson in particular, taking some time to get 'on' to his best golfing style.

Walter 'Dubs' One.

The third hole was halved, all four taking five on the par five hole. Hagen provided the thrill again by a wonderful recovery from the rough after hooking considerably on his drive. The fourth went to the visitors and the fifth halved, Christ missing a putt by an inch on the fourth to halve the hole.

Four par three's were registered on the sixth, after which Christ shaved in a birdie two to cut the visitor's margin down one. His drive was within three feet of the pin and he sank the putt easily. Christ duplicated his birdie performance on the eighth, to make it only one down for his outfit. The Country Club produced a round of the gallery's applause on this green when he sank his putt from the edge of the green. MacFarlane was enjoying atrocious luck on his putting, rimming for the second time on this green.

On the final hole going out Walter showed that masters aren't perfect in execution by dubbing his second shot after a fair drive. He made it all up, however, when he holed a side-hill downhill putt from the edge of the green for a four, which halved the hole.

Robeson Even's It Up.

The tenth was all even when Hagen missed a yard put which would have won the hole. The tenth is played up hill and is a difficult par four, each of the four taking that number of strokes. The eleventh, twelfth and thirteenth were all even, a run of near putting cropping in all four of the participants.

After crossing the road onto the club house side of the course the locals evened matters up by copping the verdict on the fourteenth. Hagen went into the rough and took three to get on while MacFarlane overdrove the green on his iron shot. Christ and Robeson both went down in four. The fifteenth was all even and then the open title-holder provided the best hole of the afternoon, an eagle two on the sixteenth—a long, narrow hole with an obscured green. His drive traveled the 238 yards and

landed on the edge of the smooth terrain, from where he holed out to again put the visitors in the lead, one up.

All were on the seventeenth green in two but no one succeeded in holing out on his first try, the hole being halved at four's. A beautiful drive by Robeson on the eighteenth brought an even-break for the local pair. Hill hit the stick with his drive and was down easily in three for a birdie which the rest of the quartet could not equal. The deadlock was not carried to a nineteenth hole. The cards.

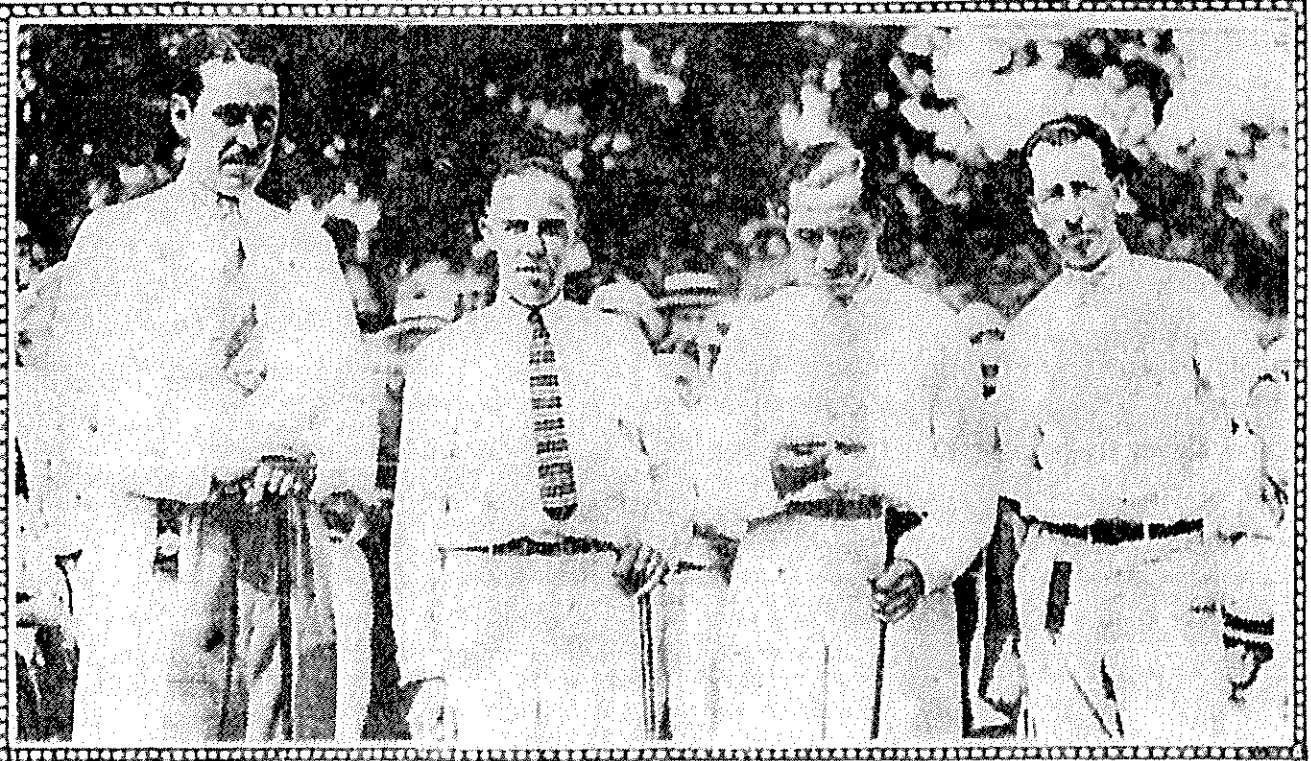

TRIO OF LOCAL STARS TO SEEK AMATEUR OPEN CROWN

*Yates, Robeson, Dailey in Qualifying Play;
Tourney Conditions Changed this Year.*

A trio of Rochester golf stars, Arthur Yates, and John F. Dailey, Jr., of Oak Hill Country Club, and Fillmore K. Robeson, of the Country Club of Rochester, will soon leave the links of this section of the country to whirl through a few practice rounds on the Oakmont Country Club, of Pittsburgh, in preparation for their qualifying rounds in the National amateur golf championship on August 31st and September 1st, which will be followed by the leading sixteen players, with match play, continuing for the victors through September 5th. Changed conditions will greet the galaxy of 128 stars this season, for the number to play will be smaller, and the number of qualifiers has been cut from thirty-two to sixteen.

Officials of the United States Golf Association feared to make the cut in the number, anticipating that stars would drop out and that the field might not be as fast as in previous years. The pairings for the qualifying as announced by the organization fail to bear out this anticipation and the great majority of links simon-puces that have made history in past seasons will again trail fairways and greens in quest of the 1925 title over the Oakmont course.

Yates Rochester Ace.

Rochester with three accepted entries is fortunate with but 128 players from the entire nation in the play. Yates, last year in the first thirty-two and winner of his first match, will carry the major hopes of the Rochester delegation although Robeson and Dailey may be depended on to show some fine play. Dailey recently competed in the British amateur and was one of the last two Americans in the competition for that famous trophy. Robeson's 66 score on the Country Club of Rochester links shows that his accuracy on long shots is returning and that the former state title-holder will be in the running.

Yates has compiled a long list of victories since last year's journey, most notable of these being the winning of the North and South amateur crown at Pinhurst early this spring. He has played consistent golf throughout the Eastern towns and will be at his best at Oakmont, in the opinion of experts. His experience of last year and since that time will aid him considerably also in this attempt. Dailey scored well last season in the qualifying round but was just short of the thirty-two leaders.

Western New York in addition to the local trio will have a strong field of contestants in Lee Chase, Park Club, of Buffalo; 1924 state champion; "Ham" Garner and "Hank" Comstock, of Buffalo, who were finalists in the Country Club of Rochester tourney; Sherrill Shirman, of Yahnundaia, Utica; Frank C. Wattles, of Wanakah, Buffalo, and Yale star.

The qualifying round will show many a surprise, although most of the big favorites will undoubtedly survive the thirty-six hole ordeal. Sixteen players are to be chosen from a field of 128 and that means many a casualty, where a single bad hole may mean going on to match play or packing the golf clubs back in the bag and returning home to practice for the 1926 conquest and chase after titles.

List of Pairings.

Harrison R. Johnston, the former Western champion, and Rudie Knepper look as if they might be entitled to consideration. That makes a team of ten and leaves only six places to fill in that qualifying list from a field that includes possibly twenty stars, any one of whom is capable of displacing some of those mentioned above.

Chicago no doubt feels that Dexter Cummings has as good a right as any one to get within that charmed circle; St. Louis has its Jimmy Manion and its Eddie Held; Boston its Freddy Wright; New York its William Reekie, its Dick Jones, its John G. Anderson and its Jack Mackie jr.; Philadelphia sends J. Wood Platt and George Hoffner; Cleveland, Ellsworth Augustus; New Orleans, the intercollegiate titleholder, G. F. Lamprecht. And even then it does not seem as if more than half of those who should qualify in any field have been mentioned for such players as Keefe Carter, the Western champion; Captain Carter, of Flossmoor, and S. Davison, Herron, former national titleholder, have still to be mentioned.

Stars have failed to get into the lists of tourney competition when the number was twice as large as this season will show and more stars are destined to fall once more by the wayside and join the gallery crowds. Jess Sweetser, of Elwaney, with whom Art Yates is fortunately paired in the qualifying rounds, won the 1922 title, finished second on the 38th green in 1923, and then failed to qualify in 1924. Anything can happen and Yates's play with Sweetser will help pull him through many a tight place and his score may be considerably lower as a result of watching the play of his opponent than as if he were paired with one of the lesser lights.

Two players stand out as almost certain to qualify. The champion of champions and present holder of the amateur crown, Bobby Jones, of Atlanta, is considered sure to get in as his medal play in his greatest game, and Francis Quimet, of Massachusetts, is driving and playing the rest of his game with such skill that his backers and friends feel he will have to be disposed of in match play before he lets slip a chance at the crown.

In addition the Walker Cup team should all qualify, in this group, Bobby Jones, Francis Quimet, Jesse Guilford, Jess Sweetser, Max Marston, Robert A. Gardner, Chick Evans and George Von Elm. There, at least, are eight who ought to get into any representative team and who, by the same token, ought to qualify in the forthcoming championship, notwithstanding the Sweetser and Guilford have given practical proof of how even former champions can fall by the wayside.

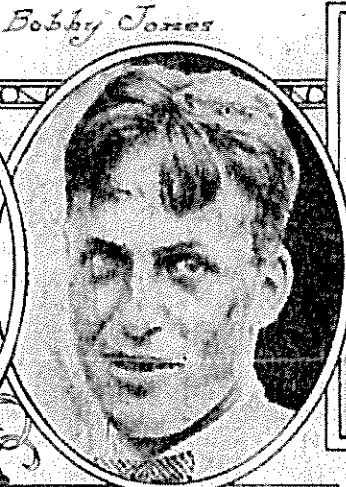

HAGEN TOPS ALL IN TITLES WON

Has Captured American And British Open Crowns Twice With Others

CHICAGO, Oct. 1.—Walter Hagen has won more championships and open tournaments than any other American golfer. His victory here in the Professional Golfers' Association championship was the third time he has lifted this title. A fourth time he was beaten on the thirty-eighth green in the final by Gene Sarazen.

EMULATES BOBBY JONES

He repeated this year, as he won at French Lick Springs last year, and thus established a record of ten straight match play victories in the event, five in each tournament. This duplicates the feat of Bobby Jones, who for two years straight has won the amateur championship.

Hagen has won the American open championship and the British open championship twice. He is the only American golfer who has ever succeeded in winning a major golf championship in Great Britain. He turned the trick at Sandwich and Hoylake, and finished one stroke behind the winner at Troon.

MANY MINOR WINS

He has won the French and Belgian open, the North and South three times, the Western three times, the Metropolitan twice, and a large number of sectional and other open tournaments, such as the Texas open, where the first prize was \$1,500.

The professional champion was born in Rochester, N.Y., and learned his game at the Country Club of Rochester, where he served as caddy, caddy master, assistant professional and professional. His only other job as a club professional was at Oakland Hills, Detroit. For a number of years he has devoted his time to exhibition and tournament golf, and to the Pasadena Golf and Country Club, St. Petersburg, Fla., of which organization he is president.
