CITY ROARS '41 WELCOME IN BIG STYLE

Frolickers Jam Downtown Area For Hours

The town literally and figuratively "blew its top" last night.

In a New Years Eve celebration unprecedented for years, and in the downtown section probably never surpassed, Rochester welcomed in the New Year 1941 with a hasty show of cheer that wholly belied whatever misgivings she may have had about what is in store during that New Year.

For at least a few hours the city forgot the trials and tribulations of the last year, cleared from its mind the troublesome thoughts occasioned by what's happening in Europe, donned paper hats, blew frantically on tin horns, and spent plenty of money making certain that it had a good time.

But all was not wild excitement, for, as every year, there were those who preferred to watch the old year out and the new in in the quiet of their home, or at a number of Watch Night services held by city churches and churches in nearby communities. In these services the peculiar seriousness of this particular turn of the year was manifest.

Started Early

In the downtown section, however, was bedlam. The noise started as early as 9 o'clock last night as the ware of tin horn vendors began to get distribution. Gradually it increased until with 15 minutes of the old year still to go the uproar seemed in full swing, particularly at the corner of Main Street East and Clinton Avenue South where the wildest demonstration in the downtown section took place.

That last 15 minutes of 1940 proved a mere rehearsal, however. With a roar of firecrackers, automobile horns, sirens and any noise-making device that could be obtained there was a roar at midnight that didn't begin to subside until nearly a half hour later. And from then on there were sporadic crescendos at intervals well into the morning.

Traffic, as usual, jammed, only more so this year. Automobiles of every description, including some of ancient vintage seldom seen in the downtown area, jammed the streets. Everybody and his brother seemed to be at the wheel of a car, and if there were any more cars in the family the uncles and aunts must have had them. All firmly held down their horn buttons as they crept, sometimes inches in minutes, through the jam.

Clubs Crowded

Genesee Valley Club members to the number of 400—the same as last year, and capacity—got an added treat in the presentation of a number of specialties by the University of Pennsylvania's Mask and Wig Club, which earlier in the evening had given its annual performance at the Eastman Theater.

Also entertaining the same number of celebrants as last year—because as in other places, no more could get in—was Oak Hill Country Club, where Mrs. Ruth Jones, manager, reported a sellout attendance of more than 500. Oak Hillers danced to a New York orchestra imported for the occasion, and were notified of the arrival of the New Year by loud blasts of a fire siren and a deluge of hundreds of balloons from the ceiling.

Also jammed were the Country Club of Rochester and various other smaller clubs which held open house for New Years Eve. Though it had no planned celebration, Hotel Rochester reported all facilities strained to the utmost to care for the throngs of patrons

Brook-Lea, CCR Rated Toughest Courses In District

If, as seems likely, the Rochester District Golf Association adopts the Chicago District system of handicapping, it seems certain that Brook-Lea will receive the highest par rating, perhaps at 73, with the Country Club of Rochester alone in second position at 72.

. . . backs handicap shift

Jim Weldon of Oak Hill, who has been boosting the shift in handicapping advocated by the late Clint Patchen, is outspoken in his belief that a handicap program based on the par ratings, rather than too-elastic pars of RDGA member clubs, would eliminate almost all the evils of the present system—eliminate, too, the consistent attacks made on the current plan.

He points to the par 70 Country Club as an outstanding example. The tortuous East Avenue layout is, in his opinion and the opinion of other district players contacted, second only to the par 73 Brook-Lea course in difficulty here. But the 70 strokes allotted as regulation figures fall below most other courses by a stroke or two.

The par ratings, of course, are based on difficulty of the various links in the district. The long and difficult par 3 holes at the CCR supply one reason for the respect with which the course is regarded. Perfect hitting will nullify that problem, but then perfect hitting would do the same anywhere, and the handicap program is not essentially for the benefit of the near-perfect golfers.

Miss Betsy MacLeod, champion of the organization for the last four years, carded 45-44-89 and Mrs. Walter Lyons of Oak Hill, Rochester, runnerup to Betsy in 1939 and 1940, put together a pair of 45's.

Mrs. Louis F. Gadbois of Transit Valley was the Class A low net winner with a score of 94-11-83.

Mrs. William O'Shaunessey of Meadowbrook had the best round of the Class B players, a 96 and Mrs. J. F. Brown of Bartlett Country Club, Olean, captured the net prize on a round of 100-19-81. Mrs. Regis O'Brien of Transit Valley had a score of 104 in Class C for gross laurels and Mrs. Harry L. White of the Park Club, took the net award with 106-23-83.

Comisso posted his 74 in the morning, hitting 28-36 for his score, and then fired a pair of 77s in the afternoon for his qualifying 150 figure.

The Country Club representative, Christ, played 37-40 on both his rounds for his 154.

Zavodny Starts Well
Trish took a 41 coming in on his morning round, but scored 38's on his three other nines for his 135 total. Zavodny started out in even figures the first nine, hitting 25 for the nine, but took 40, 39 and 43 the rest of the way.

COUNTRY CLUB LINKS INVITATION OPENS FRIDAY

FIELD OF 150 EXPECTED FOR 3-DAY EVENT

Russell to Defend Crown; Tucker Eyes No. 3

Rochester's major golf tournament season will open Friday, when approximately 150 clubswingers from all over the East swing into action in the qualifying round of the Country Club of Rochester Invitation.

That fixture in Rochester's links firmament, with the 17th tourney in the series on tap, will have only one two-time champion in the field, Private Jack Tucker of Uncle Sam's Country Club, Fort Stewart, Ga., winner in 1938-39 and runner up in a 19-hole final match last year.

Henry Russell of Washington, who last year entered from Duke University and won the title in his first appearance at the Country Club, will be back seeking a repeat, while Oak Hill's Bill Chapin, 1936 winner, probably will be the only other ex-titlist in the field.

Expects More Entries

A pair of invited "name" players who will be unable to make the contention are Francis Osimet of Boston, former National Amateur and Open winner, and Syracuse's "Trailer Bill" Holt, now in New England, but their absence will be more than compensated for by the balanced strength of the competing field.

Leon Sage, CCR tournament chairman, expects the customary wave of late entries which generally pours in from out-of-town on the last few days before the tournament, and points out that Monday and Tuesday mail of the tournament week always produces powerful entries. He expects the field to approximate the 150 who competed last year, although the draft and defense demands may cut into it somewhat.

Among the players who will be watched particularly will be Carl Snively, Cornell's football mentor who also is a 6-handicap golfer. It will be Coach Carl's first appearance in individual competition here, although he has played in the Brook-Loa Invitation, a best-ball event in the past.

Dr. George Trainor, current champion of district golfers on the strength of his victories last year in the HDGA, Monroe and Buffalo Country Club Invitations and Monroe club tourney, will be No. 1 local entrant, but there is a long list of other formidable players slated to support him in an effort to chalk up Rochester's seventh triumph in the tournament.

Ferentz Eyes Event

Among those expected to be Mike Ferentz, USCC mate of Tucker's, who at last reports hoped to reach Rochester with Tucker Wednesday. The home club entry will include Fred Allen, Brendan McInerney and possibly Jack McInerney Jr.

Two low handicap golfers from Liverpool, Ohio, who will be making their first appearances in the Country Club test, Everson Hall and Joe Wells Jr., will rank well up among the favorites. Hall, a former Yale player, sports a handicap of two and Wells is allowed one more stroke.


Charlie Christopher of Chicago, quarter-finalist last year and another 2-handicapper, will be back, as will the veteran Raynor Gardiner of Boston, a contestant for many years who describes his handicap as "6 plus age plus a quick hook."

Among the other recent entries whose handicaps indicate they must be figured well up among the list of choices to qualify for the championship flight are Capt. N. C. Hodgkin of Kentucky Military Institute in Lyndon, Ky., and Harlow Weitz of Jefferson County Golf Club in Watertown. Stan Emerick of Oswego, carrying a 5 "spot" will be back this year and may skip the seniors' event, in which he had a 36-hole medal of 153 last year, for the match play divisions.

Pairings for the tournament will be made Thursday night, with an 18-hole qualifying round scheduled for Friday and the four rounds of match play planned for Saturday and Sunday.

With the course reported in top-flight condition, entries will find its par 70 a searching test. While 68 is the amateur course record, no player has managed to come closer than two strokes to that figure in the qualifying round in the past.

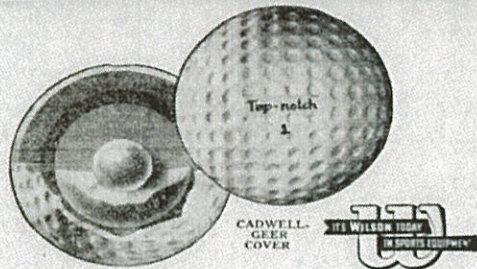

10th Hole Troublesome

The 10th, which cuts back across the creek, was loaded with trouble. Roughed off the tee, Mrs. Trainor found it even worse further down the fairway when she pulled an iron into the trap. She failed to get out on her first attempt and settled for a six. On the short 11th, she almost sank a chip from the trap, getting her par three. And on the uphill 12th, she knocked another of her niblicks a foot from the pin for another par.

Too many approaches on the 574-yard 13th, where only two bogies were counted all day, cost the Monroe ace a seven.

She parred the scary 14th, hitting a solid five iron to the green for her second shot. A six iron on the 125-yard 15th brought another regulation figure for the card, and she followed with two more even figures on 16 and 17.

Finishing added strength on the 423-yard home hole, Mrs. Trainor hit a drive and brassie 10 feet from the pin, barely missing her eagle and settling for a birdie four for the 81.

The Country Club of Rochester star, Miss Darcy Macomber, trailed the winner by five shots. Miss Darcy, first off the tee in yesterday's early morning dew, played 13 holes under summer rules before being informed that the rest of the field was observing winter rules. Unfortunately she already had counted three sevens.

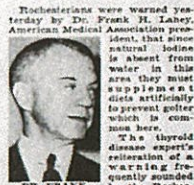

Rochester Area Lacks Natural Iodine, Thyroid Disease Expert Warns

Of Food Drive Objective

Rochesterians were warned yesterday by Dr. Frank H. Lohrey, American Medical Association president, that since natural iodine is absent from water in this area they must supplement diets artificially to prevent goiter which is common here.

The thyroid disease expert's reiteration of a warning frequently sounded by the Rochester Health Bureau recalled that for a time the city injected iodine into its water mains, but discontinued the practice as too expensive and in favor of recommended use of iodized salt for table and cooking.

Use of iodized salt in iodine-deficient areas such as Rochester is one of the cardinal goals of the nutrition-for-defense program, Dr. Lohrey said at Strong Memorial Hospital where he held a clinic for University of Rochester Medical School students.

Asks for Moratorium

In two other lectures during a busy day here, the head of Boston's Lohrey Clinic:

1—Tipped at a Country Club of Rochester dinner that labor, for one, and government itself emulate the medical profession's example in declaring a moratorium on "internal discord" in the interests of needed national unity during the emergency.

2—Asserted before the Academy of Medicine that many persons die needlessly from cancer of the lower digestive organs because they ignore nature's clear warnings and seek surgical aid too late to benefit from improved surgical techniques.

In discussing goiter before medical students Dr. Lohrey recalled that compulsory use of iodized salt in Iowa areas virtually wiped out goiter, and had the amazing effect of increasing the average height of conscripts by an inch and one-half.

The surgeon disclosed that in a decade surgical mortality in goiter cases has shrunk from 10 per cent to less than 1 per cent, an accomplishment which he declared removes the last excuse for procrastination where surgery is needed. It is necessary, he said, in cases of toxic goiter, where heart, liver and the general system are being damaged, and in the tumor goiter which leads to cancer of the thyroid.

Outlines New Agency

Before physicians at the Country Club dinner Dr. Lohrey outlined the new physicians' procurement and assignment agency affiliated with the Federal Security Administration, of which he is chairman. Besides providing physicians for armed forces it will protect community medical services, he said. The nation will need 3,000 physicians for defense immediately. This will require large medical school classes, and the University of Rochester, for example, did increase the entering class this year by 20 per cent, he commented.

Recalling that organized medicine had been torn by internal differences as to types of medical care, Dr. Lohrey declared that internal discord has been completely eliminated so that the profession could unite solidly behind the government in the emergency. And this, he added, is a lesson which other groups, notably labor, and the government itself might heed in promoting national unity.

At the Academy of Medicine the AMA head reviewed end results of a series of 1,200 operations for cancer of the large bowel, explaining that 20 per cent of cases had had no recurrence five years after operation. He declared that cancer in that area definitely yields to early treatment; moreover it gives the sufferer so much advance warning that it is "unavoidable" if he seeks advice too late. A study of 250 cases showed the same early danger signals, among them passage of blood and irregularity, Dr. Lohrey said.

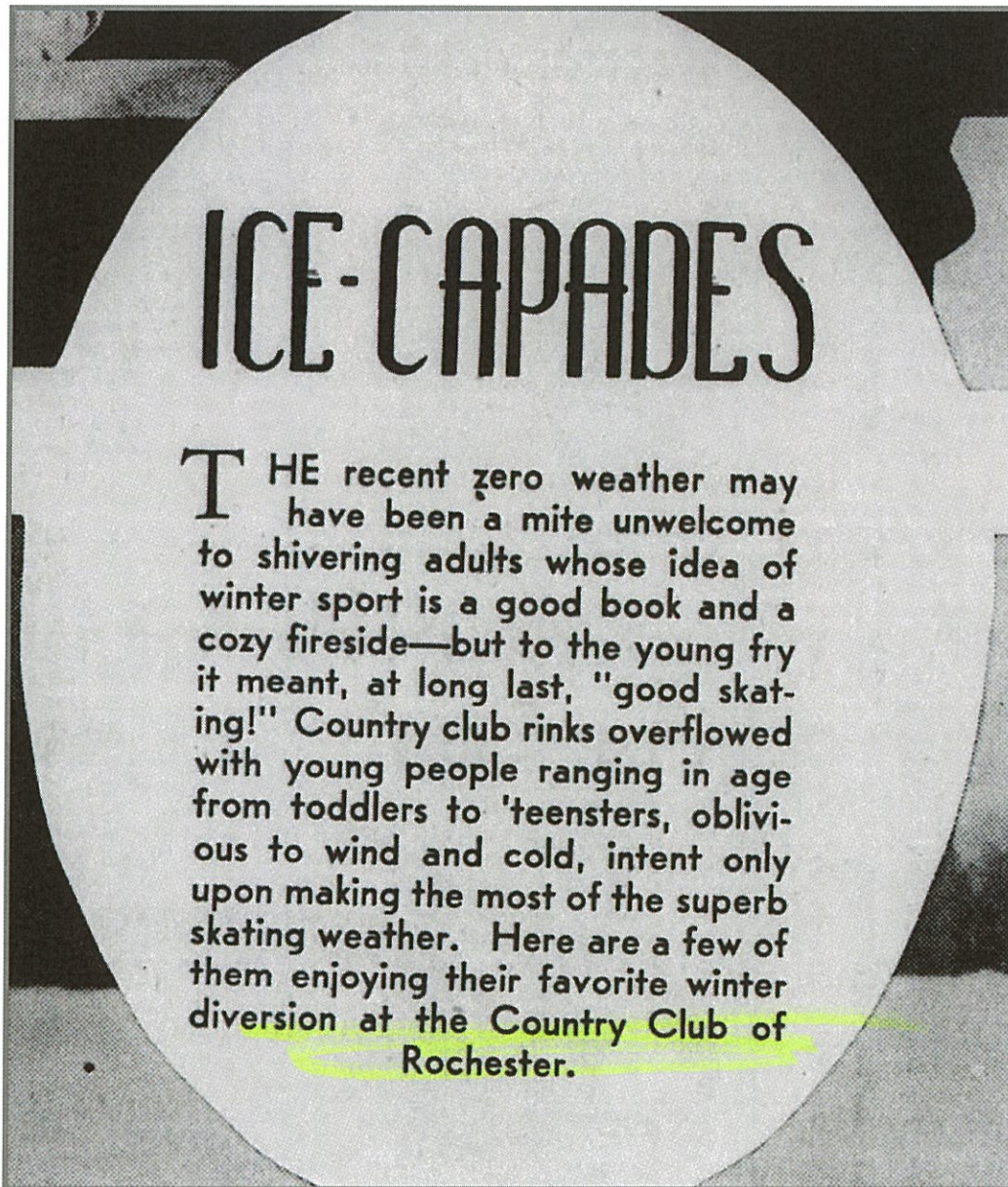

WAR IS CITED AS CAUSE OF TOURNEY BAN

CCR's Invitation Also Likely to Be Halted

In a move which occasioned no surprise, but which added another to the list of golf events hit hard by the present world conflict, the Monroe Golf Club board of governors last night voted unanimously to abandon its Invitation golf tournament for the duration of the war.

The Invitation, in its five years of existence, had skyrocketed to a place as one of the most popular of the Rochester area's annual tournament fixtures, and leaves the Rochester District Golf Association's championship test as the only individual match play tournament definitely scheduled for male golfers here this summer.

(The Country Club of Rochester Invitation has not definitely been abandoned, but there seems little likelihood that it will be held. CCR officials already have gone on record that the tournament would not be held on as large a scale as in previous years, but there remains a bare possibility that a curtailed tourney will be staged sometime this summer).

It had been believed that Monroe's governors would drop the Invitation, but some hope had been held out that the tourney could be held on a smaller scale than in the past.

Cliff Goodrich won last year's tourney, while previous winners included Dr. George Trainor and Jack Tucker, both in the armed forces now. Arnold Zimmerman of Bath and Fred Allen.—LILLICH.

Country Club Votes To Stage Invitation

THE Country Club of Rochester's board of governors voted last night to hold the CCR Invitation golf tournament in honor of George Christ's 25th anniversary as professional at the club, which falls next month. No dates have been set for the tournament as yet.

There had been some doubt that the event would be held, because of war conditions. Tuesday night Monroe Golf Club voted to drop its Invitation, but the CCR governors decided that the tourney would be a fine tribute to Christ.

This year's tourney will be the 18th CCR Invitation. Last year's event was won by Jimmy Hassman of Dansville.

In addition, he held the Western New York PGA title five straight seasons, the Central New York crown, and qualified several times for both the National Open and PGA meets. A wrenched muscle in the 1928 U. S. Open cut short his rating as a topflight national player, but he has remained one of the most feared of area competitors.

Included among the assistants who have aided him during his long term at the Country Club were Russ Farnum, now out of golf; Clarence Doser, Godfrey McGarvey and George Collins.

TRAINOR, GOODRICH SHARE INVITATION MEDAL

EACH BAGS 72 WITH TORRID FINAL ROUND

Bill Chapin Fires
73 at CCR—
Robinson 74

Dr. George Trainor, who yesterday received orders to report July 14 as a Medical Corps captain, and Cliff Goodrich, the beloved "Skippy" of Brook-Lea, staged torrid finishes yesterday to share medal honors in the 18th annual Country Club Invitation golf tournament.

Trainor, home early in the afternoon, started out with a mediocre 28, dropped a fourth stroke on the par 35-35-70 course to regulation figures at the 15th, but regained two strokes with a blazing finish as he birdied the 17th and 18th holes with 3's.

Goodrich, just beating the shadows home, was even more spectacular on the back nine. Out in a shaky 40 strokes, five over par, Goodrich tossed in three straight birds in the closing stages of his round. They came at the 15th, 16th and 17th holes, and Cliff missed a difficult 20-footer at No. 18 which would have given his solitary medal honors.

Neither Goodrich nor Trainor depended on his putting for his finale, although each rammed down a 10-footer in the course of his finish. "It was the chip shots," each declared in explaining the fine climax to his round. Their cards:

Performances of the co-medallists overshadowed such highlights as the fine 73 turned in by RDGA Champion Bill Chapin in a marked reversal of form after a month of poor golf, and the fact that eight players tied for five places at 77. The resulting playoff was at the lowest qualifying score in the history of the CCR classic.

Jack Johnston of Durand, one of the 77 shooters, left for work immediately after his round and missed the playoff. S. P. Connor of the Country Club dropped out on the first playoff hole (the 17th) with a 6, and his clubmate, Brendan McInerney, turned in a 5 at the next hole to fall to the second flight.

Slipping in under the wire on the playoff were Bill Welsh of Genesee, Carl Gath of Lake Shore, Owen Luckhurst of Ridgemont and Bob Allen and Jack Yockel of Brook-Lea.
Brook-Lea golfers dominated the qualifier, with five players—Goodrich, Danny Gaskill with 76, Gene Robinson with a fourth place 74 and Allen and Yockel—in the title flight.
Jacobs 'In' at 75
Del Jacobs, Midvale veteran who was playing only his fourth 18-hole round of the season, came in under the wire at a popular figure—75—at which Bill Cory of Durand, Sam Ferentz of Midvale and Harold Landt of Buffalo Country Club also qualified. Landt was the only non-local linksman to make the championship flight, adding to the all-Rochester hue which the tournament has for the first time in over a decade.
Irv Maeske of Durand, beaten eight winner of a year ago; and Fred Allen, last year's medalist and only host club player to qualify, were the remaining members of the first 16.
The tournament, being staged in honor of George Christ, now serving his 25th season as head CCR pro, gave indications of immediate fireworks in the first round.
The medalists were due for acid tests, Goodrich against Maeske and Trainor against Gaskill. The latter, two-time RDGA king, is one of the most feared match play golfers in the district.
Chapin vs. Allen
Highlight of the first round play, however, may come in the duel between those perennial golf feudists and off-course buddies—RDGA Champion Chapin and Fred Allen, who knows every blade of grass (and grain of sand) on the East Avenue layout.
It was probably the last tournament of the duration for Trainor. A lieutenant in the Medical Corps, he is due to become a captain when he reports for duty in Louisiana the week after next. The CCR Invitation, too, is the only major local title which has escaped his grasp in the last three years, during which he took the Monroe Invitation, RDGA, Buffalo Country Club Invitation and Monroe Club title.
