Publishing Firm Officer, H. J. Henderson, Retires

An association of more than 41 years with the Lawyers Co-operative Publishing Co. ended yesterday with the retirement of Howard J. Henderson as a director, senior vice president and treasurer of the company.

He also relinquished the posts of chairman of the board of Bender-Moss Co., and director of Bancroft-Whitney Co., both of which are San Francisco affiliates of the local publishing firm.

Born in Palmyra Nov. 1, 1890, Henderson moved to Rochester at the age of 7 when his father, the late Rev. Josiah R. Henderson, a Baptist minister, was appointed corresponding secretary of the Rochester Theological Seminary, one of the predecessors of Colgate Rochester Divinity School.

He attended School 15, East High School and the University of Rochester, being forced to withdraw from the latter after one term because of illness. He entered the real estate business for two years before re-entering the U. of R., from which he was graduated in 1917 with a bachelor of arts degree. He was a member of Delta Kappa Epsilon fraternity.

On March 15, 1917, while still an undergraduate, Henderson became a part-time employe of the White Binding Co. which was merged into The Lawyers Co-operative in 1936 to become its present Binding Division. He continued as a full-time employe after his graduation. He was a physical director in the War Work Program of the YMCA at Camp Dix, N.J., prior to entering the U.S. Army in February, 1918, at Ft. Hancock, N.J. He was graduated as a second lieutenant in the Coast Artillery and was in training when World War I ended.

Returning to the White Binding Co. in 1919, Henderson served as manager and secretary before the merger with Lawyers Co-operative. In 1942 he was elected secretary of the company and a member of the executive committee. In 1948 he was elected vice president; he was chosen senior vice president in 1953 and treasurer in 1955. He was elected president of Bender-Moss in 1951 and chairman in 1955.

An avid sportsman and hunter, Henderson for many years has bred and raised prize English setters at his farm near Victor, winning his share of blue ribbons at field trials and dog shows throughout the eastern U.S.

He has been president of the Associated Alumni of UR and president of the Hubbell Class for Men at First Baptist Church, of which he is a member, and he is a trustee of Colgate Rochester Divinity School. He is a charter member of the Co-op 25 Club at his company, is a member of Doty-Magill Post, American Legion; the Country Club of Rochester and the University Club.

The annual show to be held in the Community War Memorial, would be on par with those in New York City's Madison Square Garden, Harrisburg, Pa., Toronto, Washington, Chicago and other important centers of the sport. It is expected to draw several hundred horses and run four days.

The sponsoring organization, Rochester International Horse Show Inc., was quietly formed last year to do the spade work. Its existence came to light through a letter from one of its directors, John W. Tarbox, asking the Civic Center Commission to allow the stabling of some of the horses in part of the center's underground parking garage which is connected to the Memorial by a direct ramp.

Clifford L. VanDerbogart, president, explained that no announcement of the organization was made "because, frankly, we haven't had anything to talk about yet." Although much of the preliminary work has been done, two crucial obstacles remain before the Rochester International Horse Show becomes a reality:

1—Sanction by the American Horse Show Assn., which would give the show big-time status and assure competition by top show horses. The association assigns the dates to each sanctioned show, so — although the local group considers September, 1960, a target date — the time of the first show remains undecided.

2—Arrangements for proper stabling, ideally in a portion of the underground garage

located, and the remaining another 200 to start—should be housed so they can be led directly from their stalls into the Memorial.

If these two problems can be worked out, the president felt that the show is assured. The Junior Chamber of Commerce has pledged itself to handle ticket sales and publicity, he said, and will receive any profits for use by its Youth Projects Committee.

Other members of the executive committee will be appointed later, VanDerbogart said.

Rochester's last major annual horse show, held in Edgerton Park, went out of the picture long before World War II. Since then the most important show in the area, drawing only sectional competition, has been that of the Country Club of Rochester.

Harvie Ward: "The top amateur in the nation."

The other two members of the U.S. team are Tommy Aaron of Gainesville, Ga., and Deane Beaman of Silver Springs, Md.

"You know," said Urzetta, "that it's a little different game over there with the weather and different turf conditions."

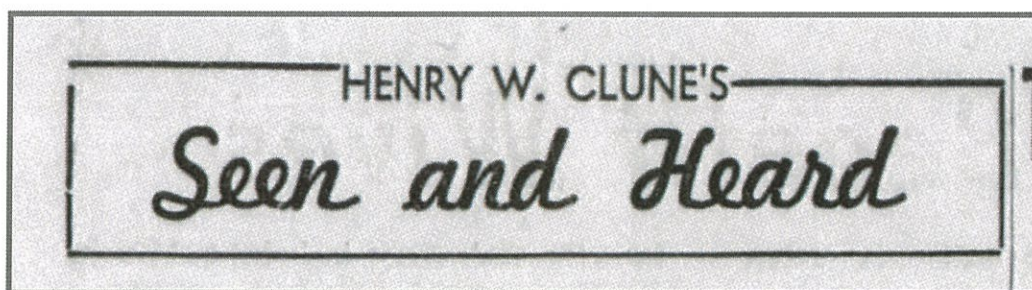

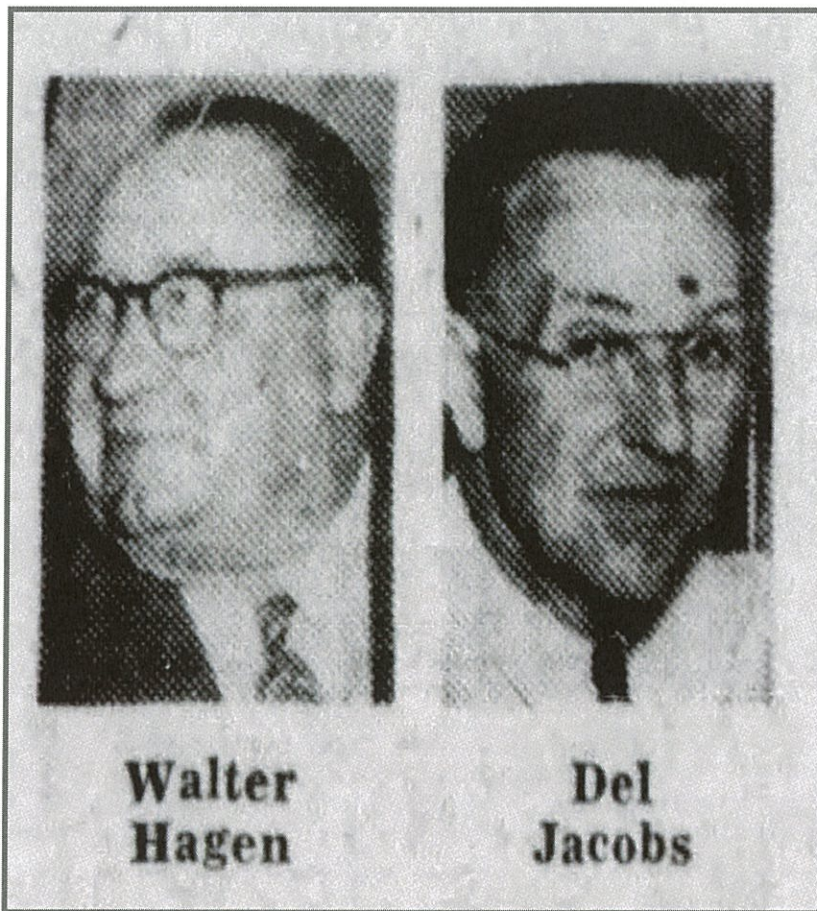
JACOBS' FEAT brings to mind a story about his close friend, the great Walter Hagen.

Finally, with a scornful look, Walter said, "No, I never had a hole in one. But I made an awful lot of twos."

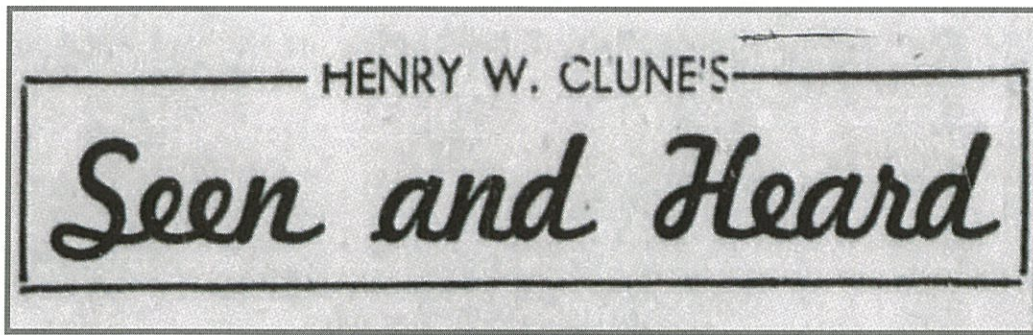

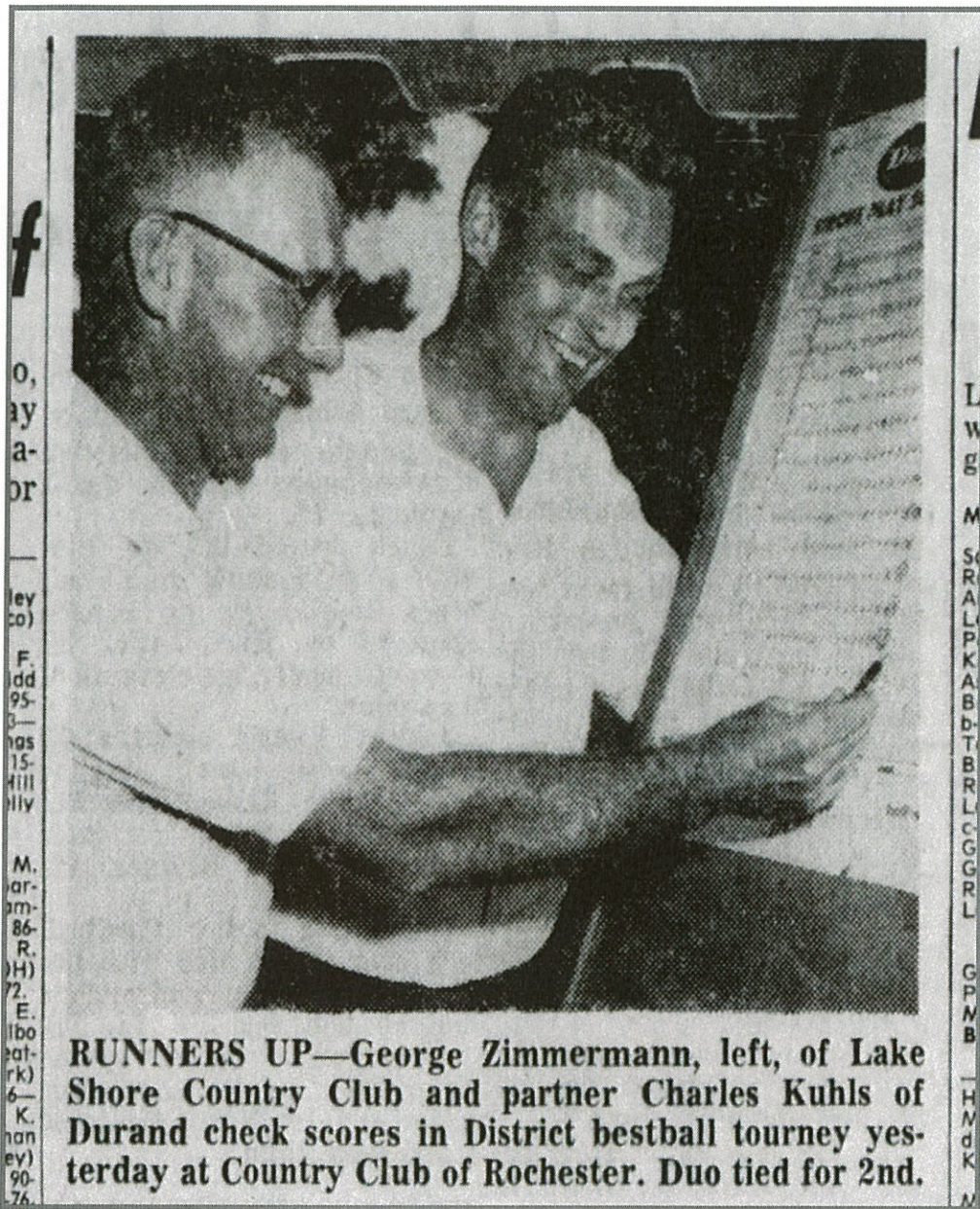

Tied with Bush and Wettlaufer are Doug LaBudde and Richard Dean of Ridgemont.

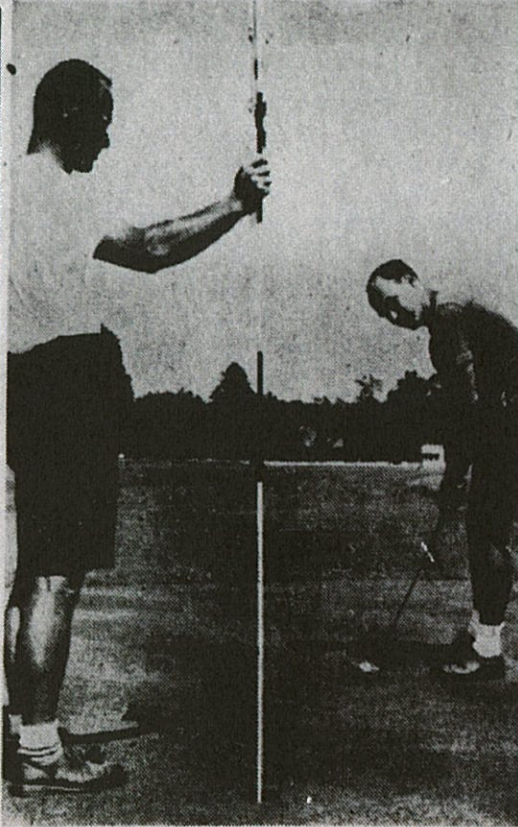
The tournament concludes with an 18-hole round today.

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COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., Sept. 14 (AP)—Robert Allen, a lanky automobile salesman from Pawtucket, R.I., brought off the principal upset of the first round of the U. S. Amateur Golf Championship today.

Allen, a 35-year-old father of three small children who don't give him much time for tournament golf, ousted Ward Wettlaufer of Country Club of Buffalo, N.Y., one of the younger members of the 1959 U. S. Walker Cup team, 2 and 1, in the opening round.

The disconsolate Wettlaufer, a quarter-finalist in last year's championship, couldn't explain what happened.

"I played very good golf," he said. "I hit two bad shots—on the second hole and the 17th, but he was ahead of me all the way."

Allen took the lead when Wettlaufer was trapped at the second, won the fourth, and stretched his lead to three holes in the sixth. He wouldn't let go as he played even par golf for 17 holes over the rugged, mountain-rimmed Broadmoor course.

Big Surprise of Day

Allen's victory was the big surprise of a day which saw defending champion Charlie Coe, ex-champions Harvie Ward, Jack Westland and Dick Chapman and virtually all the other favorites come through the first round unscathed.

Allen went out in 36, even par for the front nine of the 7,010-yard, par 36-35-71 course. He has only one up at the turn after three-putting the eighth and ninth greens and losing both holes to Wettlaufer's pars. He increased his lead with a par at the 413-yard 13th hole, lost the next and then ended the match on the 17th when Wettlaufer again hit into a trap.

Wettlaufer was one of nine U. S. Walker Cup players in the 200-man field which started the first round of the tough match play tournament.

Coe, the team captain, breezed to a 7-and-6 victory over Robert Meiering of Roswell, N. M.
