It was announced yesterday at a meeting of the Country Club of Rochester's women golf officials that the club would hold its first annual women's invitation tournament Aug. 24-26, in conjunction with the sectional qualifier for the Women's Amateur, Aug. 24-25.

The qualifier primarily would be for candidates in the section including Buffalo, Syracuse and part of Canada. Golfers may, however, with special permission, qualify in sections other than those assigned for their home territory.

Other factors which may bring some of the feminine name golfers to Rochester are the holding of the National Girls' championship in Buffalo Aug. 28, and the Curtis Cup matches, also in Buffalo, Sept. 4-5. Among those who might play here are the sensational Bauer sisters—Marlene and Alice—Polly Riley, and Glenna Collett Vare.

When Mrs. Charles H. Wanzer, annual winter visitor in Miami for the past 40 years, from Rochester, N.Y., played golf, she had a fine set of clubs made by that master of the game, Walter Hagan, who at one time was pro at a country club in Rochester.

"These clubs were a handicap to me" laughed Mrs. Wanzer, "for when people who didn't know me and my game saw them, they expected great things—" So, she decided to give up golf and devote herself to something she could do "sitting down"—namely, writing poetry.

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This transition wasn't hard for Mrs. Wanzer as she has written poetry since she was a little girl "my first poem was published when I was 10," she said and chuckled as she added, "But you see, my father was publisher and editor of the newspaper in St. Louis in which my masterpiece appeared!"

Recently, however, Mrs. Wanzer published a book of her poems entitled, "After Glow" and now has published a song—she wrote the lyrics—called "Similie" which is fast becoming popular.

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She is the former Minnie Lee of St. Louis, was educated at a private school in Atlanta and moved to Rochester as the young bride of W. Roy McCanne who was president of the Stromberg-Carlson co.

After her marriage she took a course in lyric poetry at Columbia university. For many years she has been a member of the Rochester poetry society and has helped edit and contributed to the society's annual book called The Gleam. She also has visited the Laramore Rader poetry society here.

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Mrs. Wanzer's natural charm is enhanced by her keen sense of humor which

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**She has been widowed twice.** Her son, Lee McCanne, now is a vice president of Stromberg Carlson co. ## First Woman to Run a Golf Club

# A Pioneer in Managing

MEASURING Ruth Barry's success by a hard-and-fast rule is out of the question. Too many fine points are involved.

Take "Manhattan" and "Martini," the felicitous membership at Oak Hill that Ruth recognized as a nice added touch. Then there's her own office. Impressive without being plush, it carries the weight it was meant to. And there's Ruth herself, who wisely lets her natural bantering humor shield a cool business head.

No one but Ruth was confident 18 years ago when she became the first woman in the country appointed manager of a man's golf club. (Even then Oak Hill was the largest country club in the Rochester area, with 650 as against its present 800 membership.)

**THE DOUBTERS** have since eaten their words. The deceptively casual Mrs. Barry has handled her 40 club employes, purchased staggering quantities of food and equipment, organized countless club functions; and in brief, managed the running of a large country club all with the smooth efficiency of a diesel engine.

Before she took over at the club's helm, she spent five years as secretary to the manager, and received a taste of what was to be in store for her. No longer a pioneer, Mrs. Barry points out that there are at least 600 women managing country clubs throughout the States; some here in Rochester.

In a way, she feels a woman has the advantage. "For one thing, most women don't have the addiction to golf men do. It's a strong temptation for a male club manager peering out of his office window in perfect golfing weather. Personally I can take golf or leave it alone, the latter course is usually the one I follow." She might have added that if a woman has an instinctive knack for graciousness that's a help when constantly rubbing shoulders with people, as happens to be the case here. They understand the running of a large clubhouse as they understand the mechanics of their home, and they give it the extra flourishes and female finesse that men often overlook.

"The job is far from seasonal, she said. Winter months are heavy with parties, luncheons, fashion shows, receptions, bowling, and the time, as well, for cleaning and renovating. Enthusiasm, which is a part of her make-up, helps her to fall in with the requirements of the moment. It also acts as a kind of contagion on her staff.

Considering that Oak Hill's expanse takes in two eighteen hole courses, an outdoor swimming pool, eight bowling alleys, four tennis courts, and clubhouse with large dining room and kitchen, enthusiasm is a thing of importance. She holds her personnel in high esteem, is fanatical in praise of her two chefs, and is proud of the fact that she never had to fire any employe other than seasonal or parttime workers. The others have been with her since her promotion to club manager.

Diplomacy as well as business sense is an important part of her job. She takes as many as 100 phone calls a day, varying from requests for jobs to one of the innumerable all-American gripes. She meets each with frankness and a sprinkling of humor, making her point and diplomatically holding to it. Ruth has handled gate-crashers and rule-breakers by the dozens—without making enemies for herself or the club.

**THE HARVEST** of Ruth's work has shown up in a series of ways. In 1941 she was national chairman at the Club Managers Association of America convention in Buffalo; the first time a woman ever receive this appointment. Last year when Oak Hill was host to the National Amateur golf tournament, Ruth was awarded a silver replica of the pin given Charlie Coe, title winner. This was again a first.

The club's kitchen came in for recognition last year when it was awarded a plaque in a national food service contest conducted by Institutions Magazine of Chicago, and was outstanding as the only club in the U. S. to receive the award.

Personal recognition came in October of last year when she was feted at a testimonial dinner and presented with a purse and leather-bound scrapbook containing club members' names.

Little time has been left to Ruth for outside activities and the only office she holds at present is that of state secretary of the New York State Chapter of Club Managers Association of America.

**THE wife** of WHEC's Jack Barry, Ruth was trained as a secretary at East High School and later at the Rochester Business Institute. She worked at the Central Trust Company as a secretary, then studied dietetics at the Rochester Institute of Technology and later at the Washington Seminary, Washington, D. C.

Her intention was to do hospital work but she was intrigued by a classified ad and answered it to become secretary to the manager of Oak Hill Country Club.

Her advice to others is a combination affair. She thinks, along with the founder of the Hotel Management course at Cornell University, that this year formal course is an excellent bet for a woman with her kind of job in mind. But she also feels that, following or preceding this course, a woman should work in a club in other capacities for experience. Her words were "from the stockroom up," which sound as unappealing as it is practical.

Whether or not a girl is successful in this different profession seems largely a matter of the "right touch." When, at the end of our interview, this reporter had to turn down the offer of an elaborate club lunch in obedience to deadline, Ruth quickly pushed buttons and had a chicken sandwich and milk brought to the office. This, she informed us, could be eaten in the length of time it took the taxi to get there.

Which tells a lot about Ruth Barry—and why she is still manager of Rochester's largest country club.

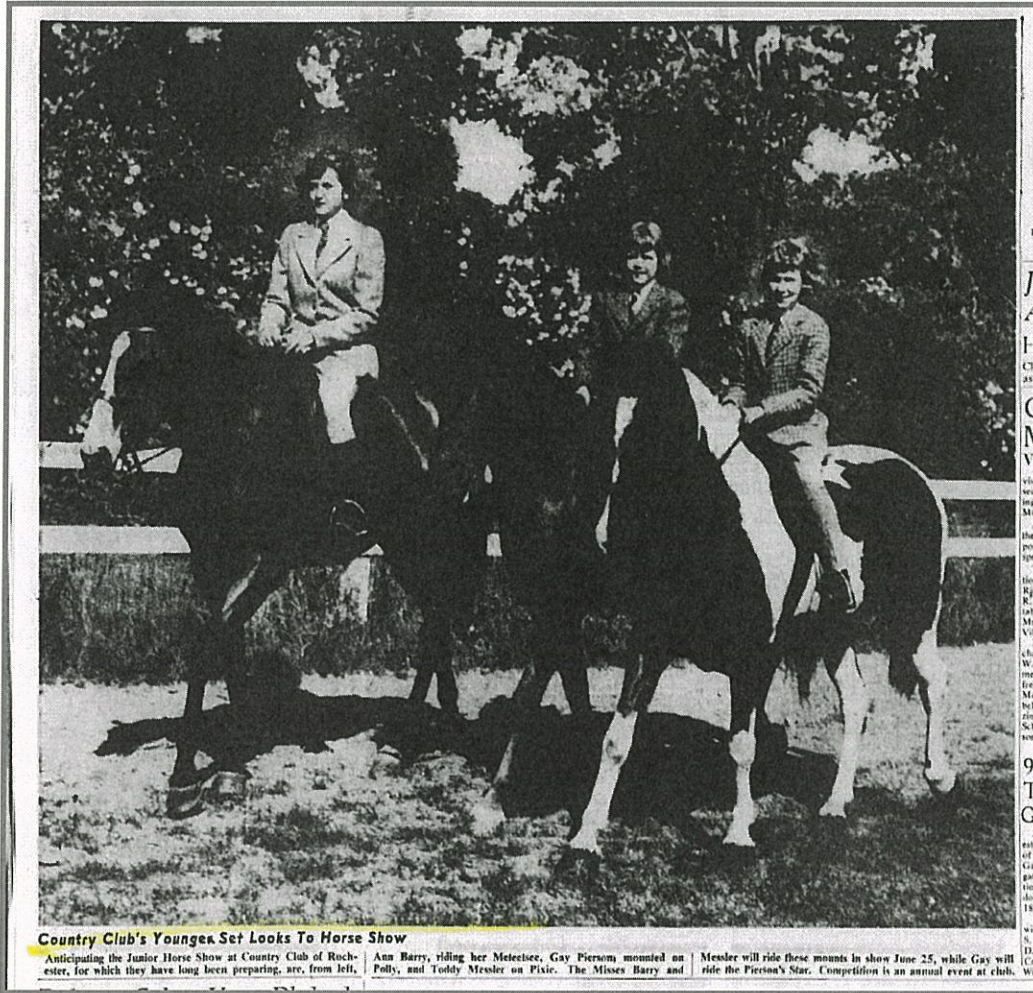

### Upward Trend

Once again scores took an upward trend. A brisk wind and tricky putting surfaces were the linksters' only excuses. A score of 77 was necessary to make the championship flight, and three players—the home club's George Trainor, former champ Gene Robinson of Locust Hill, and Gordy Claus—tied at that figure and staged one of the longest and most interesting playoffs ever held at a local tournament.

It took five holes before Claus finally carded a birdie to best Robinson. Trainor got out earlier when his par four on the 441-yard second hole bettered a pair of bogies by Claus and Robinson.

All three had slubbed up the easy first hole for bogies, and after Trainor escaped with a par on the second, Robby and Claus both took turns missing five-footers which would have ended the affair on the third green. The scrambling Claus came out of a trap to tie Robinson on the fourth, then as play continued on the par five 15th hole, Claus curled in an eight-footer to end it.

Veteran Eddie Randall and Dave Mullen, a comparative newcomer, both of Oak Hill, were the only other players to better 75, each turning in 74. Bobby Hill, another Oak Hiller considered a threat for the crown, was at 75, along with Jim Meikleham, unknown quantity from Green Lakes.

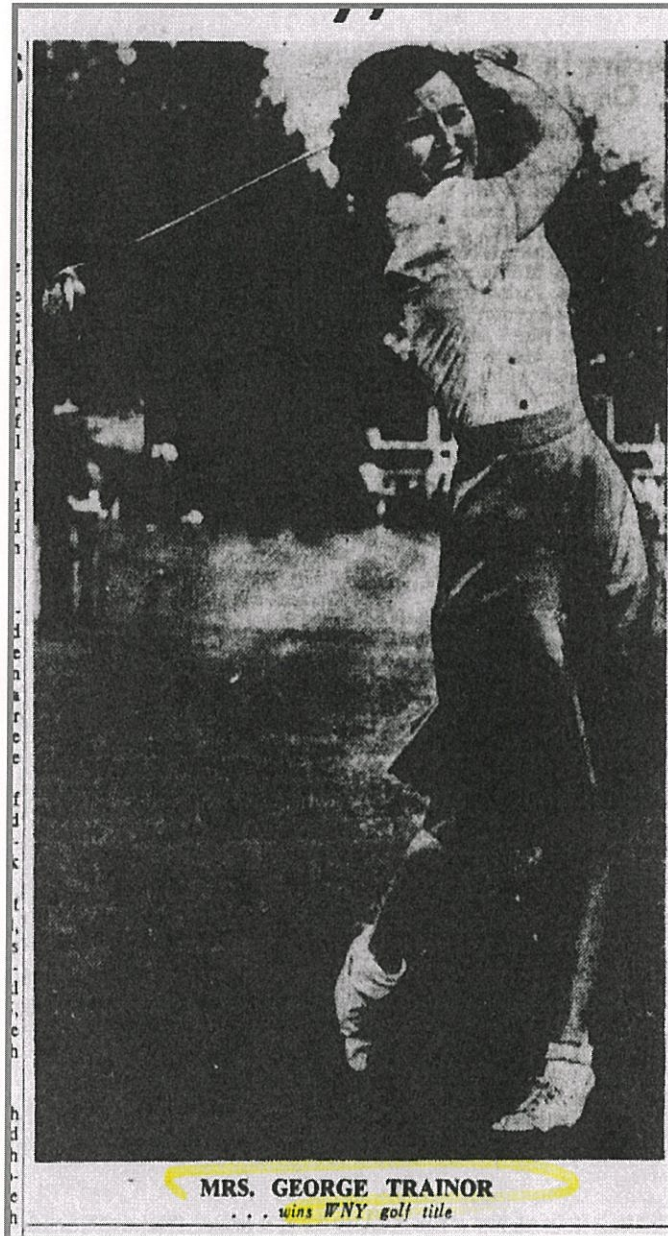

# Hill Beats Trainor, 5 and 4, to Capture CCR Golf Honors

20-Year-Old Star at Oak Hill  
Youngest Holder of Title—  
Thaney Toughest Foe

By BRUCE KOCH

Blond Bobby Hill, Oak Hill's determined little links star, won his first major golf title yesterday, defeating clubmate George Trainor, 5 and 4, in the final of the 23rd annual Country Club of Rochester Invitation.

By winning, the 20-year-old Hill became the youngest golfer ever to hold the coveted CCR crown. He replaces Sammy Urzetta of Irondequoit as champion. Urzetta, who had his sights set on becoming the only person ever to win the tournament three times, was the victim of some steady play by Trainor in yesterday morning's semifinal.

As for Trainor, the loss was nothing new. The husky medic, who is a member at the CCR as well as Oak Hill, has reached the final round no less than six times, only to see his efforts thwarted on each occasion.

**Hills Cinches with Birdie**

Hill matched standard figures for the 14 holes he needed in besting Trainor. And he wound up the match with a beautiful birdie deuce on the difficult 217-yard 14th.

During the entire tournament, Hill was four over par. He was five over on opening day when he used up 75 blows in qualifying. But after that he dipped one under in ousting Gordy Claus of Lake Shore in the first

round; three under against Mort Reed in the second, and three over against Medalist Bill Thaney of Oak Hill yesterday morning.

Thaney gave him his toughest struggle of the tournament, carrying the muscular little champ to the 17th green. But here Hill once again came through with a bird to end the fracas.

Trainor was lavish in his praise for Hill's play. "Bobby played gorgeous golf," said the doctor. "He simply never gave me an opening."

And Trainor was so right. Hill was off to a flying start, stroking home a 12-foot uphill putt for a birdie three on the very first hole.

Although his putter didn't behave as well as Bobby wanted it to, it never let him down in the clutch.

After halving the second, third and fourth holes, Trainor played the 402-yard fifth in regulation and it appeared as though he would even the match as Hill lay three 25 feet from the cup.

#### Hill Steadied in Putting

But Hill hunched over his pellet and sent it winging into the cup for a half. Next blood was drawn on the seventh, a 524-yarder that saw Hill reach the edge of the green in two with a two-iron. A chip left him a short putt which he holed to put him two up.

Bobby lost a chance to go three up when he muffed a two-footer for a winning par on the eighth, but he finally did go up three when Trainor flubbed a chip shot on the ninth and bogeyed.

Both parred the 10th and 11th, Trainor just missing a 12-foot birdie attempt on 10. On the 232-yard 12th, Trainor's tee shot caught a trap and the match all but ended as he failed to get his par and Hill made his three.

On the 14th, Hill's four-wood tee shot plunked on the green eight feet from the cup and he proceeded to knock it in and end proceedings.

NOTES: A Fuller Brush salesman by trade, Hill is a real student of the game. He plays and practices diligently daily at Oak Hill . . . And his patience and practice has paid off. Only five years ago Hill started taking the game seriously and a year later he won the RDGA Junior on the same course he triumphed yesterday . . . Here is a list of Trainor's conquerors in his previous appearances in the final: 1939—Jack Tucker; 1941—Jimmy Hausman; 1942—Cliff Goodrich; 1947—Lyndon Wilson; 1949—Sam Lirzetta . . . Win or lose, though, George's achievement of gaining the final in six of the nine CCR tournaments he has participated in is commendable . . . Incidentally, it was a big week for the Trainors. Earlier this week Mrs. Trainor won the Western New York women's title at Transit Valley, Buffalo.

### Golf Official Hits Proposed Hike of State Caddie Rate

Albany—(AP)—Caddies will all but disappear from the state's golf courses if New York adopts a proposed minimum per schedule for them, a public hearing was told yesterday.

Francis H. Russell of Troy, representing the Eastern New York Golf Association, told industrial commissioner Edward Conis the proposed rates were so high golfers would carry their own bags or rely on caddy carts.

The Amusement and Recreation Minimum Wage Board has recommended caddies get a dollar a bag for each nine holes or less, and two dollars a bag for each round of 18 to 18 holes.

Russell called the proposed order "overcomplicated" and said a caddy carrying double for 10 holes would make four dollars for less than two hours work.

"Under those rates I might give up my job and go to the state," Russell said. "Actually, however, it will mean that no caddies will be employed."

Russell suggested \$1.50 for 10 holes on Empire courses as a fair rate, with double that for a little less for carrying two bags.

Under the state labor law, the commissioner is empowered to fix minimum wages in seven industries, including enterprises classified as amusement and recreation.

Commissioner Conis has scheduled a public hearing in New York City Friday, and in Rochester Sept. 22. A final order on the wage schedule is expected about Dec. 1.

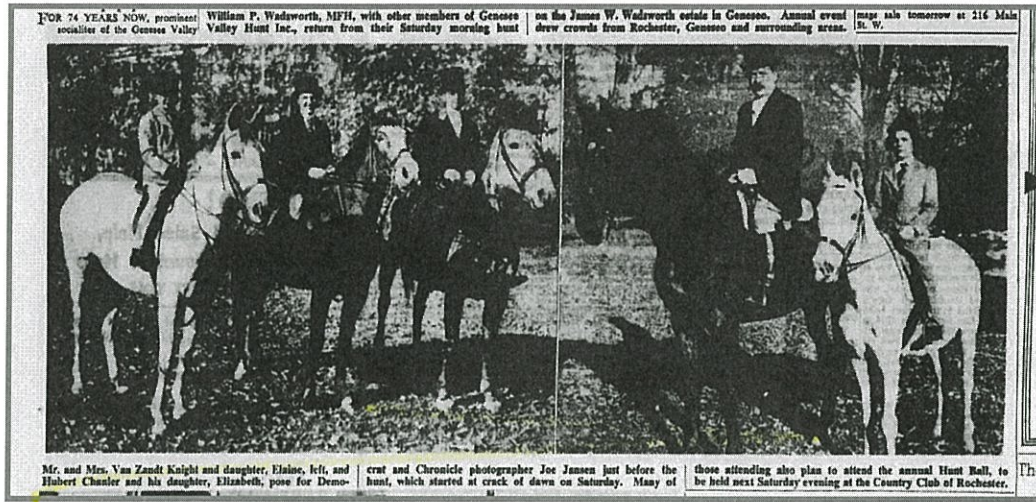
