

Back of these two leaders trailed Percy Allis of Germany, whose 67 in the Bret round had given him the lead on the field. Allis slipped to a 71 today for a total of 138, two strokes ahead of the defending champion, Tommy Armour, who put together rounds of 68 and 72 for 140.


The field was cut for the final 36 holes of the championship tomorrow by the elimination of all these more than 30 strokes behind the leader. All of the outstanding United States, British and Canadian contenders were within that limit, the survivors including 35 from the United States, 32 from Canada, 16 from Great British, one Frenchman, Auguste Boyer, and the British-born Alliss from Berlin.
