# Slants on Sports

Several sports had record years for this city during 1928, and promoters and backers of these amusements are hoping for a continuance of interest and sparkling play during the 1929 season which opens this morning. Baseball drew a great attendance, almost double that of the immediate preceding season, while the Red Wings won the pennant and made plans for a new stadium, the opening of which will be a 1929 red-letter day.

Boxing has been quiet for the past few months but last Spring the Delaney-Gates battle at Edgerton Park drew a record indoor attendance, and the amateur game took on a stronger aspect in the final programs at Convention Hall under the Rochester Athletic Club management. Wrestling was more than quiet the entire season but Jule Bauman still has his finger in the pie and will bring out some of the big boys if the new Sportsmen's Athletic Club goes through with the obtaining of its license and its planned program on Jan. 14th.

George Christ of the Country Club of Rochester continued his sway of supremacy in the links while the successful movement to start the Rochester District Golf Association met with much approval. Enlargement of this body in 1929 will add to the interest in the sport. The Western New York women's championship was played at Oak Hill Country Club with Miss Peggy Wattles again in control of her shots and still in possession of the championship trophy when the smoke cleared.

Hockey had its greatest year here, with the crack Rochester Hockey Club playing six contests in the early months of 1928. The organization has perfected plans for a greater season in the next three months, providing a slight break can be obtained from the weather man, his help being necessary for the strapping on of skates. Arena talk is not all air, either, if we can size up the situation correctly.

Tennis saw its junior and city champions crowned, and added interest provided with the playing of the match events. The Maplewood Y. M. C. A. and Rochester tennis clubs are the leading lights of the net and racquet game, with the Y outfit promoting all kinds of tourneys, for doubles and singles.

Coach Philip Burnham of the Rochester Hockey Club will have his athletes out for a workout on the Country Club of Rochester rink this morning at 10:30 o'clock. *George Christ Finishes Third to Sarazen, Hutchison in Miami Open*



# TRAILS JOCK BY 2 SHOTS AS GENE WINS

## Sarazen Has 294 Total for Third Straight Triumph; Christ Hits at 304

Miami, Fla., Jan. 5—(Special)—George H. Christ, star professional linkman from Country Club of Rochester, carried off third money today in the Miami open championship tournament over the Municipal Course at Hialeah, after a brilliant fight against a field of the best players in the country. The upstater maintained a consistent pace to finish the final half of the 72 holes today in 78-77 for a two-day total of 304, only two strokes back of the second-place Jock Hutchison, former British open champion.

Christ finished yesterday's play in fourth place, and his showing in the high winds this morning and afternoon convinced many of the topnotch players that the Rochester representative will bear watching in the major tournaments this year.

The winner turned up again in Gene Sarazen, former U. S. open titleholder, who triumphed for the third year in succession. Sarazen's rounds were 73, 73, 74, 74 for an aggregate of 294.

Christ's consistency is shown in his nine hole scores today, they being 39, 39, 39, 38. Two bad holes probably cost Christ second place, and on each he took a 6. These were the 13th hole in his morning round, and the fifth in the afternoon. His cards for the final 36 holes follows:

Joe Turnesa, New York, and Eddie Williams, Cleveland, split fourth and fifth money with 305 each. Massie Miller, Norwich, Conn., played along with the leaders until the seventh and eight holes of the last nine, when he dropped off for a 42, that brought his final score to 306, winning a tie for sixth place with Charley Mayo, Jacksonville. Just inside the money was Johnny Farrell, National open champion, who chalked up a 308 for his two day's play.

Sarazen won the \$750 first money, while \$500 went to Hutchison. Christ was awarded \$400, while Turnesa and Williams split fourth and fifth money of \$250 each. Miller and Mayo did the same with the fifth and sixth money for \$137.50 each. Farrell got \$100 for his place. Scores of the leaders:

***F. B. Mitchell, Long Owner  
of Post Express, Dies, 84***



## Ran New York Papers, Led Tobacco Merger, Noted for Horses

Francis B. Mitchell, for many years owner and publisher of the Post Express, died yesterday morning at Kolaneka Farms, an establishment he maintained in Pittsford for the breeding of standard bred horses. He was 84 years old.

Mr. Mitchell was born in Perry, Wyoming County, in 1844. At the conclusion of his schooling he engaged in the perfume business in this city for some time and then went to New York City to begin a career in the newspaper business that continued until a few years before his death.

### Formed American Tobacco Co.

After a few years in New York, Mr. Mitchell purchased the New York Evening Mail, which was owned by Cyrus W. Field. Later he negotiated the sale of the Evening Express, owned by John Kelly, a leading politician. These two papers were then combined under Mr. Mitchell's direction and he operated them for several years as the Mail and Express. The Mail & Express was later acquired by L. F. Shepard and Mr. Mitchell became publisher of the New York Recorder.

At the death of his brother-in-law, William S. Kimball, head of the William S. Kimball Tobacco Company, Mr. Mitchell, who had been named as executor of the Kimball estate, Mr. Mitchell, with James S. Hart, a leading tobacco manufacturer in this city, helped to merge the Kimball and Duke interests to form the American Tobacco Company.

Shortly before his death Mr. Kimball had purchased the Post Express and Mr. Mitchell decided, at the former's death, to operate this paper, and he became president of the Post Express Printing Company.

### Boosted Civic Enterprises

As publisher of the Post Express Mr. Mitchell lent the support of that newspaper to many construc-

tive civic enterprises. He was particularly interested in music and the arts and through the columns of his paper he constantly encouraged the promotion of such cultural pursuits. He himself was a cultivated musician and had studied voice in Florence and London. One brother, the late Gurnsey Mitchell, was a noted sculptor. His other brother, William O. Mitchell, was associated with him in the printing business which he continued after the sale of the Post Express a few years ago to the Hearst interests.

Although the Post Express was a Republican organ, Mr. Mitchell was the first to lead the attack against the candidacy of the late George W. Aldridge, Republican leader in this district, when Mr. Aldridge ran for Congress against James H. Havens. The defeat of Mr. Aldridge was largely attributed to the active and powerful campaign for Mr. Havens, led by the Post Express.

Mr. Mitchell was a man of great individualism. Kindly and courte-

ous to a fault, he was nevertheless a vigorous opponent of enterprises that in his judgment were inimical to the best interests of civic Rochester. He was the sole dictator of the policies of his newspaper during the years that he controlled its destinies.

### Trotting Horses Was Hobby

Mr. Mitchell's chief outdoors hobby was trotting horses and in the development of good standard bred horses he operated for many years a large stock farm, equipped with a half mile training track in Pittsford. In the last two years his horses, under the direction of Will Caton, have figured prominently on the half mile tracks in the East.

Mr. Mitchell was one of two members of the Municipal Art Commission and had served in that capacity for a number of years. He was a member of the Chamber of Commerce of the State of New York and belonged to two New York Clubs, the Republican and Strollers. In this city he was a member of the Genesee Valley Club, the Country Club of Rochester and Automobile Club.

Mr. Mitchell leaves, besides his brother, William, two nieces, Mrs. George C. Gordon and Mrs. Frederick T. Pierson, and a nephew, Hart Mitchell, all of Rochester.

Funeral services will be conducted at 3:30 o'clock Monday afternoon at Mount Hope Chapel.

# ENGINEER SWIFT JOB AND DEPART WITH NEARLY \$500

Bind Woman, Take Bookkeeper from  
Building Where 15 Men Are Asleep  
and Compel Him To Open Safe

AUTHORITIES BELIEVE THEY  
ARE WESTERN PROFESSIONALS

The exclusive Country Club of Rochester in East Avenue, Brighton, early yesterday morning was the scene of operations of a gang of bandits, who aroused the bookkeeper from his slumber, forced him to open the club safe, and escaped with between \$300 and \$500 in cash. Every move of the bandits seem to stamp them as professionals and graduates of the western school of crime, the police say. They left no clues.

### They left no clues.

It was after 4 o'clock yesterday morning when four men carrying flashlights, two of them armed with automatics, forced an entry to the main building of the Country Club.

### Bind Woman to Bed

They first came upon Miss Norine Barrett, sister of Pierre E. Barrett, steward of the club, who was visiting her brother over the week-end. They were somewhat surprised to find the woman in the building, but they tied her to her bed and warned her not to make an outcry.

The robbers found Barrett and ordered him to get up and accompany them to the office. Arrived there, they ordered him to open the safe.

"I haven't the combination," said the steward, whereupon the bandits asked him who had, and were told that information was in the possession of the bookkeeper.

"Where is he?" Barrett was asked.



### Not Afraid of Fifteen

The steward told the quartet that the bookkeeper, John Reus, roomed with other club attaches in a building apart from the main clubhouse, where living quarters are provided for nearly fifteen men.

"Lead us to him," ordered the bandit leader.

Barrett protested against being forced to brave the wintry blasts in his pajamas and with no shoes on his feet, a protest which was ruled a point well taken by the leader, who sent one of his men back to Barrett's room to obtain clothing for him.

Having dressed the steward, the party quietly made the trip to the employees' living quarters, where by the use of the flashlights Reus was found, covered with the automatics, and ordered to get up and dress. None of the other sleepers was awakened.

He was taken to the main building, and there was ordered to open the safe, which he did. The safe opened, the bandits took their time gathering the money, the amount of which was estimated at between \$400 and \$500.

### Spared Man's Savings

The bandits discovered a cash box in the safe.

"What's in this box?" asked the leader of Reus.

"That's my savings," replied Reus.

"We don't want your money, my friend," courteously replied the bandit, who placed the cash box back in the safe.

Reus and Barrett were then led back to Barrett's room in the main building, where sheets were torn and both men made fast to their beds.

Before leaving, the bandits cut two telephone wires within the building, but neglected to cut a wire leading from a switchboard. They then fled as noiselessly as they had entered. If they escaped in an automobile, the machine was parked at such a distance from the club that no one near the club heard the departure.

#### No Clues Found

Miss Barrett was the first one to free herself. She went to the room of her brother and found him and Reus as the bandits had left them. She set them free, and a call was sent to the Sheriff's office.

Chief Deputy Tom Woods was put on the trail, but was unable to find a clue. Bertillon Operator Edward Burke of the Rochester Police Bureau hurried to the clubhouse to obtain finger prints; but the bandits had all worn gloves, and there was no work for Burke.

An alarm of the presence of professional bandits was sent to all parts of the state.

## Wilson Adviser Will Address Yale Alumni

## Police Hold Two Brothers In Country Club Robberies

**One Caught Here, One  
in Cleveland; Two  
Others Sought**

With two alleged members of the bandit quartet that held up the Country Club of Rochester and the Brook Lea Country Club under arrest, police throughout the country last night were searching for two other members of the band, one of whom is wanted on a charge of murder. All four are said to be brothers.

The two arrests came after nearly a month's investigation by deputy sheriffs under the direction of Chief Deputy Tom Woods, who said that a tip, the source of which he could not reveal, pointed to the brothers as responsible for the two country club robberies. The two held are:

### Captured After Long Watch

Arthur Williams, 32, of 141 Anderson Avenue, arrested by Deputy Sheriffs George Gordon and Daniel Leary at his home yesterday morning and held in the jail, and Ray Williams, 24, arrested and held in Cleveland.

After learning that Arthur Williams was to return to his home this week, Deputies Gordon and Leary "planted" themselves nightly where they could observe all persons entering or leaving the house. Their vigil was rewarded about 10 o'clock yesterday morning.

Ray Williams was taken into custody, Cleveland police say, on March 25, when he and his two brothers who are sought, Alfred, 29, alleged ringleader, and Harold, 22, were attempting to crack a safe in the Arcadia Club, in a suburb of Cleveland. Ray, who was said to have been acting as outside guard, was captured, but the others escaped.

At the Country Club of Rochester the quartet is alleged to have forced the bookkeeper, John Reus, to open the safe, from which \$600 was taken.

When he heard of the Cleveland arrest Chief Deputy Woods sent Deputy Ray O'Loughlin, who, with Gordon and Leary, had been working on the case, to the Ohio city. O'Loughlin was accompanied by Gerard Barrett, steward of the Country Club of Rochester, who was bound by the quartet while they took \$600 from the club safe.

#### Steward Picks Out Men

At Cleveland Barrett is said to have picked Ray Williams out of a lineup of prisoners as one of the holdup men, and Cleveland authorities agreed to waive their rights to the prisoner. He will be brought to this city today. Barrett also is said to have identified Arthur Williams yesterday as another member of the band.

The quartet, all Rochester youths, are characterized by police here as criminals of the most dangerous type. Arthur at one time was under arrest for manslaughter but was not convicted, according to police records.

Alfred is said to be wanted at Cedar Rapids, Iowa, where he is accused of killing a gasoline station attendant in a holdup and to have wounded the sheriff in a running gun battle during his escape.

The robberies of the two country clubs here took place on March 9 and 10, the Brook-Lea club being entered in some unknown manner and \$200 taken from the safe.

## Bandit Suspect Back, Arraigned with Kin on Country Club Charge

Ray Williams, 24, accused country club bandit, was brought to this city last night from Cleveland by Deputy Sheriff Ray O'Loughlin and with his brother, Arthur Williams, 32, of Anderson Avenue, this city, was arraigned before Justice of the Peace Keller of Brighton on charges of first degree robbery and grand larceny, second degree.

Both waived examination and were held for the Grand Jury. With two of their brothers still at liberty, they are accused of holding up the Country Club of Rochester and the Brook-Lea Country Club and escaping with more than \$700.

Ray was arrested by Cleveland police several days ago while trying to crack a safe there in company with his two brothers, who managed to escape. Arthur was arrested here after an intensive investigation under direction of Chief Deputy Tom Woods.

Both men held are said to have long police records and are considered by authorities to be a dangerous type of criminal. While being taken to and from the home of Justice Keller they were handcuffed and heavily guarded to prevent any break for liberty.

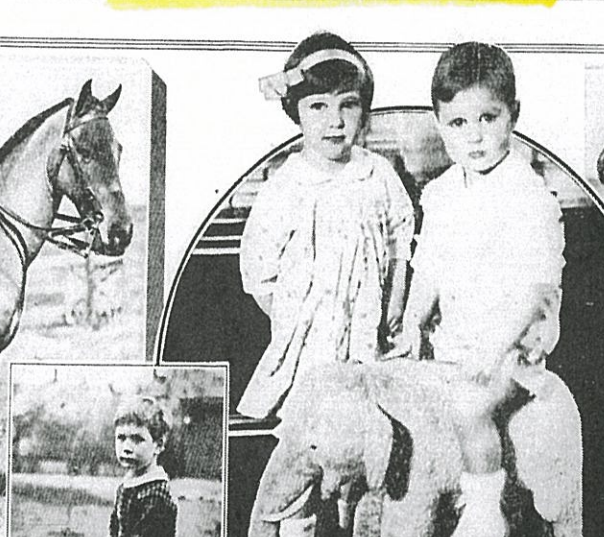

# *Golf Association Approves Lighter Ball for Use in '31*

New York, May 9—(AP)—American golfers will slug a lighter and larger ball through the fairways of the country after the first day of January, 1931.

Following five years of exhaustive tests and experiments, the United States Golf Association announced today that the standard golf ball of the future will be not less than 1.68 inches in diameter and 1.55 ounces in weight. The standard ball in use today weighs 1.62 ounces and is 1.62 inches in diameter.

The action of the U. S. G. A. followed close on the refusal of the Royal Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews, ruling power in British golf, to tamper with the present ball. The United States governing body had hoped that the change might be made simultaneously in two of the principal golfing nations. No decision on a ball to be used in international play will be made until necessary.

Announcement of the change in specifications, made by Prescott S. Bush, secretary of the U. S. G. A., follows:

"The executive committee of the United States Golf Association has adopted as the standard golf ball, a size not less than 1.68 inches in diameter and a weight not greater than 1.55 ounces avoirdupois. This ball will become effective for play Jan. 1, 1931.

JUN. 1, 1904.

"The adoption of the specifications as to size and weight is the result of five years of experiments by the association in an endeavor to secure an improved ball. It is believed that the new ball provides for the average golfer an easier and pleasanter ball for play in all departments of the game. This opinion is shared by the leading players and the manufacturers.

Actual play with the new ball has demonstrated that its increased

size makes it easy to hit and that it lies better under all conditions. For the extremely long hitters, there is a slight reduction in yardage, while the approaching and putting qualities of the new ball are proved to be far superior to that of the ball now in use."

Said loss in yardage of drives is made up amply, by the advantage of the new ball in iron play and putting. The ball is easier to hit, rides higher out of the rough, is better controlled, "sticks" to greens, and is a "beautiful" putting ball. In six weeks of steady play, averaging 77 to 82 for 18 holes, the subcommittee chairman said he averaged one and one-half strokes better for each round with the new ball. He believes the new ball will make the game easier for "duffers" and more satisfactory and exacting for the stars.



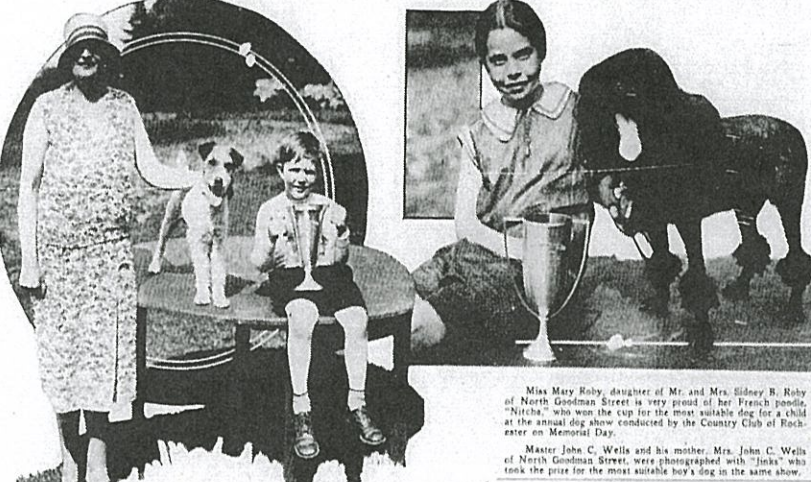

That medalist jinx which causes so much grief to low qualifying-round scorers hit Howard A. Tryon, of Elmira Country Club, yesterday afternoon in the form of a deluge of par shots off the clubs of the defending champion, F. H. (Hike) Gouverneur, of the Country Club of Rochester, and the youth who scored a 74 Thursday must sit on the sidelines or edge of the greens this afternoon and watch others fight for the title in the seventh annual invitation tourney of the Country Club of Rochester.

Four remain, three visitors to this city and Gouverneur, in the semi-finals with a title hope of the field of 143 which teed off Thursday morning. In addition to the champion there are his morning opponent, "Hank" Comstock of Buffalo's Wanakah Country Club, and the contestants in the lower half of the bracket, S. P. Emerick of Oswego and George Boeckh of Toronto.

Each of the four won two matches yesterday. Gouverneur preceded his victory over the sensational Tryon with a win over Bob Reilly, a clubmate, 4 and 3, in the morning and Howard beat C. W. Weis, 5 and 4. Gouverneur's margin over Tryon was of 4 and 3 as his 15-hole total just equalled par. "Hike" was out in 37 and snared a birdie on number 11 by sinking a chip shot from six feet in back of the green. He then played par the rest of the route, dropping a hole at number 14 when Tryon was on the green in two shots, a long second being the deciding factor.

**Fast Scoring, Long Matches**

Scoring was much more brilliant in yesterday's battles and might be claimed as climaxed with an under-80 score tallied in the beaten eight play of the sixth sixteen where Ed Carson of Lockport was "hot." Ben Hughes in the fourth sixteen broke 80 with ease as did Oliver Barber in a round that he completed in the beaten eight of the fifth sixteen against G. L. LaBorie.

Of the 90 match-play battles that waged over the Country Club terrain, 14 went more than the 18-hole route. The longest was between G. C. McMahon and C. C. Mansfield which McMahon won on the 27th green. Eight extra holes were halved by the pair.

The beaten eight of the third sixteen had close matches all through with the 27-hole match leading, with Allie Neary eliminating W. B. Day, 1-up, 2 holes, and with Ward beating Hallert, 1-up, and Harman trimming Raines, 2 and 1. In the first round of the third sixteen no margin was longer than 2 and 1 and those defeated kept pounding along.

The American Golfer trophy for club pairs went to Comstock and Wadsworth of Wanaka Club, Buffalo, based on scores of the qualifying round. Comstock and Wadsworth turned in a best ball of 69. They had:

Smith, who pocketed something like \$14,000 last Winter by capturing nearly every big link event held on the Pacific Coast and in Dixieland, is regarded by critics all over as the greatest young golfer to ever spring up in this country.

Smith, the tall pine of Missouri, recently celebrated his twenty-first birthday by winning the French open championship from a brilliant field. Smith is the master of every club in his bag, a steady shooting youngster who seldom becomes rattled. He came from behind to win the \$15,000 La Gorce open at Miami as a climax to his sensational Winter campaign. The La Gorce tourney is the richest of all golf events.

The Missouri youngster is one of the favorites for the National Open to be staged at the Winged Foot Golf Club, Mamaroneck, N. Y., June 27 to 29. Both he and Hagen are using their short exhibition tour to tune up for the greatest of all golf events. Smith intends to remain with Hagen in team play and would like nothing better than to add the National open title to their already impressive collection of crowns.

With fair weather Monday the match is expected to attract the largest gallery to ever see an exhibition affair in this city. Brook-Lea Country Club officials have set the starting time for 3 p. m. Hagen and Smith are due in town early Monday morning coming directly from Buffalo where they are booked to play Sunday.

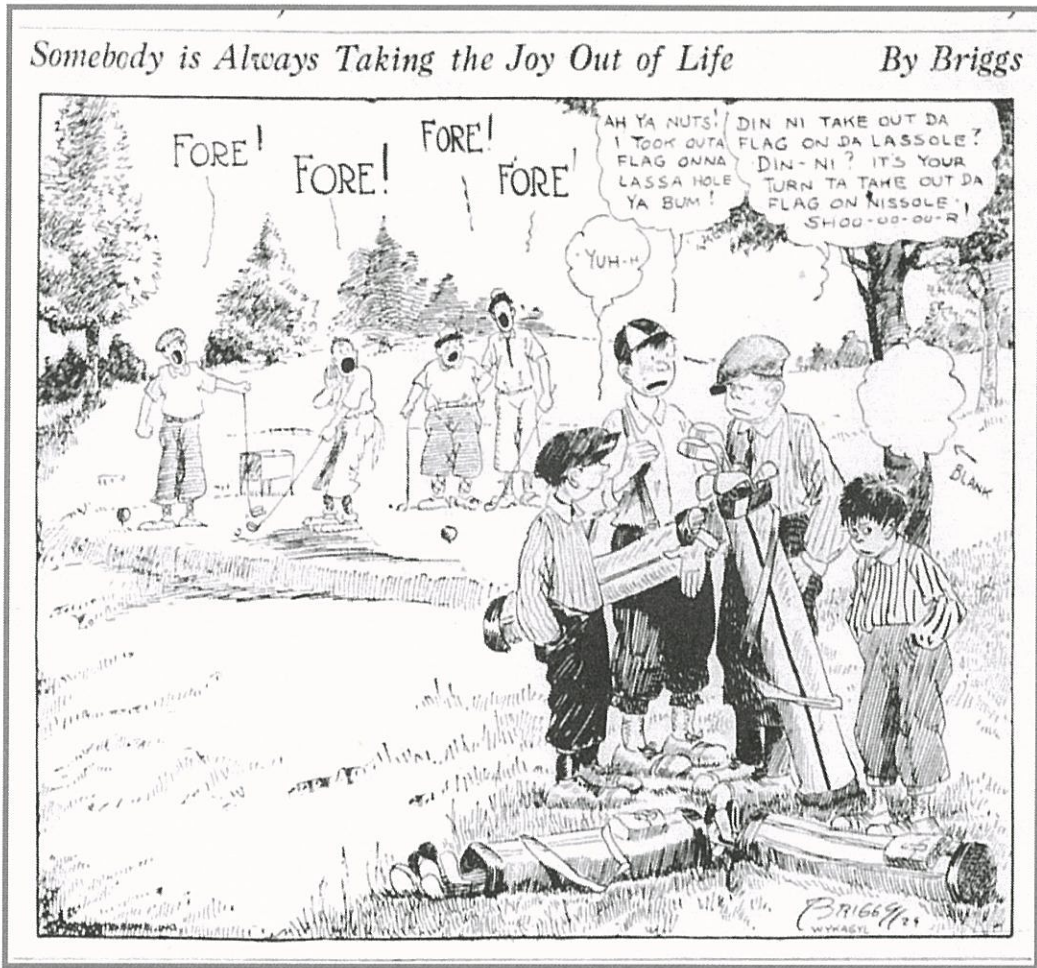

He and Hagen are great pals and the Jupiter star attributes much of his success to the good advice which he has received from "The Hill."

Posts 291 Score for 72 Holes;  
Burke Triumphs with

### He's Ready for National Open



George Christ, Country Club of Rochester professional and four-time champion of the Professional Golfer's Association of Western New York, served notice on the big guns of the golf world yesterday that he will have to be reckoned with in the National open this week at Mamaroneck, when he finished second to Bully Burke in the New York State open tournament which ended yesterday at Rye. Christ posted a 291 score for four 18 holes, finishing four strokes behind Burke and beating out a field of notable club swingers. George had an excellent chance to break the course record with a 67 at the Westchester-Biltmore links during his second round on Friday when he needed a pair of par 4's on the last two holes for a 67. He became a little shaky, however, taking a 6 at No. 17 and a 5 at No. 18 for a fine round of 70.

(Five June 22—Special) — Playing 72 holes of the long west course at the Westchester Biltmore Country Club in one stroke under even par, Willie Burke, of Westport, N. Y., scored an impressive victory today in the New York State open golf championship, winning with four strokes to spare with a score of 205. Something of a sensation a season or two ago when he first broke loose in the South, Burke came back into the winning column with as brilliant a flourish as he has ever shown, evidently reinvigorated and rejuvenated by a few months spent on the shores of Lake Champlain.

Leading the field by four strokes at the end of the first 36 holes with rounds of 72 and 68 Burke got on a 73 and then a 71 to win it. The 73 increased his lead to five strokes at the end of the 54 holes but George Christ, Country Club of Rochester star, who finished in runner-up position, regained one of these with a 73 in the afternoon. Harry Cooper of Buffalo with a 75 scored 205, being tied for fourth place with five others, Mike Brady of Winged Foot, Macdonald Smith of Lakeville, Tony Manero, unattached, Joe Turnesa of Elmford, and Herman Barton of Tonawanda. Before these and in third place was Henry Cline of Milliver, Conn., who finished with a 73 for a total of 204.

#### Christ Gets Birdie

The round-up for the third round found the tie for second place broken. Cooper and Christ had started the eighteen holes together at 141. Christ, who had done 71 and 70, brought in another 71. Cooper had a 76 and was even out of third place being displaced by Missie B. Miller of Newark, Conn., and that moment practically unknown.

The gallery today had no difficulty keeping in touch with the leading players inasmuch as Burke, Christ and Cooper were placed. In the afternoon therefore the tournament became a race between those three. At the first hole Christ surprised his companions by pushing his tee shot away off the line and then approaching up for the only birdie of the trio. Burke recovered from a bunker but took two putts while Cooper after driving the green, indulged in three putts.



At the second hole Burke regained this stroke with a perfect 4. Christ was in the rough with his drive and over the green into a bunker with his second. A bunker also cost Cooper an extra stroke.

After finishing out on the third Burke probably felt gratified that he had started with a lead of five strokes. He required three shots to get within ten feet of the pin and from that point three more to get down. As he started to putt a group of onlookers appeared to unsettle him. He putted eighteen inches over the cup and missed coming back, taking six for the hole. Christ and Cooper each had a 5 here, Christ being short with his second and Cooper in the rough.

#### George Is Steady

The trio played the next three holes in regulation figures. There were several features at the short seventh, however, where Christ and Burke had their par 3's and Cooper a 4.

Burke was the only one of the party on the green but Christ recovered cleverly for a single putt after placing his tee shot to the right of the green. Bunkered with his tee shot Cooper had to pay the penalty.

The eighth saw Cooper drop another shot when his approach failed to hold the green. At the ninth Burke and Burke scored birdies 4's while Christ three putted for a six. At the turn the standing was Burke 36, Christ 37, Cooper 40.

Burke had a six stroke lead with which to start the incoming nine from Christ. Coming back the Rochester man regained two of these with a 36 on against a 38. Burke, however, was too strongly entrenched and closed the tournament victor by the same margin as that which Cooper had beaten him for the honors at Shawnee earlier in the week.

Burke was too far ahead of the field to be caught. It was a question up to the last whether Christ would be able to retain second place. Steadiness also brought the Rochester man through even in the face of some drumfire from different directions.

Miller, the dark horse, seemed all ready to slip into no worse than third place after going out in 36 the last time around and starting home with 3-4-4-4.

But down there in the shadows of the fourteenth and fifteenth trouble was lurking for Miller. His drive hit a tree at the fourteenth and by the time he had finished that hole he had a 7. Then came a 6 and this time on a short hold. A trap, some rocks and a shot over the green brought about the downfall of Miller this time. Christ's cards:

## Slants on Sports

Rowing supremacy, carried last season to the Pacific Coast by the Golden Bears of California, was swept back to the Atlantic Seaboard last night in the dusk of the roughened Hudson River, as Columbia's Lions swept eight other crews before them to win the four-mile Varsity event of the intercollegiate regatta. And while Columbia was taking the verdict in the major event of the day, with its record-breaking field of nine entries, two nearby university eights were paving the path to future glory with the sweep of their secondary eight-oared craft. Cornell won the junior varsity event, sneaking under the wire as Syracuse folded up in the final spurt, while the Orange was not without its regatta triumph, taking first in the freshman race. The Big Red and the Orange and the Lions have placed New York State's eights on the highest pinnacle in the rowing game, long the aristocrat of the college sports.



Only five of the nine crews finished the race, and officials had a tough time in the darkness deciding just which places, after the first three, were won by the respective crews. Columbia, however, rode right through the roughness and darkness to bring back the crown it had held in 1927 and which it lost to California last year.

Meanwhile a busy sports week opened in another sector with the qualifying round of the Buffalo Country Club woman's Invitational event, topped by Virginia Wilson, of Chicago, who scored an 81 for a tie and then played off with Martha Kinsey of Wyoming, Ohio. Miss Wilson equalled Harry Cooper's record for the first nine with a dazzling score of 33, bagging four birdies. Miss Helen Little of the Country Club of Rochester will represent Rochester in the first flight as a result of her 96 card.

Today match play will start in that event and in the intercollegiate golf championship tourney over the Deal course where such well-known figures as Maurice McCarthy, Jr., Al Brodbeck, and others will swing into action. Thursday the hopes of Western New York and Rochester will center in the thrust for the National Open championship of Walter Hagen, George Christ and Harry Cooper. That same night Max Schmeling and Paulino Uzcudun crash in the Yankee Stadium ring.

Rochester's baseball club took a day off yesterday, after a series of "off" days, and will resume with the Orioles today and tomorrow before invading Buffalo and then coming home next Sunday for what should be a merry welcome to the battling Red Wings. Bob Morrow, with a broken arm, not a split finger; "Rip" Collins, with a broken nose; Paul Florence, with a badly sprained knee, perhaps the most serious injury of the entire bunch; Watty Watkins, with a broken hand, and Joe Brown with an injured shoulder and arm, and a long road trip and the club has won nine and lost 11 against sturdy opposition, to keep a 3½ game lead. The personnel is changed, also, with Herman Bell, back for league combat for the first time since he won that memorable twin-bill over the fighting Royals last September; and with Art Jacobs, Art Reinhart, Jim McCracken and Ray Blades in other pastures.

There are only 21 men on the roster, which should leave room for the quick addition of a capable left-hander to help "Lefty" Irvin.

Hagen played some brilliant shots in his round today. Walter snared an eagle three at the 514-yard fifth hole. He was on with two mighty wood clouts and ran a 10-footed into the cup to clip two strokes from par.

Harry Cooper, of Meadowbrook Golf and Country Club, Buffalo, the other entry from Western New York, played around with Joe Kirkwood and Horton Smith. Harry has been on his game here all week and is regarded as one of the strong "dark horses" of the tournament. He had 76 today.

Mamaroneck, June 27—The sun which has been burning the fairways at Winged Foot a crispy brown the past few weeks gave way today to the one and only Bobby Jones. The stocky Atlanta barrister, pounding out a scorching round of 31 for the final nine, blazed his way into the lead in the 33rd National open championship here today with a brilliant 69 for the first 18 holes. Bobby leads his nearest rival, Al Espinosa, of Glencoe, Ill., by a single stroke.

They've talked Jones here for the

They've talked Jones here for the last month and tonight they're shouting his name wherever the golfing clans gather. This boyish looking son of the south stands out over a brilliant field tonight like a powerful beacon light on a black night. Those that figured to give Bobby the ruggedest kind of opposition are far back and there are few who can afford to spot the Georgia belter any strokes in National or any other kind of a championship.

Gene Sarazen trails Jones by two strokes, Leo Diegel and Tommy Armour by five, Bobby Cruickshank and Billy Burke by six, Walter Hagen and Horton Smith by seven, Bill Mehlhorn by 12 while Johnny Farrell, the defending champion, is 17 precious wallops behind the southern express.

#### Equals Macfarlane's Mark

While a blistering sun beat down just at the noon of day Jones reeled off the most amazing nine hole of golf that a National open championship has witnessed since Willie Macfarlane cut loose during the second round of the title event at Worcester in 1925 to post the same remarkable figures.

Jones, like the rest of the bunkered brigade, stumbled into trouble on the first nine when he took 38 pokes to get around, two over par. A six on the very first hole kicked up a heap of discomfort for the Atlantan and he was still shaky at number 9 when he slipped over par for a five on a rather easy four hole.

The great gallery that had romped over the hill and dale in pursuit of the Georgia wonder sighed at the ninth green when Bobby missed his putt for a four.

Even the great Bobby Jones was off up to this point today. One by one they had hit the turn, few smiling and the majority wearing a frown on their bronzed brows. It was a tough old course after all, they said. But it was all through being tough for Bobby Jones.

The music of long putts dropping lazily into a tin can soon changed the surging crowd of some 7,000 that still followed the progress of the southern express. At the 10th green he took a par three and the fireworks were now due to explode.

#### Starts Scoring 3's

A drive and an iron carried Jones to the 11th carpet and here he inaugurated a series of breath-taking putts that left the gallery speech-bound. He was 13 feet from the pin and a birdie but he rammed the ball straight into the cup.

The 12th, a par five, required only a pair of robust wood clouts to get Bobby home. Nine feet of velvet-like green between the ball and an eagle. You could have heard a pin drop on the green as the Atlantan stroked the ball into the cup with a thudding sound.

Too err is human but to recover is divine. Jones proved that at the 213 yard 13th where he was down behind a bunker about 50 yards from the pin with his tee shot. Bobby pitched up beautifully and nearly holed the ball on the fly while the crowd let out a mighty roar. He dropped a four-foot putt for his fourth straight three.

The crowd was keyed now. It was ready for anything. Some figured that Bobby would break 30 if he continued at this sizzling pace. The climax came at the 11th when Jones drove a 20-footer over for another birdie.

#### Bobby Attracts Gallery

It was every man for himself now to get a glimpse of Bobby Jones. The news spread like fire in an oil soaked haymound. The fairway were swarmed with raving spectators.

"Jones, Jones," they yelled. "He has five 3's in a row and is going wild."

They flocked in from all sides of the fairways like blood thirsty troops chasing a retreating enemy. By the time they reached the 18th green there were 10,000 in the gallery all fighting, pushing and elbowing for a look at Bobby.

But after all Bobby Jones is only human. He proved this at the 15th green where he missed a putt by a hair's breadth for another birdie. Only a superhuman could continue at this nerve wrecking pace. He narrowly missed an eagle at the 16th when his 25-foot putt clung to the edge of the hole. He had an easy four and finished out the last two holes in even par for a 69.

It was the first time that Jones had ever broken 70 in a National open championship. He had 32 putts on this heart-throbbing round, 18 going out and 14 on the inward trek.



**Hagen Has 76 Score**

The fact that Jones was two over par going out should somewhat soothe the sting of high scores among the rest of the pack in pursuit of the crown. Had Bobby been even or under par on the first nine the boys could pick up their clubs and go home tonight. As it looks they may only be wasting their time by staying here un-

It will take a golfing miracle to stop the prize of the South from coming to the hands of the South. The best of them on the green.

The odds and more disappointing play of the day was that of Johnny Hayes. The former Quaker Ridge man, who only a year ago played on a weekend field at Chicago and had done in the past for the time being on the momentous trial of 14 strokes.

It was just a case of the rhombus being handed out to the most round. Johnny might well have retained his advantage on retaining his title of the best dressed golfer, a prize that will not come to him this year if he wins again.

Walter Hagen had two rounds of 14 for 14. The Rochester boys had in a typical Hagen position. He did not lose a stroke, when the early hole was not being hit up from the green on Saturday.

Hagen was not out until nearly 1 p. m. and took along the second largest gallery of the day. There was something brilliant about his game. He couldn't get his famous putter to do them in the cup and he could not hit his putter in many of the sand bunkers.

George Wright, Country Club of Rochester professional, after a bad start pulled himself together on the final hole to become out a 73. George, in constant trouble on that last hole, was out in 11 but without a 27 on the honor roll (see page).

There were 41 galleries out of the entire field that stretched two acres under 74. Christ has not a good chance to come through and finish among the leaders.

It was a rough and tiring day for Christ. The first round George went for holes before he was able to get into the hole for a full. That was not the first green, a few holes, where he was in the rough with his drive and was out about but managed to get into the hole in two holes.

Christ found trouble right from the beginning because he started out like a snail, going into the hole with no warning up. He failed to leave the hole in a 27 and a 10, the Country Club of Rochester did not put in appearance of the locker house until shortly five minutes before the time.

A home observer, that has been following Christ for the past week, remarked after the first round that it was not until the 11th hole that he began to feel his drive on members. Then his putter found him who had a chance to come home in 23 as he three-putted two greens and finished up with a 73.

Had George, then hitting, he would think he would have been right in the thick of the battle tonight. He was straight out of the line, found very few bunkers and there is no chance of such mountings around that rugged course. But he was completely short and you can't be short and over at Mount Zion.

**Christ Hit For Scores**

Christ got off with a good drive at No. 1 but only had a green and hit himself 75 yards short of the green. He ran his approach to within ten feet of the cup and two strokes off to the right at No. 2 but it improved off a run and he got on to the fairway but only three feet of the hole. He second shot was short of the pin and he was very near to get up. He never took for a putt but missed the cup taking another day.

George looked for the shot to the left on the par three 21 yard third and had to play out of a trap. He was left with a 12 but ran over a bunker and he again failed to hole out with a second stroke. A ball second hole let him a step short of the green and pushed the ball in to the left for the third shot. At No. 4 he played all the way down in the rough and managed to get his first put with two putts for a 64.

**Out in 41 Strokes**

He got back in a red again at No. 4 where he had a good drive but without a foot short of the green from a perfect lie on the fairway. There was no feeling on his club and he was himself that he had practically no idea where any of his shots were going. He ran his approach very close to the pin and had to take a couple of putts on the putting line to get in the hole.

George picked up a little sand shot at the 13th hole, where he made a mistake to the green and had a 13-foot putt back on the lip of the cup. He got his putt there without any trouble. He was in the rough at the 14th with his second shot. A number 4 iron, but pitched to within six feet of the pin from where he lagged one stroke and hit into the cup.

Two belly mounds were failed to get him home at the 14th hole. Now, a par five, but he was out with a 13th shot and two putts.

# *Veteran Leads Young Star by Two Strokes; Tucker in Win in Amateurs' Division*

Charlie McKenna, professional of Oak Hill Country Club, romped off with the annual Western New York Open championship over the Genesee Valley Park links yesterday with a 142 score for 36 holes of medal play to lead the largest entry list that the event ever has drawn. The long-hitting star rang up the consistent rounds of 73 and 69, his second tour of the layout being the only marker under 70.

While McKenna was scoring that 69 total in the afternoon, a new star in the district was making his appearance among the low scorers. Clarence Doser is the youngster to come "into his own" in this tourney, and the little Country Club of Rochester assistant who is playing tourney golf in a major way for the first time this season contributed an afternoon 70 to a morning 74 for second place among the professionals, two strokes back of McKenna.

While McKenna had his brilliant and par-breaking 69, Doser was but one stroke over the lanky boy and had a sensational 33 coming home. Doser rang home birdies on the 11th, 12th and 17th to get his 70 after going out in 37, which he did on both rounds.

#### Tucker Tops Amateurs

Jack Tucker, Ridgmont Country Club at present, and former park star, won the amateur award with a 146 total, three strokes in advance of John F. Dailey, Jr., Oak Hill; Bob Rossney, Genesee, and Paul Woock, Genesee, all of whom had 149. In a play-off for prizes, Rossney took a four on the tenth hole for the victory over the pair and Dailey went along to defeat Woock for third place among the non-paid golfers.

An Olean pro, J. Higgins, who is handling the new St. Bonaventure layout, topped the field in the morning with a sparkling 74, one stroke in front of Walter Bemish of Genesee Country Club, and two in advance of Ray Wright, East Aurora, and McKenna. Higgins slipped to 75 shots in the afternoon to follow Steve Riley, of Genesee, in the pro order, and tie with Wright at 146.

Riley had 74 in the morning and 71 in the afternoon for 145 and third place with Higgins, and Wright fourth. Bemish finished the day with 148 to tie with Ken (Scoop) Haubner, Monroe Golf Club assistant, for sixth place. Haubner, like Doser, had two fine rounds and is another of the younger pros who will bear watching in future events in the section.



#### McKenna Flashes Style

McKenna was red hot with his iron play in the afternoon round, getting his short game under perfect control for close approaches to the pin after his usual mighty tee shots. And his putts were going down from the midfair range and hung on the lip from far off to keep his score down.

The Oak Hill man equalled par on the outward journey with a birdie three on the fifth hole and a last stroke on the par-three sixth. The others were played in par. To get a 55 coming home Charlie had a birdie on number 12 and played par on the other efforts.

With the rounds of 69 and 70 by McKenna and Doser stealing most of the thunder, John F. Dailey, Jack Tucker, Higgins and Riley had 71's with Walt Bemish getting the only 72 in the crowd. There were a sprinkling of 73's and 74's during the tourney.

Dailey went out in 34 and came home in 37 for his 71; Tucker was out in 35 and home in 36; Riley reversed these figures with 36 out and 35 home and Higgins manufactured his total in the same manner as did Tucker.

The tourney drew the youngsters and the veterans, with Tom Noonan, 13-year-old scoring an 83 in the morning round and the old-timer of the public links play, at least in number of rounds played each year, Bill Lawson getting a 151 total by virtue of his splendid 73 in the afternoon.

Roesney won a handsome bag as his prize, but almost lost the chance with his putting on the extra hole. He was on the green in two shots, about 25 feet from the cup and his first putt was dubbed, rolling but 10 feet. Bob then sank a 15-footer for the victory over Dailey and Wouck, each of whom took 5's.

The entry list exceeded by 19 any previous Western New York open.

Joe Sargent and Teddy LaPalm "posted" totals of 72 and 70, respectively, in the morning play but could not stick around for the after-lunch round and they were ruled out.

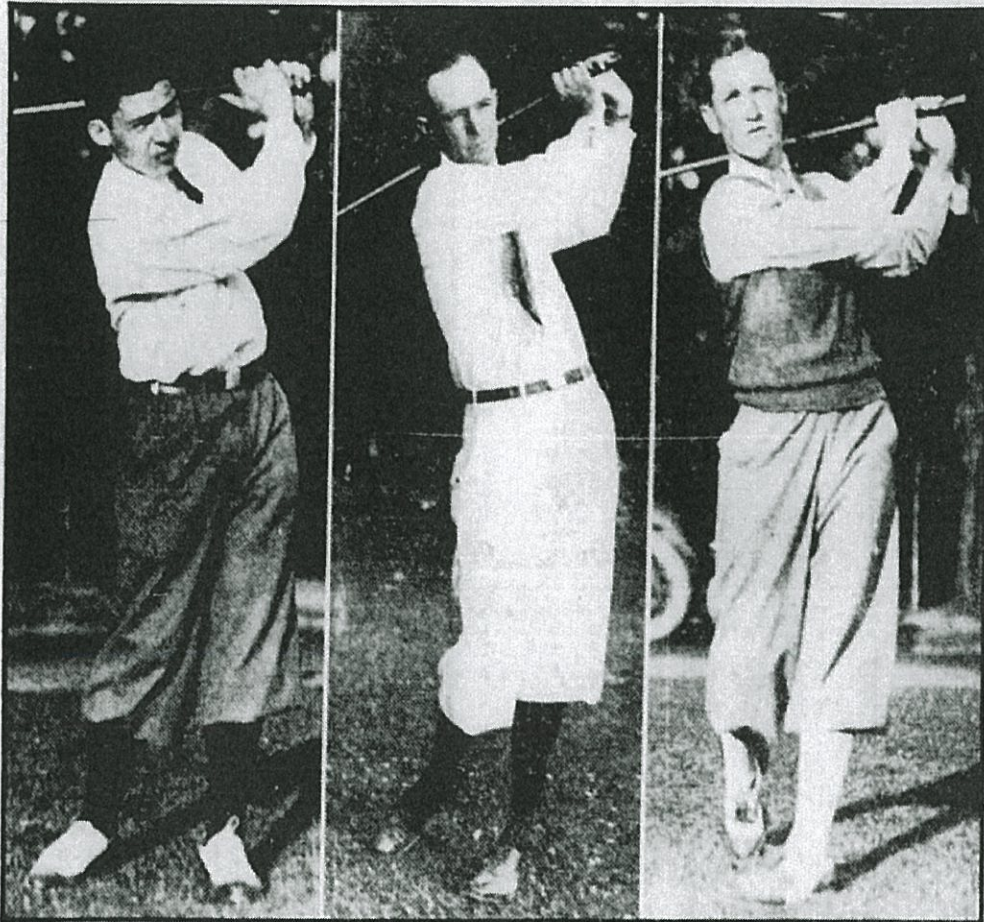

# PLAYS WELL TO TURN IN CARD OF 71

'Hike' Gouverneur and Woock,  
of Rochester, Entered in  
Title Flight

Schenectady, Aug. 1—Maurice McCarthy, Jr., of Green Meadow, flashed one of his brilliant scoring streaks over the first nine holes of the Mohawk Golf Club here this morning and when the dirt, dust and wind had stopped its swirling around the tees and greens, the boy from the New York section had turned in a 71 and topped the field of 141 starters in the seventh New York State Amateur golf tourney by two strokes. McCarthy was out in a sizzling and riotous 54 on the 3,490-yard first nine, much harder than the second one, on which he took a 37.

While McCarthy was spoiling the thunder for most of the entrants who had visions of leading the pack for the honor of medalist, he alone was upholding the view of the "wise" boys that 70's might be easy and that 71 and 72 would find many of the boys hunched. McCarthy finished just two strokes ahead of 71 Law Weatherwax, sensational and aspiring 16-year-old linksman from Schuyler Meadows. While McCarthy coasted into the lead with a breeze on the second nine for a 37 and his 71 Weatherwax followed the usual run of the day's play by obtaining a 40 on the long and tedious out-going half of the route and then proceeded to burn up the incoming paths with a low-scoring 33, the best nine holes of the day.



### Rochester Places Two

Meanwhile, Rochester was placing two entries in the championship flight of 32, and gaining a tie for the last place in the division. After F. H. Hiker, Gouverneur of the Country Club of Rochester had staged a comeback on the second nine while playing with McCarthy to get a 38 on the homeward journey, despite slips over par on the 11th, 12th and 13th for a total of 80 and qualifications, Paul D. Woock, of the Genesee Golf Club, came along with the same total for a place in the top bracketing and a say as to who is going to take the championship of this event, run by the New York State Golf Association.

Woock was 42 at the turn with 6's on the third and eight holes and he likewise had to come home in 38 shots, a birdie three after a ten-foot putt on the 18th green being of considerable service. Woock was steady on the short holes, getting all three of them in the regulation three total for an aid in his score.

L. W. Chapin, one of Rochester's younger stars, hailing from Oak Hill, had an 82 to get in a nine-way play-off for three places in the championship. Chapin went out on the first hole in the play-off, however, Young Bill was on in three as were eight of the nine, with S. McKeon of Oneonta on in two and down in four to take one of the three places. Chapin three-putt the green with one other entry and six went on to the second hole. Here Bob Beale of Mohawk had a par three and George Hale sunk a birdie two for the other two places in the championship lineup.

McKean had the long drive on the first hole with Chapin second after a pretty a swing at the ball as will be seen in this tourney. Chapin's second was in the rough to the right and he was on in two but could not putt, a factor which hindered his scoring in the qualifying round.

### "Hike" Finishes Well

Gouverneur had a bad seven on the third hole, 620 yards long. Hike was over with his third, in the rough coming back with his fourth and barely got on with his fifth to get down in a pair of putts. He then hit for three pars of four shots each but on the 325-yard ninth he smacked his pitch into a trap and went over par. In the 370-yard seventh with a down-hill roll he was pin high with his drive but took a par four as he had to pitch over a deep trap.

The short holes on the second nine, one of 160 and one of 125 found him taking fours. "Hike" was working hard and a brisk wind which was a drawback to McCarthy on the second nine, also bothered. A par-five 13th hole was played in six shots. Going to the 14th, "Hike" counted up and evened par from that point to the finish with a birdie on 14, a slip on the 15th and three straight pars of four each to finish and be saved an uncomfortable afternoon as the 81's and 82's were constantly in danger of dropping to the third sixteen.

Gouverneur was a semi-finalist at Westchester-Biltmore last season in this event and a finalist at the Oak Hill Club in 1927 when Arthur (Ducky) Yates defeated him. The Rochesterians present, 14 entries, and friends of many of the players were squeezing for the fine finish which came.

Quite a number of golfers well known in Rochester through participation in the 1927 state tourney or in Country Club of Rochester invitation tourneys qualified for the title play. Two strokes behind Weatherwax at 75 were J. S. Beale of Mohawk and Melvin Newman of Lake Placid, and R. A. Barringer, also of Mohawk. This trio completed a list of five which equalled or bettered 75. # Youthful Country Club Star Whips Field of Experienced Pros in Annual Tournament

Scores Brilliant 69 in Afternoon to Top Mc-  
Auliffe by Two Strokes; Wins Trip to  
National Event in California

Clarence Doser, black-haired baby of the Professional Golfers' Association of Western New York, stepped out yesterday at the Country Club of Rochester and gave a golfing lesson to a field of veteran links warriors in the annual qualifying test for the National P. G. A. championship. While old timers shook their heads in amazement this 20-year old stripling who serves as an assistant to George Christ at the Country Club, pounded out a brilliant 69 in the afternoon to give himself a 36-hole total of 143, two strokes better than "Rap'em" Ray McAuliffe, long hitting star from Erie Downs, Buffalo.

By his victory Doser earned a trip to Santa Barbara, Calif., next December to compete in the National P. G. A. championship. McAuliffe, who was second, also will make the journey these two getting the places allotted to the Western New York Association.

Doser's triumph yesterday was his first victory in major competition. Clarence has long ruled the ranks of assistant pros but it was not until this year that he has had the opportunity to compete with the big fellows.

After being fairly well back in the list after the completion of the first 18 holes Doser came through with his sizzling 69 after lunch to literally break the hearts of his experienced foes. He sent booming drives down the middle of the fairways, approached with deadly accuracy and rarely missed a putt within the six foot range.

#### Proves His Mettle

Going to the 17th tee on the last round Clarence was two under par. He smashed a terrific drive down the fairway but it tumbled into a sand trap some 25 yards in front of the green. Here he proved his mettle by playing a beautiful explosion shot to within three feet of the cup and holed out for a birdie three. He went up to the last hole needing a four for a 68 but three putted the green for a five.

In winning Doser kept the Country Club flag flying high. It has been many a year since George Christ has not qualified for the P. G. A. event but yesterday, due to an injured shoulder, he was forced to trail along and watch his youthful pupil grab off the honors. There was no one in the handful of spectators watching the play that squeezed any harder on every shot than did George for Clarence.

McAuliffe, one of the favorites to win the tourney, seemed headed for victory after posting a fine 72 in the morning but he could not cope with the par-battering play of the youthful Doser in the afternoon. Ray required just one more stroke for his matinee round for a 36-hole total of 145.

Charley McKenna, considered Rochester's best bet with Christ out of the tourney, took a 79 in the afternoon after having acquired a 73 in the morning, the result of a brilliant 33 on the homeward nine.

Bobby Jones, ofodus, Jack Gordon, Transit Valley and Bill Loomis, of South Shore, all finished in a tie for third place with cards of 149. Frank Kreiger, of Oak Hill, came next with a 150 total.

## POSTS CARD OF 136 FOR TOP PLACE

Clarence Doser Qualifies  
for Match Play With  
Total of 140

Los Angeles, Dec. 2.—(AP)—Stroking his way through the most brilliant competitive round ever hung up for the Hillcrest Country club course, Fred Morrison, Los Angeles pro, posted a 65 today for a total of 136 to capture medal honors in the 36-hole qualifying round of the 1929 Professional Golfers Association championship.

Off to a steady start in his first 18 with a par 71, Morrison cut loose with a dazzling brand of golf in the afternoon round that chopped six strokes off perfect figures for the course. Ten birdies and an eagle in the 36 holes brought the Midwick Country Club entrant medal honors over one of the finest fields ever assembled for the big event.

His play was flawless all the way while tee shots boomed out for yardage unequalled by most of the other 63 sectional entries who teed off in the final qualifying test today.

Four strokes behind the leader came Leo Diegel of Agua Caliente, Mexico, defending champion and pre-tourney favorite to repeat for his title. Diegel covered the rolling golf layout in 71 in the morning and trimmed the card by two strokes in the second round for a total of 140.
