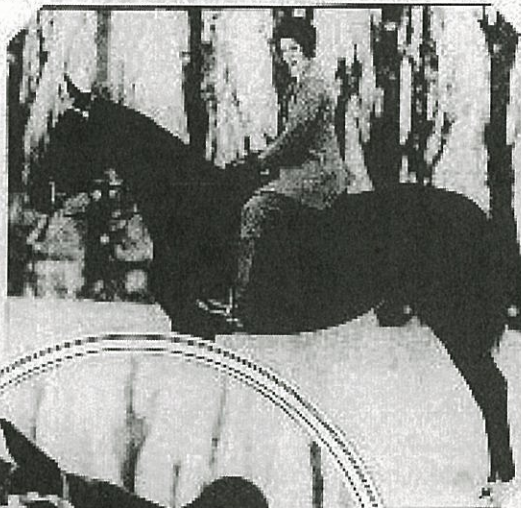

## LUMBER FIRM PRESIDENT DIES IN BALTIMORE

William S. Morse Had Been  
in Business in Rochester  
for Forty Years

William S. Morse, president of the William B. Morse Lumber Company, died at Baltimore, Md., yesterday, aged 58 years. He was a trustee of the Rochester Savings Bank, a member of the board of directors of the Rochester General Hospital, and a member of the Genesee Valley Club, the Country Club of Rochester, the Rochester Club, the Rochester Chamber of Commerce, and the Unitarian Church.

Mr. Morse was engaged in the lumber business in Rochester for 40 years. After the death of his father in 1904, he became president of the William B. Morse Lumber Company. He had been in ill health for the last two years.

He leaves his mother, Mrs. William B. Morse of Rochester, and six brothers and a sister, Charles C. Morse, John P. Morse, Frederick G. Morse, Howard C. Morse, Whiting B. Morse, and James R. Morse of Rochester, and Mrs. Henry A. Patten of New York City.

The funeral will take place at the home of Whiting B. Morse, 7 Arnold Park tomorrow at 2:30 p. m. The burial in Mount Hope Cemetery will be private.

SENATE ACTION ON PARKER MAY SET PRECEDENT

Would Trespass on Judicial Branch if He Is Quizzed as Was Thacher

Washington, March 29.—The Senate, at first through its Committee on Judiciary, will begin this week the high process of passing upon an appointment by the President to the Supreme Court of the United States. In the case of the present appointee, present Circuit Judge John J. Parker of North Carolina, the most formidable protest against confirmation has arisen through a formal objection made by the American Federation of Labor. Their objection is based on the ground, as put by them from their point of view, that Judge Parker while a circuit judge sustained an injunction forbidding a labor union to solicit new members among miners who had signed contracts binding themselves not to join unions.

Speculation about the Senate Judiciary's probable attitude on this question and this appointee is associated with a comment frequently made about this committee. The comment is to the effect that the Senate Committee on Judiciary has come to contain an exceptional proportion of senators of the sort who are called progressive by those who approve them and radical by those who do not. Its chairman is Norris of Nebraska, probably the most progressive or radical, whichever word one chooses, of all the Senate. Second on the committee is Borah. The committee includes also Rains of Wisconsin, Caraway of Arkansas, King of Utah and Walsh of Montana.

Mr. Barnard organized the Barnard & Simonds Company, chair manufacturers, in 1898. He was the senior member of the firm of Barnard, Porter & Remington, dealers in paints and oils. He also was interested in agriculture, which he called his hobby, and operated a farm of 150 acres on the lake shore, two miles east of Nine Mile Point. He was a director of the Rochester & Genesee Valley Railroad.

He was a member of the Genesee Valley Club, the Country Club of Rochester, Rochester Club, Seneca Club, Rochester Chamber of Commerce, United States Chamber of Commerce, National Manufacturers' Association, Rochester Historical Society and Memorial Art Gallery.

### Generous in Charities

Always a generous giver to charitable funds, Mr. Barnard was a large contributor to the University of Rochester. His interest in ambitious students was demonstrated by his creation of a fund to aid those who needed assistance in obtaining a college education.

Although Mr. Barnard always took a keen interest in public affairs, he held only one public office, that of president of the Village Board of Brighton in 1905.

Mr. Barnard was a life-long member of the Unitarian Church. His connection with it began when he served as a boy in the capacity of pumper for its pipe organ. He and his wife, who died sometime ago, were the first couple married in the new edifice forty years ago. He served many years on its board of trustees and was chairman of the board on several occasions. He also served as chairman of its property committee. He regularly attended services, the last time

# Tired Business Men Losing Golf Monopoly as All Ages of Both Sexes Crowd Links

Twelve Courses Now Operating in City  
and Vicinity, with Two More To Be  
Opened Soon, and Others Needed

Golf, the game that has won over more devotees than any other sport within the past ten years, has gained a firm foothold in Rochester and vicinity with twelve courses now in operation and with two more scheduled to be opened in a short time. Considered a game for only the tired and wealthy business man up until a few years ago, one now can find links of the city crowded with youngsters of both sexes as well as older persons any day during the warm months of the summer season.

Golf, much like baseball, has developed into big business with professionals shooting in tournaments with \$25,000 at stake and with instructor posts at various clubs paying as high as \$20,000 a season. It is a game here to stay and its rapid growth in the last few years has hurt attendance at baseball games as well as other sports that depend on attendance to pay their expenses.



### Twelve Courses

There are at present nine private clubs, Oak Hill, Country Club of Rochester, Brook-Lea, Westridge, Ridgemont, Locust Hill, Monroe, Hillcrest and Irondequoit; two public courses at Genesee Valley Park and one at Durand-Eastman Park. Two more private clubs, Midvale in the town of Perinton and a new Lake Shore now under construction.

Five of the private clubs, Brook-Lea, Westridge, Ridgemont, Locust Hill and Monroe, have been built within the past ten years while two new eighteen-hole courses at Oak Hill were constructed only a few years ago. The Oak Hill Club, however, is one of the oldest in the city, the site of the courses having been transferred only when the ground on the river was sold to the University of Rochester to be used for the new college.

The public links, Genesee Valley and Durand report new records for attendance at the end of each season, a sure proof that the game is

growing rapidly. A new clubhouse has been erected at the Genesee links and will be opened for the first time this Spring. There are two eighteen-hole layouts at the Westside park while Durand boasts a nine-hole course that is a true test of anyone's golfing ability.

With Oak Hill and Monroe both boasting links that can be made into championship courses with a little work, there is a possibility that Rochester may some day land a national open championship tournament. Oak Hill has already played host to the state amateur championship and this year the women's state title event is booked for these links.

### Midvale to Open

The new Midvale Club expects to be opened for play next year. Locust Hill opens an additional nine holes on its present course this year and the new Lake Shore Club may be ready for the assault of the divot diggers by Fall.

Sweepstake events and special tournaments throughout the season tend to create more interest in the game on links. A new record for the total number of players to trudge over local courses in one day was established on Memorial Day last year. With new courses being thrown open, 1930 is almost sure to be a banner year for the knights of the mashie.

Rochester women have been in the main responsible for the success of the Women's Golf Association of Western New York. Miss Helen Little of the Country Club of Rochester last Fall was elected president of the organization. Tournaments are played each season on the courses of the Brook-Lea, Oak Hill, Country Club, Irondequoit, Locuse Hill and Monroe clubs.



Rochester also harbors the leading professional golfer of the section in George Christ of the Country Club of Rochester, who has been the dominating figure in the Professional Golfers' Association of Western New York for many years. Arthur (Ducky) Yates, who plays under the colors of Oak Hill, is one of the outstanding amateurs in the country. He won the state amateur crown two years ago and gained considerable fame the same year by eliminating George Von Elm, considered next to Bobby Jones in the simon-pure ranks, in the national amateur championship tournament.

The Rochester and District Golf Association organized in 1928 stages a yearly championship tournament that tends to create spirited competition between the clubs of the city and vicinity.

# Woman Golfers of Western New York in First Tourney May 26; Handicaps Listed

With two of their fellow-members participating in the British women's championship on the links at Formby, interest of members of the Women's Golf Association of Western New York\* has increased this past week, according to Miss Helen Little, of the Country Club of Rochester and president of the district body. The first tourney date, May 26, hardly will see either Miss Peggy Wattles of Buffalo or Miss Louise Fordyce of Owasco Country Club, Auburn, in action over the Cherry Hill Golf Club course at Ridgway, Ont., but these two internationalists are expected to play in the other monthly events, including the championship.

While Miss Wattles will be a top-heavy favorite to retain her crown in the title play, much interest has been aroused among the woman players over the results of the handicap medal-play tourneys, scheduled on the other dates. All players with a handicap of over 28, rated from five cards turned in, are prevented from entering the tourneys which result in the improvement of the higher handicap entries in order that they may cut their score and play in the association contests.

#### Rating Accepted

The classes will run from 0 to 14 for A players, 15 to 21 for B entries and from 22 to 28 for C contestants. This rating has been accepted and is used by the women's Eastern, Western and Southern Golf Associations.

## DOSER TOPS FIELD WITH CARD OF 147

Feller, Bemish and Christ  
also Qualify in Test  
at Transit Valley

Buffalo, June 16.—Faced by that 21-year-old links wizard, Clarence Doser, youthful Country Club of Rochester assistant pro, Rochester golfers made a clean sweep of the four places allotted the up-state district in the National Open qualifying test at the Transit Valley links here today. Doser blazed his way over the rain-soaked course in 69 strokes in the afternoon for a smashing triumph over a field of 36 after he apparently was out of the running at luncheon with a 78. His final 36-hole card read 147.

The other three to qualify and win the right to compete in the championship finals at the Inter-lachen Country Club, Minneapolis, next month were: Ray Feller, Ridgmont, 148; Walter Bemish, a Rochester boy, and now pro at the Genesee Country Club, 148; and George Christ, Doser's tutor at the Country Club of Rochester, 149.

Doser's sensational afternoon round showed seven threes and was all the more remarkable in that it also sported a seven at the 13th hole. Clarence seemed well on his way to a possible 65 when he stepped up to the 13th tee but he pulled his second shot into a clump of trees and after reaching the green in four, required three putts to get down. This placed him on even terms with par and he went one over when his putter again failed him at the 14th and he took three pokes on the carpet to hole out.

#### Feller Furnishes Surprise

These disheartening breaks were enough to smash the spirit of a grizzled veteran but Doser, fighting with bulldog determination, rallied superbly and bagged birdies at the 15th and 16th greens to again go under par. At the 15th he rammed a 25-foot putt into the cup and at the 16th sent a pitch shot to within three feet of the tin. At the final green he just missed a 68 when his 50-foot chip shot stopped an inch short of the cup.

The victory was Doser's second major triumph within the last year. Last Fall he topped the field in the qualifying round for the P. G. A. tournament at the Country Club of Rochester.

Christ just barely managed to skim in under the wire after having set the pace in the morning with a 73. It was the first tournament George has competed in since the National Open last Summer and the rain that fell throughout the afternoon was no help to his ailing shoulder. He was out in 37 in the matinee round but took six at the 10th and 13th greens for a 39 coming home and a 76.

Ray Keller furnished the big surprise of the day inasmuch as he had been entirely overlooked as the early finishers came in. The steady stroking Ridgemont propped up with a brilliant 72, however, and immediately moved into a tie for second with Bemish.

Bemish was also unusually steady and came through with a fine 73 in the afternoon to win his way to the open. Both Jim Heaney and Steve Riley of Brook-Lea and Durand respectively, were in the running until the final nine of the afternoon round. Heaney required 40 strokes to get home in while Riley took two more.

The sweeping victory means that Rochester for the first time will be represented by four golfers in the country's greatest links event. For the past few years Christ has been the sole representative from this city to win his way to the open.

Among the invaders who will be serious threats are W. Hamilton Gardner, Buffalo Country Club and two-time winner of the invitation tournament; Robert Bliss, Niagara Falls; Howard Tryon, Gordon Taylor, Toronto; John S. Brice, Schenectady; Leonard Martin, Ives; Alex Knapp, Baltimore; T. F. Padlock, of Detroit.

There will also be second, third, fourth, fifth and sixth place to qualify for match play today. A prize will be awarded to the players with the low medal score today. Match play will begin tomorrow, both in the morning and afternoon.

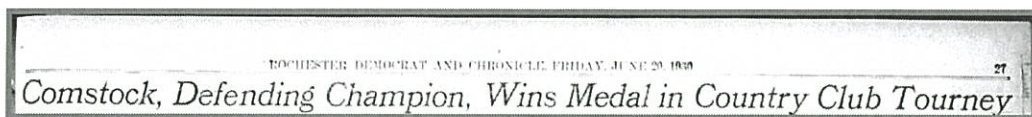

### GOUVERNEUR IN FORM

Six Rochester Golfers in  
First Sixteen; Scores  
Unusually Low

Henry W. (Hank) Comstock, sandy-haired defending titleholder from the Wannakah Country Club, Buffalo, gave fair warning to the most brilliant field ever entered in a Country Club of Rochester invitation golf tournament, that he is going to be a stubborn champion to dispose of in the eighth annual classic which got under way at the C. C. of R. links yesterday morning. Playing through intermittent showers, Comstock clicked off a brilliant 69, two under par to win the medal honors and top his nearest rivals by three strokes.

One of the last to finish, Comstock captured the lead held jointly throughout the day by Howard A. Tryon, of the Elmira Country Club, last year's medalist, and Gordon Taylor, of York Downs Country Club, Toronto. Tryon and Taylor, both out early in the morning before the rain had begun to patter on the links, posted cards of 72 and appeared entrenched in the top position until the Buffalo youngster started blazing his brilliant trail.

The scoring in yesterday's event was the lowest since the first tournament was staged back in 1925. Six golfers tied at 77, were obliged to play-off to see which one was to be eliminated from the first sixteen under a gray sky last evening and with a driving rain pelting down in their faces. In this sextet was included the name of Arthur (Ducky) Yates, Oak Hill's long driving star, and a heavy favorite to win the tourney.

#### Favorites Survive

Yates along with Hiley Harmon of Monroe Golf Club, W. B. Macomber of the Country Club, Leonard Martin of Ararat, and John S. Best of Mohawk managed to remain in the championship flight after hanging their tee shots for 36. Claver of Canandaigua, the lone member of the playoff group, got in trouble on his first shot and then he became lost on his third stroke. The game was immediately settled without further play in the part of the others.

Favorites on a whole managed to get in the first sixteen but there were several jolted by the law-suiting epidemic which hit the links early in the day. George Bowditch of Toronto, who carried Conshark to the 20th green before meeting defeat in the finale of last year's chase, landed in the third sixteen while Alex Kapp, of Baltimore, looked on as one of the biggest threats for the crown this season, couldn't get going until the last nine and got mixed out of qualifying with a 73.

There were others, too, such as Robert Bush, Niagara Falls, J. W. Chapin, Oak Hill, Bruce Barty, of Canada, and Tommy Hobbit, of Buffalo, who failed to get under the wire. Before the tournament it was common gossip that he would be good enough to get in in last sixteen.

#### Rochester Places Six

Rochester placed six men in the championship flight and will have an excellent chance of winning the trophy. Fairfax H. Hines, Governor, near, blind, buried star of the Country Club, topped the local delegation with a fine 74 played in the late afternoon when the elements were at their worst. Jack Tucker, faithful shot maker who scattered the rubies of the Ridgeman Golf Club, came next with a fine 75. Tucker got away to a glittering start when he went out in 30. A seven on eleven and a six at No. twelve threw Jack into all kinds of trouble and he required 40 paces to get around the final nine for a 75. Ben Douglas, Oak Hill, Hiley Harmon, Monroe, Art Yates, Oak Hill, and W. B. Macomber, Country Club, were the other Rochesterites to qualify.

Yates, who has played little golf since last winter, was continually in trouble, topping his tee shots and missing putts. Art played a great shot from a sand trap to the green on the final hole to bring him his 77 and get him in the first sixteen.

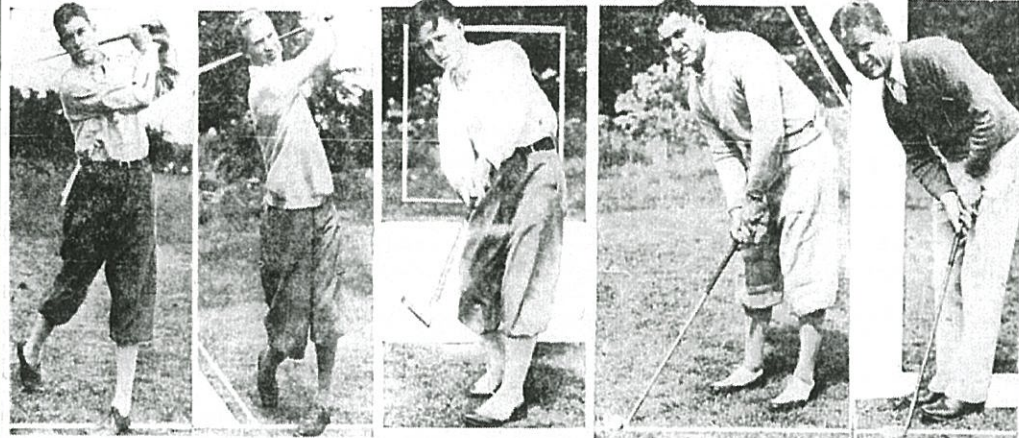
The two best nine-hole rounds of the day were made by Gordon Taylor and A. B. Hatfield, the latter of Yonkers, who both hung up cards of 32.

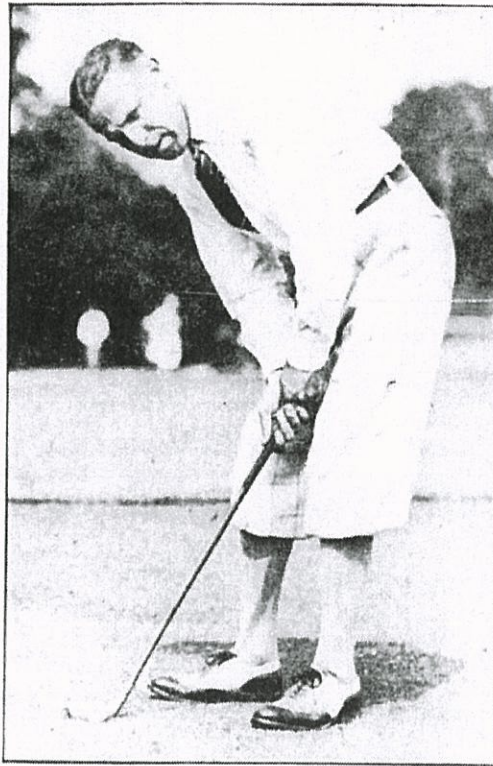
### Links in Fine Shape

Interlachen Country Club, Minneapolis, Minn., July 11.—Two Rochester golfers, George Christ of the Country Club of Rochester and Walter Bemish, professional at Geneva Country Club, safely managed to hurdle the first two-day test of the 34th National open golf classic today by qualifying for the final 36 holes of play here tomorrow. Christ topped the contingent, which also included Ray Feller, of Ridgmont Golf Club and Clarence Doser, of the Country Club of Rochester, with a two-day total of 153. Bemish coming back nicely to shoot a 75 today after a staggering 80 yesterday, finished two strokes behind Christ with a 36-hole card of 155.

Doser, cracking wide open, took 82 wallops to get around Interlachen and this added to yesterday's 79 gave him 161, the highest total of the Rochester delegation. Feller, by scoring a fine 37 one over par on the final nine today hammered out a 77 and this along with his 82 yesterday listed him with many others at 159.

Christ had a golden opportunity of breaking into the select circle of leaders today but he wrecked his chances on the final nine after having matched stroke for stroke with par on the outward journey. George played splendid golf throughout the first nine, and was putting for birdies on seven greens. He was short on every putt of any length until the 16th green and he became thoroughly disgusted with himself as the pellet rolled up time and again only to stop a foot or two short of the cup.

Stars back poorly

#### Stars back poorly

Christ had a miserable start on the homeward nine going four strokes over par on the first three holes with a 6, 5 and then a 7. To make matters worse he also went one over at both the 14th and 17th greens finishing six over par on the last nine holes for a 12.

The most brilliant nine-hole round turned in by a Rochester golfer was recorded by Walter Bemish, who bettered par by a stroke going out with a 35. He faltered on the final nine, however, requiring 40 pokes to get home for a 35 total which equaled Christ's fine card of yesterday.

Bemish's 35 was remarkable inasmuch as he three-putted the fourth green with an easy birdie in sight and a probable eagle and then on the ninth tee lost a stroke when an excited woman, rushing to get a look at Bobny Jones who had just started out, dashed plumb in front of him on the fairway as he was in the act of swinging.

"Hold it!" yelled a panic-stricken spectator on the tee just as Walter was bringing the clubhead down to meet the ball. He pulled up on his swing, missed the ball completely on purpose and then went on to get a par five anyway. It robbed the Genesee pro of a golden chance of finishing the first nine two under par.

#### Squares With Par

Christ put together two tremendous wallops to overshoot the first green today and slipped a stroke over par. He was putting for birdies at both the second and third holes but was short on both attempts. At the 506-yard fourth he belted two beautiful woods down the fairway and was at the edge of the green. He chipped up a foot to the left of the tin and became all square with par.

At the 178-yard fifth he overstepped par again, his ball being some 35 feet short of the green. It was caught in the wind and failed to carry. George's approach was very feeble and he took a pair of putts to hole out.

On the next four holes he was putting for birdies and only at the final green did he collar one to finish in even figures.

At the tenth tee George got up to bat but was held up some five minutes by wild-eyed gallerites dashing madly across the fairway to get a peek at Walter Hagen parading up to the 18th green. After much shouting the marshalls finally cleared the way and George proceeded to hook one off into Interlachen's tiger rough. His ball was buried a foot in the toughest blades of grass this Northwest

# CHARLEY'S 77 LEADS FIELD IN FORENOON

Buffalo Pro Comes Back to  
Win Matinee Event  
With Card of 74

Long hitters had their day at the Monroe Golf Club links yesterday when Charles McKenna, Oak Hill pro, and "Raper" Ray McAuliffe, Erie Downs, Buffalo, star, the two Macs lugged off the honors and gold in the two 18-hole medal tournaments that featured the second Western New York Professional Golfers' Association gathering of the season. McKenna, with a card of 77, topped the field in the morning, which was originally billed as the only medal play event of the day.

The scheduled pro-amateur match for the afternoon, in which Monroe Club members were to team up with the pros, failed to materialize however, because of the lack of amateurs, and the field took another whirl at the win-swept links. McAuliffe's long game was not to be denied this time and he came through with a brilliant 74, two strokes over par and three better than McKenna's morning winning score.

A whistling wind swept the rolling terrain throughout the day and the hopes of the big majority of the field were dashed before they had completed the first nine in the morning. Ordinary hitters found it impossible to make a headway into the gale with irons, even when only short distances from the greens and very few of the players were putting for birdies and pars during the day. Scores in the 90's were not uncommon and a good portion of the field refused to turn in scores in the afternoon so high did they mount.

#### Rochester Pros Fare Well

Rochester pros captured the Hons' share of the winnings with Jim Heaney, Brook-Lea's new instructor, finishing in the runner-up position to McKenna in the morning and Clarence Doser, Country Club of Rochester youngster, clubbing his way into the same berth in the afternoon. Heaney's morning card showed an 80 but it was good enough for second money. Doser posted a 77 in the afternoon, to equal McKenna's morning round. In the matinee affair McKenna and Heaney tied for third place with scores of 78. Elwin Nagell, of Meadowbrook Golf and Country Club, Buffalo, carried off the third place prize in the morning with an 81.

McKenna, who along with McAuliffe, ranks as the longest hitter in the Association, played steady golf throughout the day. Charley was out in 38 in the morning while the rest of the field was blowing up managed to take only one more stroke on the incoming nine for his 77. He posted the best 36-hole card of the day, his 77 and 78 giving him an aggregate of 155.

### McAuliffe Comes Home in 36

McKenna's morning card showed only one six. His long wood shots enabled him to reach the greens in good style and had he been favored with a little luck on the putting carpets he might have clipped three or four strokes off his score.

McAuliffe, wild in the forenoon when he posted an 84, steadied down in the matinee event, and lost no time in going to work on old man par. He was out in 38 but on the final jaunt got all of his clubs clicking and played the only nine holes of the day in par by registering a 36 on the incoming journey. Doser was even with par for the last nine going to the 17th tee but he required six strokes to get down on this hole and finished with a 38 for his 77.

George Christ, Country Club of Rochester star and five-time winner did not play in the tourney because of the cold weather. George has been bothered with a side injury since the National Open last June. It was announced yesterday that the new pro event will be held at the Erie Down course, Buffalo, June 9.

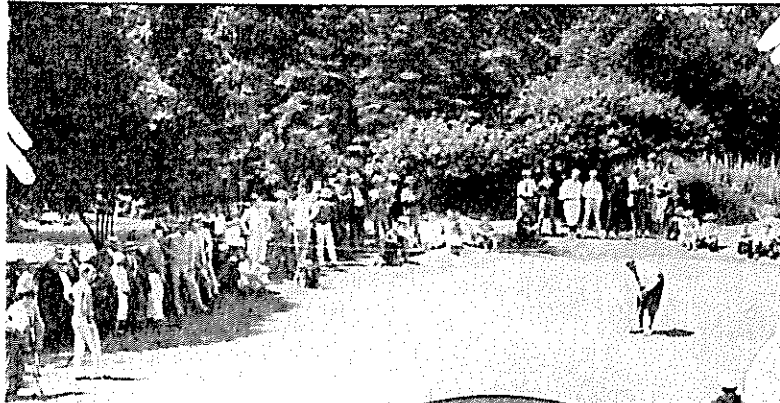

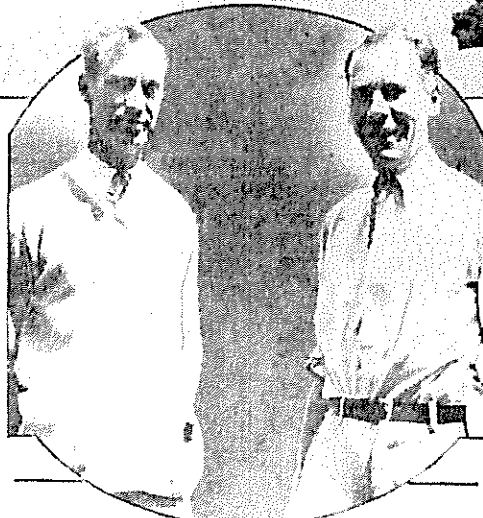

Fifty-eight Foot Craft to Be Used on Lake; Wind Stave 2 motor

*Oak Hill Luminary Drops  
15-Foot Putt into Cup On  
Final Green for Victory*

Triumph Follows on Heels of 23-Hole Win  
over Comstock in Semi-final Round;  
Gouverneur Eliminates Macomber

A 15-foot putt that skidded over the spacious 18th green and hit the bottom of the cup with a thud, enabled Arthur W. (Ducky) Yates, Oak Hill Country Club giant, to conquer Fairfax H. (Hike) Gouverneur, Country Club of Rochester ace, in the finals of the eighth annual C. C. of R. invitation tournament yesterday afternoon. Yates triumphed by a 1 up margin, staging a garrison finish that was featured by a 50-foot chip shot straight and true into the tin at the 16th green and a birdie three at the final hole for victory.



By his victory the Oak Hill club captured the crown for the second time in the history of the event. Art rallied superbly to win both his matches yesterday vanquishing the defending champion Henry W. (Hank) Comstock, of Wanakah Country Club, Buffalo, 1 up in a brilliantly played semi-final struggle that went 23 holes before a decision was reached. Comstock, the favorite to win the honoree, had the match in hand going to the final green but he took an ugly six and allowed Yates to even matters.

Gouverneur entered the finals by eliminating his clubmate, W. B. Macomber, 4 and 2, in a well-played match. "Hike" took an early lead with some below-par shooting and brought the match to a close at the 15th green.

**Both Shoot 76**

Yates and Gouverneur both shot rounds of 76 in the afternoon. Yates was in trouble going out in 49 to his opponent's 38. Their cards:

Yates was the first to gain the advantage in the deciding match holing a 20-foot put at the 430-yard par four second hole for a birdie three while Gouverneur was requiring four strokes to get down. "Hike" squatted things at the 500-yard par five third, however, when he garnered a birdie with Yates taking a six. A birdie three at the seventh gave the Oak Hill player the upper hand again but Gouverneur finished the first nine with a rush by winning both the eighth and ninth holes to hit the turn 1 up.

They halved the eleventh with 4's but Gouverneur was in the rough with his drive on the dog-leg 12th and Yates, thanks to a tremendous drive, was on in two for a birdie four while Hike for was taking a five. This allowed Arthur to square the match again and at the short 13th he went 1 up, as Gouverneur's drive found a trap.

#### Yates Holes Chip Shot

The 18th hole in the Yates through-out the entire tournament, which proved nothing to him and by side of his drive to the green. He managed to hit a par five but it was not good enough to take the hole as Conover's put down in two and occupied the green for a birdie four. Once again they were out even and each managed to collect his par three at the 189 yard 19th.

That gave Yates a birdie chance and Art won the final hole handsly while Constock was hitting the ball all over the fair way for six strokes. Brilliant golf featured the first four extra holes, but at the 189 yard 18th Constock found a trap to the left of the green with his second shot and failed to get on in three. Yates reached the putting carpet in two and got down in four to Henry's five for victory.

L. Martin of Apawans won the championship of the beaten eight of the first sixteen by defeating B. A. Houghes, Oak Hill, by default. Posts Cards of 69, 72 for

Niagara Falls, Aug. 4—(Special)—Walter Bemish, professional at the Genesee Country Club won the right to represent the Western New York district in the National Professional Golfer's Association championship by winning the annual 36-hole qualifier today at the Niagara Falls Country Club. Jack Gordon of Transit Valley pulled up into third place with consistent rounds of 73 and 72 for a 145 aggregate.

Bemish was real "hot" over the first nine holes, bagging an eagle three on the 525-yard third, where he got a length drive and then slammed his iron second to within two feet of the pin. He birdied the seventh and eighth to reach the turn in 32, three under par. Walter also was under par on the 11th and 18th holes, stroking over the second nine in 37 to go to lunch with a fine little 69 behind him.

**Snares Second Eagle**

In the afternoon Bemish found difficulty in controlling his putter and he was two over par to the turn, despite the fact that he bagged a birdie four on the third. On the 11th he snared his second eagle with the ball a scant foot from the pin.

Beginning with the 14th, which also proved his jinx hole in the morning, he ran into a streak of tough luck, which for a time threatened to completely ruin his chances. Here his second stuck in the tall grass at the top of the green, he was short with his chip and then rimmed the cup with a ten footer, finally taking a five on this par four hole. A brilliant recovery just enabled him to get his par on the 15th when his second was well over the green. He chipped a foot from the cup, however, and needed but one putt. On the short 16th he dropped his tee shot on the green, 40 feet from the flag and then proceeded to use up three putts.

**Recovers at Home Hole**

He also was over par on the 17th, being short with his second, failing to get close with his chip and needing two putts for a five. 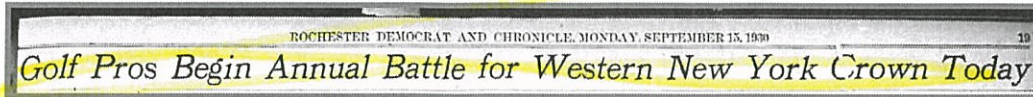
### Mrs. Preston Winner

## POSTS 73 ON FINAL ROUND FOR VICTORY

Doser Finishes Second with  
298; Jim Heaney in  
Third Position

The title of professional golf champion of Western New York today belongs to Walter Bemish, black-thatched shot maker from the Genesee Country Club. Losing the lead only once during the grueling 72-hole test of the Western New York Professional Golfers' Association annual championship tournament, Bemish crashed through with a sterling round of 73 on the final 18 holes over the east course at Oak Hill Country Club yesterday morning to finish with a three-stroke margin on Clarence Doser, youthful star from the Country Club of Rochester.

Bemish's winning total was 295 strokes, the result of rounds of 75, 72, 77 and 73. Walter topped the field by a stroke at the half-way mark on Monday, slipped back to a tie for second place at the conclusion of 54 holes Tuesday, but like a good race horse rating his own pace, he came pounding down the stretch yesterday with three strokes out in front and with most of the contestants strung out far in the rear.

Jim Heaney of Brook-Lea, slipped in under the wire to grab off third place money. Heaney, well back at the end of the first 36 holes, placed himself in a contending position with a splendid 73 Tuesday and added a 75 to this yesterday for a total of 301. He nosed out Frank Kreiger, Oak Hill, and Jimmy McConnon of Silver Lake, who finished in a tie for fourth place with scores of 302.

**Bemish Consistent, All Summer**

By his victory yesterday Bemish captured the district crown for the first time. Walter has been a menace to the salaried brigade all Summer, however, and has played the most consistent golf of any member of the association this season. He figured prominently in every big event staged in the district this Summer, finishing in a tie for second place in the qualifying round for the National open; led the field in the qualifier for the P. G. A. and climaxed it all with his triumph yesterday in the outstanding event of the year for the sectional pros. He made a very respectable showing in the National Open, qualifying for the last day's play and was nosed out of qualifying for match play in the P. G. A. by losing out in a play-off.

Bemish teed off in company with Doser and Kreiger yesterday morning, all three being bunched for the lead. By the time the trio hit the turn Walter had a five-stroke advantage on both Doser and Kreiger. Sending long booming drives down the fairways and straight crisp irons to the greens, Bemish shaved a stroke from par in covering the first nine in 35. Kreiger was out in 40 while Doser, finding it difficult to control his shots, required 41 blows.

Starting the last lap of the long journey Doser made a brave attempt to overhaul the flying Bemish and had a fighting chance as they went up to the 17th tee. An ugly six caused by a hooked drive, cut Walter's margin down to two strokes at the 15th green. But the Genesee star killed off what little chance Doser had of overtaking him on the very next hole, a 481 par five affair.

**Eagle Decides Issue**

Here Walter split the fairway with a tremendous drive and then came up to the ball to play one of the best shots of the entire tournament. Still about 190 yards from the green he cracked a beautiful iron straight and true to the pin. The ball landed in the center of the green and rolled up to within two feet of the cup. It was an eagle three and he went on to get his par four at the home hole for a well-deserved victory.

Doser had his clubs working perfectly on the final nine which he toured in 36, even par figures for a 77 and 298 total. Kreiger, however, could not get back to playing the same brand of golf that had kept him among the front runners for the first two days and he had to be content with an 80. Jim Heaney meanwhile was coming fast and when he sunk his final putt for a 75 and a 321 total, Kreiger went bounding back into a tie for fourth place with Jimmy McCannon, who had just finished with a 74 for a final count of 302.
