Money Isn't Everything

OUTSIDE THE PICTURE window, the 17th fairway was a wide, vast panel of snow. Inside the golf shop at Country Club of Rochester the head professional, Sam Urzetta, was winding up some book work. The ex-caddie from the other side of the tracks in East Rochester, the kid who had worked his way through St. Bonaventure and become a basketball star in the process, only to reject a draft by the Minneapolis Lakers, the "nobody" who had won the National Amateur from Frank Stranahan in 39 holes in 1950, was all settled down as a club pro. Except for one thing. The urge to compete still was too strong, and Sammy had just decided to take off for the Caribbean tour with his wife, Mary Ellen.

Sammy remembered one winter tour, long after his Walker Cup victories, when he averaged 72.53 swings for 43 rounds, and wound up with something less than \$300 in prize money, even though he was not three average strokes off the top money winner's pace. He was explaining how he didn't expect to win all the loot in sight.

"MONEY is important," said Sam, easily. "You need it to live. And I love competition. I crave it. The more I play, the more urge I get to win. But it's not just the money, nor the competition. The tour is good for me for other reasons. Matter of fact, it's cost us \$175 to \$200 for each of the five or six weeks. You can go cheaper, if you want to starve a little."

"The tour is important to me because golf is my business, not just playing. I want to become as good a golf pro as I can, playing and teaching, and this includes running a golf shop. There's a lot to this business I'm still learning, like keeping records and taking inventories. There's a lot of money tied up right here in the shop. I'm lucky to have a terrific assistant like Pete Brennan. That's important to any pro, the right assistant."

"On the tour, besides playing, I watch guys practice and I talk and I listen. Every golfer has a different problem. This way I get different ideas about playing problems, about how different pros run their shops. And playing under different conditions. All this helps my teaching. I like to teach. It does my heart good to see a person improve by following instructions I gave him."

"So the more tournaments I play, the better pro I become. At least that's my theory. I'm completely happy and satisfied here, having this club especially, and I hope they're happy with me. It's just that I want to be a better pro."

His Brother's Record

SAM GOT TO TALKING about his own golf, and the day he shot seven birds and an eagle, but wound up only 70, and how perhaps he played better when he didn't know so much. He talked about the three new holes that should be ready for the CCR Invitation in June, and how it was a very deceiving golf course. He recalled that in the Open qualifier Lionel Hebert was the only player to do anything to the course, and that was a 68.

He talked about the course record, 61, by the late George Christ, the pro, and 64 by Cliff Goodrich, the amateur. He talked about Frank Commisso, who has done so much for him. He talked about his own best score at CCR—53—a number he made not once but five times. And it was only natural, Sam being a solid family man, that the talk would get around to his family, and his big brother Joe, who was killed in the Huertgen Forest in Germany in 1944, only a few months after Sammy had enlisted, fresh out of high school.

THOUGH older, Joe was smaller than Sam, and today he would have been about 10 years older, 44 or 45. Sam caddied for him, and idolized him. He remembers Joe playing football without a helmet, and suffering a broken collarbone, and because of that injury, having to limit his backswing. "He developed a natural fade as a result," says Sam. "It was beautiful."

Jack Tucker, Frank Commisso and others of the area's amateur and pro golfing stars recall Joe as lighter, not the hitter that Sam is, but accurate. "He was a fine golfer," remembers Tucker. "There's no question in my mind he would have become a pro—he was good enough—had he returned."

"He was only about 5-8," recalls Commisso. "Joe was a good, gutsy player. Nothing disturbed him. He was a rawboned, exceptionally aggressive golfer. When he set his record 64 at the old Midvale, scoring was tougher. It was before they manicured the course. They had more trees, and since then some traps have been filled in. And no winter rules."

Joe's memory in his mother's home is perpetuated by a vigil light that has burned, alongside his picture, ever since the news came in 1944.

THERE is a story, too, about Sam perpetuating his brother's course record at old Midvale. The way it was told to me, Sam was having a tremendous round, and when he hit the 18th green, he needed only to get down in two to wipe out his brother Joe's record.

The story is that Sam refused to putt out.

Sam didn't deny it in the clubhouse this day, as he sat and talked. "Maybe it was a skin game," he said, evasively, "and perhaps I didn't have to putt out. I just don't remember."

Sam didn't deny it in the clubhouse this day, as he sat "It's true," said Nick yesterday. "You can't imagine how Sam worshipped Joe. He's his inspiration for every tournament. That day, Sam had the record in his hand. Instead, he knocked the ball away from the pin, and said, 'That record belongs to Joe.' And Sam walked off."

Hagen Honored By CCR Group

Walter Hagen, statistically the greatest golfer of them all, last night was honored with a lifetime membership to the Country Club of Rochester. "The Haig," who was born near the CCR, caddied there when he was 7 and broke 80 when he was only 11, currently is residing in Detroit.

The move by the Board of Stewards of the CCR was announced last night by club president Warren A. (Deke) Allen.

"Hagen's success has done great honor to the club," Allen noted in the announcement, "and tonight's action was unanimous. It is our desire to honor him for the great honor to our club by his association here."

Hagen, now 67, became assistant pro in 1908, and in 1913 became head pro, replacing Andrew Christie. Hagen finished second in his first American Open effort in 1912, at Brookline, and in 1914, then only 22, Hagen won the Open at Midlothian, Chicago.

Hagen left for Detroit, leaving the CCR post, in 1918. His tournament successes include two U.S. Opens, four British Opens and five PGA championships.

CCR Offers Bid For Amateur Golf

The Country Club of Rochester yesterday became one of approximately seven clubs to offer an invitation for the 1962 United States Golf Assn., Women's Amateur Championship.

William C. (Bill) Chapin and George Trainor, who hold positions in the USGA and also belong to CCR, made the official bid at the USGA's annual meeting in New York yesterday.

The tournament, which draws upwards of 160 of the nation's top distaff amateur golfers, will be played in Tulsa, Okla., this year and Seattle, Wash., next year. It will return to the East in 1962.

In 1953, the USGA Women's Open championship was held at CCR. Two other tournaments, the 1949 Men's Amateur, and the 1956 Men's Open, were held at Oak Hill.

Gosnell New Head Of Lawyers Co-Op, Ezra Hale Retires

Thomas H. Gosnell yesterday was elected president and chief executive officer of Lawyers Co-operative Publishing Co. by the firm's board of directors.

At the same time the board announced the retirement of Ezra A. Hale, president since 1942.

Gosnell joined Lawyers Co-op in 1946 after graduation from Yale University and five years of naval service. In 1950, he took over the management of a subsidiary, Beuer-Moss Co. in San Francisco. He became a director and the treasurer of the California company, offices which he currently holds, as well as a director of Baker, Voorhis & Co., Inc. of Mount Kisco, another subsidiary.

Gosnell was made a director of Lawyers Co-op in 1952, credit manager in 1954, controller in 1955 and treasurer in 1959, a post he will retain in addition to the presidency.

He is married to the former Georgia Potter of Rochester and resides with his wife and three children at 774 Lake Rd., Webster.

Hale, who also relinquishes his directorship, has served 44 years with the firm. He joined it in 1916, leaving the next year for a two-year hitch in the Army. Following his discharge, he married Josephine Booth of Rochester. At Lawyers Co-op he became successively collection department manager, assistant secretary, secretary, executive vice president and president. Twice during his presidency he added the duties of treasurer.

Hale has been a director of Central Trust Co. for many years and became its board chairman in 1959. He also has served on the boards of Rochester Friendly Home, Rochester General Hospital, Rochester Institute of Technology, Monroe County League for Planned Parenthood, Chamber of Commerce and Rochester Community Chest. He is a member and past president of the University Club, a member and former vice president of the Country Club of Rochester and a trustee of the University of Rochester.

European Chafer No. 1 Problem, Says USGA Greens Authority

For 99 per cent of the golfers, copper spot, helminthosporium, brown patch, red thread, dollar spot, Australian sod fly and broad-spectrum fungicide don't hold any interest.

But if such men as Alexander Radko, eastern director of the United States Golf Assn. Green Section, and the individual golf course greens superintendents weren't any more interested than the golfers, there wouldn't be the lush layouts on which to play.

Radko, in Rochester to inspect six courses, attended a special Rochester District Golf Assn. dinner at the Country Club of Rochester last night. Fifty greens keepers, greens chairmen and club presidents from RDGA clubs were on hand to hear a brief talk supplemented by slides and to take part in a question and answer session.

With Radko was Dutch Harman, a former county agricultural agent in New Jersey and now a part-time assistant to Radko. The two men, who leave this morning for Westchester County, toured Lake Shore, Oak Hill, Ridgemont, Monroe and Locust Hill in addition to the CCR.

"We found the courses had wintered much better than they did a year ago," Radko said. "The No. 1 problem, according to our inspections, is the European chafer, a relatively new insect in this area. It did plenty of damage to courses here last year, and it's traces are appearing again. The grub is almost identical to that of the Japanese beetle, and from what we have heard, it could be the European chafer that is causing so much havoc to lawns around here. Control of the European chafer requires a stronger dose of insecticide than the Japanese beetle."

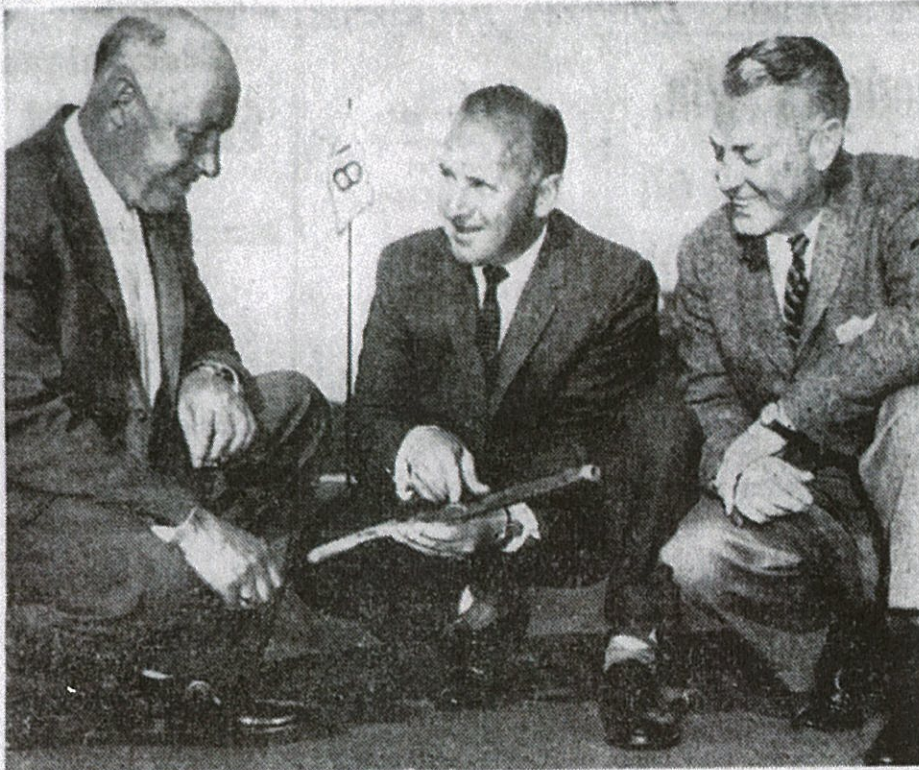

Business Up, Bankers Told By Economist

A business economist for the Federal Reserve Bank of Philadelphia said last night in Rochester that business is generally good — but not quite as good as optimists predicted it would be at the year's end.

John R. Bunting made the statement at the annual dinner of the Security Trust Co. in the Country Club of Rochester.

He said "business activity is proceeding at a good pace, though excessive optimism at the end of the year and the still lingering effects of the steel strike have distorted perspective more than somewhat."

Bunting stated that consumer spending for automobiles is proceeding at a more rapid pace than a year ago. However, the new "compacts" seem to be drawing sales from other domestic makes rather than from the foreign makes.

The economist also said:

Retail sales are good, though not as good as expected at the turn of the year.

Spending on new plant and equipment seems to be gaining momentum.

Government spending will probably rise slightly before the year end . . . as a result of increased state and local government expenditures.

For your information, Miss Rawls says: "People interested in bettering their golf are better off watching a topnotch woman golfer play than a man. Men are much stronger and can get away with mistakes. A woman must learn to swing correctly to hit a golf ball correctly." Betsy is well qualified on the subject of golf. Since she turned pro nine years ago, she has won more than \$100,000 on the tournament trail. Last year she snared an unprecedented 10 titles. Since 1951, she has won 36 championships, including the National Open in 1951, '53 and '57. The 1953 tournament was held at the Country Club of Rochester.

Betsy is 32 years old and one of two children from not-too-well-to-do parents of Austin, Tex. "Golf is 50 per cent mental," states Miss Rawls, who is a Phi Beta Kappa

grad of the University of Texas. "This includes 'desire' and believe me, without a combination of a relaxed mind and desire to win, you don't go any place in this game.

"Sleep is one of the most important things in playing good golf. You've got to have plenty of it, along with a proper diet," says Betsy. Miss Rawls gets plenty of rest, eats well and doesn't smoke.

The 24-year-old Oak Hiller, winner of this event two years ago and medalist in the invitation at Monroe last week, used his best round of the year to romp home three strokes in front of his nearest competitor in the field of 191 swingers.

Thomas played only the final two holes in the rain, but while later starters were hampered a bit by an off-again-on-again drizzle, Terry and the other early starters faced a stiff breeze. Nevertheless, scores were low and a playoff at 74



Bob Eckis Jr. of Buffalo, a non-resident member of CCR, posted the lone 71, while 72s were registered by Tony Langan (Syracuse), Ron Brownell (Utica), Tom Henkel (Locust Hill) and Bert Wing (Lake Shore). Qualifying at 73 were Jack Mollica (Syracuse), Terry Newell 3rd (CCR), Pete Bush (CCR) and Roe McBurnett (Utica).

Five 74s played off for the final four places in the 16-man title flight. Making the grade were Don Allen (CCR), Pete Liebschutz (Irondequoit), Fred Grover (Midvale), and Lick Thornton (Oak Hill). little golf this year, was 36-34 for his 70. Eckis' 27-34—1 card showed seven 3s.

Thornton Wins CCR Invitation

Invitation championships, extra-hole match triumphs and great pressure shots have become happy habits for Jack Thornton.

Oak Hill's one-man assault on the local golf scene plunked a wedge stiff to the pin on the second extra hole yesterday to outlast Don Allen of the home club for the title in the Country Club of Rochester's 33rd annual invitation tournament.

Facing what seemed certain defeat in both the semifinals and final, Thornton presented himself a fine Father's Day gift—his second major area crown this month. He went extra holes in his last two matches last Sunday to cop the Monroe Invitation.

For an East Bloomfield lass, however, summer is a period of hard work, as she trains her horses and appears in horse shows virtually every weekend. The reason for this prodigious labor? Carolee Bennett has a consuming ambition to be entered in the Madison Square Garden Horse Show next November.

Carolee, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harold (Bud) Bennett, will enter horse shows on eight consecutive weekends this summer. The first, July 10, will be held at Wintow Farm in Victor. It is run by Mrs. Madeline Meiner, one of New York's most enthusiastic horsewomen.

Other shows Carolee will enter will be in Avon; Mendon fire department show at Oakridge Farm, Pittsford; the Country Club of Rochester; Ackerly Horse Show, at Clark's Summit, Pa.; Great Barrington, Mass.; the fire department show at the Roger Young farm, Pittsford and the Buffalo Saddle and Bridle show.

A "bug" about horses since she was about 4½ years old, 17-year-old Carolee has appeared in about 30 shows in the last four years. The most recent was in Lancaster, Pa., earlier this month. In April she won an "Excellent" rating at the Farm and Home Center in Canandaigua.

The attractive, blond student at Columbia School, Rochester, began riding in earnest when her father gave her a Thoroughbred mare for her 10th birthday. She recently acquired a thoroughbred race horse. With the help of her trainer, Jack

During the hot, summer weeks she must ride a minimum of four times a week and school her horse three times a week. Recreation? Well, when she wants to relax she mounts her horse and goes on trail rides.

If trail riding seems to be too tame a form of recreation, Carolee likes to go fox hunting, when she can, on the Wadsworth estate in Genesee or at Limestone Creek, near Syracuse.

She also attends clinics from time to time, at which prominent horse show judges give tips on riding and show techniques.

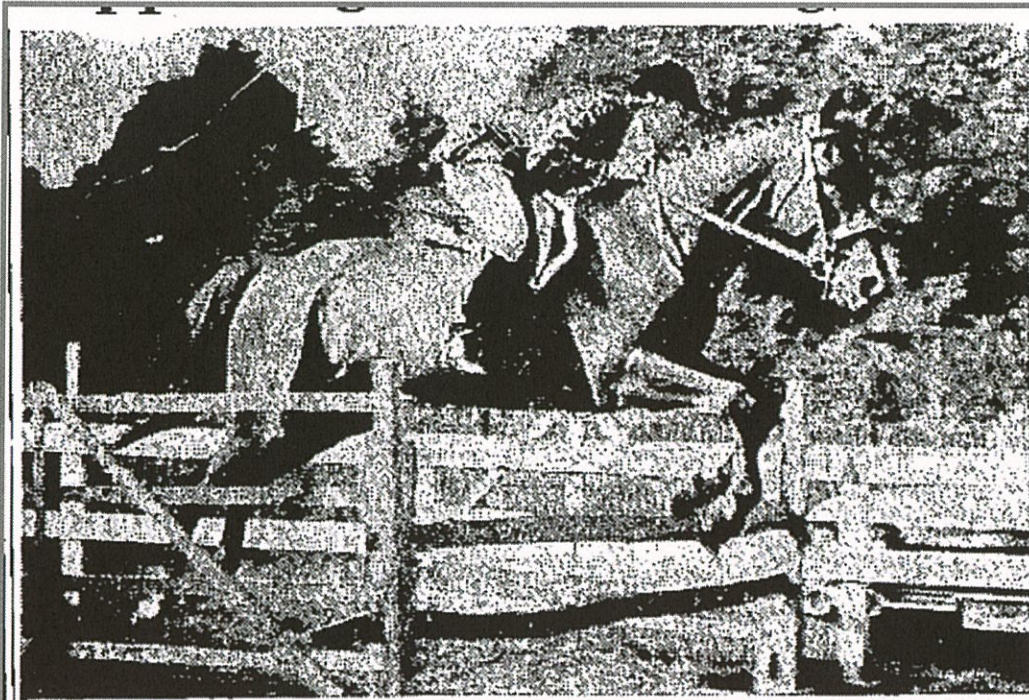
A versatile horsewoman, Carolee has exhibited in "green" hunter, working hunter, children's working hunter, confirmation and equitation divisions of horse shows.

To realize the goal of appearing in Madison Square Garden, the American Horse Show Assn. selects the winners of the nation's top horse shows on a cumulative point basis. Awards are given at the Garden at the end of the season.

Despite a couple of broken arms and an assortment of abrasions and contusions acquired from spills she has taken during her career, Carolee always gets back on her horses as soon as possible. "I'd hate to run the risk of losing myself confidence," she said, "so I always get right back on my horse."

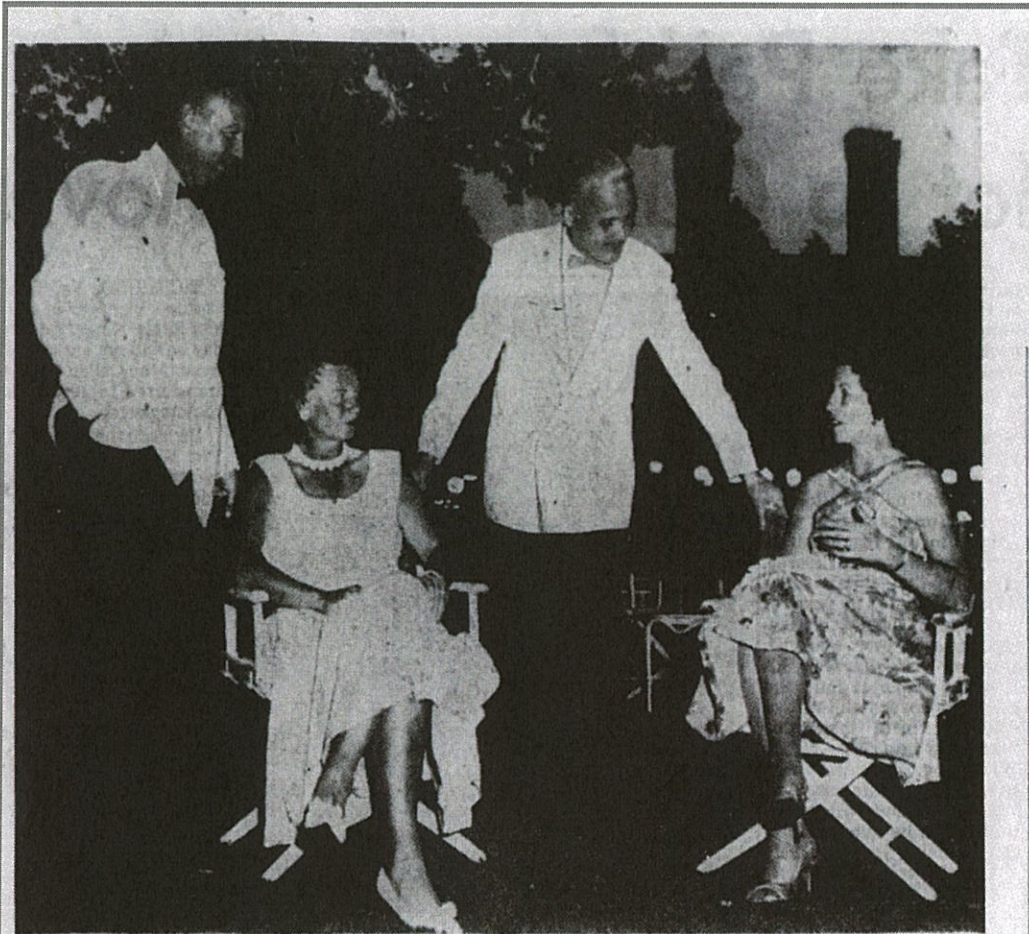

He's a Bogeyman!

IN AKRON, Ohio, site of the Professional Golfers' Assn. title chase, the name of a native East Rochesterian is "verboten."

Why? Because most of the contenders are holding Robert Trent Jones to account for some of the awful things that have happened for the last three days on the exacting Firestone Country Club layout. (See other story, Page 1C.)

Long considered the world's foremost golf course architect, Jones "can't understand" the protests and teeth-gnashing by the pros over his remodeling work.

R. T. J. two years ago was asked to toughen the 6,585-yard, par-72 links. He took the job. Among other things, this is what the Montclair, N.J., resident and Cornell University grad did:

- 1—Dropped par to 70 and increased the yardage to 7,165.
- 2—Added 22 fairway traps some 240 to 275 yards from the tees.
- 3—Ordered the construction of 28 additional traps around the greens (they are his specialty—narrow, shallow flash sandtraps).
- 4—Relocated 16 of the 18 tees.
- 5—Directed that some 350 trees be felled to make room for a new 16th tee. (Masters and U.S. Open Champion Arnold Palmer carded a triple bogey 8 on this 625-yard, par-5 hole yesterday, and earlier had labeled the hole "ridiculous.")
- 6—Demanded that the fairways be clamped to an average width of 35 yards.
- 7—Permitted the rough to grow much longer.

The revamping drew such comment as:

"Nightmare . . ."

"There is more danger here than in a dark alley . . ."

"There are so many trees that the late Joyce Kilmer's line about a tree being lovelier than a poem doesn't have any buyers here . . ."

"The man is sadistic when he gets to a golf course . . ."

"After he rebuilds a golf course he ought to be sentenced to play 36 holes a day on it . . ."

. . . target of pros' gripes

Jones, a frequent visitor here, drew the plans for Durand-Eastman and Midvale courses; remodeled the Oak Hill Country Club East Course for the 1956 National Open championship; recently supervised the construction of three new holes at the Country Club of Rochester, and several years ago laid out the 17th green, with its surrounding "chocolate drops," at Locust Hill.

Does criticism by the pros trouble Mr. Jones? Uh-uh.

"I've always found that the cream invariably rises to the top on a course which is a great test of golf," he says. "A great course reduces the chances of a scambler winning. The winner at Akron will be a great shotmaker . . . with a score of 283 or 284."

Golf Ever Sport To Ouimet

Oak Hill Dedicates Tree to Star

By HANS TANNER

HOW many golfers who could win the U.S. Open at the age of 20 and the National Amateur at 21 would abstain from turning professional?

Chances are that Francis Ouimet, in Rochester yesterday for Hill of Fame tree dedication ceremonies at Oak Hill Country Club, was, is and will be the only golfer in history to fit that description.

"Golf always was and has been recreation and sport for me, and that's the perspective in which I've wanted to keep the game. Besides, I thought I could do better in business. I've done all right and never regretted what I did," said Ouimet, at 68 still active in the brokerage business in Boston.

It was in 1913 in Brookline, Mass., his hometown, that Ouimet bested Harry Vardon and Ted Ray in an 18-hole playoff for the Open crown in his first try. He was the first amateur and was and still is the second youngest player ever to win the Open. Horace Rawlins was 19 when he copped the title in 1895. Ouimet is one of six who captured that event in his first attempt.

2d Youngest to Win Amateur

THE FOLLOWING year he became the second youngest to win the Amateur until Jack Nicklaus turned the trick at 19 last year. Until then Louis James (1902), Chandler Egan (1904) and Jess Sweetser (1922) at 20 were the youngest. Francis came back 17 years later, in 1931, to beat Jack Westland for the Amateur championship. Westland grabbed the title 22 years later—in 1952.

Ouimet, who played a round over the East Course yesterday in a two-foursome group that included Bill Chapin, Jim Weldon, Nels Lengeman, Marty Gullen, Howie Youngman, USGA vice-president C. W. Benedict and New York State Golf Assn. prexy John Ward, once played a "friendly round" with Walter Hagen at the Country Club of Rochester in 1917 and was at Oak Hill in "1935 or 1936."

His appearance then at Oak Hill also was for dedication of an oak tree. That tree is located behind the 18th green of the East. Trees previously dedicated on the Hill of Fame, located between the 10th tee and the approach to the 13th green, honor President Eisenhower, Hagen, Gene Sarazen, Ben Hogan, Cary Middlecoff, Chuck Evans, the late Babe Didrickson Zaharias, Bobby Jones, Chapin and Dr. John R. Williams, who originated the Hill of Fame idea.

Whole Game Has Changed

HOW DOES OUIMET feel Arnold Palmer would have fared back "in the old days"? "He would fare well in any era," he replied, "but you never would have seen his money winnings come within range of the some \$75,000 he has collected this year. Why, around 1913 and '14 a professional winning the National Open would get only \$300.

"The whole complexion of the game has changed," Ouimet said. "Equipment—mainly the steel-shafted clubs and higher pressure golf balls—and courses have been the big changes. The courses are longer now, but the difference in equipment more than makes up for the added length and consequently the boys hit them much farther and score lower today."

And how is Ouimet playing these days?

"Terrible," he said. "I'm just a once a week or once every two weeks golfer now. I belong to three clubs and have handicaps of 6, 7 and 8, but next year they'll probably be 7, 8 and 9."

That's terrible?

Del Jacobs and Golf Were Synonymous

"If he had to die, he probably would have wanted it to happen exactly as it did — on a golf course."

This was the consensus of James D. (Del) Jacobs' friends last night when they learned of his death by heart seizure yesterday near the second green at the Country Club of Rochester.

Del, 62, died where he had spent a great deal of his life — on the CCR grounds. Mr. Jacobs was a retired businessman (he once owned a dairy and had real estate interests). He had considerable free time and he spent it helping — gratis — at the Country Club, serving as starter, score-keeper, etc., for the club's many tournaments.

He played there back in the days of Walter Hagen and the late George Christ, both close friends. He was a proficient golfer, even in his later years when on several occasions he managed to crack CCR's par 70.

One of the highpoints in his golf career was the 1937 Rochester District Golf Association championship tourney, when he was runnerup to five-time winner Jack Tucker. Although Tucker won in a rout, Mr. Jacobs often talked of it in later days, poking fun at himself.

On July 5, 1959, he scored his only hole-in-one in four

decades of golf, and, appropriately it came at CCR. It was on the 154-yard 15th hole and Del used a 6-iron. He shot a 71 that day.

Jacobs' friends and acquaintances were legion. He was known by golfers across the nation. He usually wintered in Florida and seldom missed the Masters Tournament at Augusta, Ga.

Paying tributes were:

Sam Urzetta, CCR professional: "Del's life was devoted to the game of golf. He made

himself available whenever he was called upon to help the game."

Frank Commisso, Irondequoit professional: "This town lost a man who did a lot for golf. He was the liaison man between Rochester and Walter Hagen. Whenever anyone wanted to contact Hagen, they'd ask Del. I had breakfast in Phoenix, Ariz., with Tom Crane, executive council of the PGA. He inquired about Del."

Godfrey McGarvey, Brook- Lea professional: "He was the type of fellow always ready to do you a favor."

Steve Ferentz, Ontario pro and former assistant at CCR: "Del was a reliable guy. Why, when I worked at CCR I never got too much chance to play. Del would stop in on Monday afternoons and tell me to go and play nine holes while he watched the shop."

Chuck Jack, president of the RDGA: "Del was a great worker for the Rochester District Golf Association. His pay was not commensurate with the number of hours he put in. We'll certainly miss him."

Mr. Jacobs' playing companions yesterday were Don McConville, Dick Eisenhart and Sam Urzetta.

Befittingly, Del parred the last hole he ever played.

James (Del) Jacobs Will Names 2 Churches

Two churches are among the beneficiaries under the will of James D. (Del) Jacobs, which was admitted to probate yesterday.

Mr. Jacobs, a well-known golfer, died Nov. 26 at the age of 62 on the Country Club of Rochester course. He lived at 1805 Penfield Road, but most of his life was a resident of Fairport, where he was born. He retired from the dairy business some years ago.

Requests of \$2,500 each were listed in the will for Advent Christian Church, Penfield, and to Evangelical United Brethren Church, West Walworth. The latter gift was made in memory of the late Mrs. Lavina Jacobs, the testator's first wife.

The petition for probate listed the size of the estate as in excess of \$20,000, but it's expected that a complete inventory will put it in the neighborhood of \$100,000.

Mrs. Edna E. Jacobs, the widow, will receive an outright bequest of \$5,000, the family home, certain personal property, and during her life all income from the estate. Should the income fall below \$3,600 in any year, the trustees are instructed to bring the widow's benefits up to that figure from principal.

Mrs. Jacobs and Lincoln Rochester Co. were named executors. The bank was appointed trustee. Nixon, Hargrave, Devans & Dey appeared as attorneys for the estate.

Other specific bequests are: \$1,000 each to Russell E. Welkley of North Rose, Mrs.

Jacobs' nephew; his wife, Mrs. Helen E. Welkley, and Barbara Ann, Joanne E. and Edmund M. Becker, all of Beaver Falls and all relatives of the first Mrs. Jacobs.

Forty-nine per cent of the residual estate will ultimately go to Russell and Helen Welkley. Another 27 per cent of it will be shared equally by six relatives of the first Mrs. Jacobs: Arthur Welkley of Lonesome Road, Fairport; Esther Flewelling, now living in Japan; June W. Hannah of Staunton, Va.; James L. Rothfuss of 1648 Five Mile Line Road, Penfield; Floyd Rothfuss of Atlantic Avenue, Penfield, and Stanley Welkley of 17 Woodlawn Ave.

The remaining 24 per cent of the residue will be equally divided among Glenn Welkley of 2081 Baird Road, Penfield; Howard Welkley of 170 Westminster Road; Thelma Brooks of 2455 Penfield Road, Penfield; Florence Schriber and Ruth Russell, both of Fairport; Charles L. Welkley of 1018 Penfield Road, Penfield; Loretta Salmon of 1022 Penfield Road, Penfield; Clarence Shull of 90 Woodgate Road, Brighton; Edwin Shull of 85 Sierra Dr., Greece, Francis Shull of 2464 Browneroft Blvd., Brighton, and Marjorie Derrenbacher of Sodus. All these, too, are relatives of the first Mrs. Jacobs.
