Rochester Club Wins at Kegling

The Rochester Club won the annual Holiday Inter-Club Invitation Bowling Tournament last night at Oak Hill Country Club.

Don Robertson, Milton Holm, Clifton Forsyth, Herb Saucke, Gunnar Wiig and Larry Wagner combined for a handicap total of 2,935 to lead the eight-team field.

Runner-up honors went to the Genesee Valley Club with 2,912, followed by Oak Hill with 2,880, Locust Hill with 2,853, Monroe with 2,839, Country Club of Rochester with 2,768, Ridgemont with 2,749 and Brook-Lea, the defending champion, with 2,742.

Bill Ryan of Locust Hill was the top individual scorer with 594. For the Rochester Club, Saucke rolled 528. Chairman of the event was Charles DeMartin.

Albert B. Eastwood Dies, Retired Shoe Firm Head

Albert B. Eastwood, 90, former head of William Eastwood & Son, Inc., a retail shoe firm, died shortly before 2 this morning in his home, 262 Culver Rd., after 2½ months' illness.

Mr. Eastwood joined the company, founded by his father, after he was graduated from Cayuga Lake Military Academy in Aurora. Shortly afterward he was appointed manager.

In 1892 he was married to Eleanor Haughton Motley, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Motley. Mrs. Eastwood died in 1942. The couple had no children.

Mr. Eastwood was one of the late George Eastman's closest friends. He was pres-

ident of the Chamber of Commerce in 1911. He also served many terms as a member of the board of governors of Genesee Hospital. He was a former director of the Rochester Community Chest and a member of Brick Presbyterian Church 60 years.

Mr. Eastwood was a charter member of the Country Club of Rochester and also was affiliated with the Genesee Valley Club and the Rochester Yacht Club.

He is survived by several cousins. A memorial service will be conducted in his home at a time to be announced. Friends may contribute to the church's memorial fund or the Genesee Hospital Memorial Fund in Mr. Eastwood's memory.

Urzetta Plans to Join Pro Golf Tour

Sammy Urzetta, head pro at the Country Club of Rochester, said yesterday he intends to join the winter golf tour at Phoenix, Ariz., in time for the tournament there starting Jan. 30.

Hill Registers 68 In Open at Tucson

TUCSON, Ariz., Feb. 6—Bob Hill's 68 led the three-man Rochester delegation today as the \$15,000 Tucson Open got under way. Sam Urzetta posted a three-over-par 73 and Howie De Angelus was two shots higher. Hill's score left him in a tie for 17th place.

It appeared that a 36 hole total of 141 or better would be needed to make the cut tomorrow.

Hill, pro at Happy Acres Country Club, Webster, N. Y., took three from the edge as he bogied the second fifth and 11th holes.

His birds came on the sixth (20-footer), 10th (15-footer), 12th (eight-footer), 15th (35-footer) and 16th (12-footer). He missed a five-footer that would have given him a birdie four on the 18th.

"I putted well," said Bob, "but I'm not hitting the ball super."

Urzetta, Country Club of Rochester, was even par until a gamble he took on his third shot on the 14th backfired.

"I'd pushed my second shot onto some mud and tried to roll the ball onto the green, hoping for a four but settling for a bogey 5," explained Sam. "The ball slowed up and stopped short of the green, I took three from the edge then and three-putted the next green for a bogey."

Urzetta three-putted the first

green for a bogey and also bogied the third when he hit a No. 9 iron second shot over the green. Sam canned birdie putts of 15 and 12 feet on the second and 12th holes, respectively.

De Angelus, of Oak Hill Country Club, took three from the edge three times and twice drove into trees as he staggered to the turn in 40, five over par. Howie steadied down on the back side for a par 35, birdieing the 14th and 18th. He nearly holed out his second shot on the 450-yard 14th. On the last hole he pitched 18 inches from the can to set up his bird. His other bird came on the second where he dropped an 18-footer.

Urzetta had 3 birdies in scoring a qualifying 74, but they were offset by three bogeys and a double bogey. Hill scored 75, coming home in 35 after an outgoing 40.

—Rochester's two leading touring golfers, Sam Urzetta and Bob Hill, got off to good starts today in the Texas Open. Urzetta posted a 37-33—70 and Hill a 35-37—72, one over par. Urzetta's score tied him for sixth place.

Bob, of Happy Acres CC, had one birdie, on the fourth. No. 8 iron second shot 14 inches from the cup. He three-putted from 15 feet to bogey the 13th and 8 from 40 feet to bogey the 15th.

"This round makes me feel good," smiled Urzetta, of Country Club of Rochester. "I didn't hit my irons too deadly but I kept the ball in play pretty well. I found the greens slow."

Going out, Sam three-putted twice for bogies. He birdied the par 5 ninth when he hit a No. 9 iron two feet from the can. Coming in, Sam holed a 15-foot birdie putt on the 10th and an eight-footer for a bird on 13.

Jimmy Demaret Fires 69, Snares Lead at Houston

HOUSTON, Feb. 23 (AP) — Jimmy Demaret thrilled a tremendous hometown gallery today with a three-under par 69 that gave him a two-stroke lead after 54-holes in the \$30,000 Houston Classic Invitation Golf Tournament.

The colorful Demaret was at his best on a muddy course and his 70-70-69—209 gave him a two-stroke edge over Marty Furgol, Lemont, Ill., and Roberto DeVicenzo, Mexico City.

While Pete Mazur, the 36-hole leader from Buffalo, N.Y., was jumping to a 77, Demaret played the front nine in 34 and came home in 35 while blasting par a third straight round on the 7,200-yard, par 72 Memorial Park course. Leaders:

Connor, 3505 Elmwood Ave. Club officials said they plan to lay out three new holes in the spring to replace three holes near the clubhouse that will be used as a practice area.

Macomber Issues Call For 'Guts ... Sacrifice'

A jut-jawed, hard-talking ex-Rochesterian who serves a top role in the U.S. State Department came home last night and sounded a call for "guts and some sacrifice" on the part of Americans to help this country win the economic cold war.

William B. Macomber Jr., assistant secretary of state for Congressional relations, told about 450 Rochester Junior Leaguers and their husbands that the present free world pattern of defensive alliances represents "a terrific accomplishment" in countering the Soviet menace.

But, he said, the success of the political warning system now circling the Communist bloc will continue to depend on patience and diplomacy—and favorable action on mutual security and trade agreement bills, both now hot issues before Congress.

Cites Four Objectives

Speaking in a jam-packed dining room at the Country Club of Rochester, Macomber said the two measures must succeed in order that the free world may continue to:

- 1—Sustain a sufficient armed force on the "periphery" of the Sino-Russian area—that is, in the countries which border China and the USSR—to discourage a limited "probing" war.
- 2—Provide economic stability for underdeveloped countries so they will not be forced to accept first Communist aid, then Communist technicians and finally, Communist domination.

- 3—Retain U.S. bases overseas, pointing powerful retaliatory guns at the heart of Russian and Chinese war production areas.

- 4—Offer continued trade possibilities to the free world and uncommitted nations, to help them pay for their imports and to forestall Soviet economic penetration.

He said Congress is practically sure to smile with approval at direct military appropriations in this first, post-sputnik budget.

Congress Cuts Feared

But he added that the State Department is "greatly disturbed" that the mutual security and trade agreements measures may be subjected to congressional scissors.

"The system's a good system, a positive system," the crew-cut statesman declared. "But we've got to sustain the whole system or it won't work."

Macomber reported that the nations which trade with the U.S. "are all scared to death that we're going to change our direction" by raising tariff walls and canceling reciprocal trade agreements.

The results, he predicted, could be a Communist economic breakthrough and an end of the steady economic and military pressures which have brought unrest and concessions behind the Iron Curtain.

Seen and Heard

ASSISTANT SECRETARY OF STATE

I HAVE a constitutional disinclination to go very far to hear people make speeches. It derives from the fact that for years I was persistently assigned to report public speakers, many of whom vaporized to unconscionable lengths. I decided during the long period when I was a captive audience that if the time came when I wasn't paid to hear a man make a speech, I'd stay away, unless someone got Sir Winston Churchill back of a lectern. Stupid though it probably is, my prejudice is stubborn.

But the lady at my house (MY house! Ha!) got me out the other night to hear Billy Butts Macomber speak at the Country Club of Rochester, and I am glad she did. Mr. Macomber has



been Secretary Dulles' right hand man for some time, and now has the title of assistant secretary of state for congressional relations. He is a young man with the kind of integrity, the kind of earnestness, the kind of quality — the "class," if you will—that a man assigned to a position of high governmental trust should have.

He played football at Yale. He was not tall, his sight was defective, he lacked weight. It is doubtful if he went 160 pounds, but he played guard against plus 200-pound Ivy League linemen. He eked out with the old college try and "intestinal fortitude" what he lacked in stature. He was a welterweight on the wrestling team. His war service required that he land by parachute behind the enemy lines.

After the war he displayed keen interest in government affairs. A few of us made a small, inexpert effort to promote him as a candidate for representative to the Lower House. It was an abortive effort. Macomber was very young; he was brushed off. How good a candidate he would have made is a question. He doesn't go in for theatrics or public display. He is a quiet, earnest, dedicated man. But one, from all reports, who is performing an eminently useful service for his country.

WAITING FOR DINNER, and Mr. Macomber's speech that was to follow dinner, I met Rufus T. Wesson, and discovered that he is a member of the Wesson family of the famous firm of Smith & Wesson, Inc., manufacturers of pistols and revolvers since nearly 10 years before the Civil War.

Rufus Wesson, who was born in Springfield, Mass., where the family business is located, is not directly associated with Smith & Wesson. His two brothers are in the firm, the fifth generation of Wessons to be members of it. Rufus Wesson was graduated from Yale with a degree in engineering. He moved to Rochester about 20 years ago to take a position with the Eastman Kodak Co. He and Mrs. Wesson (she also is a native of Springfield), live on a farm in Mendon.

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THE JUNIOR LEAGUE sponsored the big party at the Country Club, and John J. Reus was around to help out with it. Mr. Reus has been employed by the club, man and boy, for 41 years. That makes him the oldest employe in years of service. He doesn't quite go back to that memorable occasion in Brookline, Mass., when Walter Hagen won his first National Open; but the "Haig" was still club pro when Mr. Reus started there. His old side-kick, Herman Garbers, who went "way," way back in the club's history, died several years ago.

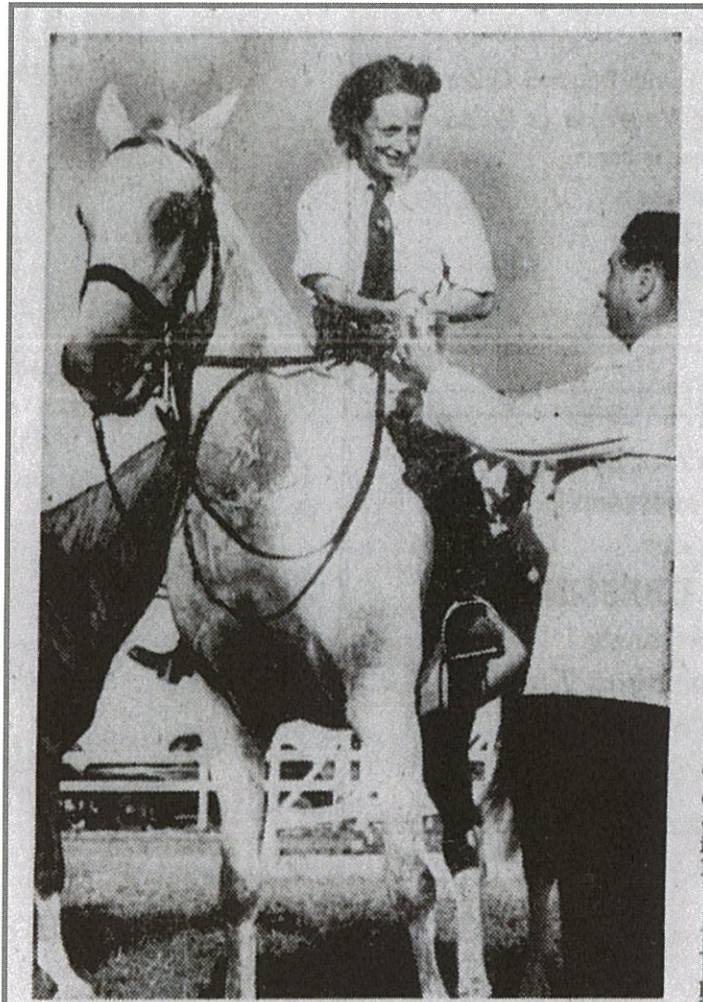
A bachelor, Mr. Reus formerly lived at the Country Club. Now, since he is semi-retired (he works only three days a week) he has moved to Fairport.

"I'm old enough to retire," he said. "But you know, you stay around a place like this 41 years, and you'd miss it if you quit entirely. I like it here. I like the people. So many fine people." He shook his head sadly. "And so many of them, I knew well, gone!"

A SLENDER WOMAN with tremendous vitality, Lucy Crawford of Lima uses her many talents in a variety of jobs.

Whether its giving tender loving care to a newborn human or a baby colt, running a tractor on a farm or re-papering a house, Miss Crawford has the skill and enthusiasm to carry the work through.

Five days a week she is on duty from 3 p.m. to 11:30 p.m. in the maternity wing of Highland Hospital. Up early in the morning, she works around her farm, does a bit of painting (woodwork not art) or paperhanging.

*Jesse W. Lindsay Succumbs at 82;
Son of Partner-Founder of Sibley's*

Private funeral services will be held Monday for Jesse W. Lindsay, former first vice president and director of Sibley, Lindsay & Curr Co. and a son of one of the department store's founders.

Mr. Lindsay died yesterday (May 23, 1958) in Strong Memorial Hospital at the age of 82. His home was at 1163 East Ave.

Mr. Lindsay had been in failing health since 1954 when he was taken ill at his summer home in Nantucket. Six days ago he suffered a hip injury when he fell at home. Death resulted from complications.

He was a Rochester native. As a youth he spent much time traveling with his parents and six sisters and brothers to Europe and through the United States. In this country they traveled by private railroad car.

Most of his early schooling was by private tutor. Later he attended Westminster Preparatory School in Simsbury, Conn., and then spent two years at the University of Berlin before transferring to Williams College.

While at Williams in the 1890s, his father called him to work in the store which the elder Lindsay, Alexander M. from Scotland, founded with Rufus Sibley and John Curr.

Jesse Lindsay began as a bundle boy and worked in every department. He became a first vice president in 1923. He retired March 1, 1935, and since then had devoted his time to managing his investments. Before he retired he was a director of Security Trust Co.

Hungry for a victory, Sammy Urzetta yesterday fired a pair of sub-par 71s to win medal in the National Open sectional qualifier at Monroe Golf Club yesterday.

Urzetta, the former National Amateur champ who now serves as Country Club of Rochester head professional, had only a so-so time of it on golf's money tour last winter.

And yesterday the medal almost slipped from his grasp as young Johnny Konsek of Buffalo, Purdue Big Ten champion, rallied strongly. But Urzetta carved three straight birdies to sew it up.

Kaczor Takes Third

Urzetta's 142 total, two under par for Monroe's 6568 yards, was two strokes better than Konsek, who had 73-71—144. Eddie Kaczor, chunky Buffalo amateur, snared the third spot with 73-72—145, while Pete Lipchik, an unattached professional from Erie, Pa., took the final berth at 75-73—148.

All four said they expected to make the trip to Tulsa, Okla., for the championship proper in June 14-16.

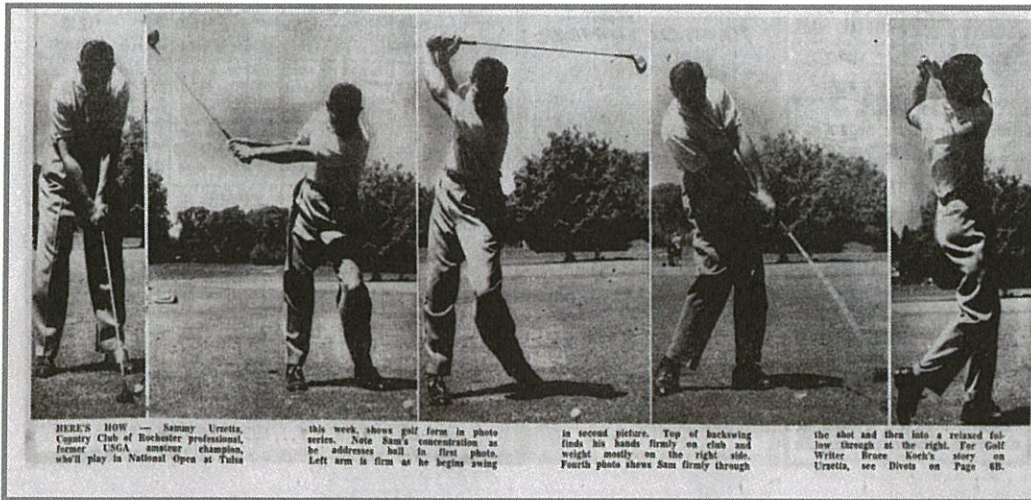
"When I say I'm a better

"When I say I'm a better golfer today than I ever was, I don't mean that I score better. But I control the ball better. I know what I'm doing when I step up to a shot."

Urzetta's chief problem lately, including his two trips on the pay-for-play winter circuit, has been putting. Sammy was a phenomenal putter as a youngster. But as veteran pro Vic Ghezzi pointed out when he was here two months ago: "Did you ever watch those youngsters putt? They don't even think of missing. Then they begin to realize that those five-footers can be missed and they wind up like we are today."

Sammy has one of the finest tee-to-green games in the business. He has a better chance against the big shots on a tough open course than on the circuit. If he can hole a few putts in Tulsa he'll be tough and prove the point that he hasn't played his best golf yet.

Tony Langan's 71 Wins CCR Medal

Tony Langan, the loquacious lawyer from Syracuse, stroked home a 35-foot birdie putt on the home green yesterday for a one-over-par 71 and medal honors in the 31st renewal of the Country Club of Rochester Invitation Golf Tournament.

Langan's great final stroke edged Rochester veteran Owen (Lucky) Luckhurst, who parlayed 11 one-putt greens and a 60-yard wedge shot into the 13th cup for a 72.

Par at CCR is 70, and it stood up well under the best shots of a 182-man field.

Dr. George Trainor, who has won the championship the last two years, opens defense of his title this morning when he meets the Rochester District champion, Bill Cory, in a match that could prove to be the most interesting of the season. Match play continues through tomorrow, with the final slated for 2 p.m.

Trainor, an automatic qualifier, played yesterday and carded a 73. He revealed after the round that he is playing despite a cracked rib in his left side. "Funny thing," chuckled Trainor, "I think it helps my game. Slows my swing down." Trainor looked in fine form as he impressed his future adversaries with a beautiful approach shot that stopped inches away from the cup on the 18th green.

Qualifying figure was 78. This became final when Norm Cameron of Boston holed a 20-

foot pressure putt on the 18th to avert a playoff at 79. A slight wind and CCR's slick greens were the only reasons that could be given for the comparatively high scores, although no one complained about the course.

Langan, a likeable 32-year-old who thrice has won the Syracuse City Championship, was out in 35, even par, and home in one-over 36. Tony, who studied law and philosophy at Oxford University in England, admitted after his round that it was the first time he had played in two weeks. His law business, which he has been practicing for seven years, keeps him from the links.

Tony, incidentally has a cheering section from Rochester, having married a city girl; the former Marge Bauer. They have two children, both boys.

As for his round, Langan had three birds—the 1st, 8th and 18th, while he slipped over par by a stroke on the 2nd, 3rd, 10th and 13th.

Luckhurst, of Ridgmont Country Club, had Langan by two shots going into the final three holes. Langan's par 3 at 16 evened it and the big birdie on the final hole decided.

Better golfers seem to play faster. Why don't all golfers try to step up and hit the ball—they'd be less likely to tighten up or freeze over the shot.

PETE BRENNAN, 99 Congress Ave., assistant pro to Sam Urzetta at CCR—Short holes always cause a tie-up. Before holing out, players on the green should allow those on the tee to hit.

While walking to your next shot, think about it. Try to select the club you are going to use—and step up and hit it.

Eliminate some of those practice swings and practice putts—unless of course—no one is playing behind you. If there is anyone behind, hole out and move on to the next tee.

MONROE (ROE) TOWNSEND, 1658 Clover St., vice president Parazin Corp.—I agree it is aggravating to play behind a slow group. But remember, many people feel golf is for relaxation and refuse to be hurried.

However, I feel that common sense and golf courtesy would speed up play.

Educate the youngsters to play fast and not dally. They're our golfers of tomorrow. And with tongue in cheek, I say: Restrict the women's play on weekends.

Thomas Gains Semis at CCR With 3 Out-of-Town Golfers

Medalist Tony Langan of Syracuse brushed aside two former Rochester District champions to gain the semifinal round of the Country Club Invitation yesterday.

Only one Rochester player—Terry Thomas—made the round of four, and Terry faces the red-hot Langan this morning.

The other semifinal match will pit H. J. (Deac) Chilton, a weekend golfer from Wellesley, Mass., against tall Billy Metzger, the Utica swinger who bowed to George Trainor in last year's final.

Metzger got revenge yesterday by eliminating the favored Trainor in a great match that lasted 21 holes.

Langan's victims yesterday were Bill Chapin, three-time winner of the District championship, and Cliff Goodrich, a double winner of the same event. Both matches were close. Although never in the lead, Chapin bowed by a 2-and-1 score in the morning play.

Against Goodrich it was nip-and-tuck, with Goodrich almost pulling it out. Two down with two to play, Goodrich rammed a 20-footer into the back of the cup for a birdie on the 17th, but then could only halve the 18th in par to lose.

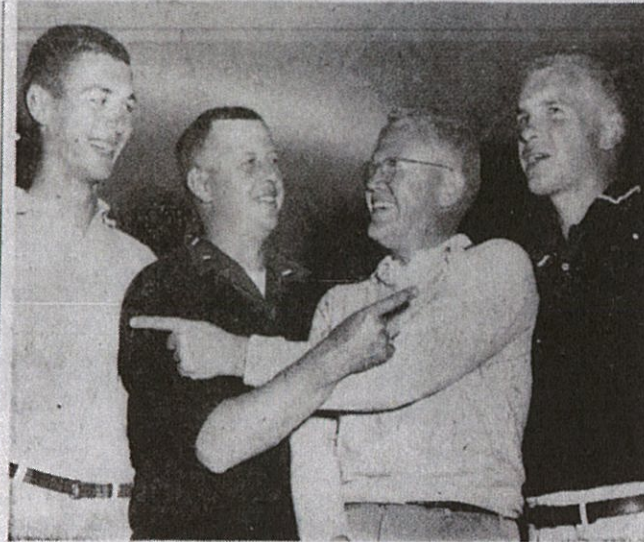
Turning point of the match, according to Langan was a one-iron shot—"the best shot I've hit in the tournament"—on the 15th. Using the driving iron for his second shot, Tony banged it 15 feet from the pin and birdied the hole to go two up, a lead that proved insurmountable to Goodrich.

Thomas, the 22-year-old Oak Hiller who was graduated from Duke University this month, played steady golf to dispose of redheaded Mort Reed in the afternoon after whomping Reed Moran, 6 and 5, in the morning.

Reed had a 3-under-par stretch, 6 through 16, to top Buffalo's Bob Fitzgerald in the morning.

Terry, runnerup in the District Championship three years ago, shot 14 pars and two bogies to top Reed.

It would be difficult to pick a winner. Thomas and Langan

Chilton advanced by defeating Billy Metzger of Utica, 3 and 2. Chilton was "about 75" medal, while Metzger didn't play his usual sharp game.

Chilton (Yale, Class of '35) who has been playing golf for 33 years without a title of any consequence, nabbed a one-up lead at the third hole against Thomas with a birdie three—one of three birds between the finalists. Terry got it back with a bird at the par-5 seventh, and then traded wins on the next two holes to make the turn even.

Thomas won the 10th and 11th with pars, and it looked as though Terry was home free, especially after he fired three more pars to carry a 2-up lead to the 15th tee.

Chilton won this one with a birdie, however, although he lost it when he missed the green on the short 16th and Terry again parred.

But on the 17th, a compara-

tively easy par four, Thomas hooked his tee shot, found tree trouble and took four strokes to reach the green. Chilton was on smoothly in two. Terry again hooked his drive on the 18th and it found a trap, while Chilton showed coolness with a well-placed drive and a good iron to the green. Chilton's par evened it.

Both drove long on the 19th. Chilton overshot the pin, while Terry cozied a wedge to within 10 feet of his objective. Chilton's approach putt slid off to the right, Thomas missed his bird by a blade of grass, but was the champ when Chilton pulled his 30-inch bid for a tie.

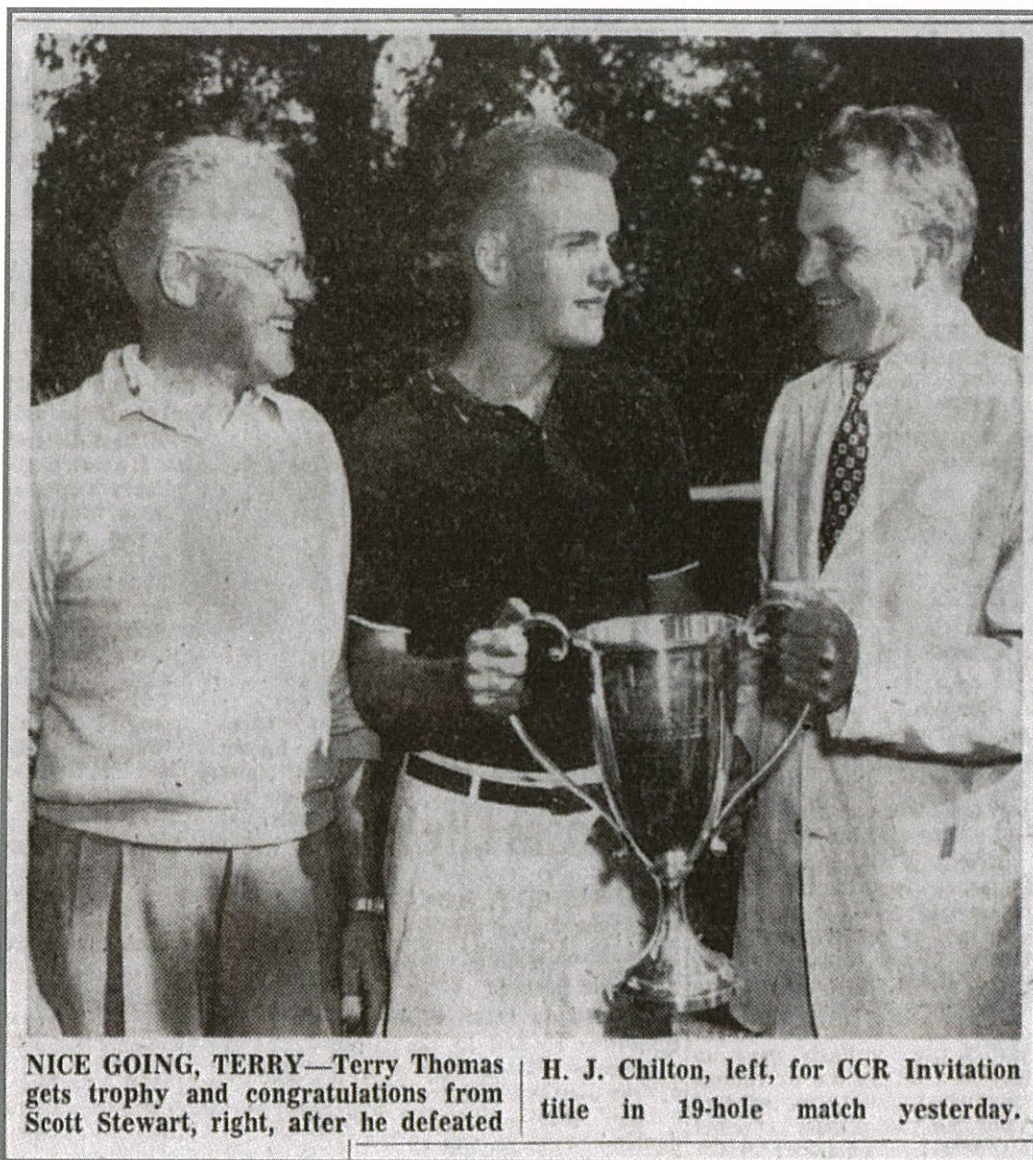

"IT MAKES a family club out of a golf club," said Mrs. Robert Cusson of Commodore Parkway.



With no tournaments scheduled for either Mrs. George Trainor or daughter Anne, it was up to Dr. Trainor to keep the family name in the golfing foreground yesterday.

He responded with a one-over-par 73 over Locust Hill Country Club's rain-slowed layout to win the medal in the qualifying round for the Rochester District Golf Assn. Championship.

He paced a field of 95 trying for 31 berths in the championship flight. Defending champion Bill Cory of Lake Shore played, but didn't try for the medal since he qualified automatically.

Trailing Trainor, the Country Club of Rochester swinger who copped the District crown 18 years ago and has won the medal five times, were four dealocked at 74.

They were George Herring and Bob Crawford, both of Durand, and Bill Thaney and Terry Thomas, both of Oak Hill. Dick Riordan of the host club and Jerry Liebel of Oak Hill posted 75s.

It took a score of 80 or better to make the championship flight. Hank Ogradowski (Durand), George Mercier (Oak Hill), Corky Root (Lake Shore), Pete Liebschutz (Irondequoit) and Bert Wing (Ridgemont) tied at that total for the remaining three positions in the No. 1 flight. Wing wasn't on hand for the playoff, and Root lost out, momentarily, on the first playoff hole, when Mercier and Ogradowski took par 4s and Liebschutz posted a 5. After hitting into a trap on the 13th to take another bogey, Trainor slid home a 15-foot putt for a birdie 2 at 15 and parred in for 37 and his 73.

Trainer, Simmons Win Way Into Final of District Golf

Warren Simmons, undefeated in Rochester District Golf Assn. championship play, moved mechanically into the 1958 final yesterday at Locust Hill.

He'll meet his stiffest test—Dr. George Trainor — for the crown in a 36-hole match beginning at 9 a.m. today.

For the 20-year-old Simmons, this is only his second appearance in the title tournament. He won it in his first try at Country Club of Rochester two years ago, taking five straight matches. Tack on four in the last two days at Locust and you have a nine-match winning streak for the unassuming youngster.

Simmons and Trainor both brushed aside a pair of foes

yesterday — Warren winning handily, while Trainor was pressed in both matches. Simmons ousted George (Babe) Herring, the hard-playing Durand entry, 4 and 3, with a one-under-par effort. He was four over in the afternoon, but still managed to beat Pete Bush of CCR, 4 and 3.

Trainor Wins on 21st

Trainor birdied the 21st hole in the morning to set down Terry Thomas of Oak Hill, and then bested tenacious Dick Riordan, the home club darkhorse, 2 and 1, in the semifinals.

The 20-year-old Simmons, who'll be a senior at Syracuse University next month, is a Phi Beta Kappa man who parlays his intelligence into winning golf. He isn't the type who tries a new swing, stance or putting

stroke every other week. "I developed my game some time ago," says Simmons. "Now I concentrate on the course I'm playing—mostly shot position and how to play the greens."

In Trainor, Simmons will find an equally astute player. The doctor has been a winner in local golf since he came here from Pittsburgh before World War II. He won the RDGA crown in 1940.

Riordan Comes Close

Riordan, a 34-year-old buyer for the Rochester Stationary Co., almost created a Horatio Alger story yesterday.

Dick was a caddy at Locust Hill around 1940 and became a member of his favorite club 10 years ago. He is not the Locust Hill champ. He never even qualified for the championship

flight in four previous appearances in the District. His main claims to fame are a few winning sweepstakes performances. As a matter of fact, that's when he plays his golf—on weekends.

But against Trainor, Riordan displayed coolness and it was a bad break on the 13th hole that helped put Dick on the sidelines.

Riordan held Trainor even through seven holes and had his clubmates and fans squeezing until the ninth when he caught a trap and went 1 down to Trainor's par. When Trainor won the 10th with a par, it looked like the beginning of the end. But Riordan dunked a 25-foot birdie bid from the edge of the 11th green and evened the match with another bird at 12.

Then on 13, a difficult 419-yarder with a creek cutting the fairway at 240 yards, Riordan's tee shot carried the creek, but backspin brought it back into the water for a penalty stroke. Riordan still managed a tie on the hole when Trainor bogied, but a win there would have been three in a row, put him 1 up, and just may have upset the doctor.

As it was, Trainor parred the 14th for a win when Riordan took three from the edge of the green. Then on 17, Trainor recovered nicely from a trap, birdied the hole and took the match.

Bush, 23-year-old University of Rochester grad who has been playing golf for only six years, had put out the defending champ, Bill Cory, in morning-round play as he shot one-over-par golf.

But he didn't have it against Simmons. The two youngsters halved only one hole on the front nine—the second in par fours. Simmons made the turn two up and played steady pars through the 15th to win two more holes and end the match.

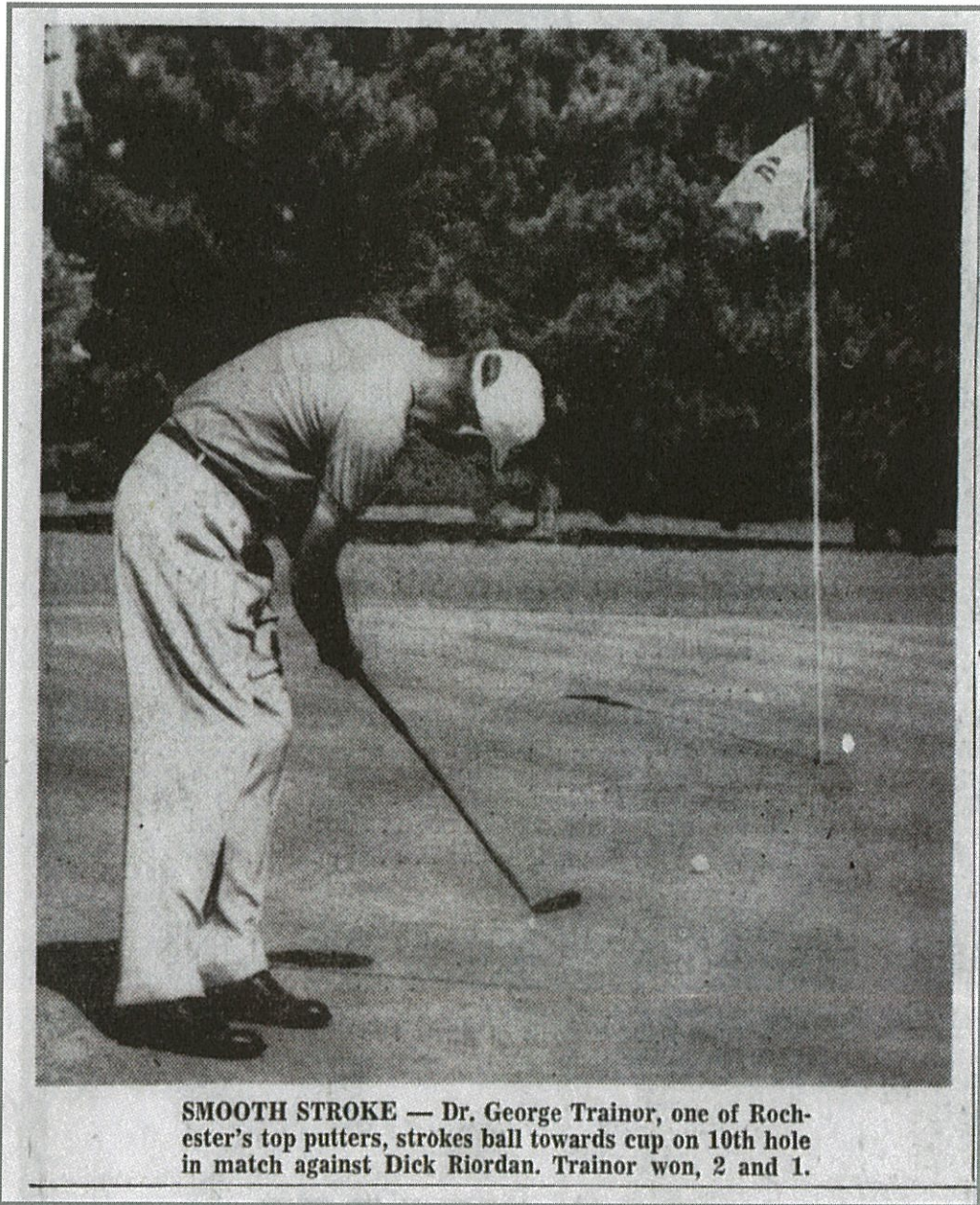

ED RANDALL is amazing, all right. But he's no septuagenarian. He's only 61. Like Shirley Temple, he simply has been on the sporting scene so effectively that he has taken on an unmerited air of venerability in some minds.

His golf does go back a bit, however. He caddied with Walter Hagen at the Country Club of Rochester nearly 50 years ago when "The Haig" toted bags before he became caddy master. And he learned his golfing fundamentals playing with Hagen and other caddies on Monday mornings at the club.

"Walter was a great showman even then," Mr. Randall recalled. "Some of the club members used to impress their guests by betting on Walter to hit a ball off the face of a watch. He'd put a couple of rubber bands on the watch so he could tee up the ball, then drive the ball down the middle of the fairway. I never saw him break a single watch.

"I used to caddy for George Eastman quite a bit. I lived in the stone house next to the Brighton Hotel on East Avenue, and Mr. Eastman would come and pick me up in his limousine. I'll tell you, I was some pork chop in the neighborhood when he did that. I sat in the front with the chauffeur and it was a real thrill.

"Mr. Eastman played frequently with Rochester Rogers. No, he wasn't very good. He'd shoot maybe 120. They'd play for dimes, and that was a serious business. If the caddy lost a ball, he was in real trouble. That usually meant Mr. Eastman would lose the hole—which would cost him 10 cents. He didn't like that a little bit."

In addition to his interest in soil research, Mr. Strong was interested in raising bees and was an avid bridge player and golfer.

Both he and his wife served on the board of Genesee Hospital. Mrs. Strong's grandfather was one of the founders of the Rochester Homeopathic Hospital, predecessor of the Genesee.

Mr. Strong was a member of St. Paul's Episcopal Church here and St. George's Commandery in Schenectady, the Genesee Valley Club, Country Club of Rochester, Oak Hill Country Club, Monroe Golf Club, Rochester Club, and the University Club.

His only daughter, Barbara, died in 1946. Besides his wife, he is survived by his two brothers, L. Wilton Strong of Fairport and Charles Strong of Rochester; two sisters, Mrs. Verne Smith of Schenectady and Sarah H. Strong of Lyme, N.H., and several nieces and nephews. Burial will be at the convenience of the family.
