**Starts with Birdie**  
The pro-amateur event was a best ball affair, but Christ needed no aid from his partner, Cooney. Christ's clubs were clicking off a merry tune in the afternoon, and he reached the turn in 24, two under par. He started with a birdie four on the first hole, lost a stroke to par on the third and shot the remaining holes in perfect figures, except the fifth and sixth where he bagged birdies.

George shot the incoming nine in par, straying one stroke over on the 12th and regaining it with a birdie four on the 15th, where he slammed his second shot to within ten feet of the pin and holed out.

## *League of Iroquois Tourney May Not Be Played This Year*

Unless Yahnundasis Country Club of Utica can muster together a 12-man team within the next week which it thinks capable of carrying its colors into links warfare there is a strong possibility that the League of Iroquois golf tournament, which has grown strong to be an upstate classic, will not be played this year.

The annual pow-wow, which is scheduled to be played at Wanakah Country Club, Buffalo, the last Friday and Saturday of next month, has been rumored to have been postponed for several weeks. No official work as to the calling off of the tournament for 1932 has been forthcoming from heads of the association, but with the tourney only a little more than a month away no plans have been made for staging it.

Yahnundasis, which has been hard hit by the loss of members, has let it be known that it does not think it capable of banding together a team strong enough to compete with the other three members of the league, Oak Hill of Rochester, Bellevue of Syracuse and Wanakah.

**Oak Hill Champion**

Yannunhasis suffered its biggest blow when Hiles Hutchinson, captain of last year's team, left the club during the winter months. Hutchinson was one of the club's outstanding players and his loss along with others has left the Utica club without many of its star golfers.

Oak Hill is the present champion having retained its laurels by non-

ing out Wanakah in spirited competition at Oak Hill last Summer.

If enough Oak Hill members vote favorably on the project and the golf committee puts its stamp of approval on it and invitation tournament may be held at the east side layout this Summer. A petition has been posted in the locker room and those in favor of staging such an event have been asked to sign on the dotted line. There is nothing definite on the event but if it is approved and passed it will probably be staged sometime in July.

Persistent rumors to the effect that the Country Club of Rochester would not stage its annual invitation tournament this year is believed to have led Oak Hill to take such a step. The Country Club layout has been undergoing many changes and if the tournament is held at all it will probably not take place before September.

Oak Hill's east course will be opened for the first time this season Saturday. All of the greens, with the exception of two, were dug up last fall and have been slow rounding into playing condition.

I., June 23 to 25. Pairings for the 36-hole qualifying round, scheduled for Wanakah Country Club, include the names of seven of the city's outstanding club swingers.

Those entered from this city among the field of 22 are George Christ, Country Club of Rochester; Clarence Doser, Lake Shore Country Club; Charley McKenna, Oak Hill Country Club; Jim Heaney, Brook-Lea Country Club; Ray Feller, Ridgmont Golf Club; Ned McKenna and Johnny McGrath, both unattached.

Last year two Rochester pros, George Christ and Clarence Doser qualified with the other place going to a Rochester boy, Walter Bemish playing under the colors of Genesee Country Club. Rochester swept the boards in 1931 when Christ, Doser and Ray Feller made the grade.

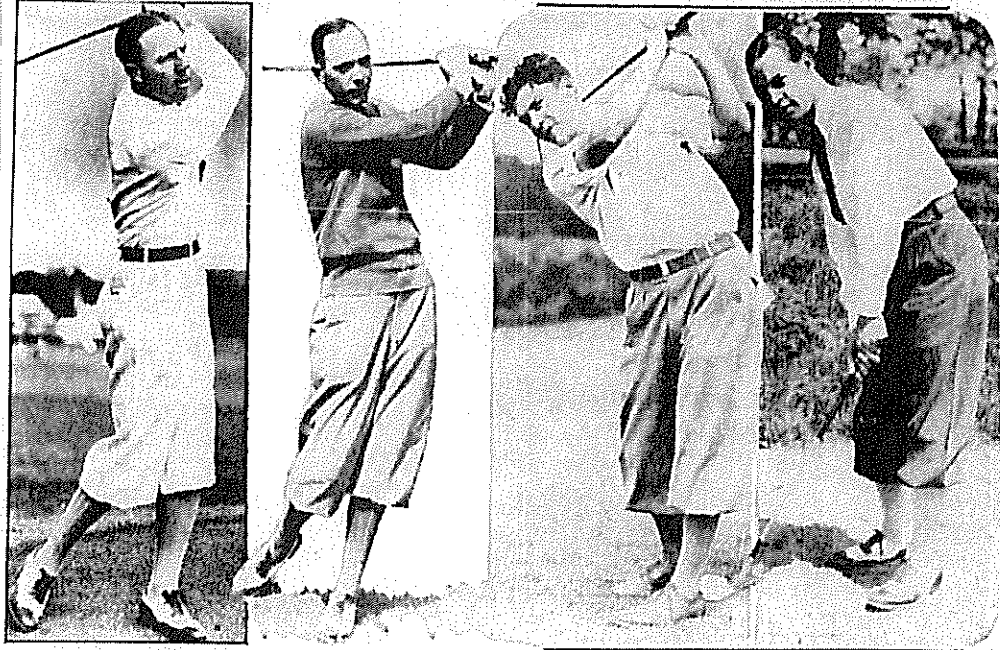

## Oak Hill Shot Maker Low in Assistant Pro Play

Louis Fitzgerald, dapper little shot maker from Oak Hill Country Club, yesterday won the inaugural tournament of the Rochester Assistant Golf Pros Association by clubbing out a 36-hole total of 158 at Midvale Golf and Country Club. Fitzgerald finished with a three-stroke margin over Russ Farnen, George Christ's first lieutenant at the Country Club of Rochester.

Despite a stiff wind Fitzgerald carded a fine 75 in the morning round to assume a commanding lead. In the afternoon however, he found the going much tougher and slipped up to an 83. His cards:

*District Golf Body Makes Tourney Changes and Names Dates for Events*

# INDIVIDUAL TITLE PLAY JULY 21 TO 23

Changed to Match Play  
This Year—Shift in  
Team Event

## *Dates, Courses for District Golf Play*

Dates and courses for the Rochester District Golf Association's tournaments for 1932 follow:

June 19—Team matches at Oak Hill Country Club. Two winners to meet in finals for district team championship sometime during July or August.

July 21, 22 and 23—Individual championship at Locust Hill Country Club. Qualifying round July 21, match play following two days.

August 31—Junior championship at Ridgmont Golf Club. Thirty-six holes medal play.

Making changes in both the individual and team championship tournaments the Rochester District Golf Association yesterday completed its calendar of events for 1932. Dates and courses for the three tourneys to be conducted by the organization were formally sanctioned.

The most radical shift was made in the individual championship, which each year features the program of events. This year the championship will be a three-day match play tournament instead of the customary two-day 72-hole medal play event which has been held annually since the association was first formed.

The individual championship was awarded to Locust Hill Country Club and the dates set for July 21, 22 and 23. The first day will be given over to the 18-hole qualifying round with match play, morning and afternoon to follow the next two days.

**Play at Oak Hill June 19**

The change is expected to provide a more popular tournament than the former long medal play grind. There will be some five or six sixteens and the customary beaten eights.

Jack Tucker, playing under the colors of Ridgemont Golf Club, won the championship last year. Tucker is now a member at Oak Hill. Oak Hill holds the team title.

The usual one-day team championship tournament has also been abolished and replaced by a new event. On Sunday, June 19, the eleven clubs which now comprise the District Association, will compete in a team match at Oak Hill. They will be divided into groups, A. and B., one composed of five teams, the other six, with the winner in each section to clash at Monroe Golf Club sometime during July or August for the team crown.

Each team will be comprised of eight men and they will play in four-ball best ball matches. Each team will be limited to two junior members and each player will use three-eighths of his handicap.



### Junior Tourney to Ridgemont

The eleven clubs which now comprise the organization and which will compete at Oak Hill June 19 are: Oak Hill Country Club, Country Club of Rochester, Locust Hill Country Club, Monroe Golf Club, Brook-Lea Country Club, Ridgemont Golf Club, Irondequoit Country Club, Genesee Golf Club, Lake Shore Country Club, Canandaigua Country Club and Westridge Golf Club.

Team champions were crowned on a total low gross and low net scores in past years. If the team four-ball best ball matches are a success this year it is planned to hold them every few weeks next season.

The annual junior tournament will be a 36-hole medal affair at Ridgemont Golf Club Aug. 31. The low 36 scores in the morning will qualify for the championship play, also 18 holes in the afternoon.

To begin with there were three holes in one made, something that seldom happens in one day, while the Country Club of Rochester was the scene of one of the lowest net scores ever recorded in sweepstakes play when William B. Morse, a 17 handicap man, shot a 73 for a net score of 56.

T. F. Teazer had the honor of scoring the first hole-in-one ever made at Lake Shore when he turned the trick at the 155-yard eighth hole. He was playing with "Buteh" Johnson and Mr. White and used a masher.

Joe Lusardy, well known local bowler, scored the third "ace" at Durand-Eastman. His No. 5 shot was just right and carried the ball into the cup. He was playing with B. Brisson and C. Brisson.

The above feats did not steal the show entirely as there were two other performances worthy of the headlines. Jack Tucker, not content to win low gross at Oak Hill with a 75 played a round out to Brook-Lee yesterday afternoon and turned in a 73, the lowest card any amateur has recorded at the west side course in many a moon.

Had Tucker's putter been clicking on the first nine the course record would have been in danger of being shattered. Jack three-putted the fourth, fifth, sixth and eighth greens to finish with a 46 on the outward jaunt. He came back home in 33 getting a birdie at the 16th hole, one of the toughest on the course. #### Born in Groton

Mr. Robeson was born in Groton, N. Y., May 10, 1870. He attended public schools at Elmira, and at the age of 14 obtained his first job as a clerk in a hardware store in that city.

He next became associated with the Robeson Cutlery Company, established at Elmira by his father, Millard F. Robeson. The company was moved to Camillus in 1891 and again to Perry in 1898. The elder Robeson established the Rochester

Stamping Company in Rochester in 1891 and in 1894 the son came to Rochester as vicepresident of the metalware concern, also serving as treasurer of the cutlery branch of the business. In 1922 the two concerns were merged under the name of the Robeson-Rochester Corporation, with Mr. Robeson as president. In Rochester the company manufactures metalware at its main factory at 172 Anderson Avenue and at a branch factory at

Last year he figured home the big chunk of the coin with another sensation at his side making.

Brother Bill finished all even with Doser at the conclusion of the morning round with 69. He had a chance to take the lead at the 18th green but three-putted.

It was still a new crowd race at the end of 27 holes, Doser reaching the turn in 24 and Mitchell in 25 but starting with the 11th hole Bill put on a classic display of golf that had a gallery of 1,500 fairly bubbling over with excitement.

Mitchell's capturing the shot, easily carried the par four hole and he followed them up with steady approach. He birdied the seventh, fourth and fourteenth holes and collected his pars at 10th and 15th for five straight strokes.

## G. W. ROBESON RECORD LAUDED IN RESOLUTION

### Trustees of Chamber Praise the Work of Former President

Praise for George W. Robeson, Rochester business man, president of the Robeson-Rochester Corporation, cutlery and metalware makers, and a former president of the Chamber of Commerce, was accorded by chamber trustees in a resolution on his death adopted yesterday.

Mr. Robeson died Sunday at his home, 18 Putnam terrace, aged 62, after a five-week illness. Funeral services will take place at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon at his home and burial will be in Mount Hope Cemetery. The Rev. Donald R. MacQueen, minister of the First Baptist Church, will officiate.

Before he became president of the Chamber of Commerce, in 1916 Mr. Robeson was its third, second and first vice-president, respectively. His public interest and devotion to the chamber are credited with his serving as treasurer and member of the executive committee for four more years.

Building plans for the chamber found Mr. Robeson interested and active, according to the tribute. In his year as president, construction plans for the new building of the chamber were adopted, and its erection began, with Mr. Robeson and two other former presidents constituting the building committee. He was a member of a similar committee in connection with the construction of the addition, completed in 1927, that virtually doubled the Chamber of Commerce plant. A trustee of the building fund beginning in 1926, he served as a chamber trustee until 1928, when he became a member of the advisory council.

"In all his service in the Rochester Chamber of Commerce, five qualities were salient: modesty, thoroughness, sagacity, honesty, strength," according to the resolution.

It continued: "In every council, in every item, no matter how important, he had first to be convinced as to what was right and fair and after that, was willing to consider questions of timeliness and expediency. This sterling quality governed him in all things and profoundly influenced not only his associates but the entire Chamber."

The board of trustees of the chamber in this memorandum desires to express their deep sorrow over his death and their profound sympathy with Mrs. Robeson and their family.

Daniel N. Calkins, president of the chamber, was chairman of the meeting at which the resolution was adopted. The following members of the board were named as an official committee to attend Mr. Robeson's funeral: President Calkins, and Frederick S. Miller, Louis S. Foulkes, James P. R. Duffy, Libanus M. Todd, Fred J. Cross and George Dietrich.

Golf tourneys are on the wane in this section. The Women's Golf Association of Rochester will run a one-day event at Ridgmont Golf Club today and at the Durand-Eastman municipal course is scheduled the qualifying round of the men's public links title play. Match play will follow. After that the Western New York P. G. A. at the Country Club of Rochester is the principal tourney remaining. George Christ, home pro, might well be considered the favorite for that play as he has toured the layout in 61 shots and a round of 70 many considered as wasted effort by the little expert. Other pros, however, have found conditions to their liking at the East Avenue course and are determined to give Christ a fight for the honors.

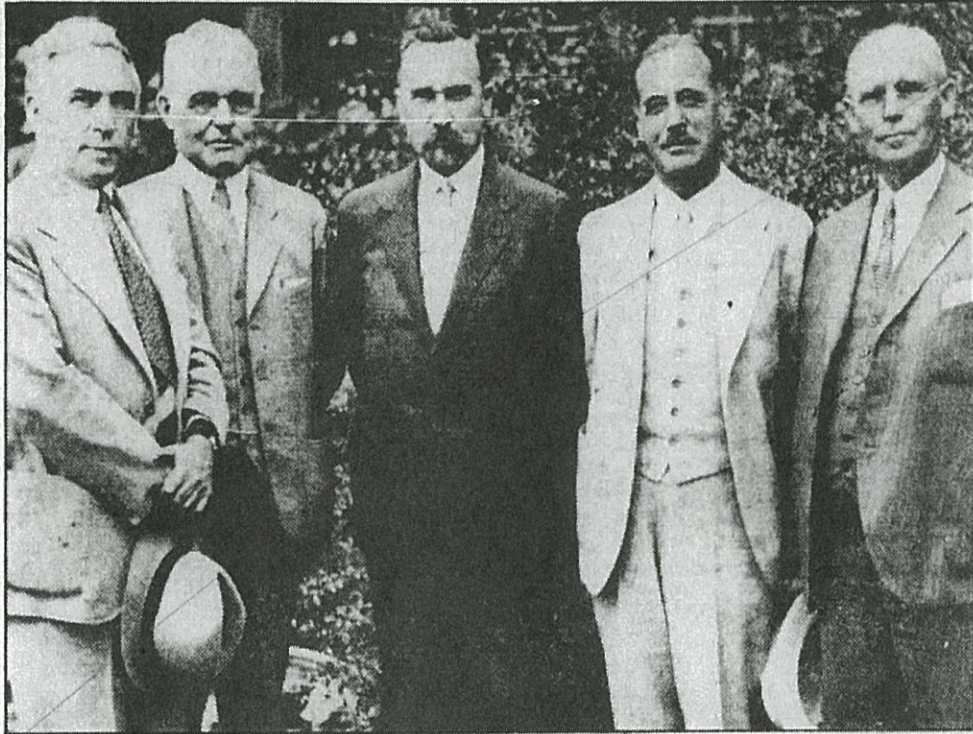

## Peter A. Bogdanov Visits Rochester For U.S.S.R.

By MARGARET FRAWLEY

Relations of Soviet Russia with the nations of the world are increasingly friendly as the result of trade contacts, Peter A. Bogdanov, chairman of the board of directors of Amtorg Trading Corporation, said yesterday on a visit to Rochester.

Mr. Bogdanov was the guest of James E. Gleason of the Gleason Works and Arthur H. Ingie of the Consolidated Machine Tool Corporation at the Country Club of Rochester for a private luncheon yesterday noon. He discussed trade relations between the United States and the U. S. S. R. and the general respect for American efficiency in his own country.

In an interview yesterday afternoon Mr. Bogdanov said he believed that international trade was cementing good relations between his country and her neighbors.

### Soviets Desire Peace

"The U. S. S. R.'s relations are better every year," he explained. "There is less prejudice as man and nations come to know about our aims. We of Soviet Russia desire peace with the world, good trade relations. There is no conflict of interests between her country and the United States. Rather, we have many common interests."

Amtorg is the international organization set up by the Soviets for the purchase and sale of goods abroad. In 1929 the Russians purchased \$33,692,000 worth of goods from the United States; in 1930 \$114,900,000; in 1931 \$181,000,000; and in the first six months of 1932, \$7,000,000. The dropping off of trade in 1932 is attributed to the favorable state of the European market and the advantages of purchases there. American imports from Russia always have averaged about a fifth to an eighth of these exports.

### Enthusiastic About Program

Mr. Bogdanov, of course, is enthusiastic about the success of the Russian program and confessed that when he returned home last summer after an absence of two years he was amazed by the speed with which the entire program was being pushed through. He discounted criticism which have been current regarding the failure of Russian crops this year. They are considerably less in the Ukraine, he said, but undoubtedly will be sufficiently large in other agricultural areas to counterbalance this.

Mr. Bogdanov was accompanied here by Samuel S. Shiman, director of information and editor of the Economic Review of the Soviet Union.

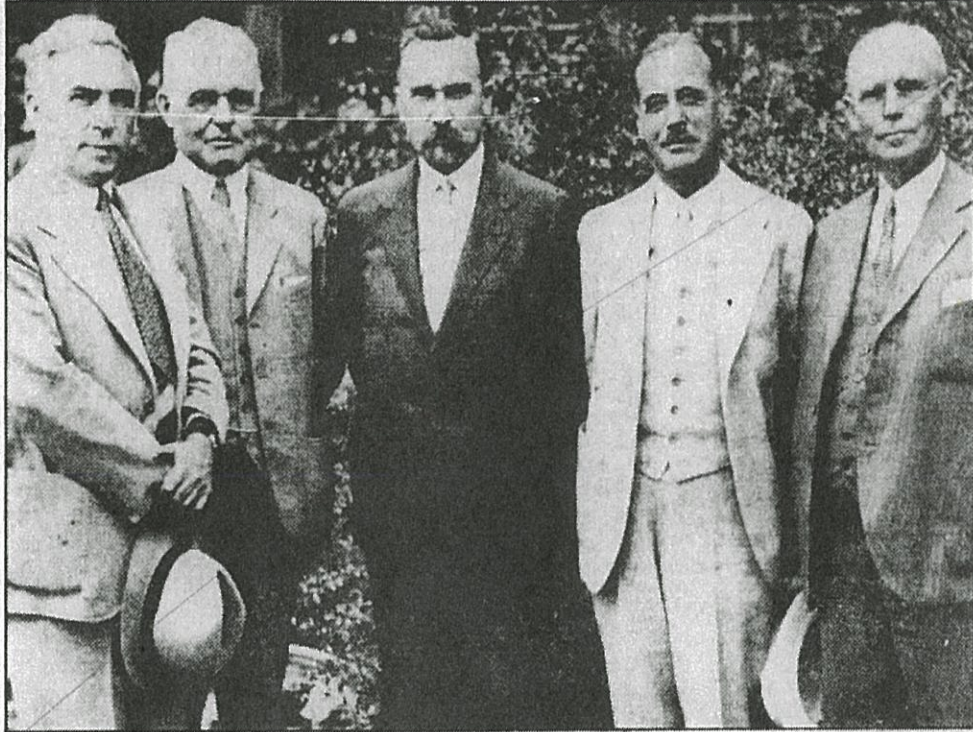

## Peter A. Bogdanov Visits Rochester For U.S.S.R.

By MARGARET FRAWLEY

Relations of Soviet Russia with the nations of the world are increasingly friendly as the result of trade contacts. Peter A. Bogdanov, chairman of the board of directors of Amtorg Trading Corporation, said yesterday on a visit to Rochester.

Mr. Bogdanov was the guest of James E. Gleason of the Gleason Works and Arthur H. Ingle of the Consolidated Machine Tool Corporation at the Country Club of Rochester for a private luncheon yesterday noon. He discussed trade relations between the United States and the U. S. S. R. and the general respect for American efficiency in his own country.

In an interview yesterday afternoon Mr. Bogdanov said he believed that international trade was cementing good relations between his country and her neighbors.

### "Soviets Desire Peace"

"The U. S. S. R.'s relations are better every year," he explained. "There is less prejudice as men and nations come to know about our aims. We of Soviet Russia desire peace with the world, good trade relations. There is no conflict of interests between my country and the United States. Rather, we have many common interests."

Amtorg is the international organization set up by the Soviets for the purchase and sale of goods abroad. In 1929 the Russians purchased \$83,600,000 worth of goods from the United States; in 1929 \$114,000,000; in 1931 \$161,000,000; and in the first six months of 1932, \$7,000,000. The dropping off of trade in 1932 is attributed to the favorable state of the European market and the advantages of purchases there. American imports from Russia always have averaged about a fifth to an eighth of these exports.

### Enthusiastic About Program

Mr. Bogdanov, of course, is enthusiastic about the success of the Russian program and confessed that when he returned home last summer after an absence of two years he was amazed by the speed with which the entire program was being pushed through. He discounted stories which have been current regarding the failure of Russian crops this year. They are considerably less in the Ukraine, he said, but undoubtedly will be sufficiently large in other agricultural areas to counterbalance this.

Mr. Bogdanov was accompanied here by Samuel S. Shipman, director of information and editor of the Economic Review of the Soviet Union.
