

It was announced yesterday at a meeting of the Country Club of Rochester's women golf officials that the club would hold its first annual women's invitation tournament Aug. 24-26, in conjunction with the sectional qualifier for the Women's Amateur, Aug. 24-25.

The qualifier primarily would be for candidates in the section including Buffalo, Syracuse and part of Canada. Golfers may, however, with special permission, qualify in sections other than those assigned for their home territory.

Other factors which may bring some of the feminine name golfers to Rochester are the holding of the National Girls' championship in Buffalo Aug. 28, and the Curtis Cup matches, also in Buffalo, Sept. 4-5. Among those who might play here are the sensational Bauer sisters—Marlene and Alice—Polly Riley, and Glenna Collett Vare.

Two celebrated Rochester golfers, born "down the road a piece" from each other, met for the first time in the Rochester Club last night, when Walter (The Haig) Hagen congratulated Sammy Urzetta on winning the 1950 National Amateur crown.

Hagen, former pro at the Country Club of Rochester, has won virtually every golfing honor

Sammy modestly accepted Hagen's praise, and expressed the hope he would be able to match "The Haig's" record.

Then Rochester Club officials learned Hagen was on his way to Rochester. Urzetta, who was in Pittsburgh, Pa., was contacted, and flew here yesterday for the club's annual Stag Dinner.

Hagen explained his failure to answer the invitation by saying that he has been known to accept invitations and then fail to show up. "I just wanted to be certain I would be here before accepting," he said.




