# Mrs. F. C. Allen Dies; Civic, Social Leader

Mrs. Freeman C. Allen, 40 Hawthorn St., long prominent in Rochester civic and social affairs, died yesterday afternoon (Dec. 31, 1950) after an illness of two months. She was 60.

Mrs. Allen was chairman of the Food and Shelter Commit-



Mrs. Allen was chairman of the Welfare Division of Civilian Defense during World War 2, and chairman of the local recruiting committee of the Women's Army Corps. She was one of the organizers of the Rochester Community Players and at one time appeared in a number of its productions.



Eleanor Angle Allen was descended from two of Rochester's older prominent families, the daughter of Charles E. Angle and Ida Motley Angle. She was the widow of Freeman Clarke Allen, who was a prominent businessman, one of the organizers of the American Legion in Monroe County and its first county commander. He died in 1933.

As a young woman, Mrs. Allen was well known in city musical circles, being a member of the "Tuesday Musicales," and often appearing as soloist at its functions. Later she gave much of her time and interest to the boards on which she served, including the Women's Auxiliary Board of the Rochester General Hospital and those of the Convalescent Hospital for Children and Hillside Children's Center. She had many other less formal philanthropic interests.

She was an enthusiastic and steady follower of sports events in the Rochester area.

Mrs. Allen was a member of the Seventh Twig, the Genesee Valley Club, Country Club of Rochester, the Chatterbox Club and an honorary member of the Junior League of Rochester.

She is survived by her son, Frederic

## CCR Keglers Hit 3,350, Win Club Tourney

Country Club of Rochester put a well-balanced team of bowlers on the line at the Rochester Club last night to run away with the second handicap tournament of the Rochester Club League. The team rolled a scratch three-game total of 2,716, respectable in any loop, and its handicap of 634 gave it 3,350.

Second place went to Oak Hill with 3,017, and third to the Rochester Club, 2,879. Others in order, were: Locust Hill 2,766, Ridgemont 2,765, Monroe 2,716, Genesee Valley Club 2,681, Brook-Lea 2,680. Locust Hill won the first tournament, rolled at Oak Hill.

Squad prizes were won by Oak Hill on the first and Rochester Club on the second. Jim Weldon, Oak Hill, won the high individual scratch prize, hitting 561. Individual handicap honors were taken by Herb Saucke, Rochester Club, 619, and Milt Holm, Rochester Club, 610.

Scratch scores of the winning CCR team were: Ray Milow 593, J. Morse 529, Bob Strassenburgh 502, Lewis B. Swift Jr. 509, Gay Levis 583. Weldon won the high scratch prize over Milow and Levis because an individual or team can win only one prize.

MASTER HAGEN GOES THRU A WINDOW IN  
SEARCH OF 15 CENTS

**D**ETROIT, Feb. 11—A balmy spring breeze floated in thru the open window of the one-story schoolhouse overlooking the Country club of Rochester [N. Y.]. The apple-cheeked, round-faced kid in the corner stared out at a number of men, swinging sticks at onion-sized pellets. He sighed. No use asking Mrs. Cullen, the teacher, to be excused. He had exhausted all the alibis in the book — toothache, ailing grandmother, a cinder in his eye, a pain in his belly. Mrs. C. had vetoed all further excuses for one Walter Charles Hagen.

The teacher looked up from her book, and her gaze landed on the empty seat in the corner. No Hagen.

"Where's Walter?"

Hagen's neighbors in the class loyally played dumb. Mrs. Cullen didn't press the matter. She liked the kid from Corbett's Glen, up the road. He was seldom in the money when it came to application to books, but he was a great hand at helping her after hours. He had, for instance, a surprising knack for drawing and coloring blackboards on holidays like Christmas, Washington's Birthday, Thanksgiving, and Easter.

**For Shipping School He Was Forced to Take Week Off**

The Hagen school-break that day was prompted by an unofficial date to caddy for Walter Powers, prominent Rochester business man. Mr. Powers was one of the most generous clients a bag-toter at the Country club could hire out to.

The culprit was immediately challenged by Mrs. Cullen the next morning.

"Walter, for what you did yesterday, you can turn around, go home, and don't come back for a week!"

Hagen wanted to say, "Come again, Mrs. Cullen?" Instead, he put on the expression of a criminal who is being given his just deserts, and departed for—the Country club caddy yard, naturally. A whole week with Walter Powers and Banker Bert Finn and maybe even Mr. Eastman [George K., the camera king and an ardent golfer].

Years later, Hagen met Mrs. Cullen and asked her why she had evicted him from school, whether she meant it to be a punishment or whether she knew Walter would be a useless pupil that week.

"The club we used had no flange. It was like a knife. You could hit a shot from the sand. It was useful coming out of rough or the hay on a downhill bank. The niblic also was great for a pitch shot, say from 100 yards out, or a pitch-and-run shot. And you could use it for stymies."

Before Hagen was 21 he had undergone his apprenticeship in the shop at the Country club of Rochester, and was making folks in upstate New York tournaments take notice. Golf had a solid rival in his future plans—baseball. The Haig could, and frequently did play every position on the local semi-pro team. He was 'twixt and between on whether to stick to golf or go after a major league career. "It was a little of both," his old teacher laughed. "What chance did I have against you and the weather and golf? How are you getting along these days, Walter?"

"O, I'm doing all right, Mrs. Cullen."

He won the United States Open championships of 1914 and 1919 and set an unparalleled American record of British Open triumphs in 1922, 1924, 1928, and 1929. Mrs. Dorothy Robinson Macomber, 3535 Elmwood Ave., Brighton, for years one of the Rochester area's most prominent women in golfing, social, civic and church affairs, died yesterday (Feb. 26, 1951) at General Hospital. She was 62.

Mrs. Macomber had been ill for several months and for that reason had relinquished three months ago her long-held position as Republican committeewoman in the Town of Brighton. The list of her activities spans nearly every type of work from prominence in athletics through all types of charitable, political and church projects.

She was a trustee of the First Presbyterian Church, of which she was a lifelong member and of which her grandfather, the Rev. Charles E. Robinson, D. D., was pastor. She was a past president of the Women's Guild of the church and a member of the committee which handled a recent modernization program at the church.

She was a charter member of the board of the Monroe County League for Planned Parenthood. For many years she was a board member of the Rochester General Hospital, having served as president and as secretary. She was chairman of the Volunteer Aide Service at the hospital.

She was Western New York women's golfing champion in 1925 and for many years woman champion of the Country Club of Rochester.

She was a member of the Seventh Twig, headed divisions in several Community Chest campaigns, was active in the Rochester Home Bureau, of which she was past director and chairman, and an honorary member of the Junior League, which she helped organize locally. Mrs. Macomber was a former president and an executive committee member of the Rochester Council of Social Agencies. She was active in organizing the Toy Depot which was merged with the Christmas Bureau of which she was later chairman. She was a member of the Central Index Committee of the council.

For several years Mrs. Macomber was chairman of the regional committee and vicepresident of the board of the New York State Conference on Social Work. During World War 2 she was director of the volunteer program for civilian mobilization in Monroe County. In 1932 and 1933 she was a member of the Citizens' Social Planning Committee and in 1935 was active in the Women's Crusade for Human Needs.

She was a past president of the Rosemary Hall Alumnae Association and a member of the Chatterbox Club.

Surviving are her husband, DeWitt B. Macomber; a sister, Mrs. Edward Peck Curtis; a daughter, Mrs. Samuel P. Connor Jr.; two sons, Allen and Edward, all of Rochester, and a daughter, Mrs. Roger H. Hetzel of Lancaster, Pa. There are 10 grandchildren. Funeral arrangements were not complete last night.

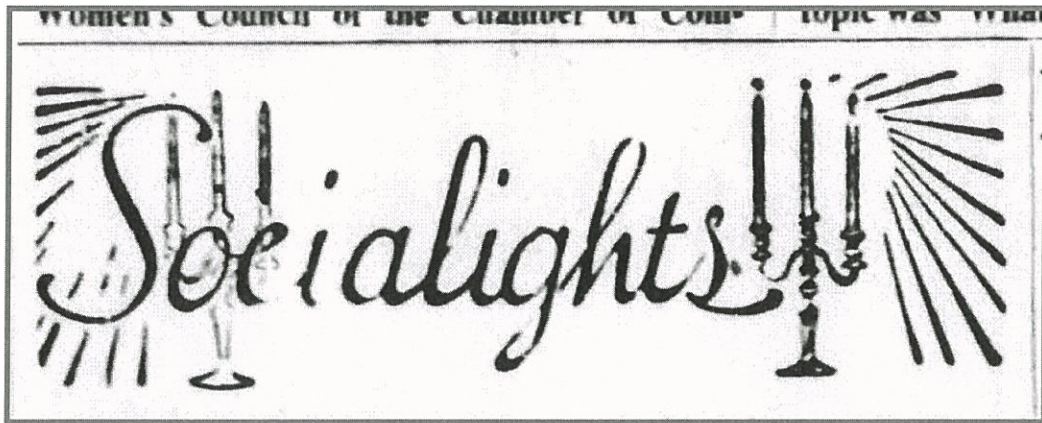
# Tourney Dates Set By Women Golfers

## Golf Professional Wills \$48,416 Estate

George M. Christ, golf professional at the Country Club of Rochester for 28 years, left a net estate of \$48,416 when he died June 27, 1947, according to a tax deposition. His widow, Mrs. Marie C. Christ, of 180 Hurstbourne Rd., inherited the bulk of the estate, her share being placed at \$48,139. The estate consisted of personal property with a value of \$42,551, including \$13,830 in insurance proceeds, and real property valued at \$10,120.

Mr. Christ succeeded Walter Hagen as pro at the Country Club in 1918 and continued in the post until his death.

# Urzetta Gets 69 in Practice Before Sailing

White Plains —(AP)— Making his second trip abroad, this time on less serious business, National Amateur Champion Sam Urzetta will leave on the Parthia this afternoon with six other members of the United States Walker Cup team for their match with the Britons, the Birkdale Golf Club, at Southport, England, May 11-12.

The affable East Rochester lad was in high spirits as he played a final practice round at the Knollwood Country Club yesterday in a best-ball match in which the Cup players were paired with club members and USGA officials.

The others who played at Knollwood yesterday were Capt. Willie Turnesa, Charlie Coe, Jimmy McHale, Harold Paddock Jr., Bob Knowles Jr., and William Campbell. Frank Stranahan and Dick Chapman have been given permission by the USGA to travel to England apart from the main group.

"I had a 69, two under par," Urzetta, who was overseas during World War 2 said. "The score doesn't mean much as we were improving our lies, and playing very rapidly as we had to finish early. However, I thought I was hitting the ball well." He did not keep a card, he said, but he knew it was a 69.

Sam was driving very well, hitting long, low balls as a stiff breeze swept the course, and it was the general idea that his superior iron play would make him a very stern competitor in England, where his ability to play irons into the wind which invariably sweeps the British courses would give him a big advantage.

Urzetta expected three friends of long standing to be at the boat to see him off today. They are Ernie Virok and John Trevisan, classmates of his at St. Bonaventure, and Dick Kochemhal, for whom Sam used to caddy at Irondequoit Country Club Rochester, and who is now a New York resident.

Always accommodating, Sam carried it to extremes yesterday. Photographers asked him to make a shot in a trap for them. He not only did it, but blasted the ball right into the cup.

With the other members of the Cup squad — Frank Stranahan and Dick Chapman, who will travel over there on their own, excepted—Urzetta was a guest at the Knollwood club for luncheon yesterday.

**All-American Final Again**

**Coe Sparkles to Oust Urzetta,  
Faces Chapman for British Title**

Porthcawl, Wales,—(AP)—Dead-tired Charlie Coe and dapper Dick Chapman smashed the last British hopes of lifting the American mortgage on their Amateur golf championship yesterday.

The two former U. S. champions meet today over 36 holes in the third All-American final in five years. Chapman will have played in all three. He never has won.

The 40-year-old Chapman was five

### Sinks 20-Footer at 13th

Coe banged in a 20-footer that had "champion" all over it to win the 13th. Nobody gave an inch after that, and Coe claimed the victory at the 16th. He had not been in the sand once during the round.

The tremendous pressure of the match went a long way towards dulling Coe's game against Evans, the tenacious Welsh champion who bounced two Americans, Bo Winger and Bill Campbell, into the discard on Thursday. The weary Oklahoman needed 37 strokes to reach the turn this time, and again it was the ninth hole that put him on the victory trail.

He made the turn 1 up after Evans had sent his second shot flying into the crowd. He won the 12th with one of those special Coe pitches dead to the pin that takes the heart out of his opponents.

He widened his margin to three when Evans three-putted the 13th, and closed up shop for the day when Evans strayed into the rough and needed five to get down at the par-four 16th.

### 'I'm Plumb Wore Out'

As Coe trudged into the clubhouse, a reporter asked him if he were tired.

"Man, I'm more than tired," came the reply in a soft Oklahoma drawl. "I'm plumb wore out."

Chapman was behind only once the entire day, and that was on the very first hole of the morning round when Beamish, a squadron leader in the RAF, rammed home a seven-footer for a winning birdie 3.

Dick squared matters on the second by slashing a two iron out of the rough to within four yards of the cup and getting down in par 4 to his opponent's 5. After that it was Katie bar the door. Out in 35, a shot under par, Chapman was 3 up at the turn and then proceeded to knock off the next six holes in three under fours.

He gave perhaps the most impressive display of the entire week in winning the 12th, 13th and 14th holes with consecutive birdies. That was too much for the unheralded Beamish, who had upset Alex Kyle of the British Walker Cup team in the previous round.

Chapman was seven strokes under level fours for the 30 holes he needed to win his two victories. Coe was six under for his 32 holes.

The match will begin at 5 a. m. (Eastern Daylight Time).

The 40-year-old Chapman was five under par for the 30 holes he needed to put the skids under two Irish popes—Joe Carr and Cecil Beamish. He ousted both by scores of 4 and 3. Coe, the 27-year-old former University of Oklahoma star, played unbeatable golf as he edged Sammy Urzetta, of East Rochester, N. Y., the current U. S. champion, 3 and 2, in the morning quarter-final. And he had enough left to down Albert Evans of Wales, 4 and 2, in the afternoon. Coe won the U. S. Amateur in 1949 at Oak Hill Country Club, Rochester, N. Y.

To British eyes, Chapman was the bigger villain. They had felt sure they would see the 29-year-old Carr playing in the final, particularly after he routed defending titleholder Frank Stranahan on Thursday.

**Never Had Right Answer**

But against the flawless star from Pinehurst, Carr never had the right answer. He hung on tightly until Chapman curled in a breath-taking 15-foot putt on the ninth hole to go 1 up.

That was all the 40-year-old veteran needed. He went 2 up at the 10th, where Carr was short, and 3 up on the 13th, where Carr's second shot was through the green.

The pressure was too much for Carr. He sliced off the short 14th into a deep sand trap, blasted out almost

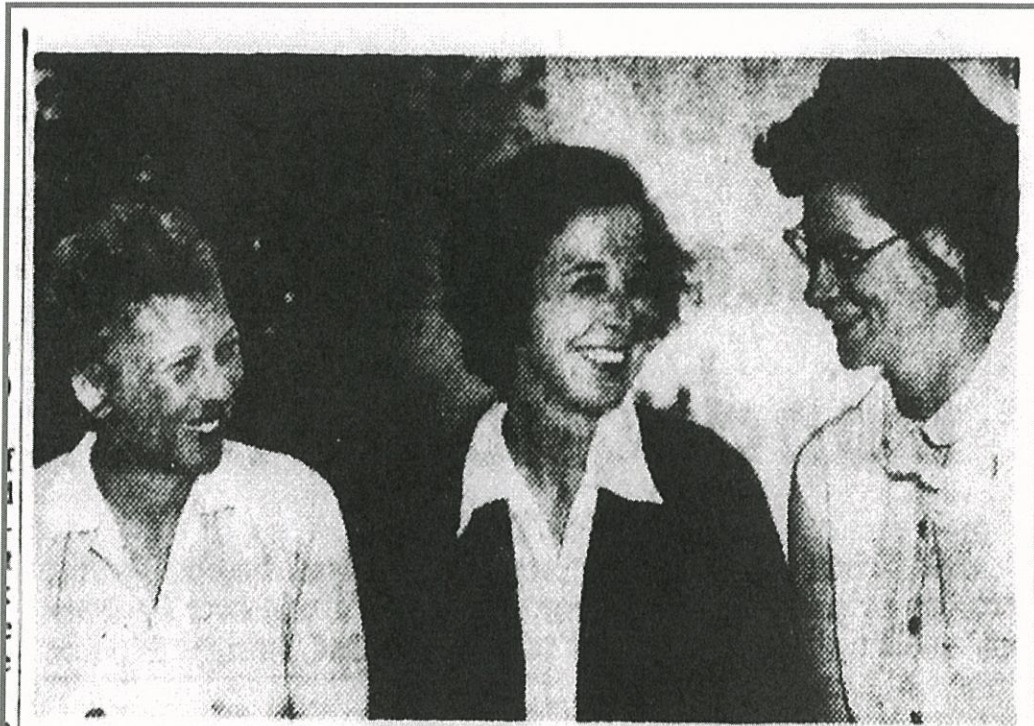

# **Clubs to Qualify Boys For D&C Caddie Crown**

All Rochester-area club professionals are asked to conduct their club qualifying round for The Democrat and Chronicle Caddie Championship Tournament as soon as possible. The tourney is to be played July 30 and 31 at Lake Shore, with each club to be represented by three boys.

Two boys from the Rochester area will be sent to the National Finals in Columbus, beginning Aug. 21. First step in the search of a berth for the finals will be local eliminations—that is, your own tournament at your own club. The three representatives for the Rochester finals must be determined on the golf course in bona-fide competition, not by personal selection.

The entire National Caddie Association program is open to all caddies at all clubs, even if the club pro is not affiliated with the PGA. However, all tournaments must be played according to PGA rules.

Here is what clubs and professionals are expected to do: Conduct their own club tournament, either match or medal play, as they prefer, so that their championship team of three will be decided and ready to play in the Rochester finals July 30-31; inform The Democrat and Chronicle of their total number of entrants; verify the fact that every entrant is a legitimate caddie who has caddied at least 25 rounds in 1951; (pro shop assistants are not eligible for this tournament); following each playing session at their own club, call in complete results to The Democrat and Chronicle sports desk.

Ira C. Sapozink, chairman of the National Newspaper Control said: "Democrat and Chronicle trophies and other prizes will be awarded to the champion and runner-up, also to other leaders. A trophy will be presented to the winning team for that team's clubhouse trophy case. All expenses of the two Democrat and Chronicle representatives in the National test, from the time they leave Rochester until they return, will be paid. If a boy goes all the way in the National event he will be in Columbus approximately one week. However, upon elimination he will return to Rochester."

# Bobby Hill Tops Bert Kling, 2 and 1, To Retain His CCR Invitation Title

Bobby Hill became the sixth linksman to take two legs on the Country Club of Rochester Invitation Tournament trophy as he downed a hard-fighting Bert Kling, 2 and 1, in an all-Oak Hill finale yesterday afternoon.

The 148-pound blond had to stand off a thrilling rally by the former professional to win. Hill was 3-up after 14 holes and needed only two halves or a victory on the next two holes to sew up the win.

Bht Kling still wasn't beaten. His blast out of the rough with a 4-wood second shot on the 15th was one of the more spectacular shots of the tournament as it stopped about 6 feet from the pin on the par-5 450-yard hole. Hill banged his iron about 10 feet from the cup, leaving both putting for eagles. The University of Alabama freshman stroked his putt, but it just curled away for only a birdie, and Kling followed with a beautiful putt to take the hole.

### Thrilling Finale

Kling, hitting first on the 154-yard, par-3 16th hole, landed on the green about eight feet from the cup. Hill hit a foot closer. The gallery of some 300 went wild as the hard-pressed Kling sank his putt for a birdie. After studying the lie and taking a minute's pause, the 21-year-old Hill rolled his ball calmly into the cup for a birdie and a half.

Now two down with two to play, Kling pushed his drive into the edge of the rough on the 17th. Hill connected with a tremendous drive that sailed 275 yards down the fairway. Kling's approach landed to the right of the green in the rough and Hill banged his iron about 25 feet from the cup. A perfect chip from the rough left Kling with less than a foot putt for a par 4. Bobby hit his putt but was a little strong, leaving himself a 2-footer for the victory. This time he was a little weak, but it had

### Edges Grover in Morning

Hill nipped Fred Grover, Midvale, in the morning round, 2 and 1, while Kling was beating Ridgemont's Owen Luckhurst, also by 2 and 1, although neither played as well as in the afternoon when Hill was even par and Kling was only two over for the 17 holes played.

Carlton Christ of Monroe downed Oak Hill's Bruce Koch, 3 and 2, to take consolation honors.

Kling started off the championship final with a birdie on the first hole to take a one-up lead, but Hill banged a third-shot wedge from 65 yards out into the cup on the 447-yard second hole to even the match. Kling hit a good second shot on that hole, but missed his long birdie putt.

They played evenly until the 178-yard, par-3 eighth hole, where Hill landed on the green with his drive and then three-putted. Kling ran into trap trouble, however, and took a 5. The defending champ went 2-up on the next hole—a par-4, 410-yarder, when he sank a 12-foot putt while Kling missed a 10-footer.

### Kling Gets One Back

Kling got one back on the 10th, but lost it again on the 232-yard par 3 12th hole. His drive faded to the right and his second landed in a trap, while the steady Hill dropped his tee shot on the green and got down in two putts. Another short hole—the 220-yard, par-3 14th—put the young Oak Hiller three up, as he got down in regulation while Kling took a 4. The rest is history, as Hill and Kling staged one of the "most exciting matches in the CCR tourney," according to club pro Charlie Bemish.

Cliff Goodrich of Brook-Lea took second-flight honors with a 21-hole victory over Durand's Bill Cory, and Hugh Shirey, CCR member, fired a 73—the best round of his life—for the consolation prize.

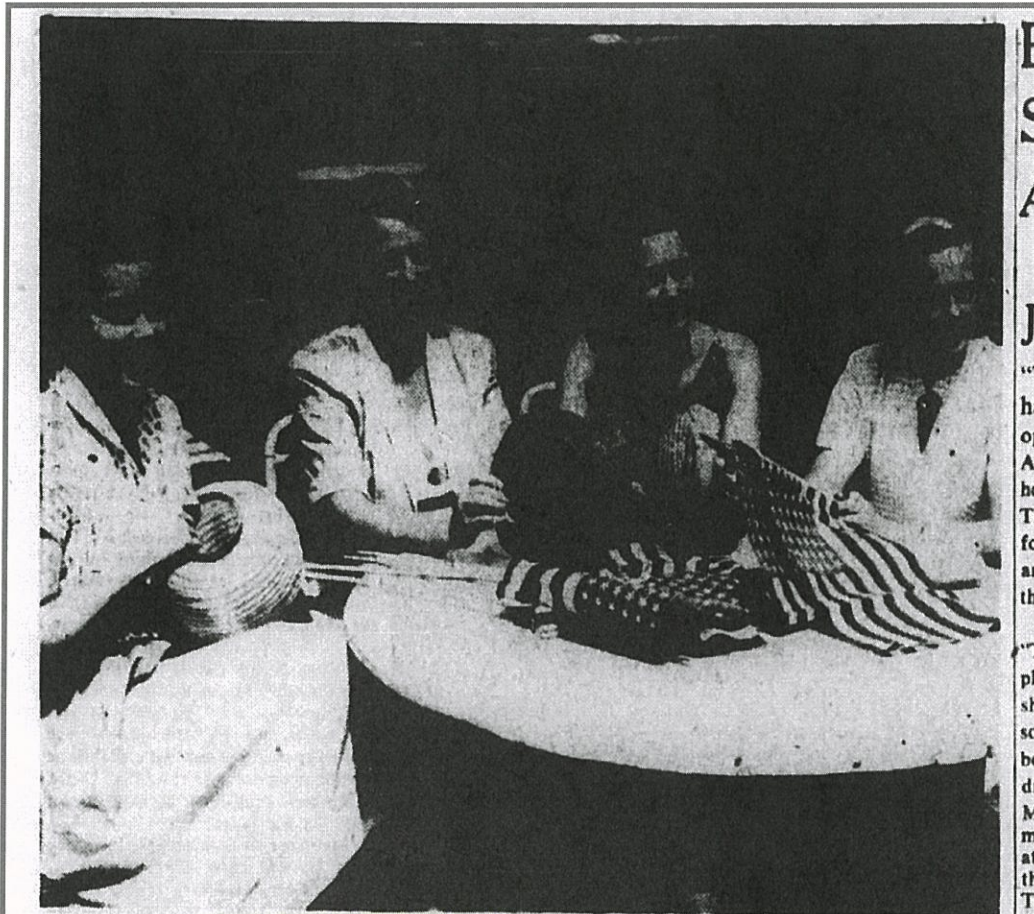

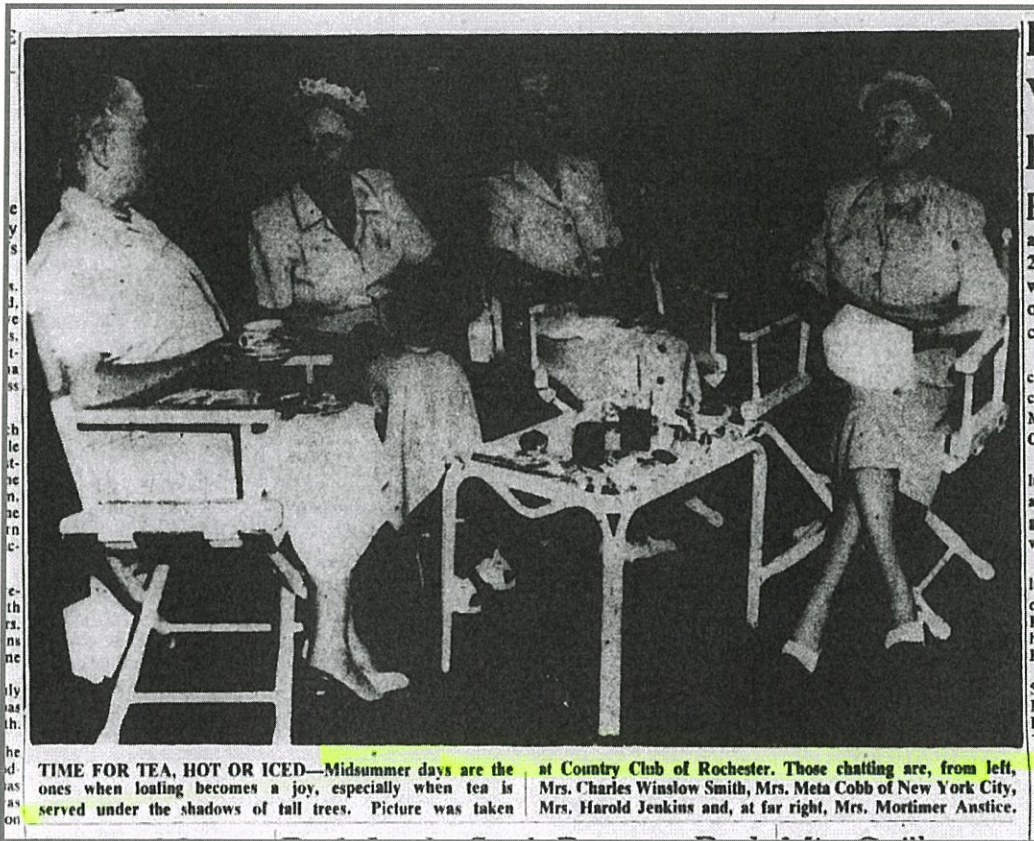

Buffalo—Buffalo's golf pros inaugurated their Inter-City rivalry with Rochester's play-for-play linkmen on a happy note at Transit Valley yesterday, defeating the invaders for the Leo M. Ward Trophy, 37 to 26.

A Rochester linkman, an old Buffalo favorite who has won the Western New York PGA title seven times, walked off with medal honors, however. He was Frank Commisso of Irondequoit, who fashioned a one-under-par 70, largely on the strength of a blistering 32 on the home half of Transit's well-trapped, tree-lined course.

Mike Parco of Sheridan Park and Dan Gaskill of St. Bonaventure, Olean, the latter playing for the Rochester team, were next in line with 71's, with both shooting their best golf on the outgoing nine. Parco carded a 33-38 and Gaskill a 34-37.

Howie DeAngelus, Rochester team captain from Oak Hill, posted 37-36—73, one over regulation on each side.



#### Commisso Starts Badly

Among the other Buffalo scoring leaders were Bill Smith of Orchard Park, the Buffalo captain, with 36-39-75; Alex Greer, Brookfield, and Ray McAuliffe, Park Club, 37-39-76, and George Smith, Country Club of Buffalo, 35-41-76.

Commisso started miserably with two fat 6's on the first three holes, but birdied the ninth for an outgoing 38. Coming home he bogied the 11th and then caught fire for birds at numbers 12, 13, 15 and 17.

This is the first year of Inter-City Ward Trophy competition, as the event previously was a duel between the Western New York PGA, which includes both the Buffalo and Rochester sectors, and the Ontario PGA.

Had the pros continued the former plan of 12-man teams, the score would have been much closer, for nine of Buffalo's points came as McAuliffe of Park Club and Dick Kelderhouse of Beeman's Point, Jamestown, "ganged up" on Howard Smith of Chautauqua, playing both halves of the final match for Rochester.

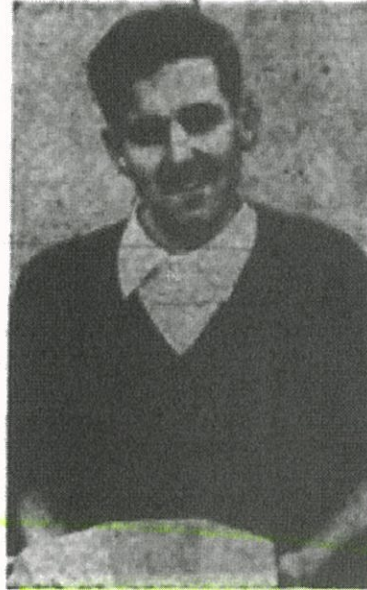

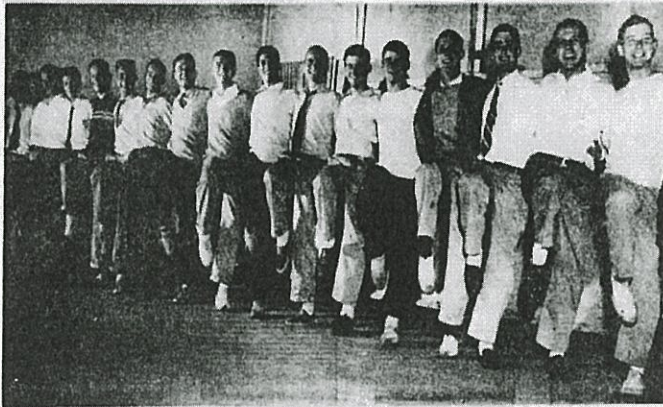
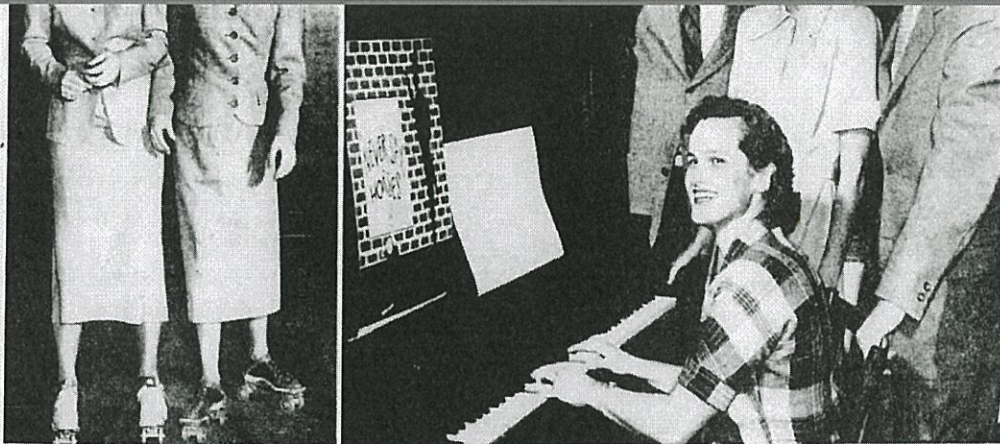
