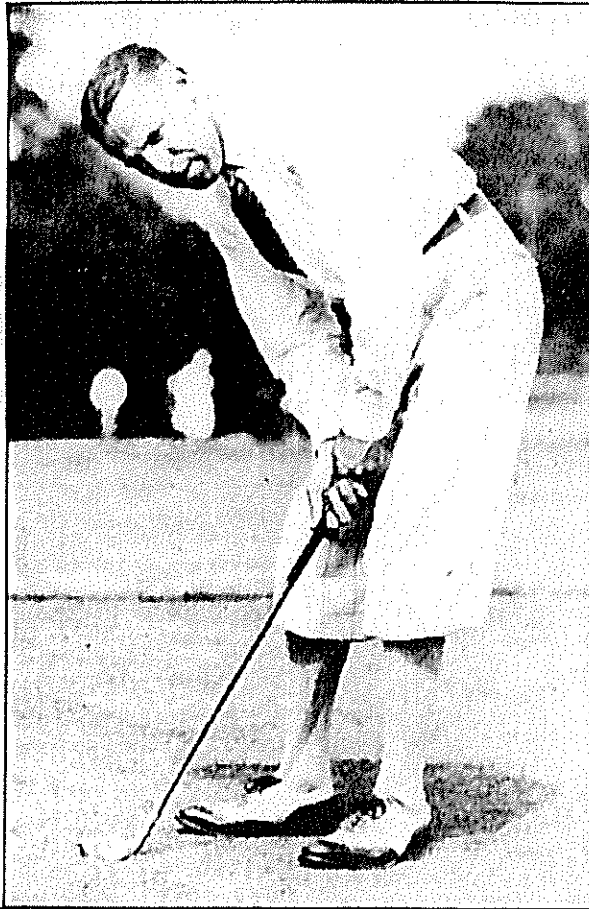
Skating Popular Winter Vogue in Rochester Society

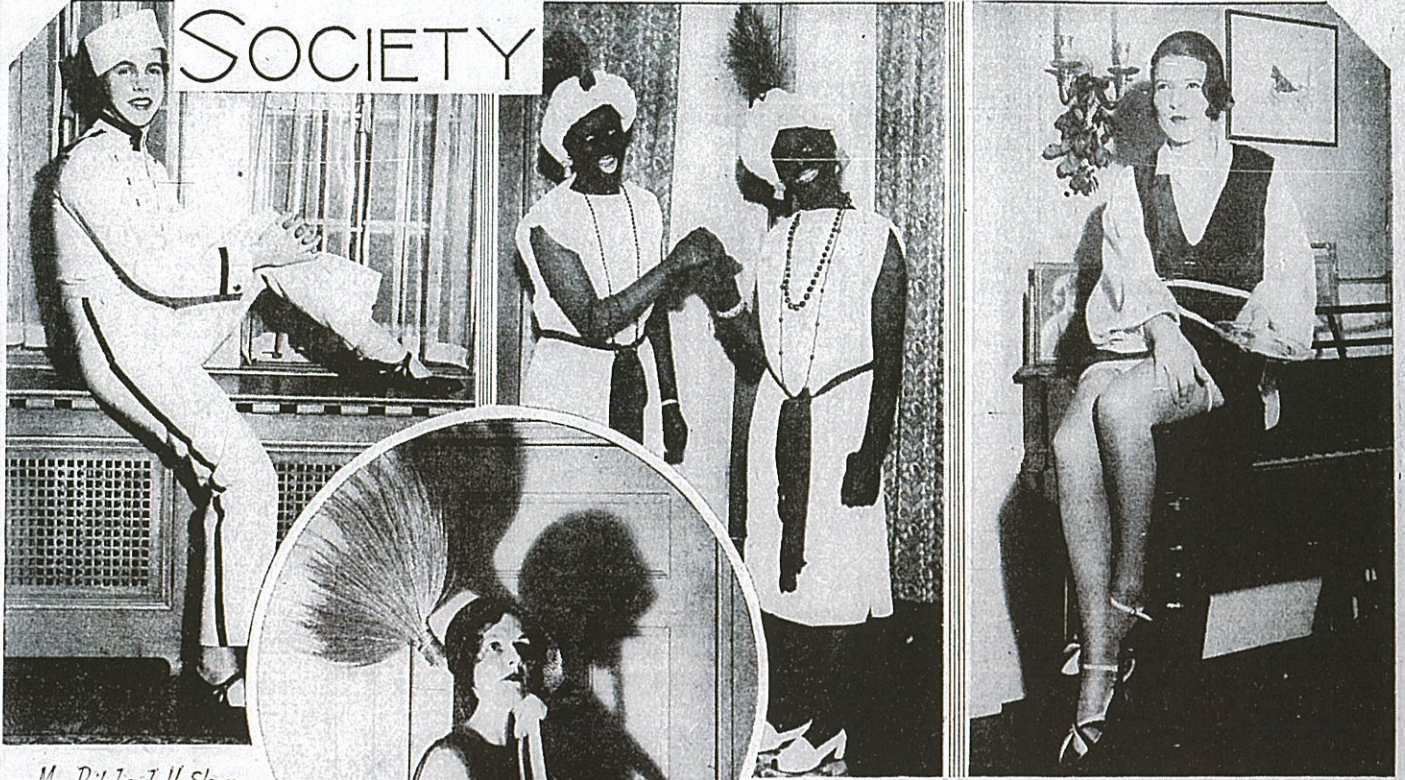

Christ and Guest Lose to Macfarlane, Cox; Sarazen, Farrell Win Close Match

Miami, Fla., March 9—(Special)—George Christ, professional from the Country Club of Rochester and his partner, Charley Guest, of Los Angeles, were eliminated in the second round of the Miami four-ball team tournament over the Miami Country Club course today. They succumbed to Willie Macfarlane of Tuckahoe, N. Y., former open champion, and "Whiffy" Cox, of Brooklyn, by 4 up and 2 to play over the 36-hole route.

Christ and Guest teamed well throughout, but could not cope with the magnificent putting displayed by Macfarlane and Cox, who sank long putts on the sixth, seventh, eighth and ninth holes of the afternoon round, for four birdies and a comfortable lead. This advantage proved sufficient to win.

Macfarlane Sinks 15-footer

Macfarlane and Cox were one up at the end of the morning round, which was hotly contested. Christ and Guest managed to gain halves on the first fourteen holes. The latter pair became one up by garnering the 15th, but the victorious combination squared the match on the next when Guest missed a short putt. The 17th was halved, and Macfarlane sank a 15-foot putt on the 18th to give his side a one up advantage going to lunch.

Johnny Farrell, of St. Augustine, and Gene Sarazen, of New York, both former American open champions, had a close call in their match against Jack Thompson, of Youngstown, Ohio and John Kinder, of Caldwell, N. J., finally disposing of the latter pair by one up. The victors gained their winning margin on the 17th hole of the afternoon round when Thompson missed an easy putt.

Hagen and Smith Cop

Farrell and Sarazen were two down at the conclusion of the first nine holes and they were behind by four holes going to lunch. The ex-champion duo still trailed at the 27th where they were one down. Sarazen, however, played brilliantly on the final nine holes to bring victory for his side.

While Gene and Johnny were advancing Denny Shute and Tony Manero teamed to upset Clarence Gamber and Cyril Walker, defending champions in a whipsaw battle, 2 and 1.

Walter Hagen and Horton Smith, another favored pair, turned back "Wild Bill" Mehlhorn and Frank Walsh in comparatively easy fashion, 3 and 2.

The semi-finals tomorrow will send Sarazen and Farrell against Shute and Manero in one bracket and Hagen and Smith against Macfarlane and Cox in the other.

Christ and Doser Participate in Pro-Amateur Golf Meet at Miami

Coral Gables, Fla., March 13—(Special)—George Christ and Clarence Doser, professionals at the Country Club of Rochester, participated in the pro-amateur competition today, which served as a prelude to the Coral Gables open over the Miami-Biltmore Country Club course. Christ was paired with Ken Berry of Miami and finished with a card of 39-37—76. Doser was partnered by Bert Lienhart, of Morristown, N. J., and posted 40-45—85.

The winners of the event were Clarence Hackeny, pro, and George P. Boyajian, amateur, both of Atlantic City, N. J., who led the select field with 35-38—73.

Behind the leaders came Jack Thompson, Youngstown, Ohio, pro

District Golf Body Tournament Sept. 2, 3 at Brook-Lea Club

The Rochester District Golf Association met yesterday morning and organized for the coming season, announcing its new slate of officers and the dates for its two tournaments. The group will hold its individual championship event Sept. 2 and 3 at the Brook-Lea Country Club and the team matches June 17 at the Locust Hill Country Club. In the title competition the players will be divided into classes A, B, and C. Class A will be composed of those playing with handicaps of scratch to and including 6; Class B of players with handicaps of 7 to 11, inclusive and Class C of those with handicaps from 12 to 15, inclusive.

There will be 28 prizes to be divided among various divisions. A committee to arrange for these prizes has been named as follows: Thomas E. Lunt, Monroe; Elmer Thaney, Brook-Lea and Ray C. Milo, Oak Hill.

Prizes Well Scattered

First there will be the championship trophy. Players in Class A will receive awards for second and third low gross and for first, second, third and fourth low net. In each there will be awards for first, second and third low gross and for first, second, third, fourth and fifth low net.

Another prize will be given to the player having the low single 18 hole gross score, and awards will be made also for the low net score for each individual 18 hole round.

As in past years, no one player will be allowed to win more than one prize, meaning that even with the probable large entry of 120 players or more there will be a prize for one out of every four in the field.

Attorney Makes Generous
Bequests to Relatives,
Friends, Institutions

TWO BIG TRUST FUNDS

Gives Law Business to His
Partner; Remembers All
Who Befriended Him

Charitable and educational institutions, hospitals and friends benefit under the will of John P. Bowman, which was filed for probate yesterday with Surrogate Joseph M. Feely. The will provides for specific bequests of \$350,000 and names the Central Trust Company and George S. Van Schaick as executors.

The total estate will approximate \$700,000, according to estimates made by the Central Trust Company.

Bequests to Institutions

Mechanics Institute, Rochester Dental Dispensary, and the Rochester Female Charities Society each receive \$10,000 under the will. The Rochester Orphan Asylum and the Infants' Summer Hospital each receive \$15,000.

Bequests of \$5,000 each are made to the Rochester School for the Deaf, Reynolds Library, Unitarian Church, People's Rescue Mission, Door of Hope, Highland Hospital, and the Rochester General Hospital.

The American Red Cross receives \$35,000, and two bequests of \$10,000 each are made to Hobart College, where Mr. Bowman attended. The Sigma Phi fraternity of Hobart College receives \$15,000.

Employees of the Country Club of Rochester, where Mr. Bowman made his home, receive \$2,500.

Two Trust Funds

Two Trust Funds

Two trust funds are set up under the will, the Central Trust Company being named trustee of each of them. The first trust fund is for \$100,000, and provides that the income shall be divided equally between Mrs. Ora Osgood Downs, 143 Barington Street, widow of the late James Downs, and her granddaughter, Jean Downs Hodges. The entire income shall go to the survivor of the two beneficiaries, and ultimately to the descendants of Jean Hodges. James Downs, husband of Mrs. Downs, was partner of Mrs. Alonza Whitcomb in conducting the Whitcomb House, now the Hayward Hotel. Mr. Bowman and his mother and father lived in the hotel for years, and a close friendship existed.

The second trust fund is for \$50,000, with Mrs. Theresa B. Malloy as beneficiary. Mrs. Malloy was connected with the hotel, and befriended Mr. Bowman and his parents. At her death, the \$50,000 will be distributed as follows: \$20,000 to Hobart College and \$15,000 each to the Highland and the Rochester General hospitals.

Many Others Remembered

John H. Gregory, president of the Central Trust Company, and a close friend and banking associate of Mr. Bowman, receives a \$1,000 bequest. Mount Hope Cemetery receives \$1,000, and provision is made for a monument at a cost of \$2,000. Clarkson Cemetery receives \$500, and each employee of Bowman & Van Schaick in service a year receives \$500. George S. Van Schaick receives the entire interest of Mr. Bowman in the law firm of Bowman & Van Schaick, and his library.

Josephine H. Downs and Evelyn S. Field of Rochester and Anna M. Bedell of New York each receive \$10,000, and \$5,000 bequests are made to Elizabeth S. Field and Barbara Field of Rochester and Robert Hodges of Brighton.

Bequests of \$2,500 are made to Henry A. Pince of New York, Adelaide Bedell Hodgman of New York, and Julia E. Rose of Rochester. Bequests of \$1,000 each are made to Victoria P. Powers, Allen P. Curtice, and Helen Curtice Gorman, all of Rochester, and to Charles M. Ranson of Buffalo.

The residuary estate, which approximates the amount of the specific bequests, is left to relatives. Mr. Bowman was a director and attorney for the Central Trust Company. Mr. Van Schaick, state superintendent of insurance, was his law partner.

Thirty-One Exempt

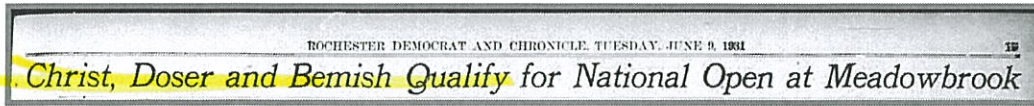

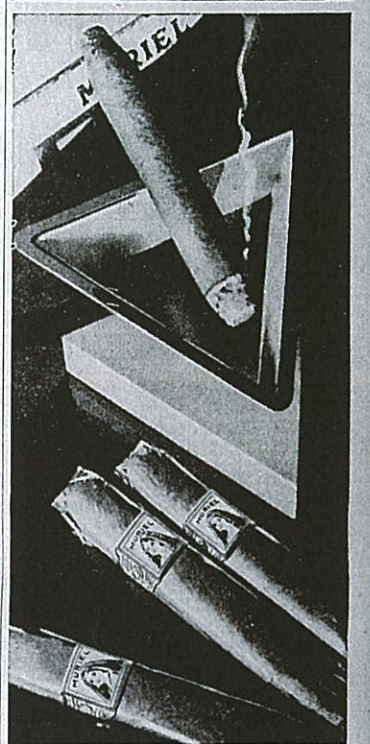

Art Yates Wins Medal in Country Club Invitation with Card of 73

ROCHESTER PLACES 9 IN 1ST FLIGHT

Seven Players Tie, Three
Strokes Back of Yates;
Playoff Necessary

Arthur (Ducky) Yates, Oak Hill's heavyweight links star, got away to a flying start in his quest for a third Country Club of Rochester invitation tourney championship, by winning the medal in the 18-hole qualifying round played over the East Avenue course yesterday with a card of 73. Playing consistent golf despite a wind that proved troublesome at times, Yates went out in 37 and came back in one less poke to finish two strokes over par.

Although he has twice won the championship—and enters the first round of match play this morning against Bob Adler, of Irondequoit, a favorite to become a three-time crown-wearer and retain the title he won last year, yesterday was the first time in the history of the nine-year old event that the bronzed Yates had won the medal. He had a three-stroke margin over his nearest rivals yesterday, seven of whom were bunched at 76.

The championship flight includes the names of nine Rochester golfers. In addition to Yates, George Carhart, Monroe, 76, F. K. Johnson, 76, Country Club of Rochester; E. P. Curtis, 76, Country Club of Rochester; Robert Adler, Henriquet, 77; Jack Tucker Hickmott, 77; Henry Steinkamp Geneva, 77; Dublin Richardson, Oak Hill, 78, and Ben Houghes, Oak Hill, 79, qualified for the first sixteen.

Eight players, all with scores of 79, were forced to play off for three places in the championship flight with Ben Houghes, Oak Hill, George Boserich, York Downs, and S. P. Emerick, Oswego, the survivors. R. L. Casper, H. M. Gardiner and Johnny Downs dropped out on the first hole. Boserich was first to qualify when he sunk a 35-foot putt for a birdie three on No. 3.

Houghes made the grade at No. 3 when playing with a borrowed set of clubs and shoes. He smacked a brassie shot in within eight feet of the cup after missing his second effort. He holed out for a birdie four. Emerick won from R. D. Price on the fifth to edge his way into the title flight.

The new balloon ball, which has created quite a furore among the amateurs, evidently is no handicap to Yates. Drives of 360 and 370 yards were quite common with "Ducky" yesterday when he was not backing the wind. His short game too was deadly and he chipped dead to the pin time and time again from off the green. Art, playing his characteristic game, did some remarkable rescuing from the rough and saved traps to save strokes.

He started by holing a good-sized putt on the first green for a birdie three. He hit the ball at 27, two over par but holed a stiffly down hill putt of 23 feet on No. 10 to become one down. He got a par five at No. 11 after driving a ball out of bounds but slipped one over at No. 16, making him even par five times for the first time.

Leonard Martin of Apawamis and Pennington Miller Jones of Lakeville, two of the metropolitan district's brightest stars, were unable to make the trip here. Martin was exhausted from the strenuous grind of winning the metropolitan amateur title last week and that much as he was scheduled to match here with Jones the latter also found himself unable to make the trip.

Bob Craver Beats Tucker, 1 up, to Win Country Club Invitation Crown

Canandaigua Golfer Puts Yates Out of Running in Morning to Enter Finals

**Reels off Last Five Holes in Four Under Par
to Upset Defending Champ; Victory at
16th Clinches Match Over Tucker**

In as dramatic a finish as the 9-year-old classic ever has witnessed, Robert Craver, the golfing journalist of Canandaigua, conquered two of Rochester's leading exponents of amateur golf to win the annual Country Club of Rochester Invitation tournament yesterday. Craver, gangling, long-striding blond and a rank outsider entering the first round of match play Tuesday, came with a cyclonic rush yesterday, climaxing his spectacular drive in the morning with a dazzling 1-up triumph over the defending champion and medalist, Arthur (Ducky) Yates of Oak Hill.

Almost Holes Tee Shot

But Craver, the hot-headed, was not beaten yet. It's too bad Bob wasn't born a ring gladiator instead of a golfer. With his grit and fighting spirit alone he could hold his own in the present crop of heavyweights.

Yates found trouble reaching the green at 14 and when Craver dropped a No. 2 iron on the carpet to get his birdie four and win the hole "Ducky" didn't seem in any great danger. A pair of threes left Yates still in command at 15 but the big thrill of the tournament was just around the corner. Incidentally the next shot that Craver was to play was the beginning of the end for the ponderous "Ducky" for it instilled even more confidence in Bob and left Yates in a somewhat bewildered state.

Craver had the honors at No. 16, a par four 225 yard affair with a fairway that resembles a bowling alley affair. It's not long but there's trouble faking on the right and left for the one who isn't straight. The green is hidden by a sloping hill and the ideal shot is to the right.

And that's just where Craver sent a spoon shot screaming down the fairway; the pellet lighting on the edge of the green and bounding straight toward the pin. It took two hard hops and on the third headed for the bottom of the cup. The gallery that had assembled around the green held its breath momentarily as the ball disappeared from sight for the fraction of a moment, much like a cork darting under the water when a fish strikes the bait, but popped out again as it came in contact with the pin and cup. It bounced six inches from the rim for an easy eagle two and left Craver one down.

Four under Par in Spurt

Craver played another remarkable golf shot at 17 to square the match. After both had gotten on in two, Yates laid his opponent a half stroke. There was just room enough for a ball to get by and Craver, 15 feet away, tapped his ball on a straight line past Yates' ball and into the cup for a three.

Both got on the home green in two wallops and Yates, with a difficult 25-foot effort, putted first.

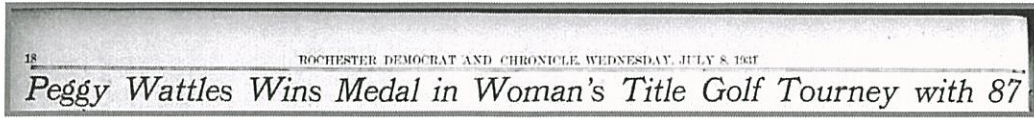

Miss Peggy Waffles, pride of Wanakah Country Club at Buffalo, will make a bid for her fifth championship of the Women's Golf Association of Western New York when she clashes with Miss Honor Bright of Niagara Falls Country Club in the 36-hole finals of the annual classic over the links of the Country Club of Rochester today.

Playing through a drenching rain, that began pelting in the faces of the players before they reached the third tee, Miss Waffles yesterday eliminated her clubmate, Miss Marion Morgan, 4 and 3 to enter the finals of the tournament she has long dominated. Miss Bright removed the last obstacle from her path to the finals by conquering Miss Jennett Michael, another Wanakah standard bearer, by identically the same margin, 4 and 3, both matches ending on the 16th green.

Miss Waffles enters today's finals a favorite to have her name inscribed on the Franklin Sidway trophy for the fifth time. The steady striking Wanakah miss winner of the championship trophy in 1926, '27, '28 and '29, had her string broken last year when she did not return from a trip abroad in time to defend her crown.

Third Chance for Miss Bright

The present champion, Mrs. Arthur Harrison of Lockport, had to be content with watching the semi-finalist fight it out from under the shelter of an umbrella yesterday as she was prevented from attending the match this year because of doctor's orders.

For Miss Bright it will be her second meeting with Miss Wattlee in the finals and her third attempt to annex the coveted trophy. The budding Niagara Falls girl succeeded to Peggy in the finals at Forest Valley in 1929 and last year she was beaten by Mrs. Harrison over her home course.

Although they are clubmates there is always keen rivalry when Miss Wattlee and Miss Morgan get together and yesterday's match was no exception. It was undoubtedly a match going to the 18th tee but here Miss Morgan's game steadily went to pieces and she dropped three holes in succession by gaining a halve at the par tree 15th after giving her drive into the rough. Miss Wattlee brought the match to a close.

Peggy Takes Early Lead

Miss Wattlee took a one-stroke penalty at the first hole by gaining a par four to Morgan's five and increased it to two up when Miss Morgan got in trouble and picked up on the 350 yard par five third hole. By getting a par three while Peggy was taking a four at the 225 and fourth hole the shot faced Miss Morgan shaved Peggy's margin down to a stroke. Miss Wattlee went two up at No. 8 with a par four but Miss Morgan kept hitting and got a hole back at the 10th hole.

She came up the 12th tee with Miss Wattlee still a hole in front but Miss Morgan's drive caught in a trap on the right and after failing to get out in three strokes she looked up. With the rain pouring down so fast that it was almost impossible for either player to keep a firm grip on their clubs Miss Morgan seemed to be bothered more by the elements than her opponent and at No. 13 she hooked her ball into the rough and required two strokes to get out.

This gave Miss Wattlee a three-stroke lead going to the 14th and she ran her margin to four up at six green with a par five to Morgan's six.

Match's end.

Miss Morgan now needed to win the last four holes to even the match and she appeared to have a faint chance when Peggy put her drive in the rough at the short 11th. A beautiful cut however carried Miss Wattle's to within 10 feet of the cup on her second shot. Miss Morgan was 30 feet off the green with her drive and her approach was to the right of the pin. Both took two putts to halve the hole in four.

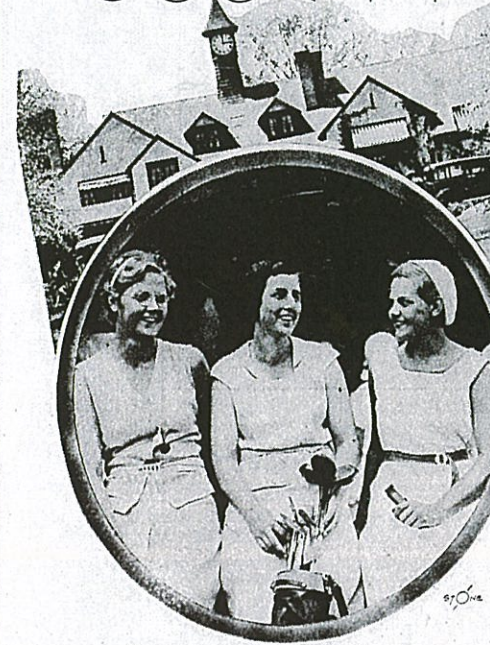

PICK HAGEN TO TRIUMPH IN PLAYOFF

Walter Slight Favorite to Beat Alliss for Open Crown Tomorrow

Missasauga Country Club, Toronto, Ont., July 12.—(AP)—Percy Alliss yet may break the 12-year monopoly the United States has held on the Canadian open golf championship.

The 32-year-old British pro at the Wannsee Club in Berlin fought his way through a driving rain in the fourth round of the open yesterday to tie Walter Hagen, Detroit veteran, for the title at 282. They will play off the tie at 36 holes on Tuesday.

Hagen, always known as a "money player," rules a slight favorite over Alliss but few experts will forget the Briton's courageous stand on the last nine holes when he overcame a six-stroke lead to deadlock Hagen for the crown. Alliss toured the last nine holes in 32 strokes, four under par for a 71, and holed an 15-foot putt on the home green for the birdie three that meant a tie.

Johnny Farrell, of Mamaroneck, N. Y., always a dangerous contender, rimmed the cup at the home hole with a long putt that would have made it a triple tie had it gone down. As it was Johnny had to be content with third place with 283.

Both Hagen and Alliss are to play in an exhibition match at the Country Club of Rochester Wednesday afternoon. Alliss will be paired with Henry Cotton, young British star, while Hagen will team up with George Christ of the Country Club of Rochester.

Hagen in Gallant Uphill Fight Beats Alliss for Canadian Open Title

SHOWS CLASS IN TRIUMPH OVER BRITON

Has One-stroke Margin in Playoff; Wins Crown for First Time

Mississauga Country Club, Toronto, Ont., July 14 (AP)—The old showman, Walter Hagen, fought an uphill battle to conquer Percy Alliss, British pro, at the Wannsee Club in Berlin, by a single stroke in their 36-hole playoff for the Canadian open golf championship today.

The Haig, after trailing Alliss by one stroke in the morning round with a 73 to the Briton's 72, shot a brilliant 68, four under par, in the afternoon to win the title with a 36-hole total of 141. Alliss followed his par-equalling morning round with a fine 70 in the afternoon only to see Hagen slip into the championship with a magnificent display on the last nine holes.

In the final analysis, the battle was decided on the 35th hole. Alliss had squared the match at the 31th by sinking a 35-foot putt for a birdie three. On the next hole, however, Hagen's second just failed to go down and he sunk a short putt for a birdie three, without difficulty. Alliss' second had rolled to within a yard of the cup but in this crisis, the Briton's putting touch frayed and the ball rolled to one side of the cup, giving Hagen the one stroke lead he needed so badly.

Alliss in Great Bid

As it was, Alliss came within an ace of squaring the match at the home green, a long putt for a birdie three missing by inches. Hagen, with the championship in his grasp, played safely, carefully rolling up his approach putt and sinking the short one he had left to halve the final hole in fours and thus win the one big championship he never previously had captured.

It was a heart breaking defeat for Alliss for he had held the lead most of the day and then had rallied gamely to deadlock the match after being two strokes to the bad as late as the 31st. He cut "Sir Walter's" lead to one stroke at the 33d when Hagen three-putted and then deadlocked the match again with his long putt at the 35th.

All told the match was all square no fewer than six times.

Hagen, in winning the championship, shot three rounds of 68. He led the field with 68-68 at the half-way mark, added 72 on his third round and 74 on his fourth to permit Alliss to tie him with 67-71-73-71 at 282. Hagen's third 68 came in today's playoff.

Last year Tommy Armour won the title in a playoff with Leo Diegel.

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COMEBACK BY HAGEN EXPECTED

Walter Justifies Hopes of
Friends by Triumph
Over British Pro

At the ripe old athletic age of 29 Walter Hagen yesterday won his 12th major golf championship. Annually, for the past five years they have prepared to tell "ten" over the bearded brow of "The Haig" and each time the great man has smashed through to accomplish some of golf's greatest feats. Seventeen years have passed since Hagen, the unknown, left the pro shop at the Country Club of Rochester to win the greatest of all golf prizes—the National Open championship at the Audubon Club in Chicago.

A Foremost Figure

This morning, after an unsuccess-ful year of tournament campaigning, he stands out again as the game's foremost figure—bar-ling only that young man from the South—"The Emperor Jones." In winning the Canadian Open for the first time yesterday Hagen beat a truly great field and con-vinced his many friends and ad-mirers in Rochester that the old Hagen spirit is still there by put-ting on one of his characteristic finishes that have long made him the most feared of all links giants.

Hagen, up until yesterday had won the National Open cham-pionship twice, the British Open four times, and the National Profes-sional Golfers' Association cham-pionship five times. His triumph over Alister at Toronto gives him his 12th major crown—leaving him second only to Jones.

Although Hagen has now won as many major titles as Jones, his record is considered by many to be more impressive. The P. G. A. has often been termed as the hard-est championship to win in golf and Walter won it five years in succession.



Hagen Here Today to Team with Christ in Exhibition Against Alliss and Cotton

Less than 24 hours after the finish of their titanic struggle for the Canadian Open championship in Toronto, Walter Hagen and Percy Alliss, British professional, meet in another links contest over the course where the "Great Walter" learned to play the shots that have made him one of the most outstanding golfers in the world.

Hagen, who yesterday nosed out Alliss by a single stroke for the Canadian championship, will team up with George Christ, local professional star, in a best ball exhibition match against Alliss and Henry Cotton, dapper and colorful British pro. The 18-hole match, scheduled for the Country Club of Rochester links, will get under way at 3 o'clock.

Both Hagen and Alliss were due to leave Toronto last night and arrive here this morning for the match. Inasmuch as Walter will be playing over the course from which he left to go out and win fame in 1922, it is expected that a bumper gallery will be on hand to welcome back the new Canadian Open Champion and incidentally followed what should develop into one of the best exhibitions ever played in Rochester.

It will be Hagen's second appearance here this year, he having appeared in an Exhibition at Ridgemoor last month. It will, however, mark the first showing of Cotton and Alliss, regarded as two of Europe's foremost shot makers.

The Country Club course record of 65 is held by Hagen and there is a possibility that it may be shattered today as both Walter and Alliss are playing superb golf at present.

The best way to reach the course is through Monroe Avenue to Elmwood Avenue, left turn on Elmwood to course. East Avenue is under construction from Chover Road to the course.

Hagen and Alliss Shoot Subpar Golf to Defeat Christ and McKenna

STARS TAKE EXHIBITION BY 5 AND 4

Walter's 69 and Percy's 70
Bring Out Stellar Golf;
Christ Cards 71

With another major golf crown adorning his bronzed head Walter Hagen came back yesterday to exhibit over the course where he learned to play the game as a boy. Paired with Percy Allis, the man who only 24 hours before he had beaten in a bitter 25-hole play-off struggle to become Canadian Open Champion, Hagen shot a sub-par round of 69 to help lower the colors of the local team of George Christ and Carley McKenna, 5 and 4, in an 18-hole best ball match at the Country Club of Rochester.

Hagen, still the same old master showman, returned the lowest score of the day but he was forced to share the spotlight with the thick-set Briton, professional at the exclusive Wannox Club in Herlin, Allis after going out in 35, two over par, fairly burned up the last nine with a spectacular 33, three strokes under par figure. Beginning at the 874-yard 12th hole the soft-spoken Englishman reeled off four birdies to finish with a 70, a stroke under par and the second lowest score of the day.

Homesteaders Never Lead

Hagen and Allis in registering their decisive triumph waged a pretty duel for the biggest number of birdies with the chunky, dark-skinned Briton having the edge with an even half dozen. These were snared at the third and ninth holes on the outgoing nine and 12th, 14th, 16th and 17th holes of the inward trek. Hagen sent his team off in the lead with a "birdie" at the first hole and picked up his others at the ninth, 11th, 16th and 17th holes.

Christ, the home club professional and McKenna, of Oak Hill, were never in the lead and managed to square the match but once, and that at the second hole when they both obtained par 4's to 5's for Hagen and Allis. McKenna, fitted in at the last minute for Henry Colton, youthful English pro, who was unable to appear here yesterday because of sickness. It was announced before the match that Colton was confined to his sick bed in Toronto with a high temperature.

"Birdies" on Eight Holes

Christ played the golf finishing with a 71, even par 54 out and 53 back. But George's excellent play was not enough to match the steady stroking of Hagen and Allis. For if Hagen wasn't getting a birdie then Allis was and between the two of them eight birdies fell on different holes as compared to three for the home town boys.

Charley McKenna, just couldn't keep out of the rough yesterday and his only birdie of the entire round came at the 16th hole. A long hitter off the tee McKenna didn't get his usual distance because he was pushing his ball to the right. He made many brilliant recoveries from the rough and traps and this alone enabled him to finish with a 75. Charley never stopped trying, however, and he came back nicely in 25, one stroke under par, after taking 34 strokes on the outward journey.

Allis Shows Shots

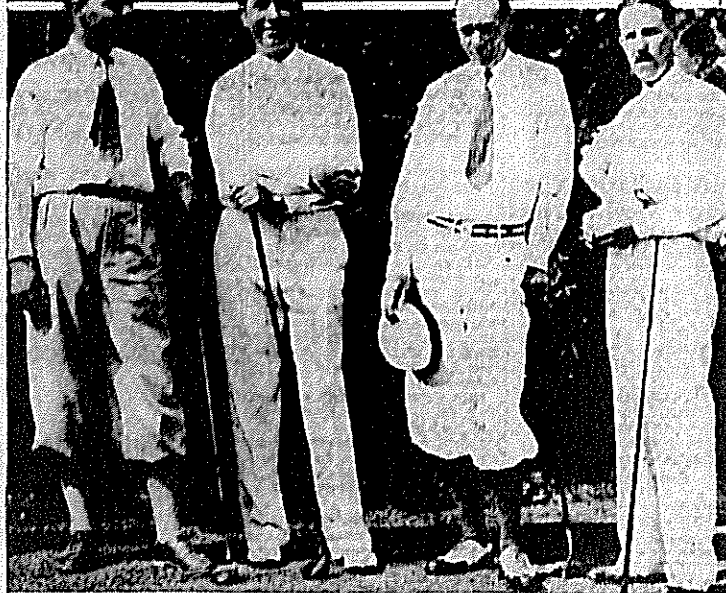
Hagen was in fewer traps and less rough yesterday than in past matches played here, another indication that he is straighter from the tee to the greens than at any time in his brilliant career. Never to disappoint "Big Walter" furnished his usual quota of thrills for the gallery remaining down long puts for birdies on the first, sixth and seventh greens. His longest putt of the round came at the seventh green, where he sent the pellet whizzing 20 feet over the shaven turf and into the tin for a birdie three.

Allis not to be outdone by the man who beat him by the margin of a single stroke in the Canadian Open, supplied the gallery with a bundle of eye-opening shots. At the third hole he played a masterly nibble out of the rough to within ten feet of the pin and then holed out for a birdie four. At the 25-yard 11th he rained two prodigious wood shots down the fairway, dropped his third on the green and then proceeded to stroke a 15-footer into the cup for a birdie four.

Those that have found it tough to get distance with the new ball-iron ball got an eyeful at the 11th hole, a 218-yard par affair, where Allis split the middle of the fairway with a searing drive that landed 25 yards short of the green. It was just a few yards short of a 200-yard blow. He dropped his approach on and holed out for a three.

Christ and McKenna held the touring pros to a one-hole lead for six holes, but then fell a victim to some brilliant stroking on the part of the invaders who went 2 up at No. 7 and increased it to 3 up at No. 8. Hagen's long putt for a "bird" at No. 11 ran his team's margin to 4 up and when Allis crashed through with a "bird" at the long 16th the invaders held a 5 up advantage. They halved the 17th hole with four 3s and the match ended at the 18th when Allis and Christ got 4 to halve this hole.

With the bunkered brigade—160 strong—encamped on the scattered battleground, the ninth annual golf championship of the state of New York opens this morning over the trying west course at Oak Hill Country Club. The late arrival of T. Philip Perkins, former British amateur champion at the club last night and definite announcement that Jesse W. Sweetser, former British and American titleholder would be in Rochester this morning, assured those in charge of one of the largest and most brilliant fields in the history of the event.

Up until early last night no definite word had been received from Perkins but it was learned that pressure of business forced both Perkins and Sweetser to remain at home until the last minute. There is also a possibility that George Voigt, another of the country's foremost amateurs, will arrive this morning in time to practice in the qualifying round.

Perkins and Sweetser are scheduled to leave the starting tee together at 10 o'clock. They will be followed at 10:30 o'clock by Arthur (Ducky) Yates of Oak Hill, 1927 champion, and Jackie Mackie Jr., of Inwood, the defending champion.

Yates, Mackie Playing Well

With the late entries of Perkins and Sweetser, considerable interest was added to the tournament which now promises to be one of the most colorful in history. Put in addition to these two luminaries, Yates and Mackie, the field is studded with the names of other notables such as Fairfax H. Gouverneur of the Country Club of Rochester, J. B. Peterson of Okego, Jack Abeln and Albert Hayes of Wabash Country Club, Buffalo; Jack Tucker of Bridgeman; Al Broadbeck of Scowaney, state champion in 1926, and Bill Chapin of Oak Hill.

Perkins and Sweetser will enter the qualifying test without having had the benefit of playing a practice round, but both will be favored along with Yates, Mackie, Gouverneur, Broadbeck and Abeln to win the medal today.

Art Yates, the upstart's biggest hope, halted out a 72 in his first practice round yesterday and opined that he thought that score would be good enough to win the medal.

"At least I'll be satisfied to take a 72 and sit right here in the post house," said "Ducky" after the completion of his round.

Mackie, who has his heart set on retaining his crown, was hitting the ball well yesterday and burned up the last nine finishing in 35. He is decidedly on his game as is Yates and both are going to be hard to beat.

Course in Superb Condition

Sweetser is one of the game's great golfers. Jess was taken ill after winning the British amateur crown a number of years ago but has regained his health again and is playing stellar golf. Perkins' play this summer has been of the highest standard, his feat of capturing the amateur in the open being evidence of this.

Elaborate preparations have been made for the tournament and Perry H. McLean, of Oak Hill, secretary of the State Association has left no stone unturned in an effort to have everything running as smoothly as possible. Newspaper correspondents from New York will be on hand to cover the tournament and workmen were busy all day yesterday installing telegraph wires to flash the results around the state.

The rolling course is in superb condition after the rains of Monday and Tuesday. The greens are as smooth as ice and the golfer who misses his putts will have only himself to blame.

Sandy Somerville, London Hunt Club, Will Defend Honors Against Large Field of Prominent Stars. Francis Ouimet, Former U.S. Open and Amateur Champion, Leads Americans. Ottawans Entered.

MONTREAL, Aug. 6.—A field of 120 amateurs, including some of the most prominent golfers on the continent will tee off on Monday morning for the 36-hole qualifying round of the Canadian amateur golf championships over the south course of the Royal Montreal Golf Club at Dixie, Que., near Montreal. The pairing and starting times issued tonight, reveals that one of the strongest teams ever to compete in the event since its inception in 1895 will seek the honors won last year by C. R. (Sandy) Somerville on his home course, the London, Ont., Hunt Club.

Seven of the nine Canadian provinces are represented in the entry and the United States has 28 representatives, including a former open and two former amateur champions of their country. The draw shows 31 entries from below the border, but three of these are Montreal players entering from clubs in the United States.

Several Outstanding Stars.

Leading the Canadian forces is Sandy Somerville, the defending champion, and considered the outstanding Canadian amateur. He has Dominion rivals from Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Ontario, Manitoba, Alberta and British Columbia. The United States representation is headed by Francis Oulmet, former open and amateur champion of that country. Oulmet has been playing consistently brilliant golf of late and the veteran is favored in many quarters to capture the Canadian title. Jesse Guilford, also of Boston, and United States amateur champion in 1921, is also one of the favorites, while Eddie Held, New York, the 1929 Canadian champion, is also considered a strong threat for the title.

Doser Leads Field in Western New York P. G. A. at Half-way Mark

POSTS 73, 74 TO LEAD BY ONE STROKE

Rowley Close on Heels of Durand Pro—Heaney in Tie for Third

Buffalo, Sept. 28 (Special)—Clarence Doser, youthful professional from the Durand-Eastman Park course, Rochester, today stroked his way into the lead at the half-way mark in the annual championship tournament of the Western New York Professional Golfers Association over the Orchard Park course.

Doser carded rounds of 73 and 74 to finish with a 147 total, one stroke ahead of Earl Rowley, of Grove Cleveland, Buffalo. Rowley had two rounds of 74, to finish with 148.

Three strokes back came Ray McAuliffe of Erie Downs, Jack Gordon of the Park Club and Jim Heaney of Brook-lee, locked in a three-way tie at 151 each.

Doser and Rowley both shot steady golf, the Flower City youngster carding a 73 in the morning and a 74 in the afternoon, while Pete put together a consistent pair of 74's. Throughout the day Doser's approaches were falling dead to the pin, leaving him rather easy putts for his par or birdies.

Short Game Deadly

After driving out of bounds on the second hole in the morning, a short 175-yard affair, Clarence chipped his third in from just off the edge of the carpet for his par. Again on the fourth his deadly approach left him but a six-foot putt for a birdie, while he needed but one putt, a five footer, for his birdie on the sixth.

Coming home he bagged another birdie on the 13th, again chipping dead to the pin, and he played the remaining five holes in perfect figures.

Doser got away to a rather bad start in the afternoon, being three over par on the first two holes. He failed to get home with his drive and brassie on the first, to go one over and then hit a tree with his tee shot on the short second; overplayed his second and finished up with a five. From that stage on, however, the Flower City pro stroked around in one under par. He ran down a 20-footer for his birdie on the third and reached the turn in 39.

Bemish Blows Up

Coming home Dosser played every hole in regulation figures except the 13th where he duplicated his morning birdie by again chipping dead to the pin. Clarence had an excellent opportunity to post another 73 for the afternoon round when his 15-foot putt for a birdie on the home hole stopped on the very lip of the cup.
