RDGA Charts Title Tourney July 5-8; Schedules Six Events

Highlighted by the championship tournament, which again will be held in early July, and renewal of the pro-amateur play which proved so popular in pre-war years, the Rochester District Golf Association yesterday announced a six-tournament slate for the 1945 season.

Following the precedent set last year, when the title test at Brook-
Lea was held over the Fourth of July weekend instead of on the traditional late-August dates, the championship will be held Thursday through Sunday, July 5-8, at Locust Hill. That date, however,

THE opening Rochester District Golf Association tournament at Monroe Thursday picked up some extra luster last night when it was revealed that the entry list will include Maj. Jack Tucker—although Tucker says the only startling thing about his score is likely to be its resemblance to a bowling total.

Nevertheless, considerable interest is attached to the appearance of Tucker, Rochester's top amateur linksman in pre-war days. The five-time RDGA champion, whose District winning never has been approached, will be making his first tourney appearance since the Country Club of Rochester Invitation in 1942.

Jack, home on leave after a hitch of nearly two years in the Pacific, has played only one complete round of golf since the tag end of 1943. He had hoped to spend considerable time on the links during his current leave, but the weatherman had other ideas—so Tucker expects to be a trifle rusty in Thursday's outing over his home Monroe course.

Pairings for the tournament will be made at a meeting of RDGA delegates at Monroe at 7:30 tonight. RDGA Tournament Chairman Joe Holzschuh is hopeful that the field will approach the 100 mark for the inaugural tourney of the District season.—LILLICH.

SUMMER, which has been so capricious, relented yesterday and gave lovers of the out-of-doors a perfect day of traditional blue skies and balmy breezes.

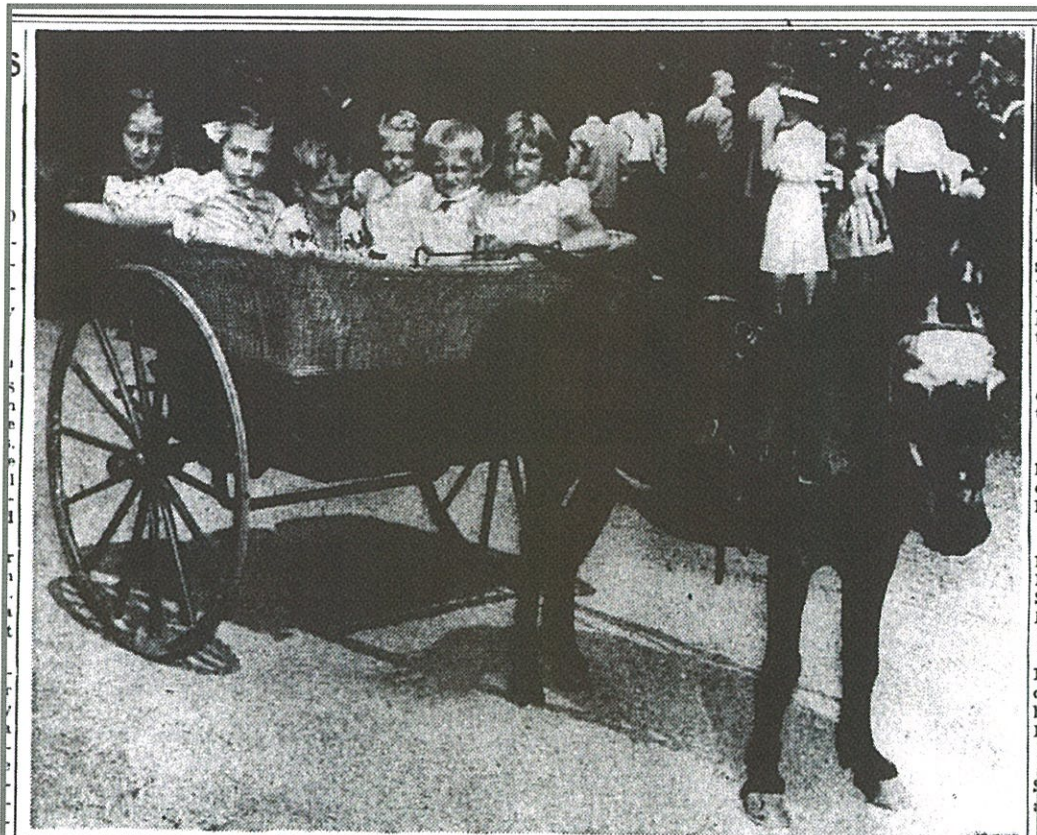
