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Thaney Seen New District Golf President --- Would Succeed Crittenden at '38 Meeting

Veteran Secretary Is Touted for Jan. 18 Annual Confab

Mid-winter Golf Note: If all goes well, the new president of the Rochester District Golf Association will be hard-working, capable Elmer Thaney, for two years secretary of the organization and for years one of the RDGA's most conscientious pluggers.

This much was learned yesterday, as grapevine chatter began prior to the association's annual meeting at Irondequoit Club the evening on Tuesday, Jan. 18.

Current president is Harry Crittenden of Country Club of Rochester, who has served excellently in that office for two years, and who now is slated to become a member of the executive committee along with Jim Weldon of Oak Hill. Weldon, an RDGA vicepresident and chairman of the tournament committee, feels he should yield his tourney chairman job to someone else—but there will be

a loud protest at Weldon's attempt to get out of this important post.

hard to estimate. Harry Harman of Oak Hill is the other vicepresident, and likewise is head of the prize committee. Bob Adler of Irondequoit is treasurer. W. A. Springer of Ridgemont, former president, is chairman of the executive committee, and Clinton Patchen of Durand is the handicap man.

Midvale, which in its tenure of membership in the RDGA has never been host to the annual championship, will make a strenuous effort to land that event for 1938—BUT, Locust Hill is more likely to get the championship, despite Midvale's efforts. This information comes from a reliable source.

The stymie, which was outlawed last season by the RDGA in the face of the United States Golf Association's adamant stand, is pretty certain to keep right on being outlawed. There were no complaints at Brook-Lea, where the '37 championship was contested, over the absence of the much maligned stymie.

STYMIE RULE AGAIN VOTED OUT BY BODY

Locust Hill Given Championship For 1938

Forty-three year old Elmer Thaney, hard-working Brook-Lea Country Club member, last night became the third president in the Rochester District Golf Association's "new regime."

Thaney was unanimously named to succeed Harry Crittenden, two-time president from the Country Club of Rochester, at the RDGA's annual meeting at Irondequoit Country Club. The other officers named were:

First vicepresident, P. W. (Gotch) Gillette, Locust Hill; second vicepresident, Fred Allen, Country Club of Rochester; secretary, Foster Yawger of Monroe, and treasurer, Bob Adler of Irondequoit. Yawger and Adler were re-elected. Allen is only 22 years old; his ascendancy was interrupted as a definite concession to the younger school of district golfers.

The stymie, killed last year by the RDGA in defiance of the United States Golf Association, again was neatly disposed of. By unanimous vote, it was decided to permit the stymie to stay slumbering in its grave.

14 Club Limit Voted

14-Club Limit Voted

The new 14-club limit was approved. This means that, beginning in May, when the first tourney will be held, no player will be permitted to carry in excess of 14 clubs.

Locust Hill was awarded the 1938 district championship and the bid of Midvale Golf Club—voiced by Del Jacobs, its delegate—was tabled for another year. If and when Midvale demonstrates its facilities are such as to permit the handling of the annual championship, according to executive opinion, the Perinton club will be considered. Otherwise, the "rotation" of the championship among the six major clubs will prevail.

A brand new wrinkle in the character of a "veterans" tournament—for district players 40 years old and over—will be attempted this season. This tourney will be in addition to the regular schedule of one-day RDGA events.

After a spirited skirmish—liveliest of the evening—a suggestion proffered by Harold Colburn of Brook-Lea was turned down, for the time being, at least. This suggestion — as figured out by the tournament committee—would have installed handicap differences in all match play of the annual championship, outside the title flight of 32. The idea finally was adjudged too hot and revolutionary to handle; if passed, it would have broken all precedent. Aimed at the so-called "mug hunter," it would have forced lower handicapped players to give away strokes to opponents in non-championship flights.

Colburn, who served last season with Jim Weldon of Oak Hill as co-chairman of tournaments, was named tournament chairman by President Thane. Gillette was assigned to chairmanship of the prize committee, and the indefatigable Clint Patchen of Durand, chairman of the handicap committee, was re-named to that post. RDGA handicapping for all district contestants, applied for the first time last season, again will be in force.

Crittenden, Weldon and Harry Harmon, the latter of Oak Hill, all became members of the executive committee, which is chairmanned by W. A. (Bill) Springer of Brook-Lea, former president. Weldon and Harman were presented with gifts in appreciation of their long period of RDGA service.

Unanimous Election

Thaney was elected with no opposition. The nominating committee, headed by Harman and consisting of Colburn and Springer, wasted little time in drawing up its slate, which met with full approval of the delegates. Crittenden had said definitely he was through; the Country Club veteran tried to get out of the job last year also, but was elected over his protests.

Finances were reported in sound condition by Treasurer Adler. The treasury balance is \$182.86, although the season was operated at a loss of \$46.56. A total of \$1,155 was received in tourney fees last year; expenses were \$1,337.16, of which 69 per cent was expended for prizes. An average of 134 players competed in the RDGA's five tournaments, as contrasted to 147 in 1936 and 142 in 1935. Delegates in attendance were:

GOLFERS, here's your new president: Elmer Thaney is a big, good-natured, florid Irishman who was born in town July 16, 1894, educated at St. Bridget's School, married and sired four children . . . Bill is 13, was runnerup in the sub-junior class of last year's junior ♦

of the best of the young district prospects . . . there are three girls, ten-year-old Mary Lou, Eileen, 8, and Suzanne, one . . . Yes, Mrs. Thaney plays golf, too.

Twice secretary and once vice-president of the RDGA, Thaney knows district policies, is popular and respected by all his colleagues . . . Is himself an excellent golfer, once shot a sizzling 72 at Brook-Lea, where par is 73. Won his club championship in 1931, is a charter member, survived two Brook-Lea fires . . . In his youth was a crack ball player, and caught for the Niagara Falls semipro team that was rated about the best in its semipro class at the time . . . Staunch follower of virtually all sports, once was a boxing judge, follows the Red Wings closely, shivers through big college football games.

Thaney bowls assiduously, and bowls well. Every year he and his fellow keglers contribute faithfully to a "kitty" which endows them with sufficient funds for an annual boat trip . . . Joe (Red Wing) Connor is prime mover in this idea . . . Last year the party sailed to Venezuela and the Dutch West Indies . . . Previous trips have taken them to Havana and Nassau . . . The new president is noted, among other things, for his beaming sunburn, which each summer blooms quickly and joyously. Thaney spends money he wins on golf bets for different lotions to assuage his feverish brow . . . Toils away during the winter on his big body, wearing off excess weight via handball and volleyball.

He first swung a golf club on the sweeping fairways of Genesee Valley Park when he was 17 years old. That makes it 26 years ago, when sheep were allowed to graze in the Genesee "meadows" as a substitute for grass-cutting equipment . . . Thaney is a longtime member of the Knights of Columbus and four times has won the yearly K. of C. tourney. He shot a 78 at Lake

Shore last summer to win. The Knights originally started the tourney for Elmer, now are trying to get him out of it .

Thaney is a manufacturer's agent, with offices in St. Paul St. . . . He is strictly a self-made man, and is highly regarded in his work . . . Gets embarrassed rather easily, a trait which adds to his personality . . . Has a nephew, Gene Thaney, who once captained the Holy Cross College team . . . Knows many sports percentages, likes to have a good time, works hard, never says boo on the golf course when he makes a poor shot, once became so discouraged he threatened to quit altogether, always came back for more . . . He can be "spotted" unmistakably on the links because of his short, abrupt backswing.

Training at Yale Instrumental in Country Club of Rochester Golfer's Success

IF FREDDY ALLEN was born with a silver spoon in his mouth it hasn't bothered either his competitive spirit, his disposition or his ambitions. Now 22 years old and the youngest officer in the history of the Rochester District Golf Association, he is married, working hard at the brokerage business and determined to win the district championship this year.

When the RDGA named Fred a vicepresident at its annual meeting recently, it was not only a constructive concession toward Rochester's younger golfers but a nice compliment to the tall, good-looking Country Club of Rochester player. Allen has become intensely interested in golf since 1934, when he resumed the game after quitting it cold for six years. And he has gotten so good that—in a round at Bermuda a short time ago—he missed the Belmont course record of 66 by only one shot.

Freddy had a good season in '37, a season which reached its peak when he waded through the Monroe Golf Club Invitation field for an impressive conquest. Enroute to that title, he disposed of such outstanding talent as Allick Girard Jr., who had been favored heavily to win. He beat Girard, 2 and 1, needing but a par four at the 18th for a 70—two under par.

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Freddy learned most of his golf from Ben Thomson, the wily old Scot who has coached Yale golfers for years. "Thomson could spot in two minutes what I was doing wrong," he says. Under Thomson's encouragement, the Rochester boy practiced religiously all winter that first year at Yale, made the freshmen team in the spring, and came back to earn a Varsity spot in his sophomore year.

CASE HISTORY: Born in Rochester at 40 Hawthorne Street, in March, 1914 . . . Took up golf at seven, under the tutelage of George Christ broke 90 at age of ten . . . Summered in Maine, where he got down to 85 at 14 . . . Gave up golf that year when he went to England for the World Boy Scout Jamboree, returned home to become more interested in baseball and swimming, pitched and played the outfield at Hill School, shagged

balls at Red Wing Stadium most of one summer . . . Resumed golf on entering Yale, where he attended for two years . . . His father, the late Freeman Allen, an Eastman Kodak executive, died in 1933 . . . Freddy decided he wanted to get in the brokerage business, so went to New York for three months to get the groundwork. Now with Shields & Company . . . His wife, the former Dorothy May, is coming along well in golf, although a neophyte. Once a 140 shooter at Oak Hill, she got down to 104 and 105 last summer, broke 100 at Bermuda . . . Fred has a sister, Jane, who rides but doesn't play golf. His mother watches . . . Prior to last year, Fred's biggest golf achievement was in gaining the finals of the 1930 district championship, losing to his pal, Brendan McInerney.

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Allen continued to bowl along at a low-scoring clip, and embarrassed several gentleman in the qualifying round of the RDGA's annual championship at Brook-Lea. With nearly the entire field in and the medal pretty well decided, Freddy hove into view as shadows descended on the 18th tee, rapped an accurate No. 7 iron to the green and got his part 3 for a 74—best score of the day. Thereupon he withdrew from the tournament, and this calls for an explanation which will show that Fred was completely honest and sincere about this unusual action. Originally, he hadn't planned competing in the championship at all, because he still had a honeymoon (the former Dorothy May) scheduled—and his vacation had been used up. His office, however, was willing to grant him two weeks in view of the honeymoon. So Fred had told RDGA officers he wouldn't play, but finally decided to play in the qualifier only. That is the whole explanation of his sudden withdrawal, which had caused a few critics to mutter untoward remarks about fellows who start tournaments but don't finish them.

Fred is an unusually tall golfer. Stands six feet two inches, weighs 165 pounds and is still gaining. Employs an unorthodox, loose-jointed swing with great leverage that produces long-hitting results. Few amateurs can keep up with him off the tees, and he has a delicate touch on the greens. Once, while engaged in a tense extra-hole battle for Yale against Harvard, Freddy birdied the 19th, 20th and 21st holes to close out the enemy. This prodigious feat enabled Yale to move into a playoff with Dartmouth for the northern division title of the Eastern Intercollegiate Golf League. The Eli's beat Dartmouth too, Allen playing an instrumental role in the conquest, then went on to trim Princeton for the league championship.

Making the sportsman weaken to the point of taking the rubber band off the family bank roll has become a profitable American enterprise, and many a dollar that should be tossed into a new dining room suite finds its way into the outstretched palms of those who provide geography of interest to the fisherman and gunner.

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The old world may be the cradle of civilization and the seat of culture, but it is prone to cop an idea or two from the new world on how to ballyhoo the dollars out of the outdoor man's jeans. The land of the Sphinx and Pharaohs is making a bid for the continental duck-shooting business and the Egyptian program will, it is hoped, not only draw the pintail perforators from Europe but the well-to-do mallard maulers from the States.

The reed covered marshes of the Nile have long been the home of the wildfowl. Shooting there finds a bag limit of about 100 birds. The government plans to make it even better by establishing a sanctuary of 250,000 acres. Arid acres of the Nile, now useless wasteland, will be flooded to a depth of five feet which will entice even greater numbers of ducks that have been using the age old flyway from Central Europe to the African lakes and swamps.

The Egyptian Government has enlisted the services of Wentworth Day, famous English sportsman and writer, to put the plan in operation. Publicity agents who have long sung the praises of the minarets and mosques will now offer shots at the mallard and merganser.

The fight for the sportsman's dollar marches on!

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Maybe there is a wide divergence of opinion among Rochester shooters or perhaps no masterful organizing hand has reached forth to draw together the scattered units of the local clay target shattering industry. M. R. MILLER, FIRM LEADER DIES IN HOME

Headed Insurance Agency, Member Of GOP

Mortimer R. Miller, 68, insurance executive, clubman and prominent Republican, died last night (Feb. 6, 1938) at his home, 232 Culver Rd. after a three weeks' illness following a heart attack in Miami, Fla.

During the World War Mr. Miller served as federal coal administrator for the county and during the emergency that followed the war served until 1923 as administrator for District 7 covering six counties.

He was a former president of the Rochester General Agents' Association, a member of the Life Underwriters' Association, the Chamber of Commerce, Rochester Ad Club and Automobile Club and also a member of the Country Club of Rochester and Genesee Valley Club.

Mr. Miller was born in Rochester and entered the insurance business after he was graduated from Colgate University. He was a trustee of Colgate.

Survivors are his widow, Henriette, two daughters, Mrs. John R. Fox and Mrs. John H. Rae, Rochester, and seven grandchildren, three of whom are children of the late Mortimer J. Miller.

Funeral services will be held in the late family home, 232 Culver Rd., at 2:30 p. m. Tuesday. Burial will be in Riverside Cemetery.



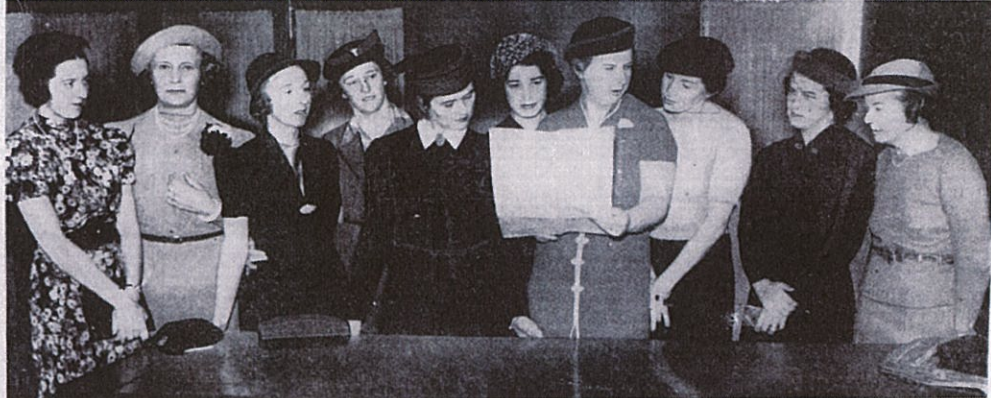

McKenna Arrives Home, to Open Shop Today

Oak Hill Country Club — Rochester's biggest links layout—rolled its greens yesterday, welcomed back professionals Charlie McKenna and Frank Krieger, and prepared to open its course unofficially today.

As assistant pro Russ Farnen announced he would open the Country Club of Rochester golf shop on Saturday and other district clubs likewise laid plans for early openings, a serious war was launched against the dreaded Japanese beetle.

This pestiferous Nipplin visitor, which for 20 years has made expensive inroads on Jersey and Pennsylvania golf courses, is definitely in town. Approximately 100 of them have been found here. To combat their presence, each district club will be asked to contribute \$100 toward a fund to eradicate them before they spread.

Only way to discourage the insect is to spray fairways and greens with a compound whose base is arsenate of lead. The treatment is expensive if used on a large scale. It costs around 13 and 14 cents a pound and 15 pounds must be used for every 1,000 square feet. Some clubs, badly afflicted, have been forced to spend around \$15,000 or else give up their golf course altogether. For example, the championship course at Merion Cricket in Philadelphia, where Clarence Doser is associate professional, has been closed for some time.

Florida also was visited by the Jap insect this winter, with resultant heavy damages to such fine courses as Bay Shore and LaGorce in Miami.

The beetle is easily recognized, being bright green in color and measuring about 1-3 to $\frac{1}{2}$ inches in length. It got into this country in 1916 and spread rapidly. Although primarily a killer of fruit trees, the insect will attack fine grasses and often kill them completely. All Rochester golf clubs are asked to be on the lookout continually for the bug, which should be nipped before it gets a strong foothold and spreads out of control.

McKenna, who holds the Western New York PGA title, arrived home yesterday from Florida, tanned and fit.

Charlie played golf every day, mostly around Miami, and said the weather was beautiful. 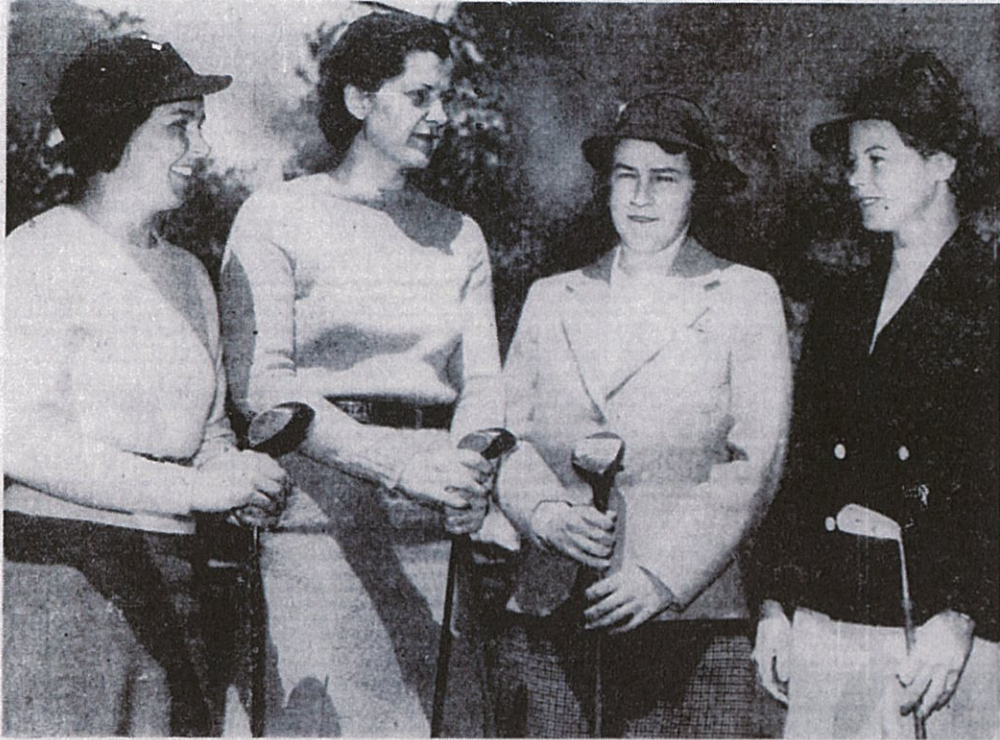

HAGEN BACK IN U.S. OPEN

Walter Files His Entry for Test At Denver

New York—(AP)—One of the largest entry lists in the history of the National Open golf championship was assured for this year's tournament when the United States Golf Association estimated that 1,160 had been received when the deadline fell yesterday afternoon.

Since the 1938 championship, to be played June 9-11 at the Cherry Hills Club near Denver, is being staged farther west than ever before, the USGA had counted on a substantial drop from last year's record entry of 1,402. The drop, however, was by no means so large as had been expected.

Pending a final check-up, it already is definite that this year's figure will be either the third or fourth largest on the USGA books. In addition to last year's top figures in the past were: 1936, 1,277; 1930, 1,177; 1931, 1,141; 1935, 1,125.

Among the 1,160 names are those of 28 players exempt from the sectional qualifying trials to be held May 31 at 31 points throughout the country. The top 31 players in last year's field automatically became eligible for the 1938 championship proper, but three of them, Walker Cuppers, Johnny Goodman and Charles (Chuck) Kocsis and former U. S. public links champion Frank Strafaci, did not enter.

Goodman and Kocsis are abroad with the Walker Cup team, while Strafaci, who recently became an automobile salesman, decided to stick to his job and concentrate on the amateur championship instead.

One familiar figure who was missing from the picture in 1937, when Ralph Guldahl set a new championship record of 281 in winning the title at Birmingham, Mich., will be back for this 41st renewal of the open. He is Walter Hagen, winner in 1914 and 1919. The Haig is due in San Francisco the end of this month and will seek to qualify there.

With 28 players automatically eligible, there will be 142 places in the championship starting field to be contested by about 1,130 players in the sectional tests. Allotment of place to the 31 qualifying points will not be announced until some time next week, after the USGA has carefully checked and approved each entry.

Star Once, Rusty Today, Fil Robeson Takes Up His Golfing Firearms Again

Former North, South Champion Finds His Game in the 80's But Would Do Better

WHEN Fil Robeson was a tall kid of 19 he wore the title of North and South amateur golf champion.

When he was 21 he suddenly quit the University of Pennsylvania golf team and went to war. Joined a French ambulance corps. Stayed in France for two years.

He came home, donned knickers again, burned up local golf courses, once shot a 66 at the Country Club of Rochester, played with such greats as Francis Quimet, Jess Guilford, Bill Fownes Jr., and Walter Travis. The only golfers around town who were as good or better were Art Yates and Charlie McKenna (then an amateur).

That was 20 years ago.

Today Fil Robeson, beginning something of a comeback at Lake Shore Country Club after failing to touch a golf club for five years, is trying to learn all over again how you go about breaking 80. He shot an 85 last week in his first time out.

It must be a peculiar feeling for a man who has accomplished the things in golf that Fil Robeson has, to look around today on a tournament scene dominated almost entirely by youngsters who haven't even heard of some of the fine amateurs who stole the headlines 25 years ago. Who of our younger Rochester players have heard, for instance, of Gurney Curtis and W. W.

Dake and I. S. Robeson, Fil's father?

Yet Gurney Curtis for years was the best golfer in town, and Dake was probably the next best. Irving Robeson, of course, has his name inscribed—as does Fil—on the North and South champions' plaque that hangs in the historic lounge of the Pinehurst Country Club—the St. Andrews of American golf.

Today, Fil has two sons—Jimmy, 13, and Irving, Jr., 15—who may carry on the Robeson tradition. Fil hopes so, anyway. Young Irving bats around 90 or so, and will do better as he grows up.

For himself, Fil holds no hopes for anything approximating the golf he used to play, but he would like to score reasonably well. Now that he's joined Lake Shore, he hopes to play at least weekend golf, and perhaps get down into the 70's with some consistency before the summer's over. Fil has found already, however, that the old swing has gathered rust with the passing years; shots he used to wade into confidently now present a problem.

The biggest thrill Fil ever got was the time when, as a 19-year-old boy, he defeated the redoubtable Henry Topping, 3 and 2, for the coveted North and South title at Pinehurst.

"I remember it well," he said yesterday, "because our match ended on the same hole where, six years later, Topping exactly reversed matters and beat me in the same finals."

True, Fil got a kick out of the 66 he banged out at the CCR one day, but his pleasure was short-lived.

"The 66," he says, "was the course record—for one day. George Christ shot a little matter of 64 the very next afternoon!"

Strong Field to Tee Off in Country Club Invitation Tournament Friday

M'INERNEY SHOOTS 74 IN TUNEUP

Stars Find Course In Splendid Condition

Several of the lower-scoring golfers hopeful of making a splash in the 14th annual Country Club of Rochester Invitation tournament, which begins Friday with an 18-hole qualifier, attacked the East Avenue course yesterday and voiced unanimous satisfaction with its condition.

Brendan McInerney, former district champion who is home from Cornell Law School, was around in 74 shots yesterday and gradually was re-acquiring the game that has stamped him as one of the very best amateurs in the area.

Freddy Allen, another home club player, who very likely may be made the favorite to win the title donned by Bill Holt last year, hit a 75 yesterday.

Ken Bourne of Garden City, a brother of Barbara Bourne, Horton Smith's fiancée, again will be a competitor, as will a number of exceptionally strong out-of-town players. One of the best of the invaders is Fred Reimers, No. 2 man on the Cornell golf team. Reimers is from Omaha. Holt, who played in the National Open at Denver, is not expected.

Field Star Studded

Among the better competitors will be Law Weatherwax of Albany, well-known here as one of the longest-hitting amateurs in the game; Bob Fisher of New York, former Yale player; Bob Wright and Fred Ayling of Syracuse, and Oliver Transue of Cleveland. Transue is a former Cornell captain. Pat Eastwood, a Toronto boy who played well here a few years ago, will compete if he gets away from the Ontario Amateur in time. Buell Critchlow of Buffalo, a one time Amherst star, is entered, along with some of the outstanding Buffalo golfers.

Jack Tucker of Oak Hill, medalist last year, with Bill Chapin, his club-mate, likely will provide serious opposition. Tucker just finished runnerup again in the Niagara Falls invitation, and Chapin who won two years ago, is hitting around 75 or better consistently.

General chairman is W. B. (Bill) Macomber, with Jack McInerney Jr., in charge of the invitation list. Pairings will be made tomorrow night at the clubhouse, with a field of approximately 125 and more expected. Around 50 of these will be entered from the home club, and an 18-man team of CCR players will engage a Buffalo Country Club team as a special feature.

Holt won the title last year by overcoming Chapin in a hard-fought final, Chapin rallying after being well behind.

The course was never in finer condition, with the greens fast and true and the fairways good. Contestants will encounter most difficulty with holes No. 14, a sturdy type of long par three, and with 15, which severely penalizes either a hook or slice.

Following the 18-hole qualifier on Friday, match play in probably six flights begins on Saturday. The semifinals are scheduled Sunday morning, with the championship finals that afternoon. A score of around 79 should make the title flight. Previous winners:

SCORE OF 78 SEEN LIKELY AS DEADLINE

Home Club Stars Stand Out in Tune-Ups

The score of 78 appeared necessary last night for qualification, after glancing at the smart, aggressive field of 130 contestants paired for the 14th annual Country Club of Rochester invitation tournament, which begins tomorrow with an 18-hole qualifying round.

Minus the defending champion, Bill Holt Jr. of Syracuse, who is not back from the National Open at Denver, the field tomorrow is alive with a flock of 70-scoring golfers.

The home club itself is more than likely to produce the winner. The CCR threats include a sturdy trio of competitors in Freddy Allen, Brendan McInerney and Jack McInerney Jr. The latter of the McInerney clan has never, by a fluke, managed to qualify in the title fight, but the way he is pounding the ball this season indicates he will be strictly on his game. Jack had a 35 yesterday for nine holes, and his brother Brendan was 75.

Jack Tucker, five-time RDGA champion, and W. C. (Young Bill) Chapin of Oak Hill and a Country Club trio, Fred Allen, Brendan McInerney and Jack McInerney Jr., are among those regarded highly in the title quest.

The 18-hole qualifying round today will narrow the championship fight down to 16 players, with match play scheduled to start tomorrow.

First and second rounds of the match play in all divisions will be held tomorrow, with semifinals and finals slated Sunday.

Led by a remarkably sound 71 executed by the methodical Dudley Ward of Oak Hill, the Country Club of Rochester's 14th annual invitation golf tournament forced a fine field to shoot 79 or better as the 18-hole qualifying round concluded last evening. Ward meets Freddy Allen of the home club as match play starts this morning.

The 16th man to make the title

The 16th man to make the title flight was not decided until 7:45 p. m. when Irving Maeske of Durand, who richly deserved to qualify, hit an approach shot dead during a four-man playoff at the second extra hole. The shot earned the public links player a par four, and eased him into the championship contention despite an almost incredible 10 which he accumulated at the 11th.

Maeske, Bob Adler of Irondequoit, Noble Miller of Canandaigua and Bill Lee of the home club, all with 79's, engaged in the playoff. Adler went out at the first hole, with a five, while the others pushed on. Miller skidded at the second, but Lee hit two elegant shots to the green, which he proceeded to four-putt. Maeske meantime was in the right-hand rough off the tee, recovered into the fairway, and punched his next a couple of feet from the flag.

All told, Rochester placed nine golfers in the title division.

Ward Steady

Ward's 71 was shot during the morning, and was an impressive example of steady, meticulous pars. With the exception of a 15-foot putt at the short 16th for a birdie deuce, Dudley never did anything spectacular. He merely parred the course to death. Only on one hole, the long 11th, did he even wander into the rough. Here he pulled his second, but recovered nicely for his par five. The 71 served notice that Ward will be tough to dislodge as match play begins this morning, for the round was the third in a row that the Oak Hiller has shot under 75 during the past three days here. 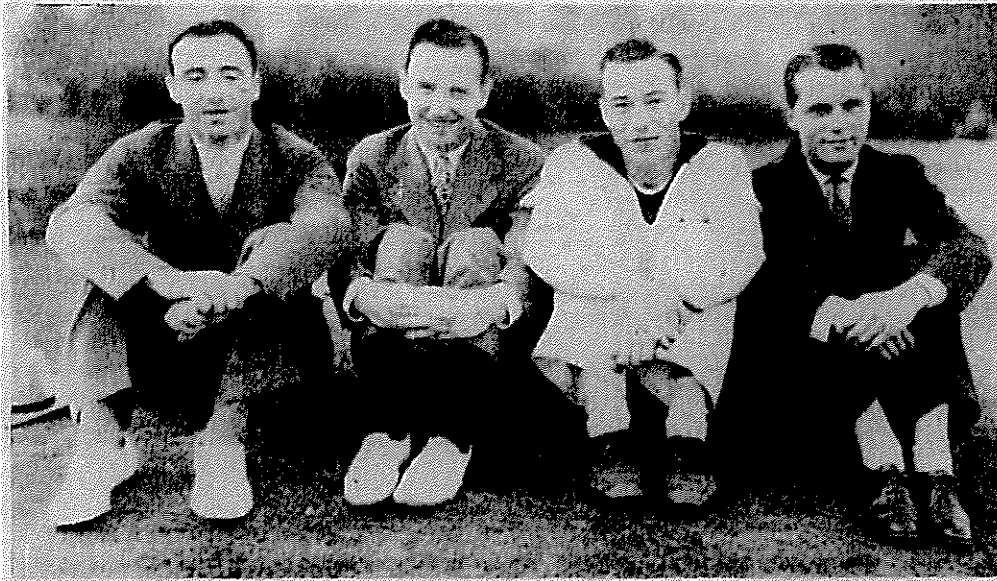
Maeske had pars for a 76 in the morning, and went out in 38 to hold Chapin even at the turn in the afternoon.

Tucker Fires Barrage of Birdies at Critchlow to Win Invitation Title

Oak Hiller Routs Bison Ace, 6 and 5

**Jack Shoots Torrid 32 on First
Nine to Take Commanding
Lead; Match Ends at 13th**

Smothering the hapless Buell Critchlow, of Buffalo, under a veritable barrage of par-cracking golf in the finals, Jack Tucker of Oak Hill, yesterday won the Country Club of Rochester's Invitation golf tournament for the first time. The margin was 6 and 5.

Not in the 14-year old history of the colorful event has a winner produced such sizzling golf, for Tucker was cut in 32 shots and never gave Critchlow a chance. When the match ended at the 13th green. Tucker was still three under par. Critchlow, captain of the Amherst College golf team last year, won exactly one hole, and needed a birdie to do it at the seventh.

The Oak Hiller succeeds Bill Holt Jr., of Syracuse as champion. Tucker had been finalist once before, losing to Bob Craver several years ago, and he was medalist last year, but he was never quite able to apply the clincher until yesterday.

Eliminates Maeske

Representing the Cherry Hill club, Ontario, Canada, near Buffalo, the 22-year old Critchlow gained the finals by eliminating the surprising Irving Maeske of Durand, 2-1, in the morning. Tucker put out his club-mate, Dudley Ward, by the same margin in the semifinals. Critchlow, incidentally, played beautiful golf all through the tournament, ousting Rennie Merritt of East Aurora in a 21-hole battle, and downing Charlie Christopher of Detroit in his second match.

Yesterday's big gallery got an eyefull at the very first hole when Tucker, ordinarily a shaky putter, holed a 25-footer for a birdie three for a quick lead that Critchlow never could do anything with.

At the 441-yard second, against the wind, Tucker laced a No. 2 wood straight at the pin, his ball stopping only six feet away. Critchlow, in the creek bed on his second, recovered for a five, Tucker missing the birdie. Critchlow rimmed the cup at the uphill third for a winning birdie, Tucker halving the hole by chipping stony from in back of the green.

on the flag.

Buffalo Boy Wins

Critchlow at this stage was four down. He earned a good half at the dog-leg sixth, laying his approach putt stiff in three, while Tucker nearly sank his chip in three. The seventh hole, a 524-yard dog-leg, finally yielded a win to the hard-working Buffalo boy, and he got a big hand as a five-foot putt dropped for a birdie. Tucker previously had rimmed the cup for a bird from 12 feet.

Critchlow went four down again to Tucker's par three at the short eighth, and they split the ninth in pars although neither was on the green in two. Tucker was trapped, but exploded out five feet from the pin and canned the putt, Critchlow pitching dead for a half.

They halved the tenth in par 4's, Critchlow's bold bid for a birdie three halting on the lip. The 11th was spectacular. This is a 550-yarder, the longest hole on the course, and Critchlow started by hitting a ball completely out of bounds, only to have the ball bounce off a bird-bath and back into the course. Critchlow eventually sank a spectacular 40-foot putt for par five, only to see Tucker retaliate with a 20-footer for a birdie four.

Five down now, with only seven left, Critchlow managed to halve the 12th in bogie 4 when Tucker made his first real mistake, a four-foot putt that rimmed. It also was the first time the Oak Hiller went over par at all.

Plays Great Brassie

The end came at the 435-yard 13th. Tucker nearly knocking down the flag-stick with a brassie second, getting an easy four. Critchlow was trapped with his wood second, exploded too strongly, and shook hands.

Maeske, who had afforded the tournament's biggest upset by eliminating Bill Chapin of Oak Hill in the second round, allowed himself to get too far down to Critchlow in the semifinals, and never could quite make up the deficit. Maeske "pecked" at the crucial 17th, topping his second shot and losing the hole when Critchlow holed an 8-footer for a winning 4.

Ward never was up in his morning match with Tucker, although Tucker, putting for a birdie at the first hole, pulled the awful boner of knocking in Ward's ball on a partial stymie. One down at the turn, Ward expired when he messed up the 16th, Tucker standing dormie two and closing out his club-mate with a par at the 17th.

The championship flight consolation was won by Brendan McInerney of the home club, who beat his brother Jack, 4-3 in the finals. The second flight went to Eddie Randall of Genesee Golf Club, who downed Tom Lunt of Lake Shore in a 19-hole battle.

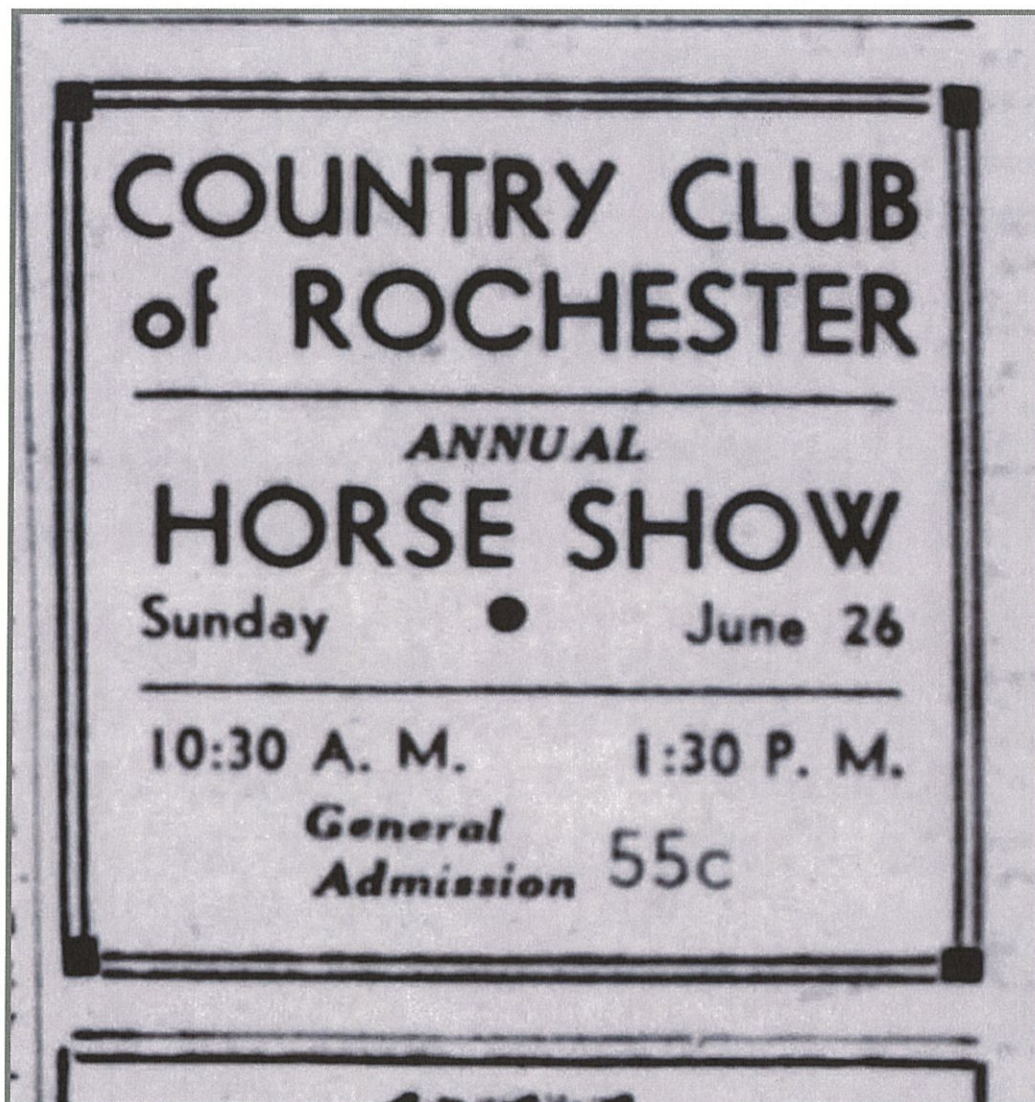

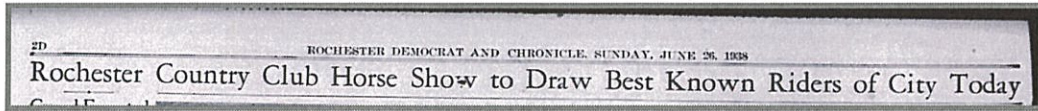

Dudley has been splitting the fairways with his shots this week, playing probably the finest competitive golf of his career. 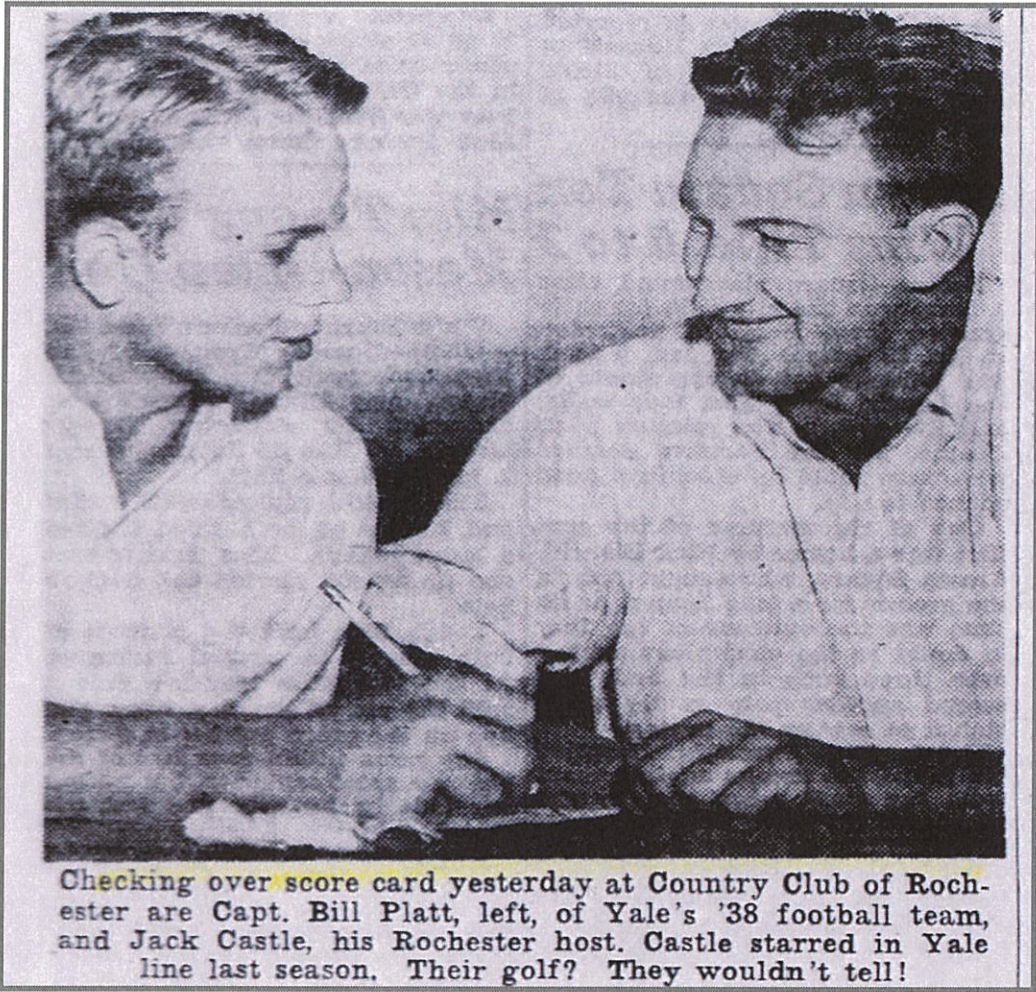

It wasn't a boast by the broad-shouldered, 22-year-old Rye, N. Y., athlete with the pleasing smile and a shock of blond hair, here as a guest of Jack Castle, a former teammate. It was, however, a nice gesture in sidestepping his own achievements on the gridiron.

"Yes," Platt pointed out after he had sunk a long putt with a stroke a la Guldahl, "you can look for Wilson to be on top with the backfield men, unless he is handicapped again by injuries. It was an unfortunate injury that forced him to the sidelines at Yale last year." ♠

Oak Hill and CCR Teams 1st in Tourney

The very fondest golfing ambition cherished by 20-year old Chub McKenna of Oak Hill is to play good golf with or against his dad. Like Walter Hagen Jr., however, young Chub stands somewhat in awe of papa.

But yesterday was a different story. With a brilliant eagle and three valuable birdies reeling off his smoking clubs, Chub paired with Charlie Sr., for a best-ball of 65 at Lake Shore, tying with the Country Club of Rochester team of professional George Christ and amateur Freddy Allen for first prize in Tom Lunt's first annual Pro-Amateur tournament.

The younger McKenna's spectacular golf paid off in dollars and cents, for Charlie collected \$50 for his team's 65, as did George Christ. The two amateurs were well rewarded with merchandise prizes.

Bags Eagle, Birdie

Although Charlie and George played fine golf all the way and richly deserved to win, the work of their amateur partners spelled the difference between being also-rans or winners. Chub rushed to the aid of his dad as early as the fourth hole, a 475-yarder against the wind which the powerful kid reached with two whistling woods and eagled with the aid of a 15-foot putt. At the next hole Chub's No. 8 iron struck the pin off the tee and he holed an easy birdie deuce. Thus on these two holes, where total par is eight, Chub used only five shots.

Again at the 14th, Chub dumped a tremendous 35-footer for a birdie three, putting his team four under par, and at the 17th he clipped a No. 8 iron six feet from the flag for another bird. At this stage, the two McKennas stood five under par, and when Charlie birdied the back-breaking 18th—which was played from a tee 50 yards to the rear of the regular one—it appeared as though the Oak Hillers were "in."

Christ and Allen were still on the course, however, and teaming beautifully.

Freddy had started the round sensationally by holing birdies both at the first and second greens, and he and George made sure of a bird at the 11th by dropping 3's apiece. They had gone out in 32, the same as the McKennas, and arrived at the 18th tee needing a birdie to deadlock the issue.

Allen Birdies 18th

Allen, whose slugging ability comes in handy at the long holes, cracked two long woods to the left of the green, then chipped stony for his birdie.

Christ, who started out by tangling with the orchards and rough but recovered strongly from the tough spots, bore down all the way, as did the careful-swinging McKenna, who holds the Western New York PGA title.

The CCR pro also paired with Jack McInerney Jr., who was in his foursome, for a best-ball of 67, while Brendan McInerney, the fourth member, carded a 70 with George. McKenna's other two partners were Jimmy Weldon, who birdied the last hole for a net eagle with his handicap, finishing with a best-ball of 69, and Jack Tucker, who also had a best-ball of 69. Brendan McInerney, who leaves this morning for the national amateur golf championship at Oakmont, Pa., yesterday won the Country Club of Rochester title for the third time, defeating Tom Lunt in the finals by 5 and 3.

The victory enabled Brendan to obtain permanent possession of the ancient little mug which bears the names of Gurney Curtis and other fine golfers of yesterday.

Jack McInerney Jr., in the midst of his most successful season, has not had the time to practice that Brendan has had, but the elder McInerney owns a compact, short backswing which has paid him dividends this summer.

The third Rochester area qualifier—Vincent Schuster of Dansville and Locust Hill—has already departed for the Pittsburgh and the battle scene. Although only 23, Schuster is no stranger to big-time competition, for he was in the national amateur field two years ago at Garden City, being eliminated in the second round by Langsley, the Britisher. The ebullient Joseph, whose confidence in his golfing ability is matched only by his inability to understand why he is not the national amateur champion, planned a round today at one of the district courses.

Joseph's arrival was almost coincident with that of Clarence (Little Poison) Doser, erstwhile Lake Shore professional now located with the exclusive Merion Cricket Club of Philadelphia. Clarence is stopping off in Rochester with his wife, en route to his winter post at Sarasota, Fla. He said he was feeling fine and expects to be back at Merion for '39. Doser has played little of late, what with a steady schedule of lessons.

The Great Thompson, rapidly on his way to becoming the Max Baer of golf, was laquacious as ever.

"Take my last ten rounds," he said. "Half of them under 70. Worst I had was a 75 at Ancaster'—that's his home club at Hamilton, Ontario—"but it was raining that day and I couldn't get interested."

Big Surprise

Little Joe, who has won the Country Club of Rochester invitation and the Brook-Lea Invitation, in addition to a flock of other tournaments scattered throughout the U. S. and Canada, astounded everybody—excluding himself—during the U. S. National at Oakmont this past summer. He played four straight matches of the most gruelling character, not one of which was finished before the 18th green.

Thompson first accounted for the eminent Ross (Sandy) Somerville, a former U. S. champion and perennial Canadian titlist, at the 18th. The news created consternation and disbelief among Somerville's army of Canuck admirers, but Joe was merely annoyed that sports-writers termed his victory an "upset." In fact, Joseph was so distraught that he promptly eliminated none other than Freddy Haas, American Walker Cupper, in the next round. Then he put out Walter Blevins of Kansas City, arriving at the fourth round as the only foreign contestant left.

You should hear Joe describe how he lost to Pat Abbott, who got to the finals eventually before losing to champion Willie Turnesa.

"I still don't believe it," he said last night. "Here I was, two up and three to play, and practically in the fifth round. Thirty minutes later Abbott and I were on the 20th green and he was holing a putt for a win and I was shaking hands with him. The trouble is that I am the unluckiest golfer in the country. Every time I lose, it's in an extra-hole match or to a 69."

Little Joe neglected to explain how Somerville or Haas felt about it. He thinks Johnny Fischer is the country's best amateur, despite Turnesa's victory.

Bermuda Bound

He expects to get to Bermuda for a while. His brother Nick Jr. is already there, pro at Belmont Manor. After that, a trip to Florida for more golf, and Canada's Little Boy Blue will be ready and eager for the British Amateur. "I been fooling around long enough," he said.

With Joe is his father, Nicol Thompson, a long time and revered figure in professional golf. Old Nicol has been located at Ancaster for many years and is known to nearly every veteran pro in the game.

Steve Riley Nicks Record 63 At Genesee Park New Course

THE lowest round of golf scored in Rochester since George Christ's phenomenal 61 at Country Club of Rochester was negotiated yesterday afternoon by Steve Riley, Rochester's golfing cop.



Steve knocked off a sizzling 63 over Genesee Valley Park's new course, lowering by two shots the old mark held by himself. Previous to that, Heinie Bishop's 66 had been low. The 63 was the hottest of Steve's golf career, being one better than the 64 which won him the Western New York Open title several years ago.

Riley, who is attached to the Franklin Street police station, shot a 34 on the outgoing nine. Coming back, he reeled off successive birdies at the 11th and 12th, did the same thing at the 14th and 15th, then tapered off an unusual day's work by finishing with another birdie—his—sixth—at the 18th. Here he laced a 260-yard tee shot, pitched within 12 feet and holed the putt.

Steve's longest putt was a 15-footer which dropped a deuce at the 14th. An idea of his accuracy is gleaned by the fact that at the 11th he nearly knocked the flagstick down with a No. 5 iron, the ball stopping two feet from the flag for a deuce.



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Was U. of R. Trustee

He was a trustee and chairman of the board of the Colgate-Rochester Divinity School, a trustee of the University of Rochester for 32 years and trustee and secretary of the Rochester Athenaeum and Mechanics Institute for more than 25 years. At the time of his death he was chairman of the institute's executive committee.

A member of First Baptist Church, Mr. Hale also was a member of the board of the American Baptist Home Missionary Society, Phi Beta Kappa, honorary scholastic fraternity; Delta Kappa Epsilon; Genesee Valley Club, Country Club of Rochester and the University Club.

Born in Adams Center, Oct. 6, 1860, Mr. Hale was educated at Hungerford Collegiate Institute, Adams, the private school of George D. Hale, Rochester, and the University of Rochester, where he received an A. B. degree in 1885, and an A. M. degree in 1888. He studied law in the office of Martin W. Cook, Rochester, and was admitted to the bar in 1887.

Tucker Eliminates Zimmerman, 3-2;

Two 19-hole matches in which medalist Eddie Randall narrowly averted the proverbial medalist's fate, and in which defending champion Freddy Allen fell to 18-year-old Jimmy Terry of Stafford Country Club in a resounding upset, rocked the Monroe Golf Club's annual invitation tournament as the semifinal round was gained last evening.

Allen, who represents both the

Allen, who represents both the home club and Country Club of Rochester, passed out of the running yesterday afternoon when the confident, careful Terry caught him at the 19th with a sound par four. Allen, whose tee shot on this hole rolled into a bad lie in the rough, missed his second, pushed his third and finally conceded Terry's four. The latter hit a fine No. 4 iron to the green in two.

Joining Randall and Terry in the semifinals were Woody Sherin, former Iowa player who wears the Monroe colors, and Jack Tucker of Oak Hill.

This morning Randall, Genesee Golf Club veteran, faces Sherin and is favored to reach the finals in the afternoon, while Terry gets another big test against Tucker, the district champion.

Randall Kallies

Randall eliminated Nobel Miller of Canandaigua in the afternoon, one up at the 19th after being two down and two to play. Miller, ordinarily the most reliable of players, failed to get into his iron second at the 17th, losing the hole with a six. Randall squared matters with a perfect par four at the long 18th, and repeated at the extra hole with another four. Miller shot four birdies, yet Randall matched every one.

Sherin put out Bob Adler of Irondequoit in a match which saw neither playing well. One up at the 18th tee, Sherin split the fairway with his tee shot, then pushed into the chocolate drops at the left in two. From there he punched an accurate No. 9 iron to within eight feet from the flag, and dropped the putt for a win.

Tucker disposed of a formidable threat in the afternoon, defeating young Arnold Zimmerman of Blair Academy, N. J., eastern interscholastic champion, by 3 and 2. Zimmerman had ousted Dudley Ward of Oak Hill in the morning, 3 and 1, and was counted on to gain the finals. But although Zimmerman had Tucker down at the start when the latter's putter wobbled, he was unable to maintain his advantage. Tucker overhauled him to stand two up at the turn.

Zimmerman then won both the 10th and 11th to even the match, but three-putted the 12th to go one down again. Tucker went two up with a birdie at the 14th, where he just missed an eagle, and stopped Zimmerman, who will enter Princeton in the fall, by planting a wood 12 feet from the flag at the 16th. Zimmerman messing up the hole for a bogie four.

Allen Putts Poorly

The Allen-Terry match was the big battle of the day. Young Terry, a freshman-to-be at the University of Rochester, had Freddy against the wall all the way. Mike Routs Field By Five Strokes

Mike Parco, Pro Leader, Deadlocks
With Hank Kowal for Second at

Any lingering doubt as to who is playing the best golf in Rochester was completely dissipated yesterday afternoon as 23-year-old Mike Ferentz, fairly bristling with confidence, ran away with the annual Genesee Valley Open golf championship.

Little Mike, the pride of Locust Hill, tore the venerable Genesee fairways apart with a scorching 67 for his second round. With his 72 of the morning, this gave him a 56-hole total of 139 blows, and made the second straight year that an amateur has won the tournament.

The defending champion, Henry (Hank) Kowal of Utica, played fine golf through a sodden day of heavy rains, but his total of 144 couldn't touch Little Mike.

Kowal's 144 was matched by Mike Parco, professional at a Buffalo driving course. Parco was the lowest-scoring pro, but his feat afforded scant satisfaction to the professional boys, who were forced into a back seat, because Kowal also is an amateur.

Outclassed Field

The day was entirely a Ferentz day. No one could touch him, and the confident manner with which Little Mike pounded all his shots left little doubt in the minds of his supporters as to who was going to win. Mike not only won, but he routed a field of the finest professionals and many of the best amateurs in Western and Central New York.

Thus Ferentz, who only a week or so ago shared a three-way tie for the Central New York Open title, proved that a golfer can overcome the handicap of height, weight and—what is more important—the lack of a job. Mike has not worked for several months.

Mike did not take the lead until the first nine holes of his afternoon round, for his morning card of 72 was bettered by three 71's, scored by Kowal, Parco and Mac Furgal, unheralded Utica pro. But the little bomber from Jefferson Road hitched up his pants on the third nine, chewed off a three-under-par 34 and had the field licked then and
