

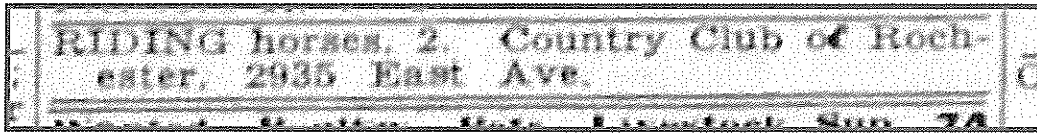

BELL & HOWELL MOVES TO OPEN KRYPTAR UNIT

Bell & Howell Co. officials moved rapidly here yesterday after Nelson P. Sanford, referee in bankruptcy, confirmed sale of the Mt. Read Blvd. plant of the bankrupt Kryptar Corporation for \$325,000.

They started arrangements for completion of the building as quickly as possible, then engaged technicians and engineers to start preparations for production of microfilm.

In addition, they announced plans for early start on one or more new buildings on the site, first of which will be a research laboratory separate from the main plant.

Before the company can take over the Mt. Read Blvd. plant, the city zoning ordinance must be changed. The City Council Wednesday night scheduled a public hearing on the zoning application for Mar. 8.

While not making any definite promises or setting any goals, Charles H. Percy, the 29-year-old president of Bell & Howell, indicated that film making is part of the company's extensive diversification program and that this 40-year-old firm operates on a large scale.

technicians, as well as a willingness on the part of the community to accept us as a new industry. The Kryptar plant, which with equipment and technical developments cost nearly a million dollars, is tailor-made to our needs, and we expect to spend another million dollars to put it into full operation."

The Bell & Howell president warned that the company will not need production workers until July at the earliest and start of manufacturing is not expected much before the end of the year.

Schwartz Gets Post

Dr. George Schwarz, former director of research for Kryptar, was appointed plant manager and director of research for the new Bell & Howell unit. He holds a number of patents in the film making field and is regarded as an authority on colloid chemistry.

Percy said that the Chicago company will send only one executive to Rochester and all other personnel for the plant will be engaged here. Yet, the operation will have the full resources of Bell & Howell's extensive research facilities available, as well as skilled management to help solve problems.

Golfer Files \$50,000 Suit

Gerald E. Colliflower, assistant pro at Monroe Golf Club, yesterday filed a Supreme Court negligence action in Cattaraugus County seeking \$50,000 damages for injuries received in an automobile accident near Olean last Oct. 18.

Colliflower, whose home is in Olean, stated in his claim that the accident left him with permanent injuries to his right wrist which will prevent him from ever playing golf again, thereby depriving him from earning a living as a golf professional.

Listed as codefendants in the action are the two drivers involved in the collision. They are Lawrence G. Dana Jr. of Bradford, Pa., prominent amateur golfer, and Jack Stephen Lee of Olean. Colliflower was riding with Dana when the crash occurred. Dana had been in Rochester at the Country Club of Rochester for the National Amateur golf tournament qualifying rounds. He qualified. Colliflower was riding back to Olean with Dana.

District Golf Championship Slated at CCR July 7-10

While a howling, wintry storm raged outside, Rochester District Golf Association solons met in the Rochester Club last night and mapped one of the most ambitious Summer links schedules in the history of the organization.

Headlining the heavy slate will be the annual District Championship at the Country Club of Rochester on July 7, 8, 9 and 10.

At the confab, one of the best attended in many years, the big topic of conversation was the championship.

District Golf Schedule

Last season there was a great deal of difficulty in the qualifying round and first day of match play. Play was so slow that some participants were forced to finish in the dark, mostly because of long waits on the tees.

Changed Rules Voted

In an effort to curb these conditions, the district officials and club representatives voted in the following rules:

1—There will be no starting times after 3 p. m. (This would assure the field of being in early even if going was slow).

2—All players with handicaps of 10 or lower must tee off before 1:30 p. m. (Some of the better golfers like to see what they have to shoot at so obtain late starting times).

3—Match play in all flights above the eighth will be played at Irondequoit Country Club. These rules apply only to the District championship.

Although there are two Twilight League dates on May 10 and 17, the RDGA tourney season will open officially on May 19, when local divot-diggers will try their shots at Monroe in a two-man best ball test.

2 Events at Oak Hill

Despite the fact that the National Amateur title test will be played on Oak Hill's East course, the Oak Hillians still will hold their two popular best ball invitations. The scratch test, with a limited field of 32 teams, is to be played on June 17, 18 and 19, while the handicap event will be run off July 13 through 16.

Qualifying for the National Amateur, which will be played Aug. 20 through Sept. 3, will be in Buffalo at an as yet unnamed course.

Rochester's Locust Hill will be the site of the National Open sectional qualifying test. The Open itself will be held at the Medinah Country Club, near Chicago.

The New York State Amateur championship, which was won last season by Midvale's Sammy Urzetta, is slated for the Syracuse Yacht Club layout. It will be held at the same time as the Oak Hill handicap invitation.

Conflicting Dates

Only other conflicting dates on the card are the Country Club Invitation and League of the Iroquois. The League of the Iroquois is charted June 24 and 25, while the CCR test is June 24, 25 and 26.

Final event of the season is the Locust Hill Mixed Scotch Twosome on Sept. 10 and 11.

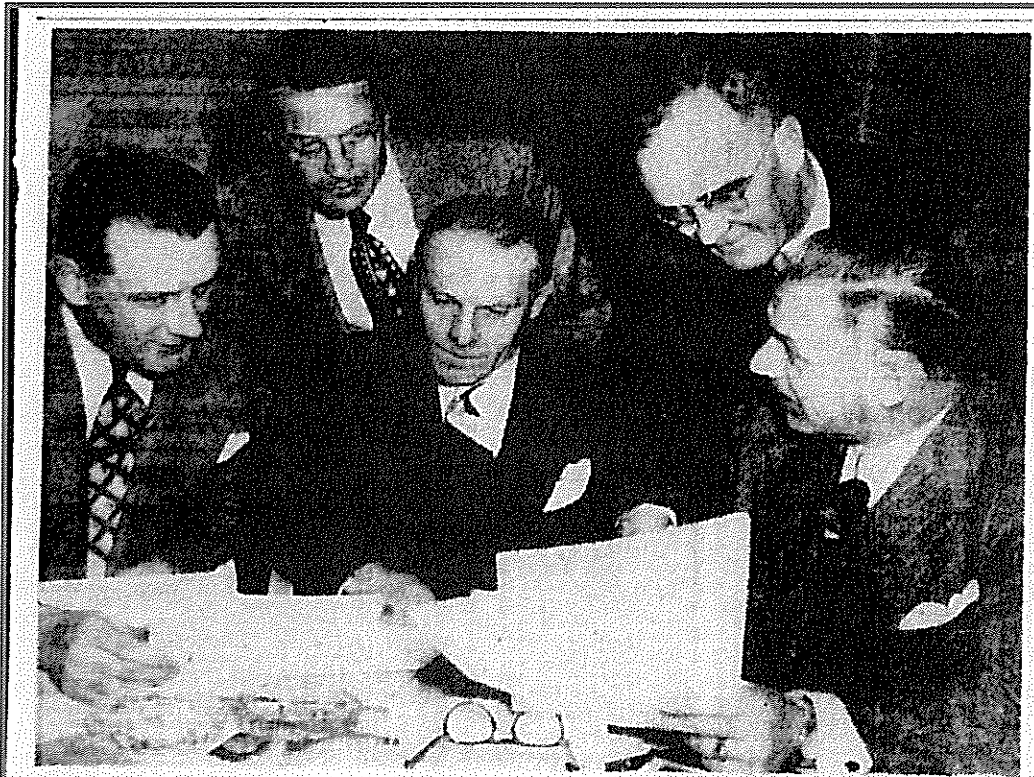

Tait was educated in the Rochester schools, attended Mohegan Lake School and was graduated from Princeton University in 1922.

In October of the same year he married the former Julia Willsea, a Wellesley College graduate, also of Rochester. They have a married daughter, Mrs. Elizabeth McFarland, and a son, David C., a senior at Phillips Exeter Academy, N. H.

For five years after leaving college, Tait was sales manager and president of various sales companies and investment concerns.

Then he was made vice president of the Genesee Valley Trust Co., Rochester. He held this position for ten years and during this time became well known to the board of management of the Stromberg-Carlson Co.

In 1945, Tait came to Pittsburgh as assistant vice president of the Union Trust Co. and soon became vice president. When the

Union Trust and Mellon Bank were merged in September, 1946 as the Mellon National Bank & Trust Co., he was made vice president.

Tait is known for his work in connection with the American Bankers Assn.

He is a member of the organization's Bank Management Commission. Also, he is a member of the faculty of the ABA's Graduate School of Banking which conducts classes for bank officials.

His home is in Forest Drive in Fox Chapel.

He is a member of the Fox Chapel Club, Yale-Harvard-Princeton Club, Duquesne Club, Princeton Club of N. Y. and the Country Club of Rochester.

Besides his mother, Mrs. Robert Tait, he also has a brother, Austin C. Tait, who lives in Rochester. Another brother, T. C. Tait is an executive of Swift & Co. in Chicago.

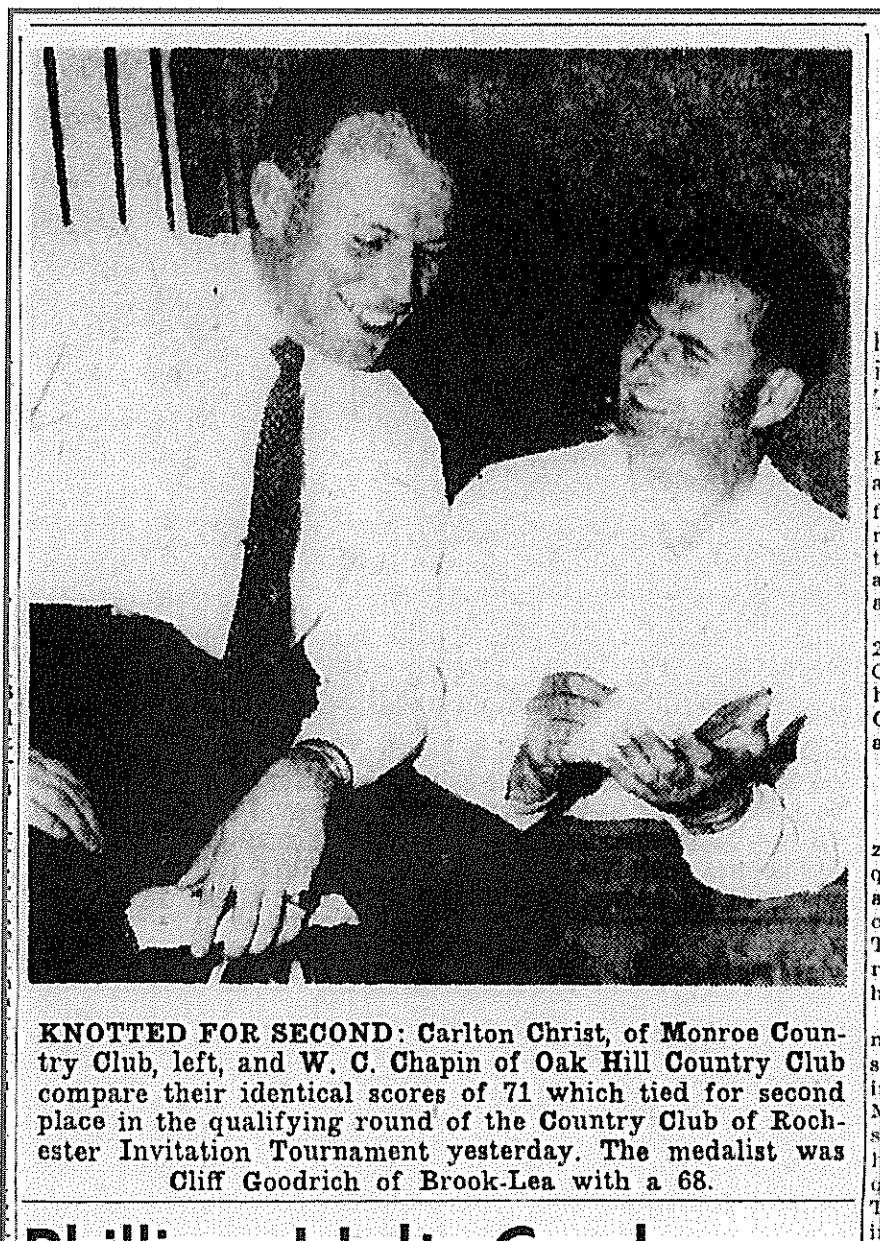

**Urzetta Captures Second CCR Crown;
Thumps Trainor in Finals, 6 and 5**

Midvale Ace Defeats Cagnazzo in Thriller

Sammy Urzetta, the Midvale youth with the golden golf touch, yesterday won his second straight Country Club of Rochester Invitation crown, trouncing George Trainor of Oak Hill, 6 and 5, in the 18-hole final.

Urzetta showed a true champion's form in the morning round when he rallied for birdies on the final two holes to oust Tony Cagnazzo of Genesee, 1 up.

Sixmin' Sam defeated Carl Christ for the title last year.

Five-Time Finalist

For Trainor it was a tough loss. It marked the fifth time that the veteran Oak Hillian had been in the CCR finals only to be beaten on each occasion.

Trainor played his best golf in the morning semifinal round when he turned back spunky Owen Luckhurst of Ridgemon, 1 up. Trainor recorded a 71 in rallying from a two-down nine-hole deficit. Luckhurst's medal was a creditable 72. Par for the Country Club layout is 33-35-70.

The win added another cup to the Urzetta trophy case. The 23-year-old Sammy now has won the Country Club event twice, the Rochester District Golf Association championship, the Monroe Invitation and the New York State Amateur. He also was medalist at Monroe last year.

Pressure Winner

After brilliant pressure golf in the morning round, Urzetta cut loose with a barrage of pars against the firing Trainor. For the 12 holes the match lasted. Urzetta was even with regulation figures.

He took his first advantage on the fourth hole when Trainor missed the green and wound up with a bogey 4.

Another missed green on the 5th by Trainor gave Urzetta a two up lead, and four shots from 100 yards out on the 7th by Trainor increased Sam's lead to three. Urzetta made a fine recovery on this hole. After being trapped on his drive so that he had to blast out, Sam whacked a wood shot to the edge of the green on the 224-yarder. He got down in two to win the hole as Trainor pulled his iron approach, was short on a chip and two-putted.

The eighth was halved in standard figures and then aggressive Sammy won the next four holes with three pars and a bird to wind-up the match.

Sprayed iron shots had the Champ in trouble several times during the day, but accurate chips and putts saved him. His booming tee shots were no little help in the triumph.

Against Cagnazzo, Sam found himself three up after the first five holes as the Geneseean couldn't get his game together.

Evens Test at 10

But then Tony, a former assistant pro at the CCR, pulled himself together to birdie the eighth and the ninth holes to move to within one hole of Urzetta. He evened the match with a par on 10.

Tony finally took a one-hole advantage of his own by pouring in another bird on the 15th. The 16th was halted with par 2s and then Urzetta turned on the heat. There was nothing for Cagnazzo to do but watch.

Tony came out of a trap on the 17th and had a simple putt left for a par. But it was no good. Urzetta rolled in a 30-foot curlier for a birdie 3 to even the match.

On the 18th, both smashed 260-yard tee shots. Urzetta laid his approach from eight feet from the cup, while Cagnazzo was just outside. Tony missed and Sam sank his and it was all over.

On his way to the championship, Urzetta defeated Bill Tinnery of Oak Hill, 2 and 1; Bob Hill of Oak Hill, 3 and 1; Cagnazzo, 1 up, and finally Trainer.

Medalist Cliff Goodrich won the consolation by beating Durand's Bud Habes, 2 and 1, and Sam Foretz captured the second flight with a 3 and 2 victory over Canadian Don Varey.

NOTES—Nearly 1,600 links fans disregarded the sweltering heat to watch yesterday's matches . . . George Trainer, despite the fact that he's never won the tourney, has made an impressive record in his seven starts. Besides gaining the final round five times, George has won the medal three times. Aside from Urzetta, his other finals opponents were Jack Tucker, Jimmy Haseman of Danville, Lynn Wilson of Buffalo and Cliff Goodrich. Incidentally, the heat didn't help George's or, for that matter, Sammy's game a bit. Both said after the match they were exhausted.

Only double winner of the tournament was Cliff Goodrich. "Blinker" walked off with the medalist award and, after being beaten in his first match, went on to win the consolation award . . . Sammy Foretz of Midvale, brother of the CCR's assistant pro, Steve, had the hottest nine-hole round of the tournament. 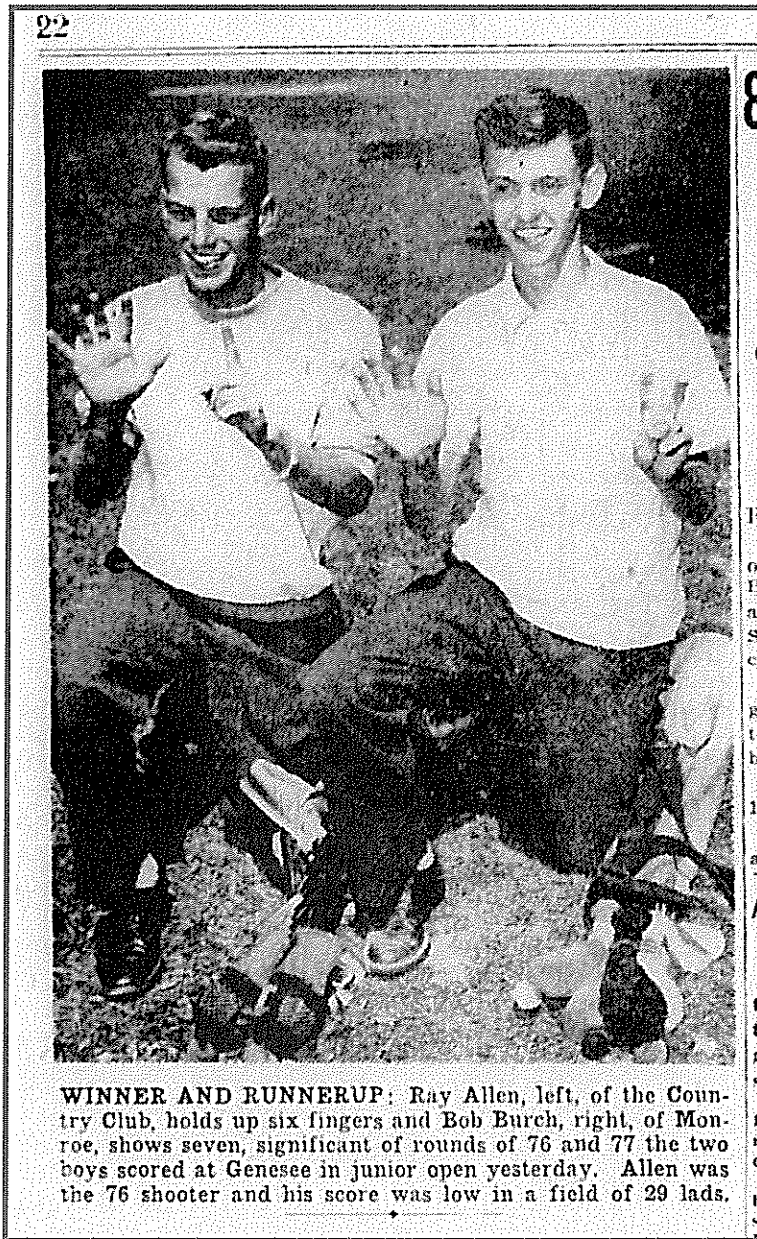

Gen. 'Beetle' Smith Due Here To Address Military Groups

Lt. Gen. Walter Bedell (Beetle) Smith, former ambassador to Russia and present commanding general of the First Army, will be in Rochester Sept. 29.

General Smith will address members of the Rochester Army Advisory Committee and the Military Manpower Committee at a private dinner at the Country Club of Rochester.

Earlier in the afternoon he will attend a reception at the home of Thomas Remington, a member of the Army Advisory Committee.

Edward Harris 2nd, chairman of both committees, said General Smith's talk will be off the record telling them what the Army is doing and how civilian groups can help.

General Smith resigned as ambassador to Russia last March after three years' service in Moscow. During that time he was a delegate to the Paris Peace Conference in 1946.

During World War 2 he served

as chief of staff in the European theater and chief of staff, Supreme Headquarters Allied Expeditionary Forces under Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower.

On behalf of General Eisenhower he accepted the surrender of Italy and the unconditional surrender of Germany. In March of this year he was named commanding general of the First Army with headquarters on Governors Island.

Red A-Blast No Surprise, S General Admits on Visit

The atomic explosion in Russia failed to surprise Lt. Gen. Walter Bedell (Beetle) Smith.

The World War 2 chief of staff to General Eisenhower and until March the U. S. ambassador to Moscow revealed that last night he was delighted from his Army.

General Smith flew back to First Army headquarters last night.

...night as he alighted from his Army C-47 for a brief Rochester visit in his present official capacity as commanding officer of the First Army.

"All I know about it is the report that there was an explosion in Russia," Smith said briefly.

"Did that surprise you?"

"No," he returned. "Look up my speech" before the Governors' Conference recently."

(On June 21 in Colorado Springs, General Smith told the nation's governors that he thought Russia had solved the problem of atomic fission, press dispatches reported then. He predicted that Russia would soon make a "test" of the atomic bomb, but claimed it lacked the machinery for large-scale production. As a "wild guess" he said it would take Russia 20 years to make the machinery necessary for remote control of atomic energy, whereas the United States now had an atomic stockpile.)

Sidestepped Queries

Then Smith, moving with the same precision that the Eisenhower armies moved through Europe, deployed around more questions and entered the official city limousine to be escorted to a reception, and later to a private dinner conference with two civilian Army committees at the Country Club of Rochester.

The Army plane arrived at Rochester Airport 93 minutes overdue on a flight from Mitchel Field. Weather forced the plane across Pennsylvania from Philadelphia to Erie before it broke through on the last leg to Rochester. Edward Peck Curtis, Eastman Kodak vicepresident and wartime Air Corps general, flew from New York on the plane.

General Smith, markedly impatient toward any further delays, barely greeted the reception committee before he entered the official car and was rushed, with police escort, to the home of Col. Thomas H. Remington for a reception.

Met by Group

On hand to greet him were Vice-mayor Frank E. VanLare, Col. Edward Harris 2nd, Dr. T. Banford Jones, personal physician for General Eisenhower in Europe, and
