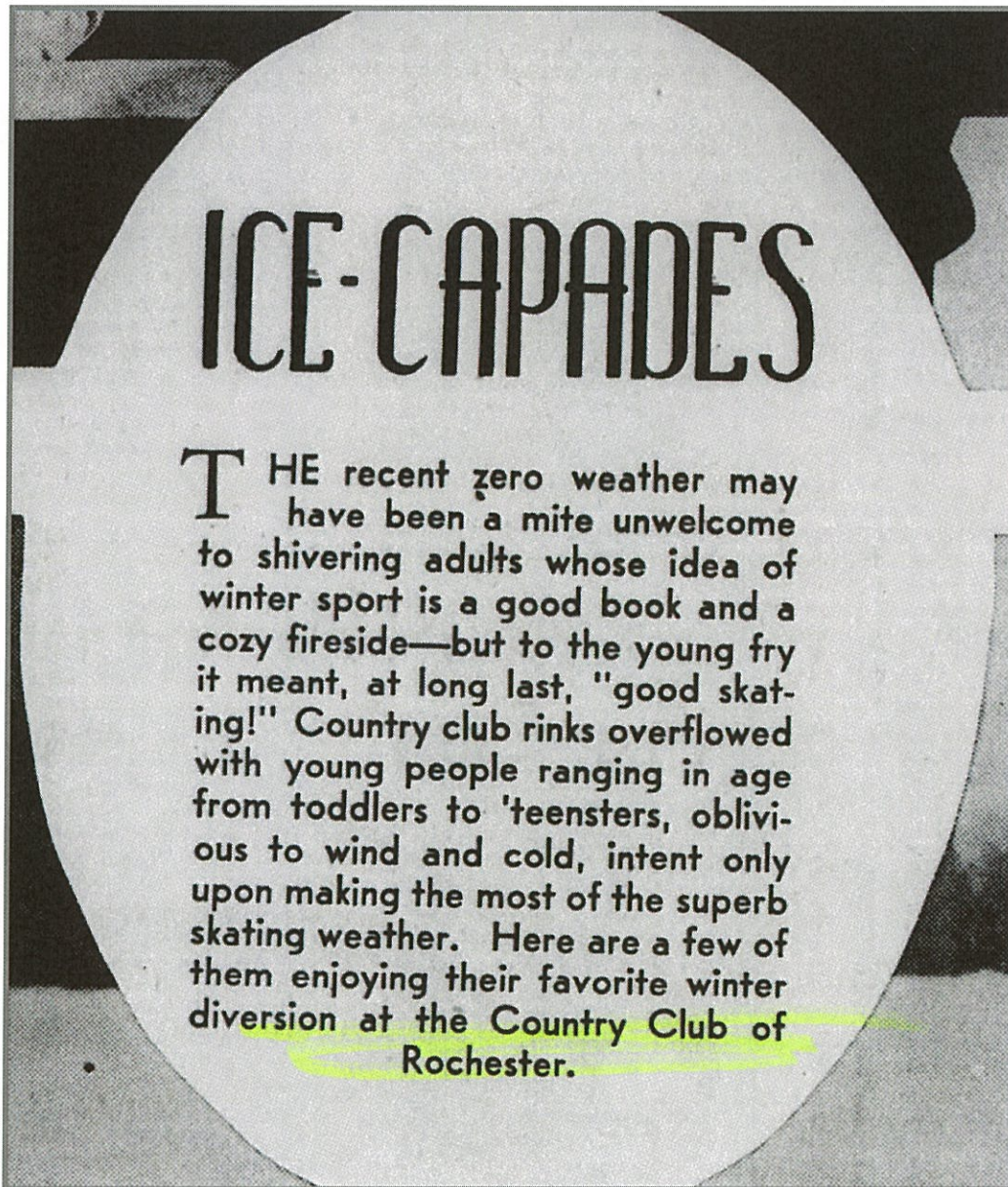


## Leonora H. Rees Plans Nuptials

## Area Horsemen Hear Plans For Show at DCAA Dinner

Riders and exhibitors who helped to build the fame of the old Rochester Horse Show and a generation of newcomers last night set the stage for a new era of showmanship on the Edgerton Park paddock when they rallied at the Hotel

Seneca for a dinner sponsored by The Democrat and Chronicle Athletic Association.

The cry of a Kentucky tobacco auctioneer, who slipped in through the storm from the bluegrass region of Lexington to make a speech, typified the rousing spirit with which horsemen discussed the new Rochester Horse Show Association, which Commerce Commissioner Harold S. W. MacFarlin hailed as a community morale builder.

The visitor was George Swinbroad, auctioneer of horses as well as tobacco and associate editor of The National Horseman, who told the citizens that Rochester has all the makings of one of the best shows in the country "dropped in your lap."

MacFarlin was there to tell the sponsoring group that the city would furnish the Edgerton Park arena on a cost basis and declared that the city administration is deeply interested in the project because under the nation's defense program the officials are charged with doing what they can for civilian morale.

The commissioner also called attention to the fact that The Democrat and Chronicle Athletic Association by furnishing equipment for last year's show, which was virtually rained out, had put the new association "years ahead" in its efforts.

Movies of the horse show of 1932, the last of the glamorous era in the former Exposition Park, stirred ripples of recognition from the audience, which included a few stars of that show, namely Mrs. Robert A. Messier 2d, the former Jane Allen; Fred von Lambeck, recently elected member of the DCAA Hall of Fame, who is recovering from injuries received in an indoor horse show in Buffalo in January; Joseph F. Weller, master of the Country Club of Rochester Hunt, and Frank Snyder of Avon.

Master of ceremonies last night was Deputy Commerce Commissioner Harry J. Gaynor, and among those at the speakers' table were Mrs. Freeman C. Allen, one of the city's foremost horse show fans; Walter von Lambeck, veteran exhibitor; James Green of Clarence, another exhibitor, and Harry Davidson, a Clevelander well known to local exhibitors. Among others present were Mr. and Mrs. Charles B. Tinker of Ithaca, Max and Bob Glover of Geneseo, and a great number of the Rochesterians best known to horse show fans. In all nearly 200 were present.

In a telegram from Florida, W. Dewey Crittenden, president of the DCAA, expressed confidence that this year's show, planned for June, will be successful without doubt "if the weatherman co-operates as well as the horsemen" and announced a plan for aiding the Red Cross with the proceeds.

The citizen group which with the DCAA is sponsoring the horse show revival includes M. R. MacGregor, Albert T. Churchill, W. McKay Patterson, Thomas F. Trutt, Edwin C. Kesel, Herbert G. Rogers, Frank Snyder, Edward Dickinson, Fred von Lambeck and Mary Louise Bock.

## WAR IS CITED AS CAUSE OF TOURNEY BAN

### CCR's Invitation Also Likely to Be Halted

In a move which occasioned no surprise, but which added another to the list of golf events hit hard by the present world conflict, the Monroe Golf Club board of governors last night voted unanimously to abandon its Invitation golf tournament for the duration of the war.

The Invitation, in its five years of existence, had skyrocketed to a place as one of the most popular of the Rochester area's annual tournament fixtures, and leaves the Rochester District Golf Association's championship test as the only individual match play tournament definitely scheduled for male golfers here this summer.

(The Country Club of Rochester Invitation has not definitely been abandoned, but there seems little likelihood that it will be held. CCR officials already have gone on record that the tournament would not be held on as large a scale as in previous years, but there remains a bare possibility that a curtailed tourney will be staged sometime this summer).

It had been believed that Monroe's governors would drop the Invitation, but some hope had been held out that the tourney could be held on a smaller scale than in the past.

Cliff Goodrich won last year's tourney, while previous winners included Dr. George Trainor and Jack Tucker, both in the armed forces now. Arnold Zimmerman of Bath and Fred Allen.—LILLICH.

Included among the assistants who have aided him during his long term at the Country Club were Russ Farnum, now out of golf; Clarence Doser, Godfrey McGarvey and George Collins.

Dr. George Trainor, who yesterday received orders to report July 14 as a Medical Corps captain, and Cliff Goodrich, the beloved "Skippy" of Brook-Lea, staged torrid finishes yesterday to share medal honors in the 18th annual Country Club Invitation golf tournament.

Trainor, home early in the afternoon, started out with a mediocre 28, dropped a fourth stroke on the par 35-35-70 course to regulation figures at the 15th, but regained two strokes with a blazing finish as he birdied the 17th and 18th holes with 3's.

Goodrich, just beating the shadows home, was even more spectacular on the back nine. Out in a shaky 40 strokes, five over par, Goodrich tossed in three straight birds in the closing stages of his round. They came at the 15th, 16th and 17th holes, and Cliff missed a difficult 20-footer at No. 18 which would have given his solitary medal honors.

Neither Goodrich nor Trainor depended on his putting for his finale, although each rammed down a 10-footer in the course of his finish. "It was the chip shots," each declared in explaining the fine climax to his round. Their cards:

Performances of the co-medallists overshadowed such highlights as the fine 73 turned in by RDGA Champion Bill Chapin in a marked reversal of form after a month of poor golf, and the fact that eight players tied for five places at 77. The resulting playoff was at the lowest qualifying score in the history of the CCR classic.

Jack Johnston of Durand, one of the 77 shooters, left for work immediately after his round and missed the playoff. S. P. Connor of the Country Club dropped out on the first playoff hole (the 17th) with a 6, and his clubmate, Brendan McInerney, turned in a 5 at the next hole to fall to the second flight.

Slipping in under the wire on the playoff were Bill Welsh of Genesee, Carl Gath of Lake Shore, Owen Luckhurst of Ridgemont and Bob Allen and Jack Yockel of Brook-Lea.  
Brook-Lea golfers dominated the qualifier, with five players—Goodrich, Danny Gaskill with 76, Gene Robinson with a fourth place 74 and Allen and Yockel—in the title flight.  
**Jacobs 'In' at 75**  
Del Jacobs, Midvale veteran who was playing only his fourth 18-hole round of the season, came in under the wire at a popular figure—75—at which Bill Cory of Durand, Sam Ferentz of Midvale and Harold Landt of Buffalo Country Club also qualified. Landt was the only non-local linksman to make the championship flight, adding to the all-Rochester hue which the tournament has for the first time in over a decade.  
Irv Maeske of Durand, beaten eight winner of a year ago; and Fred Allen, last year's medalist and only host club player to qualify, were the remaining members of the first 16.  
The tournament, being staged in honor of George Christ, now serving his 25th season as head CCR pro, gave indications of immediate fireworks in the first round.  
The medalists were due for acid tests, Goodrich against Maeske and Trainor against Gaskill. The latter, two-time RDGA king, is one of the most feared match play golfers in the district.  
**Chapin vs. Allen**  
Highlight of the first round play, however, may come in the duel between those perennial golf feudists and off-course buddies—RDGA Champion Chapin and Fred Allen, who knows every blade of grass (and grain of sand) on the East Avenue layout.  
It was probably the last tournament of the duration for Trainor. A lieutenant in the Medical Corps, he is due to become a captain when he reports for duty in Louisiana the week after next. The CCR Invitation, too, is the only major local title which has escaped his grasp in the last three years, during which he took the Monroe Invitation, RDGA, Buffalo Country Club Invitation and Monroe Club title.

## Commisso Shares 2nd Place with O'Grady

George Christ, Country Club of Rochester veteran who is celebrating his 25th season as head pro at the CCR, yesterday added another link to his chain of Western New York PGA championships.

Despite a high wind which sent scores soaring, Christ toured Ridge-mont's par-72 layout in 72 and 76 shots yesterday for a 148 total to win his sixth championship. He dethroned Frank Commisso of Irondequoit, five-time title and de-fending WNYC king, who finished a stroke back at 149, in a tie for second place with Leo O'Grady, Transit Valley entry.

O'Grady and Commisso accounted for the only subpar rounds of the day with strong afternoon finishes, O'Grady netting a 70 after a disastrous morning 79, and Commisso tacking on a 71 to his morning 78.

### Fires Up Big Lead

The tournament, probably the last for the duration of the war, drew more than a dozen pros, sur-prisingly large in the face of re-cently adopted gasoline rationing. Only nine of these turned in scores, however, and Christ, sporting a six-stroke lead at the finish of the morning round, nearly made the event a rout until he faltered on the last three holes.

Christ last strokes to par at the 24th and 25th holes as he finished 253, and both Commisso and O'Grady, burning up the third nine with two-under-par 24's, had a chance to overtake him.

Commisso had bogies at the 20th and 22nd holes and even a bird at No. 23 wasn't enough to pull him even. O'Grady apparently had an even better chance of catching the CCR pro, coming up to the 25th tee needing only a pair of pars for a 69 and a deadlock for top money. But O'Grady slipped to a five and finished with a regulation five at the 26th to wind up in the second place tie.

### Slips On Final Nine

Christ, hitting his irons with machine-like precision, played steady golf for 27 holes, at which time he was even par. His last four strokes on the final nine, but his consistent play, had built enough of a margin to coast to the triumph. Leaders' cards:

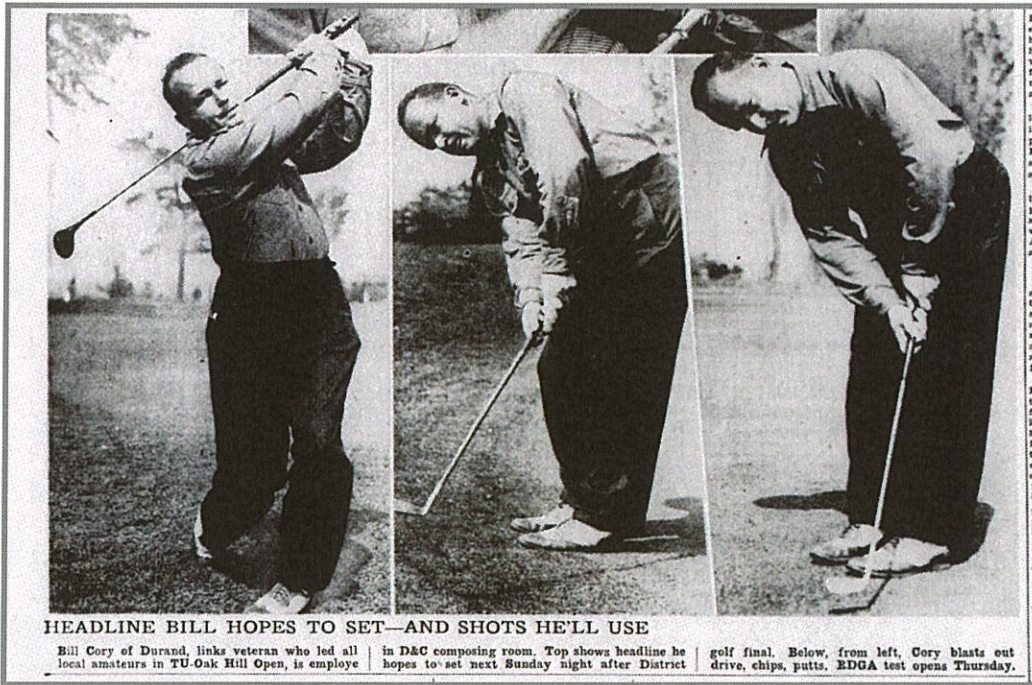

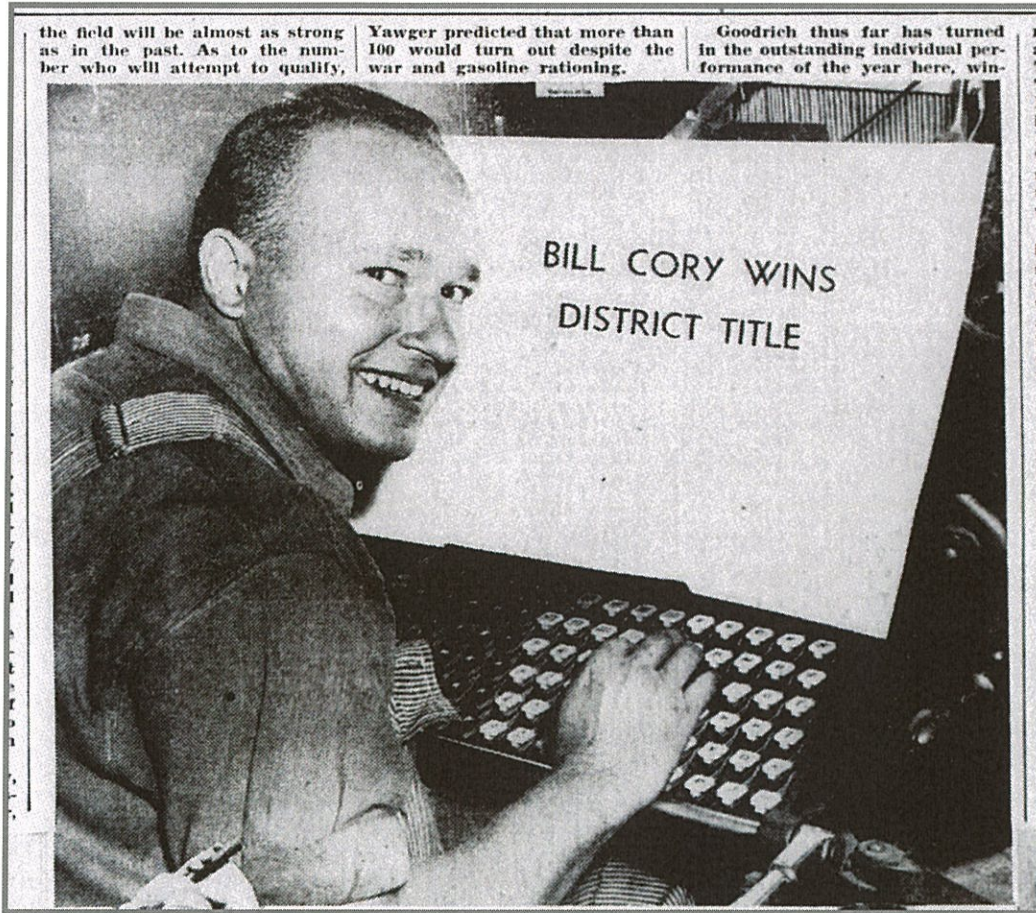

Goodrich, Monroe Invitation titlist in '41 who this summer won the only previous important match play tournament here this year when he annexed the Country Club Invitation, remained one of the prime favorites for the championship when he won a pair of matches. Goodrich defeated Frank Weis of Genesee in the morning, 3 and 2, and then barely outlasted Sam Ferentz of Midvale in a fine match, 1 up.

Gaskill was a first round victim of Jack Hamill of Genesee at the 20th green in the morning, the latter sinking a curling 20-footer to close out the two-time former winner of the crown. Hamill then went on to eliminate Bob Wegman in the second round, 5 and 4, to gain the quarter-finals.

## The Sports Trail...

### British Golf Fans Recall Hagen's Links Feats --And Antics

By WHITNEY MARTIN

NEW YORK — (AP) — Fred Corcoran is home on furlough from his duties as director of Red Cross sports programs in England, his busy head jam-packed with memories of experiences, ideas for improving his service to servicemen, and stories of English experiences of famed American sports figures, such as Gene Sarazen and Bobby Jones and Walter Hagen.

This magazine had a caricature of a grinning, carefree Hagen on the cover, with the notation: "The most bizarre champion the game has ever known."

The story inside, which does not necessarily mean it's an inside story, is titled: "Hagen Finishes!" and deals more with his colorful cockiness than his well-known accomplishments.

It points out that Sir Walter was a colorful character, literally, from his first appearance at a major tournament. That was in 1912. The senior pro at the Country Club of Rochester (N.Y.), discouraged the youthful Hagen from entering the U. S. National Open, but that did not prevent Walter from showing up at the meet just to see what went on. He showed up in a pair of grey flannels, a striped silk shirt, a gaudy bandana tied cowboy fashion around his neck, and a vividly checkered cap.

Particularly Walter Hagen, as that gaudy individual had the knack of doing things and saying things that caught the fancy of the public and long will be remembered.

In fact, there wasn't room enough in Corcoran's head for all the Hagen yarns. Some he carried on top, like a spare head of hair. Just before he left he had picked up a small golf magazine and stuffed it in the crown of his service cap, forgetting it until he arrived here.

This magazine had a caricature of a grinning, carefree Hagen on the cover, with the notation: "The most bizarre champion the game has ever known."

### **'Haig' Lived Up to His Confidence**

His triumphs, both sartorial and in golf, came later, and stories of his unbounded confidence, not to mention his escapades, are told and retold in England and Scotland.

There is the time, for instance, when he went to the first tee for his final round to win his last British Open championship at Muirfield and remarked casually: "How about a 67?" A 67 it was, smashing the course record and setting a new low for a round in the event.

It was quite customary for him to enter a locker room before a tournament, gaze about confidently, and remark: "Well, who's going to finish second?"

### **Always a Gambler, Playing to Win**

He was always a links gambler. That is, his motto was, "Never play a shot safe. When your opponent is in trouble go for everything." At St. Anne's, in 1926, coming up to the last green he had one more shot to play to tie Bobby Jones. He played a full mashie in the desperate gamble of holing out. He meant to be in the hole or past it.

He over-ran the cup, went in a bunker and took two to get out. If he had played it safe he would have finished as the first pro, as Jones won. Asked why he had taken the chance, he said philosophically:

"I wanted to be first or nowhere . . . to be second and leading professional cut no ice with me."

Rochester's Brig. Gen. Edward Peck Curtis, now stationed in North Africa, pinned a Distin-

gushed Flying Cross on an airman who six years ago used to caddy for him at the Country Club of Rochester, but the general didn't know it.

The flyer, Staff Sergt. Richard M. Hasbrouck Jr., 22, of 93 Winton Rd. S., is home from Africa this week after participating in 50 raids during the last seven months. He received the DFC award June 30, the day he started for home.

The general, Hasbrouck said, wasn't aware that he was honoring a fellow Rochesterian, but "I recognized him because he looked exactly as he used to on the golf links."

The flying cross was awarded to Sergeant Hasbrouck after an incident Mar. 23 when his outfit was flying over Bizerte and was attacked by some 30 enemy flyers. A faulty cartridge exploded in the feedway of his gun, jamming it and giving Hasbrouck a "little scratch" on his hand. Nevertheless, he cleared the gun, knocked down one Messerschmitt-109 and damaged another.

The sergeant, who is due to report in Salt Lake City Aug. 15 for a new assignment, said he has spent most of his time here visiting friends and playing golf.

Although hesitant in speaking of his flying feats, he has official papers to show that he was responsible for shooting down another Messerschmitt and a Macchi-202 while in Africa. What else he may have done with no official records to show for it, the airman would "rather not say."

The young gunner, son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard M. Hasbrouck, has been in the Army Air Corps since April, 1942. Before entering the Army, he was assistant manager of a chain grocery here.

## YOUTH ADMITS THEFT CHARGE, DENIES FELONY

### Grand Jury Lists 25 Indictments, 5 No-Bills

The 19-year-old youth dubbed the "Blond Blister," who, police say, confessed to 19 daylight burglaries, pleaded guilty yesterday afternoon in County Court to petit larceny, but he still has to contend with a third degree burglary charge.

The youth, Walter Lake, 56 Asbury St., who was said to have told police when he was arrested Nov. 6 that he sought money to finance his planned Thanksgiving Day marriage, was indicted yesterday morning for third degree burglary and petit larceny.

On his arraignment in the afternoon before County Judge William C. Kohlmetz he surprised the prosecution by pleading guilty of the misdemeanor and not guilty of the felony. Judge Kohlmetz set sentencing for Nov. 29. Later in the day, Lake's attorney indicated there had been a mixup and District Attorney Daniel J. O'Mara said the youth will be brought in again tomorrow on the burglary count.

**\$93 Theft Charged**  
Lake was indicted specifically for breaking into the home of Mrs. Mary H. Kern, 525 Rockingham St., last Oct. 14 and stealing \$93.

The Grand Jury, in reporting to Supreme Court Justice William F. Love, handed up 25 indictments, including nine "youthful offender" cases, which are kept secret; nine open indictments and seven sealed bills. Five no-bills, exonerating seven defendants of criminal charges, also were returned.

Of 19 men and youths named in the open indictments, one besides Lake pleaded guilty. That was Earlis Hall, 20, of Bristol, Conn., who admitted second degree grand larceny in theft of \$331.57 last Oct. 19 from the Country Club of Rochester, where he was employed. His sentence was set for Nov. 29.

**Denies Assault Count**  
Charles Mayl, 19, of 98 S. Washington St., pleaded innocent of first degree assault in the shooting last Oct. 30 of Miss Joyce Cooley, 25, of 47 Troup St. Mayl was indicted for shooting Miss Cooley through the chest with a bullet from a .32 caliber automatic pistol in an early morning quarrel in a cottage in Pine Grove Road, Irondequoit. The indictment charges assault with intent to kill the girl, who is recovering in General Hospital.

William R. Booth Jr., 24, of 218 Oriole St., pleaded innocent of first degree arson in allegedly setting fire to the home of George Jost, 140 Oriole St., the night of last Sept. 13.

## Eugene Van Voorhis Rites Set Tomorrow

### Long Illness Claims Veteran Lawyer At Age of 79

Funeral rites for Eugene Van Voorhis, one of the city's oldest practicing attorneys, and member of a distinguished legal family, will be held at 3 p. m. tomorrow from the home, 591 Thomas Ave., Irondequoit. Burial will be in Riverside Cemetery.

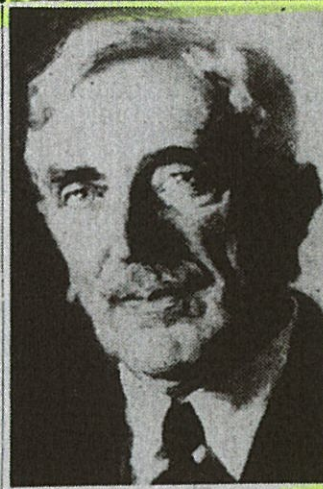
Mr. Van Voorhis, who was 79, died Monday night (Dec. 20, 1943) at the home of his son, Supreme Court Justice John Van Voorhis, 714 Rock Beach Rd., Irondequoit, following a long illness.

Admitted to the bar in 1887, Mr. Van Voorhis entered into partnership with his father, John Van Voorhis, who died in 1905. He argued a case in the Court of Appeals a few weeks after his admission to the bar and records of trial courts and appellate courts show that he participated in many cases in every field of law for 56 years.

#### Succeeded Father

After his father's death, he and his brother, Charles Van Voorhis, onetime state public service commissioner, who died in 1942, carried on their father's law business. Two generations of the family continued the same law business for 92 years.

Van Voorhis brothers by the late Justice Benjamin N. Cardozo of the Supreme Court of the United States, who said, "These men have erected a living memorial to their father." The brothers succeeded to their father's representation of the Seneca Nation of Indians in land litigation and Mr. Van Voorhis was initiated into the Seneca Nation at a ceremony in Durand-Eastman Park

### Noted Figure Dies At Jurist-Son's Home

Born in Rochester Mar. 11, 1864, he attended School 11 and Rochester Free Academy. Attending the University of Rochester on a scholarship, he was graduated in 1885 with membership in Phi Beta Kappa. He was affiliated with Delta Kappa Epsilon.

In 1896 he was married to Miss Allis M. Sherman of Washington.

#### Life-Long Republican

A life-long Republican, Mr. Van Voorhis served as president of the Rochester Bar Association in 1912 and for seven years was a vice-president of the New York State Bar Association. He held membership also in the American Bar Association, the Holland Society, Country Club of Rochester and Genesee Valley Club.

His last appearance in court was in December, 1942, before the late Supreme Court Justice Ernest I. Edgcomb of Skaneateles.

Surviving besides his widow and son, are a brother, Norman of Rome, N. Y.; two sisters, Mrs. Robert Lee MacCameron of Rochester and Mrs. Edward F. Boyd of Westport, Conn., and three grandchildren, Emily, June Allis and Eugene Van Voorhis. His mother was Frances Galusha Van Voorhis.
